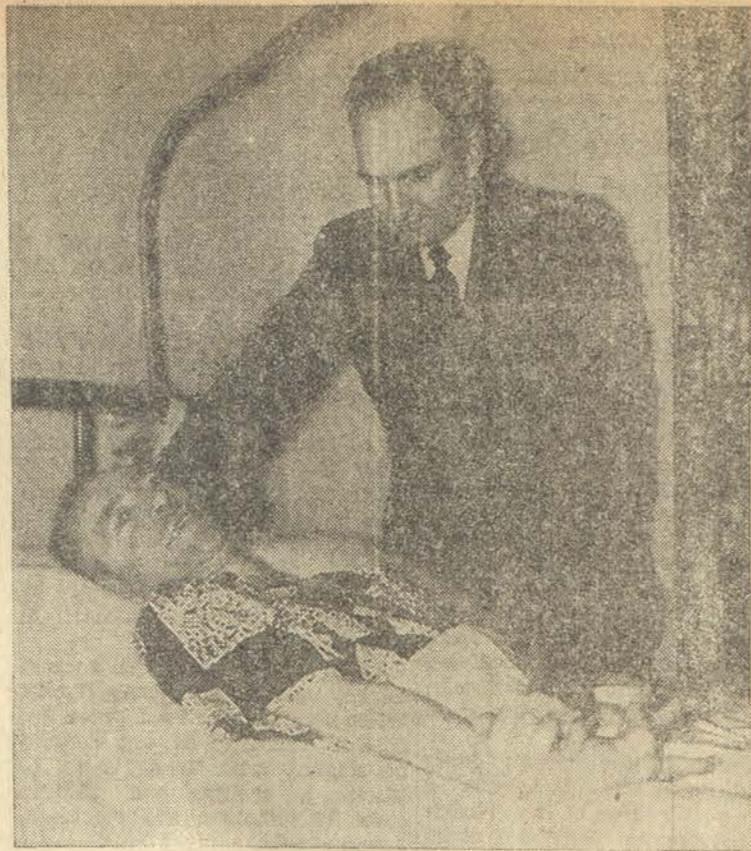

The firm seeks a restraining order against the United Mine Workers and its affiliated District 50, United Construction Workers, to prevent picketing of its property and "intimidation of employees during the current strike." The strike began Feb. 11.

Thirteen officials and members of the unions are cited in the petition. The firm also charged that three of its linemen were fired upon while repairing a broken pole in the Feds Creek section of Pike county last week.

Edgel Hutchinson, of District 50, one of those named in the action, has denied any intimidation of company employees. He said the bullets came closer to the union pickets in the Feds Creek incident than they did to the linemen.

Hutchinson added: "We picket company projects but we picket peacefully and we don't interfere with emergency projects."

Hutchinson said his company has signed 55 of the company's 60-odd production and maintenance employees, but company officials refuse to discuss the subject of union recognition.

Also named in the court action is Carson Hibbits, field representative for the U.M.W.

The company's petition charged that 25 pickets in five cars followed linemen to the Feds Creek area and threatened them while they were working to restore service to the area. It added that while three linemen were up a pole they were fired on from a nearby woods "by persons unknown to the plaintiff."

Hutchinson said the pickets had offered to help set the new pole and were refused by the company. He said one of the bullets fired from the woods landed in a creek near the pickets.

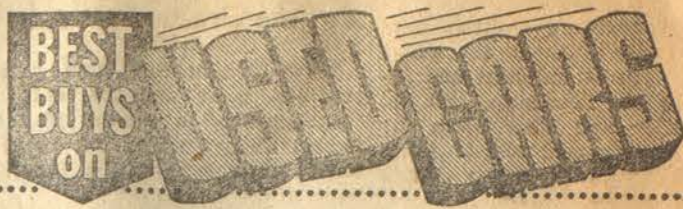

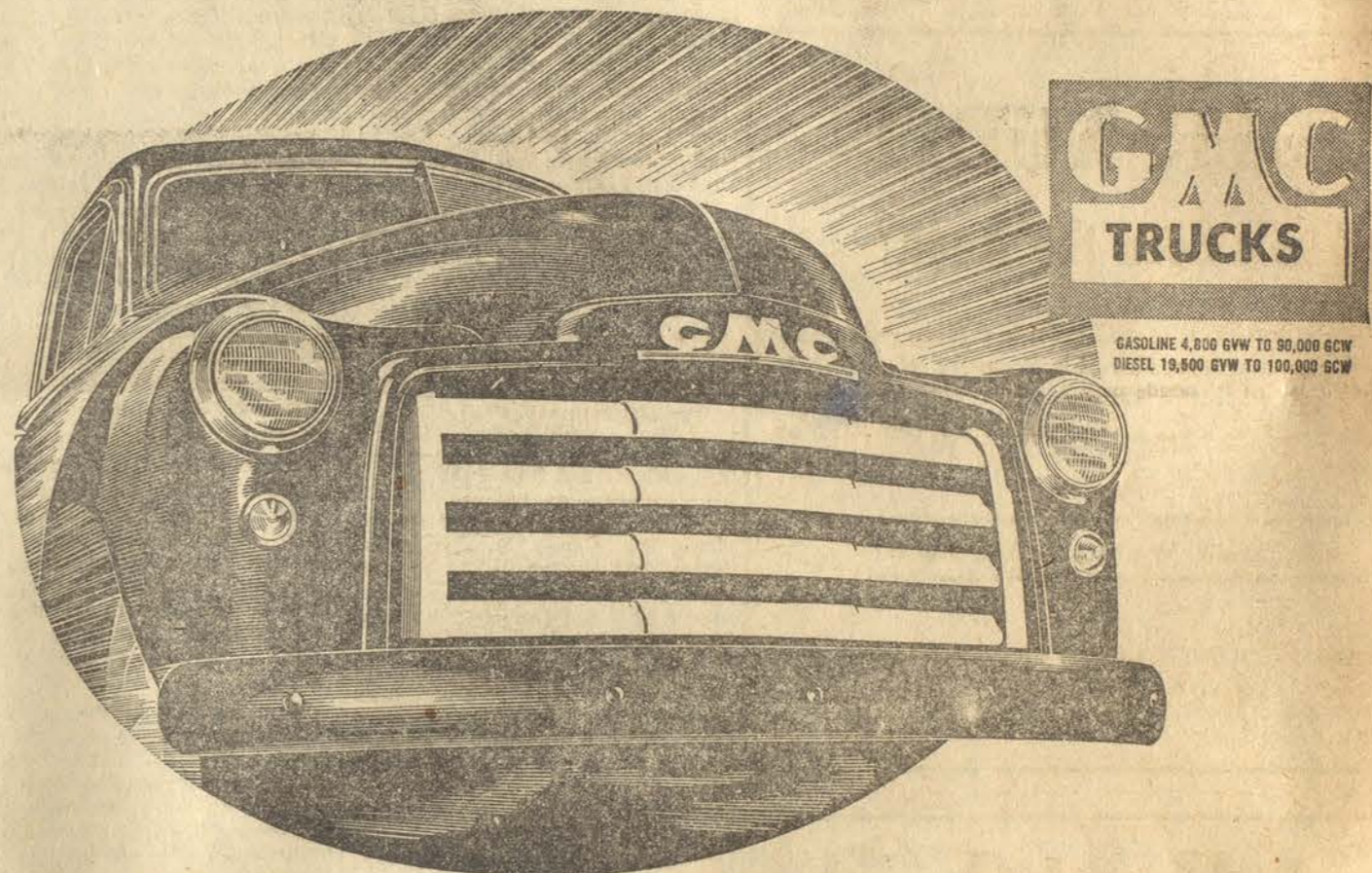

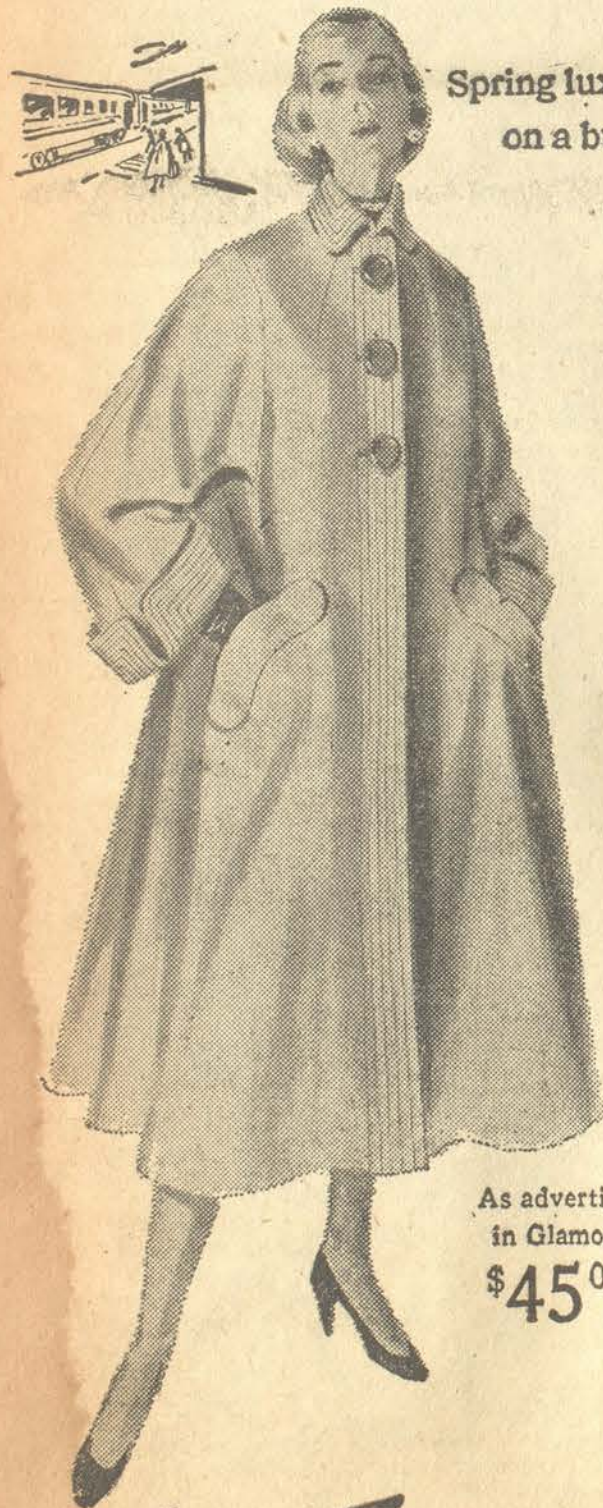

STATE LAWS APPLY

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 24—The new federal mine safety law does not suspend or supersede Kentucky mining laws in this field, but is supplementary to the state laws, the State Department of Mines and Minerals has been advised by the Attorney General's office here.

The first game will be played Tuesday night at 7:30, with Betsy Layne meeting Garrett in the only contest of the evening. All other sessions will begin at 7 p.m., except Saturday night's championship game which will begin at 8. Lawrence Price, tournament manager, said.

Wednesday night, Prestonsburg will meet McDowell in the first game, and Wheelwright will face Auxier in the second. Thursday night's games will pit Wayland, the host team, against the winner of the Betsy Layne-Garrett tilt, and Martin against neighboring Maytown. Friday night's semi-finals will name the two teams to meet the following evening for the title.

Doors of the gymnasium will open an hour and 15 minutes before game-time, each evening. There will be a few reserved seats available through local school principals, Mr. Price said. Charles "Greasy" Hughes and Sid Meade will officiate all games.

Trophies will be awarded to the championship team and the runner-up, for sportsmanship and to the best foul shot. Individual miniature basketballs will be awarded to the all-Floyd team of 10 and to all members of the winning and runner-up teams.

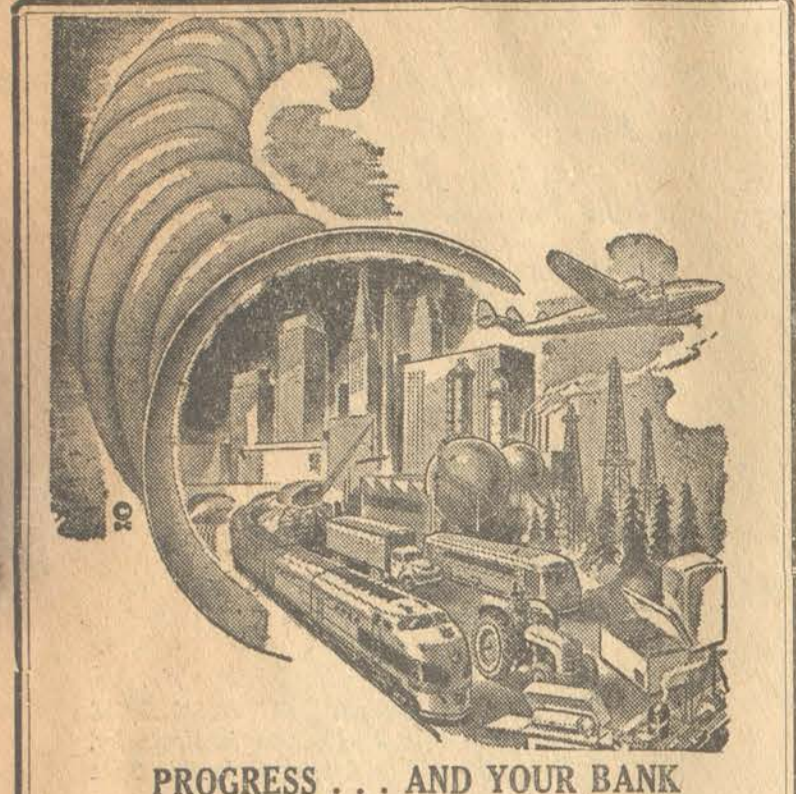

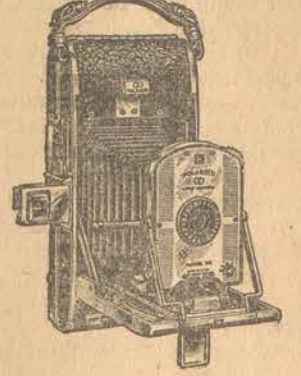
