Last year, approximately 75,000 trees-most of them pine, as is the case this year-were planted on Floyd hillsides.

The Imana Steel Company which began its reforestation program a few years ago has received 45,500 trees, and expects to set 50,000 this year. It planted the same number last year. These trees are being placed in the vicinity of Wheelwrigh and Price. Another coal company which has done rather large-scale tree-planting is Princess Elkhorn at David which, this year, ordered 8,000 trees, the same number as last year's

The largest order placed by an individual is the 5,000-tree shipment Joe W. Jarrell will plant on his Bull Creek farm. Other orders for trees. most of which have been received.

# A LOOK at the FACTS

When a man is publicly attacked, there are always two questions that come to mind: Who are the ones making the attack and what reasons do they have for so doing? The attack and smear campaign has been waged against me by a group of defeated candidates and people that seek to do me harm politically. Some of these men I have opposed in their attempt to be elected, and others have been interested in candidates I have opposed. If it had not been the motive and intention of these disgruntled politicians and office seekers to create a prejudice in the minds of the people why did they file suits against and give unfavorable publicity to certain office holders and say nothing about certain others? This has been a double barrelled campaign of smear and whitewash-to smear some and whitewash others.

Had it ever occured to you that it is easy to hide behind a bright light? What would happen if the lights were turned around? Compare the acts, deeds and reputation of the seven men accused with those making the accusations. Abraham Lincoln once said, "You can fool all the people some of the time and some of the people all the time, but you can't fool all the people all the time". You know which of these socalled accusers have been candidates, are expecting to be candidates, or have close relatives that are candidates. For several months this group of individuals has made certain accusations against me and certain other office holders. They have never said that I have received one dime that I was not legally entitled to receive. In fact I stated in my deposition that I had not received one dime that I was not entitled to receive for my services as your elected official, and the attorney for the Taxpayers League stated "We have never said you did." Likewise they never told you that I had failed in the performance of my duty or that I had not ably represented the people of Floyd county, or that I had failed to help and accomodate the people I served.

For some time a reputable firm has been making an audit of all the offices of Floyd county. The results of that audit were published in last week's issue of The Floyd County Times. It was a significant fact that the gross receipts of my office were one of the lowest of any that were published. I told representaives of the League privately and stated publi I welcomed any audit of my office by any honest, reputable accountant and that I would abide by any findings that he made. They refused to agree to this for the reason that they wanted a suit filed so that I could be smeared in the newspapers. It was the publicity of a law suit they were seeking against me and certain other officials. These law suits have been given wide publicity in our local newspaper. This small group of individuals has made it a rule of politics to smear the innocent, twist the facts, prejudice the accused and stoop to any method to create a feeling of distrust in the minds of the people against those they oppose and those they have selected to defeat in this year's election.

As any business man knows there is a vast difference between the "gross" receipts and the "net" receipts from any business or profession. Any official is entitled to credit on the constitutional limit for the necessary expenses of his office. It so happens that I have been sued for every penny I have received since I have been your County Attorney. Surely, I should be entitled to be paid for the work I have done and the services I have performed. The largest part of the income of the County Attorney's Office comes from the State Treasurer out of the fines and forfeitures paid in by the Circuit Court Clerk. These payments are made 3 times each year. Sometimes commissions earned in one year are not paid until the next year. This causes "lean" years and "fat" years. When the "lean" years are offset against the "fat" years and a reasonable allowance is made for expenses, Floyd county would be indebted to me. Is it significant (or isn't it) that although my office has one of the lowest incomes, this suit was filed against me?

I have had a right under the law to hire an assistant at a salary of \$1800.00 per year. I have never done this because I did not think it was necessary and would save the county that much money. I have kept my office open every day for the transaction of business and have worked 10 and 12 hours on many occasions. An assistant would have made my work much easier, but I saved this money for the county by not having one.

At the risk of making this statement too long, I want to outline some of the accomplishments of my tenure of office. I hope you will take the time to read

In years past it was customary to hire special lawyers to help the County Attorney when the county became involved in a law suit. No special counsel has ever been employed to help me and not one cent has been paid in attorney fees since I have been County Attorney. Floyd county has never lost a case of any significance.







He said that he has learned that 16 mines employing 2,200 men in Kentucky were closed in 1952, and thus far this year four mines employing 600 men were closed, plus the smaller mines which "are closing in large numbers."



We are not Okies, we Kentuckians who migrate to Ohio, Michigan and other states where employment may be found. We are not an ignorant, shiftless lot, although we are different from the natives of these states. But we are caught in an economic vise as cruel as any ever suffered, fictionally or otherwise.

Here we have a great coal field, one of the greatest in the country we consider the greatest on earth. Our underground waters are suitable to industrial purposes. We have timber and natural gas, clay, even germaniumrich coal. Other resources, some of which are perhaps known to a few, have not been explored, much less tapped.

And yet we are caught in an economic backwater. It is as if we were far up a cul-de-sac, dead-ended, with only one way to travel-and that out.

One Floyd county village has 15 tenantless homes. Others are hanging on there, hoping for a break, dreading the break with home ties. This is only one example of

the outward trek. We of the Big Sandy region have long maintained that this section with all its potential would be developed industrially, and employment for its people found at home, if the river were made navigable, supplying a means of cheap transportation and an artery of traffic to complement the inadequate facilities now provided by its one railway and its

highways. But will the federal government recognize our needs and the strength this section has to add to the power the nation needs in the face of a powerful enemy? Or will it spend its millions on unemployment benefits and outright relief appropriations?

What of the human resources of this section? Shall Kentucky educate its youth for service in other states, and only those stay at home who have neither hope nor ability to improve their chances of becoming economically independent elsewhere?

And what will it benefit the railway interests to hold this section in thrall, in fairy-tale fashion, by defeating its efforts to gain water transportation if the region's industry dies and its people

So runs the story. Truly a ament for the highlands.
