

As County Candidate; High Court Decision Clarifies Deadline

Now it's official. The deadline for filing for county office or for a district of a county, except for city or school board offices, is midnight

This date applies to Democratic and Republican candidates. Independent candidates must file by midnight June 16. The deadline for Republican, Democratic and independent candidates seeking offices which represent districts of two or more counties is midnight June 6, -Saturday of this week.

The Court of Appeals itself fixed the deadline date for the filing of candidates on the regular party tickets for county office or for offices representing district divisions of a county. Vaughan and Osborne Deny Guilt in Murder Of Girl 4 Years Ago

Almost four years after the brutal murder here of Muriel Baldridge, Prestonsburg high school girl the case was revived last week with the arrest of two men.

And after the examining trial Wednesday morning of the two, Clyde Vaughan, 33, Prestonsburg. and Dewey Osborne, 34, of Paintsville, formerly of this place, the case remained an unsolved murder mystery, one of the most baffling in the annals of Kentucky crime The men were released.



Hall is a former deputy constable Orginally there were 13 defendants but one of them, M. B. Bloomer, Letcher county, was acquitted by a directed verdict in the first trial when Judge Swinford ruled tha the Government had not made out a case against him.

The prosecution contends that the defendants were involved in the beating and forcible swearing into the union of Kentucky employees of a nonunion mine in Virginia. The disturbance occurred in Letcher county, Kentucky.

In his opening statement to the jury of 12 men and four alternates, including one woman, District Attorney Claude P. Stevens, Prestonsburg, pointed out that the defendants are charged with violating the Labor Relations Law.

John Y. Brown, Lexington attorney, opening for the defense, explained that the union men were on the mountann that day to establish a peaceful picket line and persuade Kentuckians not to help break a strike that was going on in Virginia.

First government witness was Joe Ison, who said his truck was halted by a crowd of 20 or 30 men a few hundred feet on the Kentucky side of the state line in Letcher county. One of the men he identified as Milburn "Otu" Hall, one of the defendants, waved him to the side of the word with a pistol, he said. Others handed him a union membership card and demanded that he sign "or we will run you, truck and all, over this mountain. He signed.

A little later, he continued, two of the men in the crowd tossed a coin to determine which would identified only by the name of "Curley" won the toss and they went after each other, Joe said, but others joined in against him and he was being "roughed up" when one of the union men caused them to let up

Ison said he saw about 15 men wearing uniforms, badges, or officers' caps in the crowd but none attempted to stop the fight.

Giles Killen, who moved from Jenkins to Clintwood, Va., after the trouble, said Hall pulled a pistol on him and forced him to sign a union card. Then he and about 20 other Kentuckians working in nonunion Virginia mines, he said, were forced to line up on the roadside, three deep, and "take the union obliga-

Ray Buchanan, Payne Gap, testified that Hall, with a pistol in his hand, cursed and threatened him. When he objected to signing a union card, Buchanan said Hall told him, "You will sign it or die on this mountain" so he signed two of them, just to play safe. When some of the mob threatened to whip him, he said, "Joe Davis told them to leave me alone." Davis is one of

the defendants. "Glen Gilliam, Jenkins miner, said he was kicked and beaten and told that, "You are getting off easy for what you have done." All he had done, he said, was work in a

mountain mine in Virginia. Refusing to swear, because he is minister in the Church of God of Prophecy as well as a coal miner, Joseph J. Hughes was allowed to testify when he "affirmed" to tell

the truth. "They lined us up and made us take the obligation," he said. "Then somebody yelled, "We've got a preacher. Let's baptize them in the name of the Father, the Son, and John L. Lewis, and I didn't like

that very much." Other witnesses testified that the union men blocked the road, forced them to sign union cards and told them they couldn't go to their jobs in Virginia.

is in that eye, not in ours. Wherever it is, violent recriminations in the British Parliament and the Congress of the United States and demands that ships be sunk, and so on, will help nobody but the enemies of both countries.
