### ORDER CLOSING CAMP'S POOL

#### Health Department Acts Also To Close Dairy Bar Here; Demands Changes

The Floyd County Health Department issued an order Tuesday condemning and closing temporarily the swimming pool at Shawnee Camp, the Boy Scout camp serving Lonesome Pine Council on Dewey Lake.

M. V. Clark, administrator of the Department, said the action provides that the pool remain closed until plans of the pool construction are submitted to the Bureau of Sanitary Engineering, State Board of Health, and approved by that body and the health department here.

He added that these plans later were submitted to the department.

An objectionable feature of the pool, it was pointed out, was use of water from Dewey Lake at a point below where the drainage outlet from the pool empties into the lake. This is expected to be corrected by taking water from a point above the outlet.

Effective last Monday morning, the health department also closed the Dairy Bar, a restaurant operated here by Malta Watson. The closing order specified that the restaurant may not be reopened until improvements are made and are approved by the health department.

Flagrant violation of sanitary regulations was cited as the principal reason for closing the restaurant.

### BOARD DEFERS CONTRACTS ON SCHOOL WORK

#### Hopes to Let Bosco, Ligon Jobs July 17; Bond Hopes Brighter

Bids tendered by contractors on two school building jobs were not accepted for opening by the Floyd County Board of Education at its Tuesday afternoon meeting, largely because a contract already awarded on a third school structure remained a question.

The schools on which the board declined bids are those planned at Bosco and Ligon. Both jobs were re-advertised for letting at 10 a. m., July 17, date of the next board meeting.

Decision to extend the time for bidding on the two buildings was reached after Board Chairman James Greene pointed out that the county high school building here has been held up because of the failure of an attempted bond sale. County Superintendent Virgil O. Turner said the board hopes to effect the sale of bonds to finance the Prestonsburg school and to award the Bosco and Ligon bids at the July meeting.

Financing of the high school structure here still hangs in doubt, however, since new bond representative contacts, although optimistic, have made no definite commitments. The board and the fiscal court last week cancelled their contract with the W. C. Thornburgh Company, Louisville, bond representative, and began looking for a new representative, one which can sell the \$445,000 bond issue. Mr. Turner had hoped to receive before end of the board meeting information that a new contact had made definite arrangements to sell the bonds, or, perhaps, to buy the bonds on its own behalf, but the call did not come through.

Meanwhile, the W. C. Thornburgh Company has threatened, the Superintendent said, to file suit in federal court to force the board to honor its contract.

The board and fiscal court, in moving to cancel the contract with Thornburgh claimed that two attempted bond sales had been failures, that the firm had withheld information from other bond firms, had increased from 1% to 4% the commission specified in the contract and had not asked for re-advertising of the bond issue.

The board re-employed all office personnel, mechanics and maintenance crewmen with the exception of Mrs. Betty Wellman, health coordinator, who was replaced by Miss Blanche Dingus, of Martin. Salaries remain unchanged.

### RIFLE BULLET HITS BOY, 16

#### Shot from Hillside At W' Wright, Sunday, Believed Accidental

Darrel Gene Dobbs, Wheelwright teen-ager, is in a serious condition in the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, with a mystery-gunner's rifle bullet through his abdomen.

Young Dobbs was shot, shortly before dusk last Sunday, while sitting on the back porch of the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Homer Dobbs. A tree-covered hillside overlooks the home, and it is believed the shot was fired from the mountain. The bullet passed straight through the youth's body.

Policeman Earl Blackburn expressed the theory that the shot was not aimed at young Dobbs but rather was a stray bullet. He is not known to have any enemies in the town.

The officer said he was not notified of the shot until more than an hour later, and that this made it impossible to find in the hills any person who may have fired the shot.

### RURAL SCHOOL OPENING NEAR

#### Regulations on Age of Beginners Told; 6,200 Will Enroll

Slightly more than half of the 11,585 grade school pupils in Floyd county will return to the classroom July 20 with the opening of the rural schools, and throughout next week it will be the task of rural teachers and Superintendent's office personnel to get ready for the school opening.

Ottis D. Spurlock, rural school supervisor, said approximately 6,200 rural pupils will be enrolled.

In connection with pupil enrollment, he explained that teachers will not be permitted by state law to enroll pupils unless they will be six years of age as of Dec. 31. The law does not compel children to enroll for school until they are seven years old. In either case, they must enroll within 30 days of opening of the school term.

If parents elect to start their children in school when they will be age six by the following Dec. 31 it is compulsory that the pupils attend school regularly, and their names cannot be withdrawn from the record books.

Rural teachers will receive their supplies at the Superintendent's office here through next week. Then, on Saturday of next week, an organizational meeting for rural teachers will be held at Martin high school. The meeting will begin at 10 a. m., but all new teachers are being asked to meet an hour earlier with the school supervisor and attendance officers for an orientation conference.

Dr. Charles Spain, president of Morehead State College, will be the speaker at the Martin teachers meeting, it was announced.

Superintendent V. O. Turner announced this week that all emergency teachers who expect to teach at the term soon to open must apply for certificates immediately and have them before beginning school. State Department of Education regulations also provide, he pointed out, that no person may substitute for a teacher unless he or she has proper certification from the Department and this on file in the Superintendent's office here.

### August is Proclaimed Green Pastures Month

August will be Green Pastures Month in Floyd county, it was said by a member of the Floyd county Green Pastures Committee this week. A green pastures supplement will be issued by The Times August 13.

Certificates will be awarded county and district master pasturesmen as was done last year by the committee. Picture taking for the green pastures supplement was begun today by County Agent O. E. Boggs. Articles now being written for the supplement are of a local nature and promise to emphasize the practical side of pasture improvement.

### PRESTONSBURG ATTORNEY REAPPOINTED TO BOARD HE HEADED TILL JUNE 8

Paul E. Hayes, Prestonsburg attorney, was re-appointed, June 30, by Governor Lawrence W. Wetherby to a term of four years on the Workmen's Compensation Board.

Mr. Hayes' chairmanship of the Board ended June 8, and the new chairman is J. J. Tye, of Barbourville. The third member of the Board is Allen P. Cabbage, Leitchfield.

The Prestonsburg man was originally appointed to the Board to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Kenneth Howe, of Pikeville. Mrs. Judith D. Archer is employed by the Workmen's Compensation Board as Mr. Hayes' secretary in his office here.

### GIRL'S DEATH PROBE ASKED

#### Kin of Viola Adkins, Held Suicide Victim, Hints She Was Slain

A brother of 16-year-old Viola Adkins, who died of what was declared to have been a self-inflicted bullet wound last Thursday morning, so strongly insisted here this week that she was murdered that the case was reopened Wednesday for investigation.

Commonwealth's Detective Alex L. Davidson and Deputy Sheriff Frank Crum went Wednesday afternoon to Galveston, where the Adkins family resides, to question her survivors and neighbors about circumstances surrounding the girl's death.

Coroner James J. Carter held last Thursday that the girl died by her own hand. She died of a bullet through her left breast. The bullet was fired from an old revolver which had a six-inch barrel. The girl was left-handed, it was said, and authorities speculated if she could have fired the bullet from such a weapon so that it would pass straight through her body.

Deputy Sheriff Frank Crum was told last week that Miss Adkins had gone, early Thursday morning, to the home of a neighbor, presumably to pick blackberries but later returned home, donned her Sunday best, lay down on a bed and ended her life. The bullet imbedded itself in the mattress on which she lay.

The brother who demanded the investigation was working away from home at the time of the tragedy. He told Davidson that stories he had been told of his sister's death are conflicting. The only brother listed last week as residing elsewhere than Galveston is Frank Adkins, whose address was given as Ohio.

Disapproval by the girl's father of her sweetheart was given last week as a possible cause for the shot.

### COAL STARTS INTO A SKID

#### June Production Up But Last Week Drop Noted in Big Sandy

Coal production in the area served by the Big Sandy-Elkhorn Coal Operators Association improved steadily through June until the week ending on the 20th. The next week, it started to skid again.

Twenty-six mines had worked the full week of five days and two of these worked six days in the week ending June 20. Loaded that week were 5,982 cars of 50 tons each. Few mines worked four days, only one worked one day and only two were busy three days in the week. It was one of the best weeks the operators of the Big Sandy-Elkhorn group had enjoyed for some time.

The next week, ending June 27, showed a slowed production, with only 5,915.4 cars loaded, or 65.5 less than the preceding week. Only 22 mines worked the full week and none worked six days. The number of mines working four days increased to 11. The shot in the arm given the area by the Lake trade was wearing off and the industry seems to be headed for the summer doldrums.

Coal production in the Big Sandy-Elkhorn field is now 10,569.2 cars of 50 tons each, or a total of \$29,989 tons, short of this same period last year. To equal last year's figure now is manifestly an impossibility, even with a phenomenal production the remaining weeks of the year.

#### By Firms As Releases On Lake Damage Asked; Delay Held Temporary

E. R. Burke, seventh district conservation supervisor, and Circuit Judge Edw. P. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Christian Baptist Church in Ashland and burial followed in the Dixon cemetery.

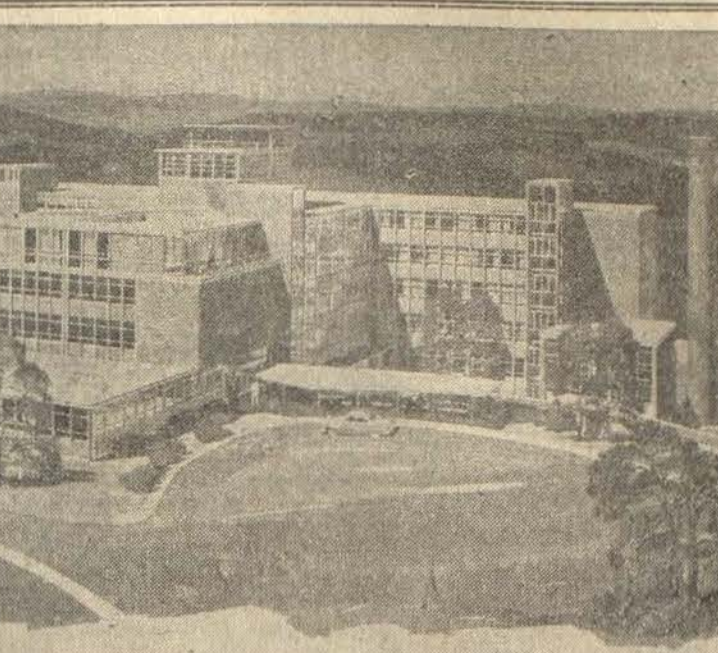
John T. Parker, assistant general manager of the Inland Steel Company at Wheelwright, who met with the Scholarship committee in Lexington, Tuesday, said all three rated high on the basis of competitive examinations and had almost identical overall grades. ### PRELIMINARY WORK BEGUN ON HOSPITAL

#### Water Well Drilling, Foundation Test Done, Beckley Ground Broken

As ground-breaking ceremonies for the United Mine Workers' Welfare and Retirement Fund hospital were held at Beckley, W. Va., July 4, drilling for water wells and coring in foundation tests were being made at McDowell for the Fund's hospital which will be built in this county.

It was said recently that work on the 10 hospitals to be built by the Welfare and Retirement Fund through a Memorial Hospital Association will begin within a few months.

The hospital at Beckley will be a 200-bed structure. The McDowell hospital will be approximately half that size, it was said.

Among those who participated in the Beckley program at the woodland site, a short distance from downtown Beckley, were John T. Morrison, M. D., assistant executive medical officer of the fund and president of the Memorial Hospital Association; Fred D. Mott, M. D., medical administrator of the associations, and Deane Brooke, M. D., area medical administrator for the Fund's Beckley office.

Governor Marland, himself a one-time coal miner, swung a miner's pick to break ground while bulldozers stood by to clear the way for the hospital structure, Miss Laura Fraley, choice of Young Democrats of the District of Columbia for "Miss Democrat of 1953," returned to Beckley, her home town, for the occasion.

The main "T" shaped, four-story building of Beckley will have a capacity of approximately 200 beds with a floor area of 1,000,000 square feet. Service facilities will occupy the central structure with the wings devoted to rooms for patients. Wall windows will provide excellent lighting and pleasant vistas.

Four operating rooms and two delivery rooms will be furnished with the latest equipment to serve the medical staff. Apart from the hospital proper, there will be a large one-story outpatient clinic adjacent to the main entrance and registration area. X-ray, laboratory, and other medical service departments will serve both clinic and hospital patients. A department of physical medicine will undertake to restore the disabled to useful activity.

Separate buildings will provide a limited number of apartments for nurses and technicians. Another building will house the school of practical nursing and student dormitory. A large pay cafeteria will offer complete meals and short orders to patients visiting the clinics visitors and staff.

### MAN FIGHTS EXTRADITION

#### Stogner Jailed Here On Virginia Charge Of Grand Larceny

Walter Stogner, who was arrested this morning at Garrett was held here for Arlington, Va., authorities, has refused to waive extradition to Virginia, Deputy Jailer Donald Horn said.

He is wanted by Arlington authorities to answer to a grand larceny charge. Stogner was jailed here by Troy Mullins, Garrett officer.

Horn said the prisoner was jailed here about three years ago on a cold check charge but was not prosecuted after his committal to a mental institution.

Deputy Sheriff Frank Parsons and Frank Crum arrested Colonel Lafayette, Tuesday afternoon, at the Mountain Gift Shop on U. S. 23, south of here, and booked him on the jail on a charge of selling beer. He later was released by County Judge Stumbo.

The officers said Laferty's arrest marked the sixth raid made on the Gift Shop. Jack Hatfield, who was listed as owner of the business, was not present when the officers arrived. Crum and Parsons said Laferty was bringing a quart of beer to a car outside as they drove up, but that he ran inside with it. Four quarts of beer and a half-pint of whiskey were confiscated by the officers.

### TRADE PARADE SET SATURDAY

#### Mayo School Exhibit To Show Student Work At Martin High School

The informational and educational exhibit of the Mayo State Vocational School has been scheduled to be shown at Martin, Saturday, on the high school campus from 10:00 a. m. to 3:30 p. m. The exhibit is free and open to the public.

This is the fourth county in Eastern Kentucky to have the opportunity to see this exhibition, the first being Martin county when exhibits were taken to Inez early in June, the second in Magoffin county on June 20 when it showed at Salyersville, and the third at Louisa on June 27.

Floyd countians who visit the exhibits will have an opportunity to see some of the machinery and equipment used in the training program at Mayo in operation, with present student's going through actual learning procedures. The exhibits on display will include objects, projects, and jobs made by the students in the 13 departments of the school. Among these will be a wooden lung for polio victims, and a man-made lightning machine, plus many smaller objects.

The purpose of these programs, according to George L. Ramey, Director of the school, is to acquaint the people of Eastern Kentucky with the opportunities available to them for training and education at the state-owned Mayo State Vocational School at Paintsville.

### 4th Was Both Safe and Sane In County, Despite Activity

It was a safe and sane Fourth in Floyd county. Only one car wreck marred the day, and nobody was seriously hurt, at that. This, despite the fact that traffic was heavy, with many out-of-state cars joining the home throng.

Martin and Garrett drew the crowds for celebration of the day with planned programs, and Dewey Lake had one of its biggest days as hundreds converged on it for a day picnicking, boating or fishing.

**Big Sandy's Plight Becomes Recognized**

**RECOGNITION** of Eastern Kentucky's economic plight and a step, at least, toward alleviating it have resulted from Congressman Perkins' intercession with Secretary of Labor Durkin for help.

What will come out of the study to be made of our needs and our potentialities for production cannot be predicted. In any event, top-echelon recognition of the distress this section faces should help.

It should help for Washington to learn for itself how many are unemployed, how desperately they seek work, why they have no work at home in, literally, a land of plenty in the sense that this is one of the great undeveloped pools of natural resources in the United States.

Perhaps, too, it will help for Washington through this study to see what water transportation could mean to the Big Sandy valley. The transportation limitations of the Big Sandy counties are apparent to the most obtuse. Perhaps a study of two valleys—the Big Sandy and the canalized Kanawha—would do more to clarify the issue than anything.

Can industry, given the concessions the new Group IV classification demands, afford to locate in the Big Sandy? Would this favored rating in bidding on defense contracts and in a fast tax write-off justify investment in the Big Sandy? We think so. One plant would set in motion those other improvements the valley needs, would attract other business in a snowballing of industry such as the favored Kanawha has seen.

We have experienced so many disappointments that many have wearied of futile effort. But Big Sandy must fight for its life. Every figure, every argument, available should be marshalled for the benefit of this forthcoming study proposed as a step toward our relief by a method short of that repugnant Relief to which we had to submit, back there in the '30's.

**Former Letcher Sheriff Succumbs at Hazard**

Whitesburg, Ky., July 6 — Former Letcher county Sheriff Herman C. Combs, 55, a candidate for the Republican nomination for another term, died today in a Hazard hospital.

His death leaves Bill Hall of nearby Ermine unopposed for the GOP nomination.

Combs, a life-long resident of Letcher county, served as sheriff from 1944 to 1948. He was president of the Combs Motor Co., the Dr. Pepper Bottling Co. of Whitesburg, and former president of the Whitesburg Wholesale Co.

He was hospitalized two weeks ago with a heart condition. Combs leaves his widow and five children.

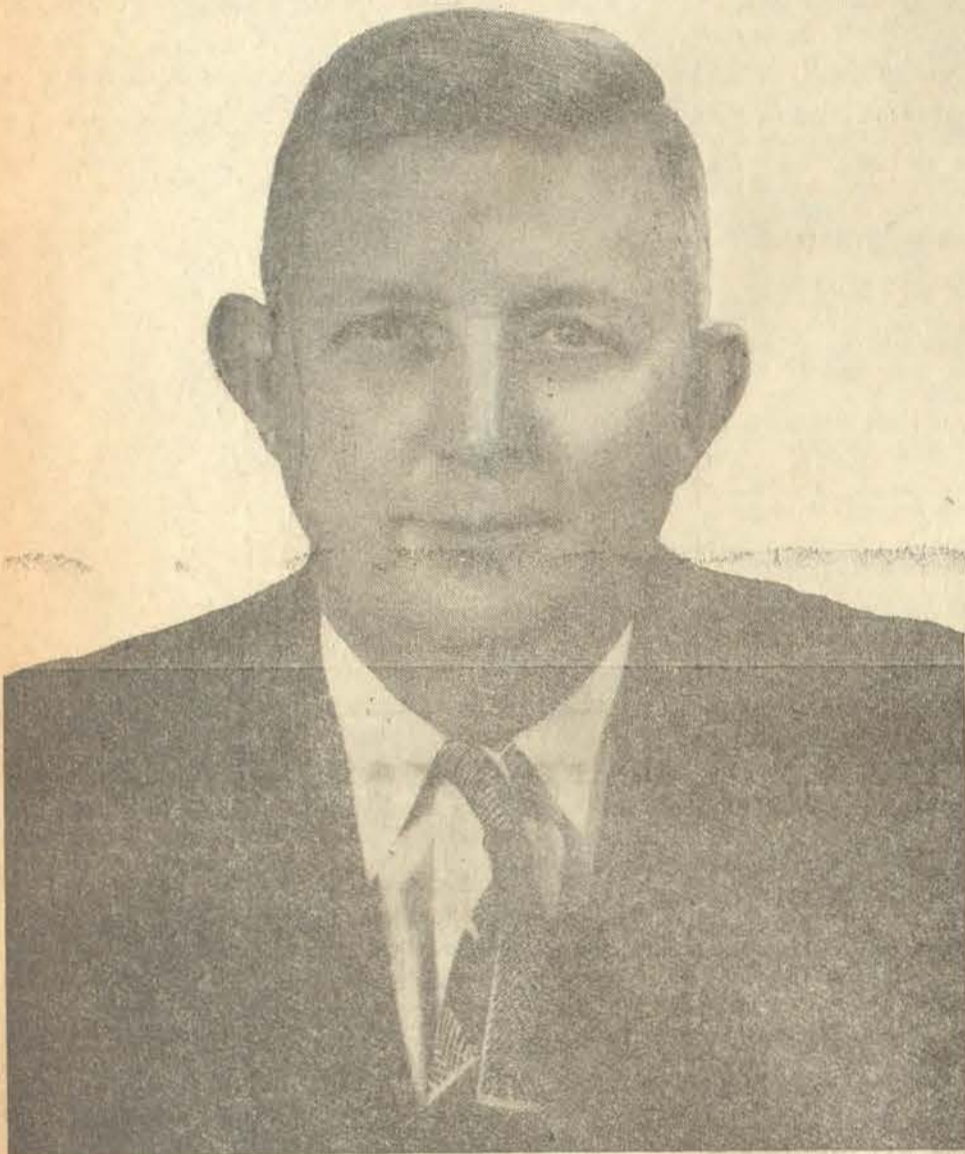

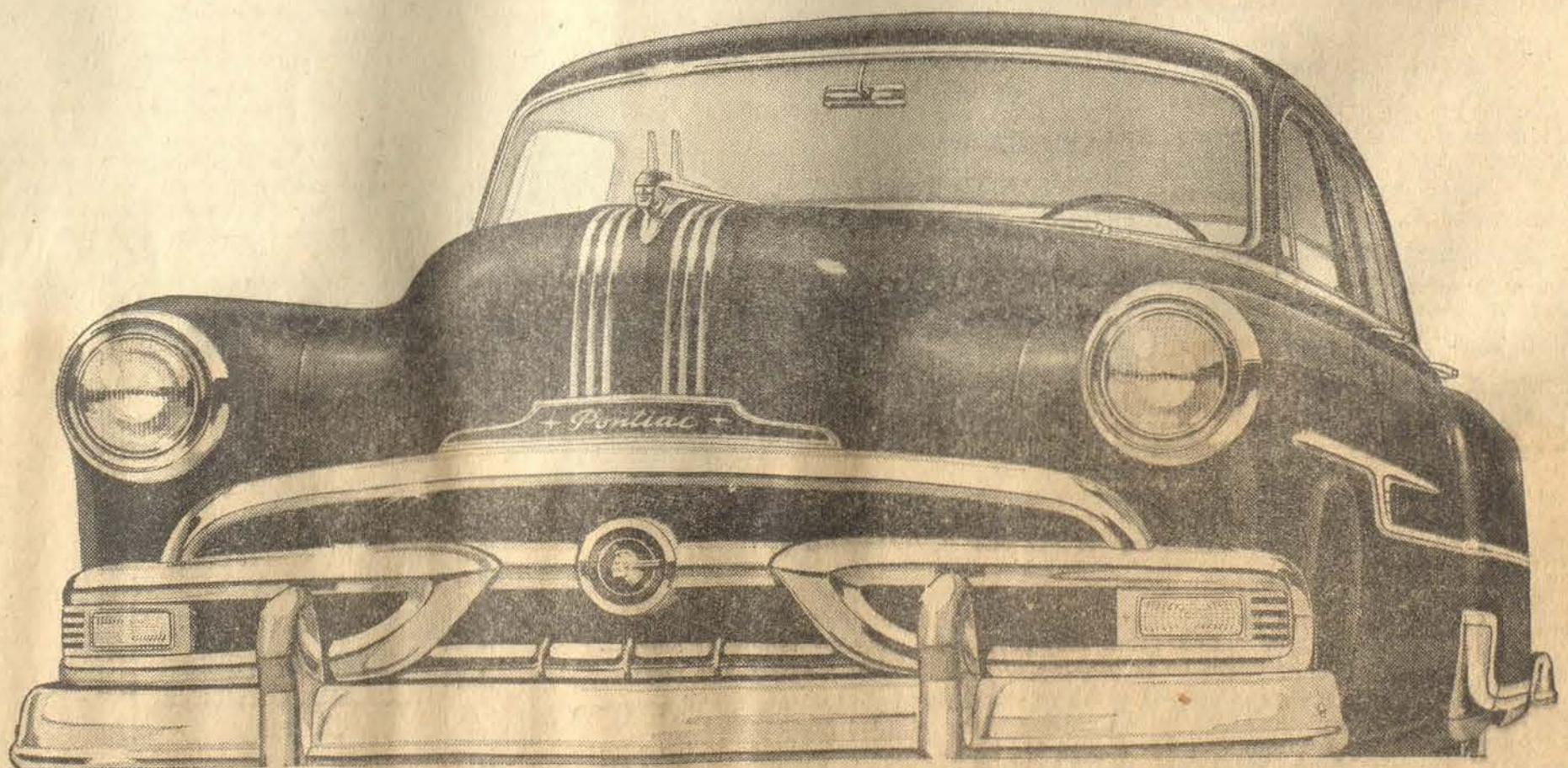

**COOPER ASKS PRESIDENT TO CONSIDER UMW CHIEF**

John Sherman Cooper has asked President Eisenhower to give John L. Lewis a voice in picking a new director of the Federal Bureau of Mines.

The Kentucky Republican released a letter to the White House suggesting that representatives of Lewis' United Mine Workers and of the coal industry be invited to meet and agree on a nominee.

Eisenhower last week withdrew his nomination of Tom Lyon of Utah to head the bureau. Lyon had told the Senate Interior Committee that he was still on a \$5,000-a-year revocable pension from Anaconda Copper Company and was not sympathetic to the present mine-safety law.

Lewis' displeasure with past mine directors once took the form of a nationwide coal miners' "memorial period" which closed the mines.

Cooper wrote Eisenhower, "The matter of mine safety is of primary importance to those who work in the mines, and I am sure that the coal industry recognizes this fact."

He said he was suggesting the union-industry conference because of his own interest in mine safety and because Kentucky has 60,000 miners interested in the appointment.

**C-C BOOKLET CITES GROWTH**

*Of Prestonsburg, Gives Data for Use in Quest For Industrial Plants*

Prestonsburg had a population of 179 persons and in Floyd county there were only 7,877 people in 1870. Thus begins a booklet prepared by the Prestonsburg Chamber of Commerce. The booklet entitled "Economic and Industrial Survey of Prestonsburg, Kentucky" was submitted to the Kentucky Agricultural and Industrial Development Board for use in seeking new plants and factories for Kentucky towns.

It is a booklet of facts and figures. Prestonsburg has increased in population by 54 percent in the last decade, while the county itself increased one percent. More than 98 percent of the population of Floyd is native white, only a percentage of less than a quarter of one percent are foreign born while one percent plus are negro. Mining claimed 5,407 employees in the county this year, while in agriculture 8,241 persons were employed. While farming had a greater number of employees, the cash income of the farmers was low. 5,308 of the 6,750 farms had an income of less than \$600 in 1949. Manufacturing is practically nonexistent. Only 90 persons were engaged in any kind of manufacturing in Floyd county in 1949.

A list of existing industry in Floyd shows that the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company has the greatest number of employees of any firm outside of mining. This company employs 179 persons. H. B. Ranier Construction Company is next with 101, and Inland Gas Company third with 75 workers. United Fuel has approximately the same number of employees as Inland Gas Company. No other employer has a greater number of employees than 15.

The booklet is a miscellaneous serving of statistics that any manufacturer may require in exploring the possibilities of plant location. The county's indebtedness of \$134,000 is set out. Prestonsburg's bonded indebtedness is stated as \$57,000 outstanding. The city's income for last year was \$64,662.57.

But to remind Floyd countians it gives a table of heat and humidity. The average normal temperature is 57.8 degrees. The average precipitation over a 30-year period is 43.6 inches. The relative humidity stands at 91 for July, increases to 92 for August and September. After that, it declines.

The book, with its assembly of facts and statistics was prepared, chiefly, by Marshall Davidson.

DIFFERENT CONDITIONS FACE VETERAN SEEKING LOAN NOW

Veterans applying for GI loans today are confronted with different conditions and requirements from those which prevailed only a few weeks ago.

In response to many inquiries, VA explained the two main changes affecting veterans are:

1. The maximum allowable interest rate on GI loans guaranteed by VA has been raised to 4 1/2 percent from 4 percent, effective May 5, 1953.

2. Credit restrictions on GI home loans have been removed making it permissible for veterans to obtain such loans with no down payment and with a repayment term up to 30 years at the discretion of the lenders.

In addition, veterans who now plan to seek GI loans from private lenders for homes, farms or businesses should apply to VA regional offices in advance for certificates of eligibility.

VA emphasized that the new 4 1/2 percent interest rate will apply only to loans closed on or after May 5. The new ruling does not affect the rights of any veteran who has a firm commitment from a lender to make a loan at a lower rate. All loans closed prior to May 5, 1953 will be continued at the 4 percent rate under which they were negotiated.

It also was explained that even though the law now permits no down-payment GI loans, veterans seeking loans may now find that many lenders will require down payments in varying amounts or percentages.

The amount of down payment and the length of the repayment period are matters to be agreed upon between the veteran and the lending institution making the loan.

Prior to the action removing controls on April 23, this year, veterans were required to pay at least 5 percent down in most cases and the maximum loan usually was restricted to 20 or 25 years.

Credit controls were first applied to GI loans in 1950 shortly after the beginning of the Korean conflict as an anti-inflationary measure.

VA said if veterans apply in advance for certificates of eligibility for GI loans, it will reduce delays in processing the loan applications later, when the veteran is anxiously awaiting completion of the deal or is pressed for time to close the loan.

Certificates of eligibility are the means by which VA certifies as to the eligibility of veterans for GI loans.

In the past, veterans generally have submitted their discharge or separation papers to the lending institutions making the loan. They in turn would submit them to the VA on behalf of the veteran, oftentimes with the loan applications.

However, since the passage of the Korean GI Bill which extends the loan guaranty benefits of the World War II GI Bill to veterans with service since June 27, 1950, to establish the veteran's eligibility VA must have information not previously needed.

Pike Woman Drowns In Swollen Stream; Tot Is River Victim

The sudden downpour of rain that descended Sunday night had its greatest intensity in the upper Johns Creek area of Pike county. One death is reported as a result, on Coon Creek, the county.

The dead person is Mrs. Caroline Coleman who lived six miles from Pikeville. She had gone out to save a flock of chickens from the sudden rise of water and was engulfed in the raging stream.

Farmers of the area who had difficulty in working crops due to the number of rains found their fields eroded and washed by the Sunday night downpour. But the greatest damage was to the abutments of bridges along the streams. Several small bridges were carried away. The damage in this county was not severe and only minor damage was done to crops.

One Pike county death preceding Sunday's rain was that of Sandra Lee Low, age 4, who drowned in the river Saturday. She, her father and another child were crossing a small bridge and Sandra fell into the water. The father was unable to rescue her because of a broken arm. The body was recovered Sunday afternoon.

Bituminous Surface Bids For Stephens-Br. Asked

Contractors have been invited by the State Department of Highways to bid on a construction project in this county on which bids will be opened July 24.

The projects advertised calls for 1.5 miles of bituminous surface on the Stephens Branch road, from Ky. 80, one mile southwest of Martin, extending in westerly direction up Stephens Branch and ending at the railroad crossing.

ALFALFA BETTER USE FERTILIZER

Farmers in Pendleton county found that Atlantic alfalfa withstood aphid attacks much better than any of seven other varieties.

In Crittenden county, 56 farmers are conducting tests on the use of heavy applications of fertilizer on all important crops.

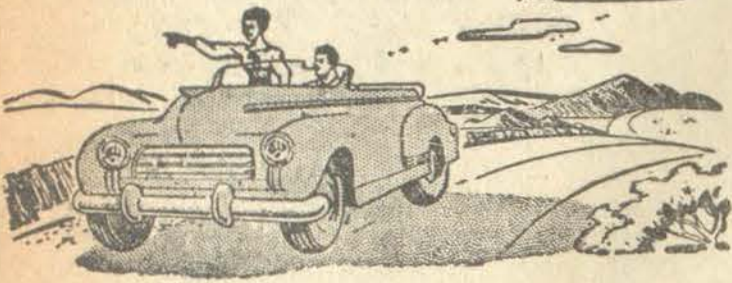

### Group IV Rating Given Area Including Floyd-co. Promises Economic Aid

Congressman Carl D. Perkins' plea to Secretary of Labor Durkin for help for six Eastern Kentucky counties, including Floyd, already has produced action which should within the next three weeks place the area in a favored status, it was reported from Washington last Thursday.

Secretary Durkin last Wednesday signed the papers which set in motion the machinery to place Floyd, Knott, Pike, Johnson, Martin and Magoffin counties in a Group IV labor market rating which is intended to help solve their unemployment problem.

A group IV rating is one which classifies an area as having a substantial labor surplus. The next step is up to Arthur S. Fleming, director of the Office of Defense Mobilization, who is expected to certify the classification to the Defense Department. This rating also speeds up the tax amortization of defense industries locating in the area, and this is designed to encourage plants to move into this section.

After Fleming acts, the Department of Commerce is expected to make a study and report to Fleming on facilities for production of defense materials in the counties named. This study is a process which usually requires six weeks, but the government agencies have promised Congressman Perkins to try to cut the time to three weeks.

## A CREEK AND A PROMISE



Here is a picture of a road and—a promise. The road goes up Mare Creek but just one mile up and you come to a ford. If the water is low you get across. If it has rained and the creek gets up six inches you can't get over.

Judge Henry Stumbo promised a bridge there when he was a candidate four years ago and is still promising that bridge. People do not call it a ford. They call it the Stumbo Bridge. 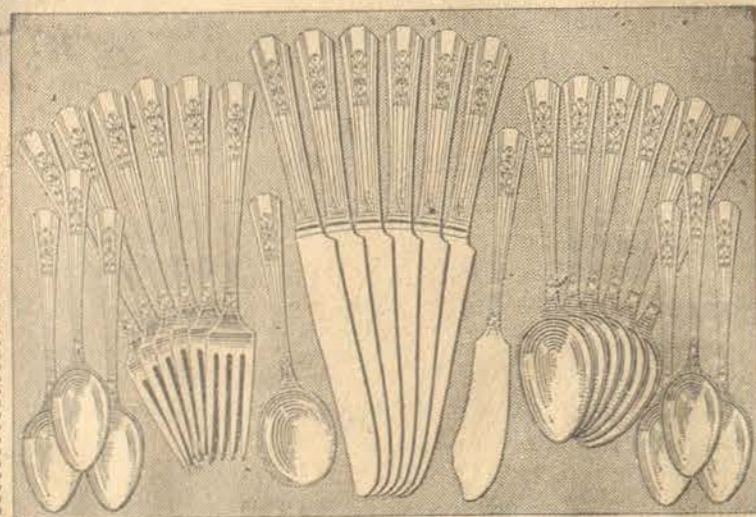

He bought the 180,000 acres, lying in Wise county, Va., and Letcher, Pike, Knott and Floyd counties, Ky., at a tax sale in Scott county, Va., in 1816.

No direct descendants of Beals Davis have been discovered. Yet most Davises in the tri-state claim kin to him.

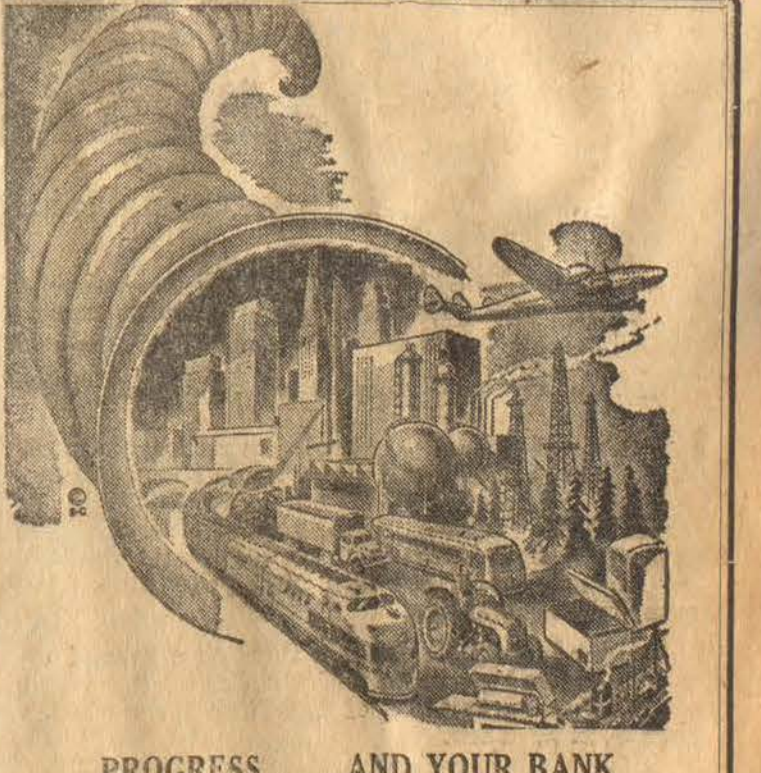

**SPORTS AFIELD**

Do you know how your boat will act in a storm or emergency? You should. You should know the limits of your boat and what it will do and can be made to do if those limits are exceeded.

Presumably you know those two basic rules—don't overpower, don't overload. But do you know exactly when your boat is overloaded or overpowered in calm water, and more important, in rough?

Rules at best are only words and boating expert Willard Crandall insists that every boat owner should find out their hows, their whys, and their limits with his own boat.

You can find out by testing your boat in shallow water. Try it with the extra passenger you've wondered about, with a bigger motor; try a sudden V-shaped turn; check how your boat responds to vigorous rowing.

Calm water is good for your first tryout, but don't hesitate to follow it up with a session of rough water. That's where you'll learn. Just make sure the water is shallow and you're close to shore. And put on a swim suit. If you're beyond active age, enlist the help of some teenagers. Most of them are interested in boats.

Fasten a sandbag or rock near the stern to substitute for your motor. In the important swamping test you'll want to find out just what position the filled boat will float in, and just what method of clinging to it are best. All other tests and tryouts are surprisingly easy.

Will your boat really tip dangerously if two stand up to cast a once? Are your air tanks, if you have them, in condition to support the boat? Will the floor boards come out easily, and will they support you if they do? How about the gas can? The bigger it is, the less there's in it, the more buoyancy. How about that life vest? Will it hold you up and in what position? Experience has shown that most small boats will support the occupants and motor even when full of water; and if a small boat is upset—turned over—very likely it will support occupants and motor. But don't just suppose that your boat will too; find out now.

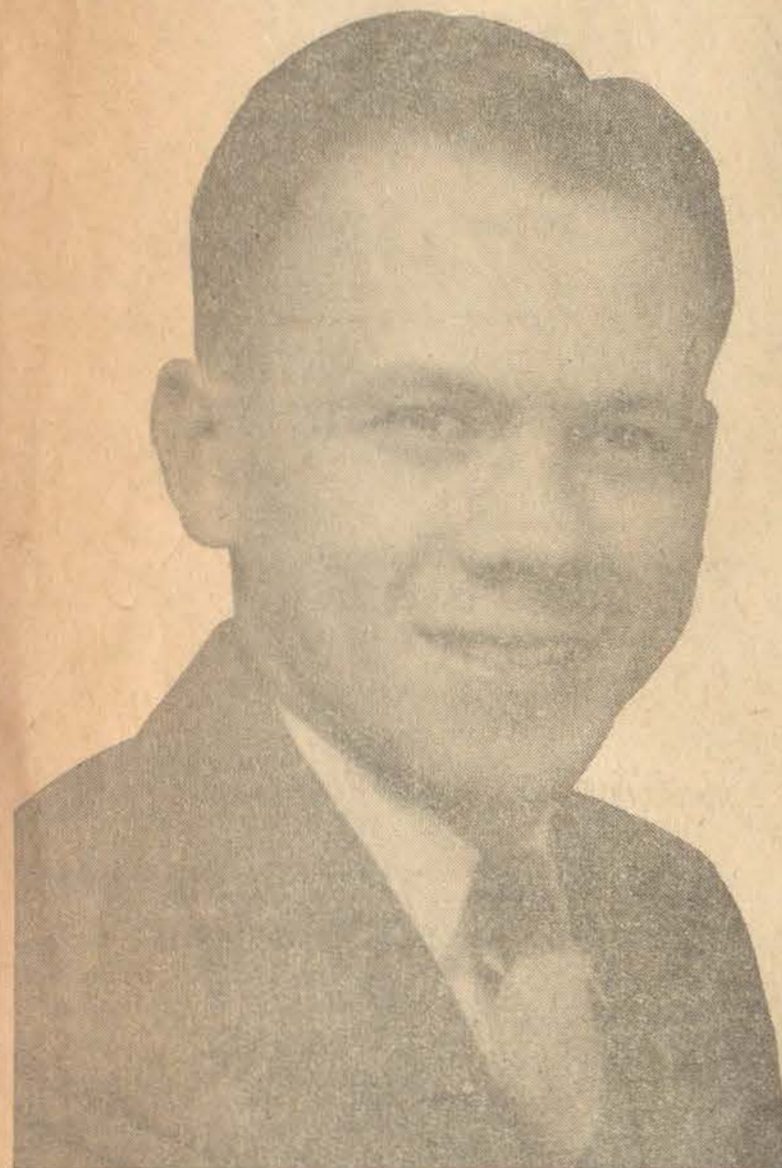

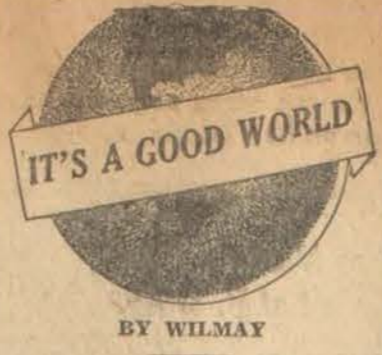

### 'L' to 'Z' Driver Permits Must Be Renewed in July

Frankfort, Ky., July 6 — Circuit clerks are selling 1953-55 drivers' licenses to persons whose last names begin with "L" through "Z", the Department of Revenue reminded again today.

Drivers in the "L" through "Z" name group must purchase two-year licenses for two dollars before July 31. They must appear in person at the circuit clerk's office and complete new application forms.

Vehicle operators whose last names begin with "A" through "K" and who have licenses will not be required to buy another license until 1954.

If a person is obtaining his first driver's license in Kentucky, he will be required to pass a state police examiner's test, or provide an out-of-state license to show that he is a qualified driver. If his name begins with "A" through "K", the license will last for only one year and the fee will be one dollar.

Persons on active military duty who drive in Kentucky are required to have Kentucky licenses, except when operating an official vehicle with a U. S. Government operator's permit.

Drivers renewing licenses must pay a penalty of one dollar if they do not renew them by the July 31 deadline.

The Judge pointed out certain state-constructed Rural Highways that had been built during his term of office but he did not tell you that these roads had ALREADY BEEN APPROVED, SURVEYED, and CONTRACTS LET on many of them BEFORE HE TOOK OFFICE in January, 1950.

**COMPARE THESE FACTS WITH THE JUDGE'S ADVERTISEMENT!**

1. He listed the HAROLD-LIGON-HI-HAT ROAD. That road had been approved, surveyed, and was advertised for bids on construction in September of 1949. (See FLOYD COUNTY TIMES, Page 1, September 8, 1949.)
2. He lists the DAVID-BRUSH CREEK ROAD. Yes, this is the road often referred to as the JARVIS ALLEN HIGHWAY because JARVIS ALLEN fought so hard for its construction. It had been APPROVED, SURVEYED, and much of the right-of-way secured in 1949.
3. He listed the CANEY-STEPHENS BRANCH ROAD. That road, too, had been approved and surveyed before the Judge took office.
4. SIZEMORE BRANCH-WAYLAND ROAD. This road had also been approved and surveyed prior to January 1, 1950.

With reference to the last two roads there appeared in THE FLOYD COUNTY TIMES of August 31, 1950; the following news item:

"Rural Highway Commissioner Emerson "Doc" Beauchamp last week promised Former County Clerk Jarvis Allen that the Caney-Stephens Branch Road and the Wayland-Sizemore road will be let to contract within the next few days."

Citizens of this county, we believe you are entitled to the facts concerning your road program and if you should check the record you will learn that JARVIS ALLEN did as much, or more, than any other person in securing the above roads. He was a special friend of the governor and made trips to Frankfort everytime the other county officials went, and made numerous trips alone fighting for road improvement in this county.

In addition to the above roads the Judge lists certain roads for improvement or Blacktop Surface.

This improvement takes no effort on the part of county officials since it is the policy of the state to blacktop the rural highways as soon as practicable after construction since it is cheaper to backtop a road than to maintain a gravel road.

He says the contract has been let on the Jacks' Creek Road and we wonder why so late ???

The JACK'S CREEK ROAD was approved for construction in 1949. It was stated in an ad in the FLOYD COUNTY TIMES of July 28, 1949, that a State Highway map was available for inspection in the County Judge's office showing that the JACK'S CREEK ROAD had been approved for construction.

Yes, Judge, we wonder what has happened to our rural road program in the last 3 1/2 years. We are still paying the gasoline tax but WHERE is it going?

How many roads were built in 1951?

How many were built in 1952?

The Judge also boasts of his county-road work done with YOUR TAX MONEY. He lists numerous roads up the creeks of this county but the total mileage is approximately 15 !!! Some of these roads were done in a period of two days with the county equipment, with the citizens furnishing much of the work at their own expense.

With the men employed by the county at the taxpayers expense on a monthly salary and the equipment owned by the county the total mileage of roads built could have been done in a period of 3 or 4 months. **What have they been doing the rest of the time, Judge? WE KNOW, WE ARE NOT BLIND.** You say in your article that you are satisfied with their work but WE ARE NOT and YOU WOULDN'T BE EITHER IF YOU WERE PAYING THE BILL.

How many of your relatives are you working or keeping on the county payroll?

You say that the equipment has not been used for private persons but we hear different. You would probably tell the people that you have built no PRIVATE ROADS and BRIDGES in the last year but we know you have.

You listed a bridge you have built across Beaver at SPEWING CAMP but that bridge was ADVERTISED FOR BIDS in the FLOYD COUNTY TIMES of July 21, 1949.

Judge, you can't keep fooling the people. They are smarter than you think. Four years ago you promised a road up practically every creek in this county and the majority are still waiting. You promised bridges that have not been built and blacktop that has not been poured and NOW YOU'RE AT THE SAME OLD GAME OF PROMISING.

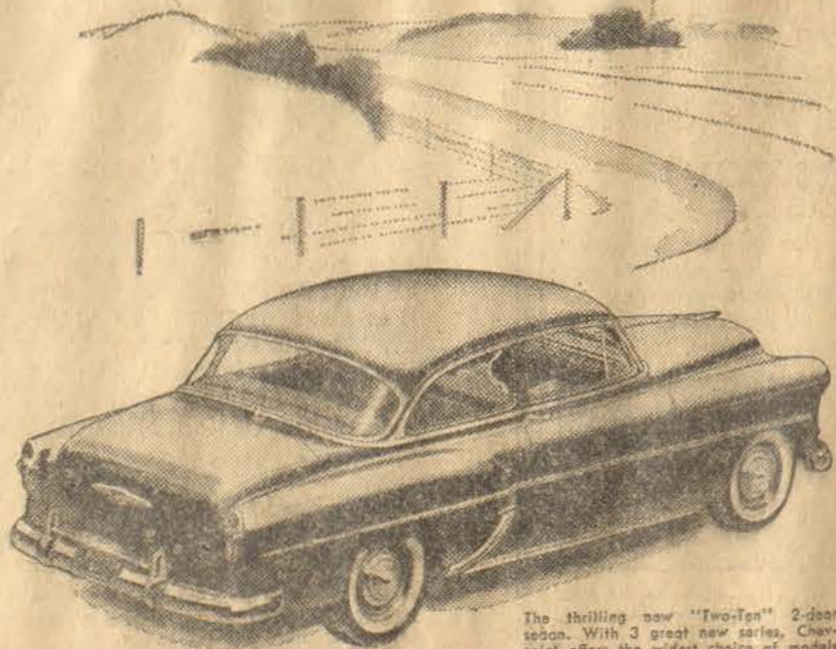

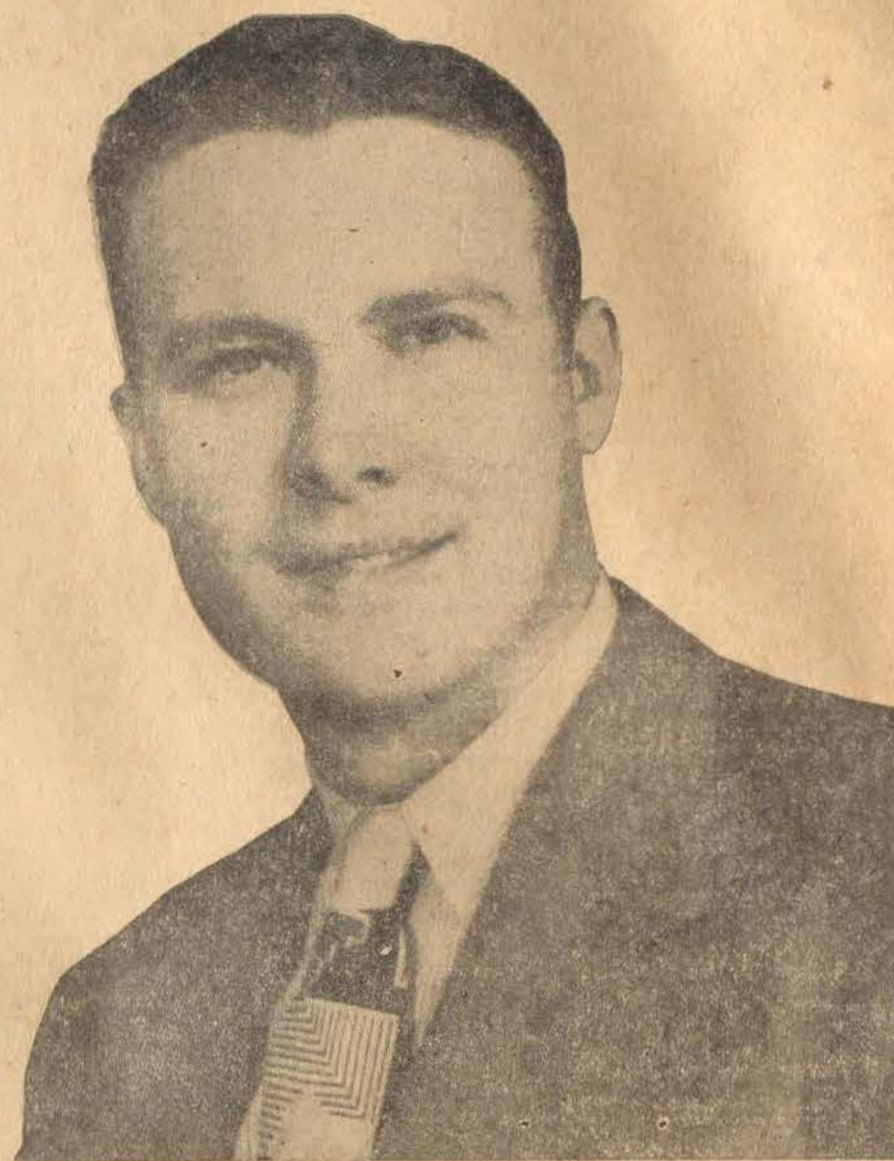

In last week's Floyd County Times there appeared an article, "Hale On Spot With Old Age Pensioners". This article included a letter from John Laferty, an old age pensioner, and was undoubtedly paid for by one of my opponents in my race for County Court Clerk. This letter attached a statement which I had previously made that I had voted against and worked for defeat of the Old Age Lien Law.

A letter of the Legislative Research Commission to Bill Adams, a Republican state representative from Letcher county, sets out the voting record of the members of the House of Representatives on the bill. In Mr. Laferty's letter attempts to show that because I didn't vote when this bill came up for consideration that I was for the Old Age Lien Law. THIS IS NOT TRUE. I WAS AGAINST THIS BILL AND WORKED FOR ITS DEFEAT.

A bill such as the Old Age Lien Law could have passed the House of Representatives by a majority vote of the members present and the rules of the House of Representatives allow two persons who are on the winning side of a vote to later move for reconsideration of a previous vote which is the only chance to later defeat a bill already passed by the House of Representatives.

It should be noted that this bill was originally passed by the Senate and came to the House a number of days previous to the time this bill was to be considered by the House. The other representative from Floyd county and I and many of the other representatives listed as voting against the bill and not voting, attempted to influence representatives to defeat this bill. It was felt that we had a very good chance of defeating the bill but on the day it came up, only one representative being absent, one more than a constitutional majority of fifty-one voted for the bill. The other representative from Floyd county and myself were withholding our vote so that in the event a mere majority and not a constitutional majority of fifty-one voted for the bill then we would also vote for it so that we could later move for reconsideration of the vote by which the bill was passed but when we saw that the bill had received more than one half the entire membership of the House, there was no possibility of moving for a reconsideration of the bill and in fact no need to vote at all.

Mr. Laferty certainly does not appear to be aware of the facts and his letter appears to be based on guesswork more than anything else. Mr. Laferty indicates that I am a rich man with hundreds of acres of land and wealth. This is completely false. While I have some land, it is mortgaged to secure funds to build my home and I myself have always worked for my living for Judge Arnold's Funeral Home and am now driving a truck in the coal hauling business and any of you who wish to check will find I am and have for some time been a member of the United Mine Workers of America.

I should like to point out that in May, 1947, during the year I first ran for representative, the average monthly payment to Old Age Pensioners was \$17.38. Six years later in May, 1953, after I had served three terms in the House of Representatives, the average monthly payment to Old Age Pensioners was \$36.16. In other words during my three terms as your state representative the average monthly payment for Old Age Pensioners has more than doubled. This is because the House of Representatives during each session of the legislature increased the appropriation for Old Age Pension benefits.

In Floyd county there are 722 Old Age Pensioners. A very small percentage of these own land which would be affected by the Old Age Lien Law. I hope that you will not be deceived by the article put in the paper by my opponent and will not discredit what I have attempted to do for you. Your vote and influence will be much appreciated.

## Floyd County Historical Notes

By HENRY P. SCALF

Towns, like people grow, and while Martin may not be fully grown, it has reached the stage where its small beginnings seems far away in the past. An excerpt from the booklet distributed previous to the Fourth of July celebration gives a few interesting facts about its history:

"When our town was first settled it was called 'Preston' in honor of the Preston family. Later it was changed to 'Smalley' and then again, in 1914, it was named 'Martin.' Smalley Crisp was one of the first settlers in the valley and lived to the ripe old age of 95. His children and grandchildren are among our best loved citizens.

"Forty years ago much of the area in and around Martin was still unoccupied and there were only a few houses. Farming and stock raising was the chief means of livelihood until the railroads came and the coal mines were opened.

"Martin citizens are proud of their pioneer ancestors and settlers. The names Crisp, Osborne, Preston, Dingus, Ratcliff, Hunter, Frazier, Flanery, Martin, Reynolds, Keathley, and Allen, are but a few of the original pioneer families that are written in the history of Martin and will live forever in our hearts."

Down here in this column is where corrections are buried. And having gotten the column off with a plug for Martin and its history a correction is offered. Johnse Hatfield was in love with and courted Rose Anne McCoy, the daughter of Randolph, the McCoy chieftain. The article on Rev. Henry Parsons stated it was Alifair.

The present writer knew better but in the hurry of getting the story together the name Alifair crept in where it should have been Rose Anne. He knew better and with a red face when a man walked into the office two days after publication of the article and announced that he was Anse Hatfield. He carried no Winchester and with a smile remarked that he was the old feud leader's namesake and grandson and pointed out the mistake in names.

He states that the love story about Johnse and Rose Anne is vague and obscure. Tradition in the Tug valley gives considerable credence to the story that Rose Anne died with the measles before her child was born and Virgil Carrington Jones, author of "The Hatfields and the McCoy's" is inclined to agree after his investigation. But there are others in Tug valley who tell another story. It is that Rose Anne's child was born in a shed while she was on her way to the Hatfield home. It is said that Devil Anse himself came and carried the babe away and that it froze to death in his arms. Johnse afterwards married Nancy McCoy, daughter of her father's brother Harmon.

Over 60 years ago the late J. M. "Bartee" Weddington went west to care for the body of his father who was killed in an accident on a train while traveling through Indiana. After the interment in a Missouri cemetery where some of the Weddingtons of the preceding century emigrated, Bartee came back to Kentucky.

Thinking on the evils of drink he finally pencilled down his thoughts

on the subject and having completed the thesis, filed it away in an old trunk. There it lay for decades. After his demise it was found by his wife and after being perused by several found its way to this.

In speaking of the approaching end of a drunkard, Weddington rises to heights of old-school forensics. We quote:

"The suffering of the living body are not to be compared with the moral agonies which convulse the soul. It is our immortal being that has agonies that last through eternity. And as his eyes dim in his earthly home his soul and body dissolve for ever more.

"He approaches the judgment seat with fear and the knowledge of a misspent life and a miserable eternity hovers before his vision. Cornered with remorse he is plunged into the gulf."

Frankfort, Ky., July 6 (Sp.)— Superintendent of Public Instruction Wendell P. Butler today recommended to all Kentucky school superintendents that the topic of Civil Defense find a place in the course of study for each school next year.

"Our country is in a state of emergency," Butler wrote. "We are no longer free from the danger of devastating attack. Seriousness of the world situation makes it imperative that school people make whatever plans seem necessary in their community to save lives and unnecessary suffering in the case of disaster."

The State Department of Education has prepared an educational bulletin on Civil Defense in Kentucky schools and it will be distributed to all schools in the Commonwealth. It outlines defense subjects that should be taught school children and also tells of the place of schools as centers of defense activities in each community.

### 'Bear' Facts—

LEXINGTON, Ky. — The South-eastern Conference football picture for 1953, starring a host of outstanding teams and individuals, should not need any special gimmicks to assure national attention. However, a couple of the lesser-known "actors" whom the Kentucky Wildcats will face, may steal a lead from the movies and provide something of a three-dimensional touch to the already interesting program.

LOUISIANA STATE AND MISSISSIPPI STATE are not given leading roles by any of the pre-season critics but could easily jump, in the best 3-D style, right into the laps of the league leaders next fall.

The Bayou Bengals, who measured UK 34-7 last year for their first win in the series, should be one of the strongest outfits in the circuit. But, due to an extremely difficult '53 schedule, we may never know just how strong the men of Coach Gaynell Tinsley are. LSU had a young squad last season and lost only six seniors, all of which adds up to trouble from an improved aggregation this year when they entertain Kentucky in Baton Rouge around mid-season.

REPORTS FROM THE DEEP-SOUTH have it that the Tigers will be sporting an even heavier line than in '52, built around All-America candidates center Gary Diddy and tackle Sid Fournet, and a more experienced backfield paced by George Brancato and Charlie Oakley. All told, 28 letter winners return and most are experienced with one- or two- or three-year experience with one-platoon ball since Coach Tinsley never fully adopted the free substitution system.

MISSISSIPPI STATE rates in our book as the darkhorse of the conference again. The Maroons of Coach Murray Warmath were picked to finish dead last (12th) in the 1952 race, but ended up as one of the surprise elevens of the year in seventh place. Three of their four losses were to bowl teams—two of the setbacks by just one touchdown.

A smartly-arranged schedule plus plenty of backfield talent, led by the terrific Jack Parker, and the prospect of improvement in their defensive setup should project Mississippi State right up to the first division doorstep in 1953.

The Maroons have more football players than most people realize and they know what to do with them. The meeting with Kentucky on Stoll Field in mid-season could be one of those "make or break" affairs.

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## Law Enforcement

The Sheriff of your county is the chief law enforcement officer. He holds the most powerful office within the gift of the people. He has the authority to summon every citizen in his county, if he deems it necessary, to assist him in enforcing the law.

When you are deciding for whom you should cast your vote for this very important office, you should deeply realize the grave and serious duty you are about to perform. You should look for these three most important qualifications.

1. SOBRIETY. No person should be given this great responsibility and authority if he is not a sober man. He, after having been elected to this office should appoint only a person as a deputy who is a sober, trustworthy gentleman. I have not taken a drink of anything intoxicating for more than 12 years. I shall never take one. I sincerely promise you that no person will be appointed as a deputy sheriff who is not a sober, respectable citizen in your community. A drunk officer has no right to arrest your son who may become intoxicated. The officer is a greater violator of the law than the person upon whom he is making the arrest. You will have 4 years of sober law enforcement when I am elected your Sheriff.

2. TEMPERAMENT. With the unlimited authority and responsibility that is granted the Sheriff, he must be reasonable, even tempered and certainly not a "hot head". He must have as his deputies men of these same characteristics. You never know when your son or my son will fall in the path of an arresting officer and it will be the duty of the officer to make an arrest. You most certainly do not want your son abused and beaten by a "hot head", clothed with the uniform of an officer.

It has always been my idea that kindness instead of abuse, justice tempered with mercy will make your son and mine a better citizen in the future.

3. DETERMINATION. The Sheriff and his deputies must enforce the laws of our state and country. Every person in this county will agree we must have law enforcement. Our schools, churches and homes must be protected. But you want sober, fair and determined officers to do this job. Only by casting your votes for a man who has done this job, can you be sure you will have this kind of law enforcement.

It was said of me on the first Monday in January, 1950 to a crowded courtroom in Prestonsburg, Kentucky, "You can say one thing about Sheriff Sturgill, he treated them all alike". My family and myself appreciated this very much, whether it was intended as a compliment or criticism. We knew that it was the truth. I promise the people 4 more years of the same treatment. I direct the following statement to the God fearing Mothers and Fathers of this county realizing that I shall answer and be held responsible to my Master for this statement, that during my six years of service as Sheriff, I never failed to perform my duties as I saw it and to the best of my ability. I had served every warrant of any kind, upon any person, for any crime, I made no difference in creed, color or standing in life. My office force and myself assisted in every way possible with my time and money, in every investigation of crime committed during my term of office.

I have never during my life had an indictment returned against me or a warrant issued for me, upon any charge. I have never been arraigned before 12 of my citizens to be tried for any crime. Decide from the truth, facts and records, not from misleading, false, smearing gossip.

I shall discuss this more fully later in the campaign. I want you to know my record and it is your duty to inquire into all candidates' records and you, the VOTERS, are entitled to have it.

I hope to see most of my friends during the next 30 days.
