

HOW MINIMUM FOUNDATION WOULD BENEFIT FLOYD-CO.

In 1952-53 the average daily attendance in Floyd county was 11,002.64. Of this number, 736.50 were in 38 remote schools with ADA below 27 pupils. This would give us 38 class room units for remote schools. Then 11,002.64 in all the schools, minus 736.50 in the remote schools equals 10,266.14 remaining ADA

This 10,233.14 divided by 27, the desirable number for each room, equals 380.22, class room units. We have four vocational teachers in the county for which we would be given four class room units. The 38 units for remote schools, plus 380.22, class room units for remaining schools, plus 4 vocational units equals 422.22 basic class room units We would be given one special teacher such as librarian, principal, or music teacher for every 3 basic units. 422.22 divided by 8 equals 52.77 units for special teachers. Then we would be required to have 4 supervisors and 3 attendance officers for which we would be given class room units. Thus our total class room units for Floyd county would be 422.22 plus 52.77, plus 4, plus 3 for a total of 482.

The state would allocate \$3200.00 per unit of the 482 class rooms for a teacher with a MA degree, \$2900.00 for a teacher with a BA degree, \$2600.00 for a teacher with 3 years' college work, and so on down

We will use for our figures \$2900.00 times 482 class room units for a total of \$1,397,800 00 for teachers' salaries. We would be allowed \$500.00 per class room unit for operating expenses, or \$500.00 times 422 class room units for a total of \$241,000.00. We would be allowed \$400.00 for capital outlay for each of the 482 units or a total of \$192, \$30.00. The average number of children transported each day in Floyd county in 1952-53 was 4,667 students. We would be allowed 1 bus unit for each 80 children transported, or 58.33 bus units. Then in addition, we would be allowed 1 bus unit for each 40 to 50 square miles in the county. On the basis of 45 square miles, for each unit, divided into the 402 square miles in the county, you would get 9 extra bus units. 58.33 bus units plus 9 bus units would equal 67.33 bus units for the whole county. We are allowed \$1600.000 for 67.33 bus units for a total of \$107,200.00.

For the total educational requirement of the county you would have \$1,938,800 00 broken down as follows:

\$1,397,800.00	for	salaries
\$ 241,000.00	for	operating expense
\$ 192,800.00	for	capital outlay
\$ 107,200.00	for	transportation

How would this \$1,938,800.00 be obtained?

The January, 1952 assessed valuation of property in Kentucky for school purposes on the local level was \$3,165,000,000 times \$1,00 tax rate equals \$31,650,000.00. Floyd county had .0848 per cent of the total tax paying ability of the state in terms of equalized value. \$31,650,-000.00 times .0848 per cent equals \$268,392.00-Floyd county's contribution on Minimum Foundation Program without capital outlay. In order to participate in capital outlay, \$26,839.20 or 10 cents of the present \$1.50 tax rate would have to be contributed by Floyd county. Thus, \$238,392.00 plus \$26,839.20 equals \$295,231.20, our total contribution including capital outlay, The \$295,231.20 from \$1,938,800.00 leaves \$1,643,568.80 for the state Legislature to provide in state taxes. The additional 40 cents that is now levied in local taxes would produce another \$107,356.80 to be spent locally for enrichment of the

(It should be noted that these tax figures on the local level do not represent any increase over the present \$1.50 per \$100 valuation rate.)

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 14 - Gov Lawrence W. Wetherby proclaimed the week of October 4-10 as "Fire Prevention Week in Kentucky" and called on all organizations to "alert every citizen to the danger of fire which strikes, homes, churches, schools, forests, factories and places of entertainment."

He called on all agencies of state government to assist private groups in the "vital crusade."

"Fire last year claimed the lives of 192 Kentuckians, injured 1.000 and destroyed property worth mere than \$13,812,000," the Governor said, pointing to the fact that "fire losses continue to increase with 90 per cent of them definitely the result of human carelessness."

The Governor said that "it is imperative that citizens learn of fire hazards and precautions necessary for fire safety.

The President has proclaimed the same time as National Fire Prevention Week.
