Inasmuch as a home agent cannot possibly do all the organizing or teaching, each club elects two of its members to serve as volunteer leaders or lay teachers. They receive special training from the HDA or specialist, and then relay that information to the members of their clubs. This develops leadership among rural women, a fundamental principle of the home demonstration program.

The HDA arranges for the help of specialists from the University, schedules meetings, helps to set goals for clubs, gives talks and demonstrations, makes home visits, advises on home or community problems, and assists in the organization and carrying out of the 4-H club program in the county. She uses a wide variety of techniques in her teaching demonstrations exhibitions, tours, slides, movies posters, publications, radio newspapers, circular letters, and TV, where available.

The home agent works closely with county-wide committees and groups such as the County Advisory Extension Council, the Homemakers Advisory Council, and committees having to do with civic activities, community improvement, recreation, or public welfare. She cooperates also with other groups in the county, such as bankers, business and professional men and women, farm organizations, schools and churches.

92,465 families in Kentucky reported using improved methods in homemaking as a result of knowledge gained through the home demonstration program.

## In Old Days, the Best Political Plum

By Lee Stewart (In the Rowan County News)

In 1917, Ches Searcy's organization carried Jefferson county and elected all of the officials. The best position was "Oil Inspector" which was given to Roscoe Searcy, a bro-County Judge. Fees in this office amounted to as much as \$50,000 a

The opposition was willing to sacrifice all other oil inspectors in the State if they could get Searcy. Most of the large counties had Democratic Judges who made these appointments. I have been told that in Fayette the office was worth more than a thousand dollars a month, and many other counties paid as well. A bill was introduced by Representative Frank Strange, of Bowling Green, placing the salary at \$3,600 a year in all counties, any additional fees were to be turned over to the State. This was vetoed by Governor Morrow, and I placed this veto on the Executive Journal, which reads:

"In explaining his reasons for vetoing the Strange bill, Mr. Morrow admitted the position of oil inspector was a fraud but the Strange measure is just as bad.

"Mr. Searcy's fees were estimated at \$50,000 a year, but under the proposed law he would have been the only oil inspector to have such a reduction in his income and would have been placed on a straight salary of \$3,600 a year.

"The duties of the position under the proposed recreation would have been the same as at present except the addition of gravity test for gasoline tested by him must be labeled.

"The strange Bill also required a report on all fees collected and turned over to the State. Mr. Morrow made the following statement in vetoing the Strange Measure.

"House Bill No. 336 known as the "Oil Inspector," or "Tester and Gauger of Oils," bill is a fraud, a deception and a political trick of monstrous size. It is as big a fraud as the position of 'Oil Inspector' has always been. For years the people of Kentucky have paid a horde of men known as 'Oil Inspectors,' several hundred thousand dollars annually in large, fat, juicy salaries for doing nothing.

No 'Oil Inspector' was ever known to inspect oil. Like lilies of the field, he tolis not, neither does he spin. He is provided with no apparatus or paraphernalia with which to inspect oil or gasoline.

"The oil inspectors of Kentucky are as ignorant of how to inspect oil as George Washington was of how to crank a ford. The opposition press of the State howls in chorus for slaughter. They demand their life blood. The high priest of Democracy demanded that they be sacraficed on an altar to the glory of his party.

"When the legislature passed the bill, it made bungling, laughable attempts to fool the people by keeping the position and duties of "Oil Inspector" just as they were before, but changing his name to 'Tester and Gauger of Oil.' It reduced the salary of one through spite and malice, but retained others in their pristine glory and uselessness.

"The Tester and Gauger of Oil" is the same old oil inspector. He is just the same old dog but has a new collar. They called him Ring before and now they call him Towser. I am glad to say that my party n both houses, with my approval, voted to kill every one of these useless offices.

"If their advice and votes had prevailed, there would not be an 'Oil, Inspector' in Kentucky today. The opposition kept their pets, favorites and henchmen in office and saved them from death and destruction and will make the people pay their salaries, as heretofore, for doing nothing.
