A total of \$600,035 was paid residents of Floyd county in publi assistance during 1953 according t

Three types of aid-old-age assistance, aid to dependent children and aid to the needy blind-are adminis tered through the agency. Tota payments in the county distribute among the three types of aid were Old-age assistance \$273,862; d pendent children, \$305,547; needy blind, \$20,626.

Public assistance payments for the entire year totaled \$39,217,165, a \$4,-000,000 increase over the 1952 total of \$35.187,055 and more than double the 1948 total of \$17,971,270, when the three programs were consolidated under one agency, the Department of Economic Security. Pay ments for 1949 were \$23,879,544; 1950, \$29,536,570 and 1951, \$31,979,-

Each year since the three programs were placed under on agency, there has been a constan increase and more than \$177,000, 000 has been spent during the time The increases have been effected du to efforts by the Congress and th Kentucky General Assembly meet the rising cost of living, a cording to Barnes.



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
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
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
