





"We" manufactured not only concrete blocks for building purposes but entrance pillar blocks for estates, bird-baths bowls and a multitude of other things. Using old type tamping machinery, he worked alone in the day except for occasional hired help. In the evenings after the sons returned from high school, he had their added help He discontinued the Banner plant in 1950 and built a modern one at Allen on U.S. 23.

With the discontinuance of the Banner plant he quit the ornamental object phase of the business and concentrated on building blocks. The sons went to the army as he had done. Bob is now in Korea and Glenn is recuperating from an illness in the Philippines. "I don't have the supervisory personnel to make ornamental concrete proucts now," he said. "I'm waiting for

e boys to get back." Hall's machinery is the most modern method of making masonry units. It is semi-automatic, electronically controlled, and forms the concrete units by vibration under ressure. The huge machine that sits in the middle of the plant floor, was, when it was installed, one of a very few like it in the country It has a potential capacity of 1,500 blocks per eight-hour shift. It turns out 1,150 per shift now. This production enables him to run an average five-day week and maintain work for five employes other than himself. Normally he works six or
