Brown knows his business.

Speaking of those Iowa Eggs. Iowa is a long way from Eastern Kentucky but since the market is here and the Corn State has the quality eggs, trailer trucks load there with thousands of dozens. The trucker can haul the load here for two cents a dozen. He clears approximately \$200 on a load. In the spring Brown begins to get plenty of local eggs. They don't have the quality the western eggs has but he disposes of them to a plant in Zanesville, Ohio. This plant doesn't especially want quality eggs, for they are broken and packed in containers for bak-

Brown has recently installed a second freezer in his plant. The two he has will hold 3,000 cubic feet of frozen food products. The new one will be used to store packaged foods bought in the Knoxville, Cincinnati and Atlanta markets. From here these foods will be jobbed to retailers. Brown operates within a

radius of 100 miles. Fryers, eggs and frozen foods are only three of the Brown products. He buys and ships approximately 100 varieties of medicinal herbs, hides, tallow, raw furs and beeswax. The last named product-you may have suspected—is used a lot by dentists.

What may be a boon to Eastern Kentucky poultry raisers is the slack-scald plant being erected at Mt. Sterling. This plant can take almost any amount of fryers this section can produce. The fryers when slack-scalded do not turn brown or deteriorate under refrigeration as quickly as these hardscalded. Brown thinks that when this plant is completed he may be able to supply some of his demand for fryers from this plant.

Besides plain, old-fashioned, hard work, the chief partner in Brown Produce Company envisions a lot of things that would contribute to the well-being of Floyd county economy. It needs and could utilize fully a modern welding shop, armature winding shop, refrigeration repair plant and a small machine

"Farmers can do a lot to improve their standard of living," he emphasizes. "There are opportunities here for small dairies. The use of more fertilizers and crop rotation would vastly improve production. But for a good cash erop nothing, in my judgment, would equal straw-



PROCLAMATION

County Judge Henry Stumbo last week issued a proclamation designating April as "Cancer Control Month" and endorsing the American Cancer Society's combined cancer educational and fundraising crusade which opened April 1.

The judge pointed out that cancer, which last year took a toll of 227,000 victims in the United States, now is America's second

Stressing the fact that public health problems are the concern of everyone in the community, he recommended the support of the cancer crusade as a means of furthering a program that is combatting the dread disease by three important fields of activity-research, professional and public education and service to patients.

The text of the proclamation follows:

"WHEREAS, public health problems are not only the responsibility of the medical and public health authorities but of all the residents of the community as well, and

"WHEREAS, cancer, as a public health problem, now ranks second among causes of death in the United States, and

WHEREAS, cancer deaths increased from 220,000 in 1952 to 227,000 in 1953 and a further increase is predicted this year,

"WHEREAS, control of cancer involves concerted action in three fields—scientific research to find permanent cures or preventatives, widest dissemination to physicians and their patients of known facts about cancer and service to cancer patients, and

WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society is the only volunteer agency in the United States with an adequate program dealing with all three of the foregoing phases of cancer control activities, and


WHEREAS, there is an especial immediate need for wider public knowledge about cancer as evidenced by the fact that 73,000 Americans died last year from cancers that could have been cured had they been treated in time

WHEREAS, the American Cancer Society is devoting more than \$4,800,000 yearly in a campaign to inform the public how to detect the seven most common cancer danger signals and to impress upon everyone the urgent necessity of early treatment if cancer is to be cured, and


"WHEREAS, the Society intensifies this public educational program in combination with its annual fund-raising crusade during the month of April, and

WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States has authorized the President to designate April as National Cancer Con-

"THEREFORE, I, Henry Stumbo, Judge of Floyd County, do here-by ordain and proclaim that the residents of this county shall observe April as CANCER CONTROL MONTH, and FURTHERMORE do recommend that they support the cancer crusade by generous dona-tions in order that this county may meet its fund quota and contribute its share toward financing the continuation of the comprehensive program being carried out by the ACS to fight cancer now and eventually to banish it as a sinister threat to future generations of our citizens.





Relief Recipients Number Rises to 102,000; Needy Receiving CCC Surpluses

More than 102,000 persons in thirty Kentucky countles are now receiving relief aid, Ben S. Adams, Commissioner of Agriculture revealed recently.

The assistance is being extended to Kentucky's needy families through the state Agriculture Department's Division of Commodities Distribution cooperating with welfare agencies in the various counties. The Division of Commodities is allocating certain quantities of Commodity Credit Corporation surpluses of cheese, butter, dried milk, canned beef and gravy, dried beans and potatoes. This state agency in turn parcels and dispatches the commodities to the petitioning counties.

Lewis disclosed that the Commodities Division has to date ordered and allocated 25 carloads of the following commodities: cheddar cheese, creamery butter, processed cheese, non-fat dry milk solids. Canned beef and gravy, and shortening have also been ordered for the welfare agencies. An order for four carloads of cranberry sauce for schools and institutions is expected to arrive by April 10. He added that the Commodities Division is distributing dried beans to institutions and welfare recipients at the rate of 1/2 to 1 lb. per person per month The C.C.C. is now allocating from the 1953 potato crop for distribution to the various relief channels. Rate of distribution in Kentucky is 3 lbs. per month for each school child, and 12 lbs. per month for each person in state institutions or wel-
