On Appeal of Judgment Rendered Against Them In Breathitt-co. Affair

The United States Supreme Court upheld a lower court's affirmation of damages against the United Construction Workers and affiliated unions, Monday. Judgment against the Construction Workers, a subsidiary affiliate of The United Mine Workers was for \$129,326 and arose out of a charge by the Laburnum Construction Company of Richmond, Virginia, that it was driven off a tipple job at Evanston, Breathitt county, Kentucky, by armed union-

The judgment was made originally by a state court in Richmond, and upheld by the Virginia Supreme

Cannibalism In Hen Flocks The best remedy for cannibal-

Here are some ways you can help to prevent cannabilism: Give the birds plenty of floor space, keep them busy by feed ing alfalfa hay or other similar feed, and remove those with blowouts immediately. Provide enough watering and eating space to prevent the birds from having to wait in line, and give them plenty of fresh air with good ventilation.

Provide enough nests, and darken them; adjust perches or nests and feed hoppers high enough to keep birds on the floor from picking at those on the perches; use dropping pit-Avoid overheating and overcrowding of baby chicks. Debeaking can be an effective cure for picking if it is done right.

Top Fertilizers Best Buys

Farmers buying fertilizers for next season are told by the University of Kentucky Experiment Station that it's the amount of plant food in the fertilizer that

"The cheapness of the fertilizer depends mainly on the price of the plant food in it and not on the price of a bag or ton,' Experiment Station men said. "Often fertilizers which are cheapest a bag or ton cost the most for the actual plant foot in them.

This example is given: The 4-12-8 grade (24 units of plant food), is a higher grade fertilizer than the 3-9-6 grade (18 units of plant food), and three tons of 4-12-8 contain the same amount of plant food as four tons of

The cost of bagging, handling and transporting a ton of lowgrade fertilizer is the same as the cost of high-grade fertilizer. Also in low grades, materials which have no fertilizing value may be put in to make weight.



After Tandy M. Layne died, his by octogenarians of today. For a great many years she lived alone. The farm was bought by Dr. S. M. in the old house ever afterwards. were virtually outlawed in 1951. One of them was Richard P. Robinson who occupied it for years.

Dr. Ferguson, who lived near the Pike-Floyd county lines at the present Boldman, died in 1904, and his heirs sold the farm to the Big Mud Coal Company, a corporation owned by John C. C. Mayo, Walter S. Harkins and others. Soon afterwards the rail station of Betsy Layne was established. Big Mud Coal Company sold in a short time to the Olive Hill Brick Company.

The company wanted the coal located here for the making of bricks at Olive Hill. Since a mine was now opened, a postoffice was established and as for naming what better one than Betsy Layne? Her old house still stood near the mine, people remembered her from years ago. So in naming the town, she was honored, her name being perpetutated on one of Uncle Sam's far-flung postoffices, Today, though, the postoffice serving where she lived, is Justell, a named coined from Justice and Elliott, later coal operators that mined there. Betsy Layne serves the people on the side of the river where Tandy M. Layne's father, James Shannon Layne lived and had a store. Laynesville, the postofifce that originally served where Betsy Layne is now and which was established by and named for James Shannon Layne does not exist.

The railway station remains with the name, and the old house sti stands, recalling that once ther lived an old lady whom everyon called Betsy Layne.

Ag Board Adopts Rules, Regulations To Enforce New Pest Control Law

Board of Agriculture today adopted and is able to walk about the farm a set of rules and regulations for Pest Control law enacted by the 1954 General Assembly, the requirements of which had been given prior approval by both representatives of the State Department of Agriculture and the pest control in-

The rules and regulations, as approved by the Board of Agriculture today, were promulgated to expedite the administration and enforcement of the following general provisions of the pest control law: (1) Set up standards of applica-

tion and workmanship. (2) Assure proper health and safety precautions.

(3) Specify requirements for contractual responsibility and fulfill-

ment of agreements. (4) Obtain proof of financial responsibility. Each pest control operator is required to carry insurance

providing a maximum liability of \$5,000 for bodily injuries; \$25,000 maximum liability for property damage; and a maximum liability bond of \$50,000 for each occurence. (5) Requirements that the operators file monthly reports of all

contracts entered into during the month. These reports must be filed with the Department of Agriculture by the 15th of the following month (6) Specify fields of operations for which licenses may be issued. Each of the approximately 200

establishments engaged in the pest control industry is required to pay a \$100 license fee annually. This includes all operators doing business in Kentucky either full or part time. Commenting on the new rules and regulations, Commissioner Adams stated: "I am well satisfied and






