### Fire Drill Planned In State Schools

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 27 - More than 400,000 Kentucky school children will participate in what is described by State Fire Marshal J. T. Underwood, Jr., as the world's argest fire drill scheduled for 10 . m., (EST) on October 5.

A network of 46 Kentucky radio stations, the largest radio network ever set up in the state, will participate in the drill which will be touched off in the studios of radio station WHAS in Louisville. Tentative plans call for the drill to nclude additional stations in Ark-

The statewide fire drill is the limax of a radio show entitled "A Chance to Live," which is produced annually through the cooperation of the state's radio stations and the Fire Marshal's office.

The fire marshal emphasized that fire drills in Kentucky's schools play an important role in the overall fire safety education program. During the past year 59 state schools were damaged by fire.


