BODY FOUND. TWO ACCUSED

Former Auxier Men Jailed As Suspects In 9-Year-Old Case

Two former Floyd countians were arrested at Hillsboro, O., Monday, as suspects in the nineyear-old Pike county mysterydeath of Hermit Damron at Regina, Ky.

The accused men are Willard 'Blackie" Hurt, 28, and his halfbrother, Henry Jennings, 37, both former residents of Auxier. They face a murder charge.

Arrest of the two followed the discovery Saturday near Regina of a body which was identified as that of Damron, 27, a coal miner who lived at Belcher until his lisappearance in February, 1945. Identification of the body was made by King Damron, father of the missing man, who said a bill-fold on the body was his son's. It contained a United Mine Workers membership card. He also identified a belt, a comb, six 32calibre revolver cartridges and a ood luck charm.

Coal Operator In Boyd Sues for \$2,500,000

Cattlettsburg, Ky., Oct. 27 - A Boyd county coal operator sued the United Fuel Gas Company today for \$2,500,000 damages, possibly the largest judgment ever sought in circuit court here.

The suit was filed by Charles E. Yates. He claimed that United Fuel Gas Company, which serves a large Eastern Kentucky area with natural gas, is trespassing on Tract 1 of the Clinton tract of land in Boyd and Carter counties. The suit said United Fuel is laying a pipeline across the land

Yates says he is the owner and is in possession of certain coal and coal-mining rights in the property He said the tract was conveyed by deed by American Rolling Mill Company to the Eastern Kentucky Lumber & Development Company December 9, 1942.

On October 11, 1954, his petition continued, Beatrice Patton and others, as owners of part of the property and of certain mining rights in other parts of the property, conveyed to United Fuel an easement of right of way to lay, maintain and operate a gas pipeline.

However Yates alleged, the instrument conveying the easement was subject to a lease made January 30, 1945, between Eastern Kentucky Lumber & Development Company and W. R. Westfall. Yates also claimed the instrument was subject to provisions of a coal-mining lease made February 1, 1950, between Westfall and himself.

If the pipeline is completed Yates claimed, he will be prevented from mining coal near to or under the line. His petition stated he would be unable to mine a minimum of 50,000 tons of coal having a value in excess

of \$5 a ton. Besides the \$2,500,000 damages. Yates seeks an injunction against the company to keep it from proceeding with its proposed 234 milelong pipeline.







4. The Nation's Health.

The Democratic plan for doctor, hospital and medical care for the nation's citizens has been all but done away with by the Republican Administration. The Republicans have cut hospital funds, medical research appropriations, and aid to medical schools for the training of doctors and nurses.

5. Public Power and Public Works Projects.

While the Democrats spent \$18,000,000 per year on river projects in Kentucky, the Republicans have averaged only \$6,000,000 per year in our State. The Republicans are now trying to do away with the T. V. A. The President calls it "creeping socialism." Is this the party we are looking to to canalize the Big Sandy?

But the Republican congress tacked a rider on the defense appropriation bill doing away with this price differential, so important to us in selling coal to the government. John Sherman Cooper and every other Republican in the Senate voted for this rider, which prevents Eastern Kentucky from having an advantage in selling coal to the government.



Kentuckians participated in the 1948 election, and only 41.5 per cent of the total registered Republicans in the state voted. This voting percentage for the Republicans was the lowest for that party since the presidential race of 1928. 

'Kentucky Story," a collection of 15 short stories, edited by Dr. Hollis Summers, Kentucky writer and member of the UK Department of

Since the chief function of a university press is to publish works which contribute significantly to knowledge and culture, many of the books issued by the UK Press necessarily are of a scholarly nature and aren't of general interest to the average Kentuckian throughout the

However, "Kentucky work likely to capture the interest of all story lovers in this area who examine it. Almost 70 years of Kentucky writing, beginning with James Lane Allen's "King Solomon of Kentucky," first published in 1891, are epresented.

Is there a Kentuckian anywhere who wouldn't thrill again to the words of "King Solomon of Ken-Remember some of the tucky?" opening sentences?

"Yes, the summer of 1833 was at hand and there must be new pleasures, new luxuries; for Lexington was the Athens of the West and the Kentucky Birmingham . . . (and later on) it was the coronation scene in the life of old King Solomon of Kentucky.

As almost any Eastern Kentuckian can tell you, a Kentucky anthology wouldn't be complete without a yarn by John Fox, Jr. His story in this volume is "Courtin on Cutshin." It opens this way:

"Hit was this way stranger. When hit comes to handlin' a right peert gal, Jeb Somers air about the porest man on Fryin' Pan, I reckon, and Polly Ann Sturgill have got the vineg'rest tongue on Cutshin or any ther crick.

Another writer selected as a conributor to the anthology was Alice Heagan Rice. Don't you recall how Amanda lifted the spell in the story Hoodooded," with this chant:

"Draw, draw, 'cording' to the law Lif' the hoodoo, now I beg, An draw the cricket Fom this heah leg!"







This does not mean that modern ducation is a failure, but it does mean that the new program, like all others, has been experimental and not all of it has proved worthwhile. The so-called enrichment program, designed to give every child more of the arts and crafts, etc., has encroached upon the time needed by and formerly alloted to the more important subjects, till some wonder if the enrichment program has not become an "impoverishment" program instead.

The modern program originated in national circles, but the change will be brought about by ordinary parents and teachers, who have closer contact with more children, whose work is done under average condiditions. There is a trend in this direction today. A number of experts have agreed that the bottom has about fallen out of standards in all subjects. This will be Step One towards revision. First, enough must

Often top specialists in the medical world have been known to reverse their stand. The same thing is going to happen shortly in the field of education, and much of the fol-de-rols, frill, extras that have overcrowded our regular schedule will go into honorable discard!

A few years ago an outstanding principal in one state said, "You can talk till you are purple in the face but you get nowhere trying to tell some of the high authorities what is wrong." But his viewpoint was right, and some of the specialists are coming to admit it and attach their signature to it.

Extra-curricular activities are fine. Top students can do a marathon with them. Handicapped children with talent in music, etc., need encouragement in such, as their careers may be in those fields. But the average child who attempts many, as participant or spectator, soon neglects his regular subjects. No child wants spinach when a banana split is waiting! Too many remain keyed up, in high gear, waiting for some entertainment that is sched-

The net result of this is that many little folks can do a better job cutting out paper dolls than they can reading or spelling! And there is a connection.

It seems that teachers, even the young ones who are unfamiliar with the old methods, have seen it before most experts. They are concerned over their own children their pupils, and are expressing themselves, in many states.



JOBLESS PAY **INCREASING**

Unemployment Higher In State than in '49; 322 Million Paid in '54

Some 18,000 employers in Kentucky paid a total of \$641,000,000 in covered by the State Unemployment taxable payroll the first six months of 1953 of \$693,292,349 or a reduction of more than \$52,000,000 drop at the rate of more than \$100,-000,000 a year.

In addition, Mr. Barnes cited the high unemployment incidence for September of 9.7 per cent-with 97 out of each 1,000 in covered insured enchloyment—or an average weekly unemployment roll of 39,240 persons in September, which is considerably higher than the rate of 6.9 per cent in September 1949—when there were \$800 persons on the average weeknemployment roll, the highest

month prior to the Korean struggle Besides, Barnes added, there are 22,000 erstwhile claimants who have exhausted their benefits this year, and we have reason to believe that at least one-half of these-or 11,000 persons are out of work-bringing the total to more than 50,000 Kentuckians in covered employment out of work.

"In other words, all the factors show that economic conditions are far worse than 1949-with industrial payrolls down substantially-and an increasing number out of work." Barnes continued. "In other words unemployment is 41 per cent more severe this year than in 1949.

"In addition to the much greater number of insured unemployed for the first nine months of 1954, 22,000 exhausted their benefits as compar ed to 17,000 for the year of 1949-includes also the factor that unemployed persons are now entitled to a maximum of twenty-six weeks of benefits, while the maximum was twenty weeks in 1949."

The "seriousness of the current situation is partially emphasized by he fact that Kentucky currently eleven areas classified by the ites Department of Labor as havin critical surplus of labor and that these areas of critical employment include 35 of the State's 120 counties."

Barnes added that during the first nine months of 1954, 1,798,888 consurance were filed in Kentucky representing that many weeks of unployment-while during the entire twelve months of 1949 only 1:295,179 such claims were filed. So far this year claims have been at a rate 87 per cent higher than for the comparable period of 1949.





Distinguished Scientist To Give Lecture Series At Transylvania College

One of the world's most distinguished writers and scientists, Dr. Julian Huxley, will visit Kentucky and deliver a series of three lectures at Transylvania College, Lexington, Nov. 22, 23, and 24, it was announced by Dr. Frank A. Rose, Transylvania president.

Dr. Huxley, eminent British biologist, has taught biology in the United States and in England and has been secretary of the Zoological Society of London and director of the London Zoo. A frequent and far-ranging traveller, Dr. Huxley has journeyed throughout Europe and America as well as to Africa, India and Thailand, and last year on a lecture tour through Australia and Tasmania. He was the first Director-General of UNESCO.

Dr. Huxley has been author and co-author of works ranging from highly specialized texts and reference books on biology, embryology and genetics to a film script and a book of poems. He and his brother, Aldous, the novelist, are among the est-known writers in the world toay. For some time he has been deoting the major part of his attention to the study of evolution, with a view to effecting a synthesis of the different fields of biology concerned and also to explain its implications for general belief.
