

If the U. S. Corps of Engineers would consider this great potential market for Big Sandy coal, the ratio of benefits from canalization of the river to the cost of the project would be much more favorable.

Likewise, if the benefits that would accrue to this nation in an emergency with the valley's coal mines working and ready to shoulder their full share of the production burden were figured and compared with the disastrous effect of abandoned coal workings resulting from a stagnant coal business—then the Engineers would certainly be constrained to favor the canalization job,

As matters stands with transportation difficulties and costs closing to this area those other markets which need the fine coal this section produces, the only solution short of canalization would be to bring the mountain to Mahomet; that is to say, locate one or more of these great power - producing plants in the Big Sandy val-

Sources of gas supply for Prestonsburg have been widely discussed here since a local company proposed to sell fuel to the city. The Times would suggest to the City Council and the Prestonsburg Gas & Water Commission that they give consideration to these matters:
