





The structure and lot, financed by the issuance of \$12,000 in bonds. cost \$16,000. The city will pay a certain amount each year as rent for seven years. After the bonds are amortized the city of Martin will own the building and lot.

Totalled 329 Last Year

Frankfort, Ky., June 6 (Spl.) Kentucky's county and independent school districts paid twice as much in insurance premiums last year to insure against accidents, as was paid by companies for damages, according to a study made by the State Department of Education.

Superintendent of Public Instruction W. P. Butler disclosed that districts paid \$73,968 in premiums, and the companies returned \$36,661 for property damage and bodily injuries growing out of accidents. Butler revealed that the study was made under direction of John L. Vickers, director of bus transportation. It also showed that there were 329 school bus accidents during the year which resulted in 62 persons being slightly injured, four suffered serious injuries and one fatality.

The study disclosed, too, that 193 of the accidents occurred on paved roads; 68 were on gravel roads and 13 were on dirt roads. In addition, the road were reported in good condition in 185 cases; 53 occurred on slippery roads; 16 on rough places and three on "soft" places in the road
