Sheriff, Chief Deputy Say Property Forfeit Penalty To Be Exacted

Sheriff Gormon Collins and his chief deputy, Troy Mullins, served written notice this week on owners of property or vehicles used in the whiskey traffic that the law providing for forfeiture of such property to the state will be enforced in all future violations of the local option

Similar action was threatened a few years ago, but the penalty was never executed.

Collins issued typewritten notices for posting and for newspaper publi cation. They cite Section 242,310. Kentucky Revised Statutes, which

"Any person knowingly or intentionally renting or permitting the use of, or using, any premises, or part thereof, or any vehicle for the purpose of unlawfully selling or transporting or possessing intoxicating liquors in dry territory, shall be guilty of a nuisance and of a violation of this chapter. Any property so used shall be forfeited to the state. The forfeiture shall extend to the whole of the premises or vehicle owned by the defendant, or to his interest in said property, including all land and buildings in

one boundary. Upon a judgment of forfeiture the Sheriff would sell such property at

Legend of Painted Rock Rev. Durham recalls the legend of Painted Rock. The Rock is located about a mile from the forks up the Clinch River on the right hand bank. The rock was so named because it was decerated with images The 75-foot structure, now com-

pletely below the lake surface, was

designed with a reddish paint. "There is a story of a vast amount of gold buried in the river bluffs near the rock," Rev. Durham said He tells the story of Dan Ridenour, called "Punkin Seed Dan," who dug around the rock looking for the gold. Dan was between 60 and 70 at the time, Rev. Durham said, and he dug huge holes in his search

for the gold. "If he ever found it," Rev. Dur-

ham stated, "no one ever knew. The rock, which had natural shelves around it, was thought to be haunted by ghosts, Rev. Durham said that his mother, as a young girl, was told by two Indians that at one time "gold was as cheap around there to shoe horses with as

The top of painted rock is sometimes visible when the water is low. When the Rev. Durham was 13 his family moved to LaFollette and there he saw his first train. "I don't know if I was ever in town before that," he said.

Rev. Durham was ordained in the old Mountain Baptist Church near Habersham, June 15, 1913. Since then, his ministry has covered the states of Kentucky and West Vir-

He left LaFollette to move to West Virginia in 1917, but he tries to get back once a year for a reunion with memories.
