### Red Rocking Chair Saves Child's Life From Brother's Shot

The back of a child's red rockng chair is credited with saving the life last Friday of 10-year-old Anna Estep when her three-yearold brother picked up a loaded .410gauge shotgun and accidentially fired the weapon.

Charge of the shotgun, fired from distance of a few feet, passed through the back of the chair and shoulder blade. Dr. George P. Archer, of the Prestonsburg General hospital, said the blast made a hole in the child's back about the size of a silver dollar and that it carried into the wound slivers from the chair and shot and wadding from the cartridge. Impact of the shot caused the lower lobe of the child's right lung to collapse, but the shot itself did not penetrate the lung.

Company, Inc., negotiated a lease We cannot believe that the Legislature had in mind the taking up of the bed of the Ohio River between the thread of the stream (the center of the channel) and the northern shore. There could be no actual settlers on such land. While we do not doubt the power of the Legislature to provide for the issuing of patents for the bed of the Ohio River north of the thread of the stream, so that sands or minerals which may be on or under this land may be appropriated, we do not

think it has yet done so Then in 1926, the old patent statute was amended by declaring that the bed of the river north of the center of the stream is vacant and inappropriated property.

The amendment added that each ounty may lease such beds for sand and gravel revenue.

Mr. Walker's argument, as expounded in his brief prepared by Attorney William Powell, is that this did not restrict counties to leases for sand and gravel, but merely permitted them. In other words, he claims the counties still have

the power to sell the land. Ohio River Oil Company, which has assigned its lease to Olen D. Sharp, Mt. Carmel, Ill., oilman, and Kentucky argue that the 1926 amendment does restrict Henderson county to the leasing of the bed for sand and gravel only.

It and Kentucky admit however that the northern half of the river bed is vacant and unappropriated land. But they say it can't be deed-

They further claim that the State Property and Building Commission, acting on behalf of Kentucky, was granted authority to lease such property for oil and gas by the re-enactment in 1949 of a law creating that agency.

The law says nothing about the Ohio River bed. It deals primarily with right of the agency to handle



Veterans of the Korean conflict who lost their World War I or II GI term insurance because their policies expired within 120 days after their discharge may now apply for replacement of that term insurance under a new law, O. H. Geralds, Acting Manager of the Veterans Adinistration Regional Office in ouisville, announced. The new act is Public Law 194, 84th Congress, Geralds added.

Under this new act, veterans whose GI term insurance expires after April 25, 1951, either while they are in active service or within 120 days after discharge may replace such insurance within 120 days after discharge, or within 120 days after July 29, 1955, whichever

They must file application, meet the premium at their attained age

in order to qualify. Previously, only those GI term policies that expired while the policyholders were in active service after April 25, 1951, could be replaced within 120 days after discharge. No provision was made for the replacement of term policies that expired within the 120-day period after discharge. The new law adds the latter period for replace-

In addition, the new law grants another opportunity for replacement to those persons whose term policies expired while they were in active service after April 25, 1951, but who failed to apply for replacement within 120 days after discharge. These persons now have 120 days after July 29, 1955, in which to

### Says Industry Speaker; Neither Does It Hurt Irreparably, He Adds

PUT-IN-BAY, O., Sept. 8 - A oal industry spokesman said here oday that legislation enacted durig the first session of the 84th ongress "neither helped us greatly harmed us irreparably." n address before a meeting of the oint committees on land and water use of the National Coal Associaon and American Mining Congress Don Sullivan, administrative asistant of the coal association, exlained that the full impact of conressional action will not become vident until the effectiveness of national defense amendment to the Frade Agreement Act is determined

(The amendment, which was dopted in lieu of attempts by oil and coal state legislators to place quota limitation on oil imports rovides for holding the imports at 1954 proportions)

Mr. Sullivan told his audience that he amendment "was not wholly acceptable" to the coal industry, but that the provision-if enforced-can nevertheless curb the "progressive usurpation" of coal's East coast mar kets by importers of residual oil He added that the coal industry is prepared to continue during the next session of Congress the crusade for a 10 per cent quota restriction on crude and residual oil.
