

Miss Haywood, Member Of WAC, Dies Friday At Montgomery, Ala.



Attorney Claims Jury Had Member Who Was Not Kentucky Citizen

This possible development arose this week when Joe P. Tackett, attorney for Enoch Spears, lower Johns Creek man accused of the rape of an elderly woman, filed a motion to quash the indictment against his client on the grounds that a member of the grand jury which indicted Spears was a residen of Ohio at the time she served as a grand juror and owned no property of any kind in Floyd county

The attorney asked that Circuit udge Hill consider the motion to uash, pointing out that the juror, Mrs. Mintie Hammond, had sold her ome here and had established pernanent residence in Ohio prior to mpaneling of the grand jury. The pears case was continued till Jan,

Three special schools served 87 children. special hospital or home tutoring was provided for 67, and speech correction or speech and hearing tests were given 2093.



Several thousand Floyd countians and more than a half million Kentuckians will receive Christmas Seals through the mails in the next few days, it was said here Wednesday by B. F. Reed, chairman of the Floyd county Christmas Seal fundraising drive for 1955.

The annual sale of Christmas Seals is the sole support of the Floyd County Tuberculosis Association and the work done by Mrs. Regina B. Roberts as t. b. nurse, it was pointed out. Floyd county was the first county in Kentucky to employ a fulltime nurse to carry on the fight on tuberculosis day after day throughout the year, and the results have not only been gratifying to the Association but also have commanded the attention of health leaders throughout the state.

Dr. E. R. Gernert, president of the Kentucky Tuberculosis Association said, in announcing the statewide Christmas Seal campaign, "Kentuckians can well be proud of the progress made in tuberculosis control here. In the past five years the t. b. death rate has declined by more than 50 per cent."

In Floyd county the death rate has dropped 88 per cent, and this is a record of success unattained in any of the state, perhaps in the nation. Five years ago, when the t. b. program was initiated in the county there were 26 t. b. deaths. To date this year, there have been two.







Democrat Keen Johnson led his Republican opponent, King Swope, by 106.130 votes. When the final figures came in. Chandler had a total of 457,185 to 325,832 for Republican Edwin R. Denney

In winning this year, Chandler received 99.077 fewer votes than he did in 1935, when his total was 556,-262. He won the governorship that vear over Swope, who polled 461, 104 in his first race for governor Swope's total that year, incidentally, is still the record Republican vote for governorship. Swope's 354,-704 total against Johnson in 1939 is the second highest Republican vote for that post.

Only twice in history has a winning candiate for governor polled more votes than Chandler did last week. His own 1935 total is still the record followed by Johnson's total of 460.834 four years later. Total vote cast for the two major. party candidates this year was 783 .-017. Only twice before has that total been exceeded in a governor election-in 1935, when rampaging interest in the sales-tax issue sent the total to 1.017.366. and in 1939, when the total was 815,534.

In the 1951 governor's election. the total vote was 634,359, compared with 675,551 in 1947, and 549,669 in 1943

Chandler's total vote last week fell about 44.000 short of the 501,-629 cast in the Democratic primary August 6. His own total then was 259.875, compared with 241,754 for Bert T. Combs.

Only about 97.000 votes were cast in the Republican primary, with Denney winning 77,000 of them. In losing last week, Denney polled more votes than any Republican since Swope. He polled 46.000 more votes than were cast for Republican candidate Simeon Willis in 1943. when Willis was elected.

Denney polled about 38,000 more votes than did his campaign chairman, Eldon S. Dummit, when Dummit was the G.O.P. candidate for governor in 1947. And he polled 37,-000 more than Republican Eugene Siler did in 1951.

Chandler carried seven of the state's eight Congressional Districts by these margins:

First 29,433; Second, 29,613; Third. 1.855: Fourth, 23, 937; Fifth, 18,-965; Sixth, 29,726, and Seventh, 14,-

During the first half of the current year (1955), however, production has been running about ten percent ahead of the 1954 pace.

"The bulk of coal output from the Eastern Kentucky field comes from seven counties in the area, each of which produced over one million tons in 1954. Altogether these counties extracted 30.7 million tons during the year or 82 percent of the total for the area. Production during 1954 was well below the 1946 rates for each of the counties. with the exception of Leslie county where production in 1954 was five times as great as in the earlier year.'

The review says that Harlan county was the top coal producer in the Eastern Kentucky field throughout the post-war period, but Pike held the lead in the 1947, 1948 and 1949. Harlan produced 8.9 million tons last year, and Pike totaled up 5.5 million

"There is some indication," the analysis says, "that the rate of loss of coal markets to competitive fuels has tended to level off in recent years. Likewise, the loss of export markets appears to have run its course. It is considered by many observers that increased consumption of coal by electric utilities should more than offset any further losses to competing fuels and result in continued net gains in total coal production.'

The most recent report by the Big Sandy-Elkhorn Coal Operators Association, which represents the major mines in this area, issued for the week ending Nov. 5, while showing an increase of over 30 per cent above last year's corresponding period, did show a decline from a total of 7,045.8 cars of an average 50 tons for the week ending Oct. 29 to a figure of 6.346 cars.

Total tonnage produced by the Association mines to Nov. 5 stands at 11,154,780 but last year it was for the corresponding period only 8,-573,000 tons.

Budget Bureau Officials. Clements, Congressman, To Discuss Waterways

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 - Senator Earle C. Clements said today that he and other Kentucky congressmen will meet November 21 with top Budget Bureau officials to urge budget planning that will speed development of Kentucky waterways.

The Kentucky Democrat said the need for a speed-up was shown by mounting flood damage, failure to capitalize on navigation, wasting of water-storage potentialities and recreational benefits, and growing siltation and water-pollution probems

Clements said the Kentucky dele-John gation would urge the fastest possible completion of the Big Sandy River survey. He said that the Budget Bureau last year had budgeted only a token amount.

"Congress, recognizing the imporof the survey in half the time recommended by the Budget Bureau,'

he said ing fiscal year, he added.

Congress has proposed complefrom seven to eight years, he said. if there is no will.

enough money to keep pace with the accelerated program outlined by Congress, Clements said.

Because of increasing traffic on the Ohio River removation and replacement of obsolete navigational structures will be stressed at the meeting, he said. Anther item to be pushed is funds to continue construction of the Catlettsburg floodwall at the confluence of the Big Sandy and Ohio river, he added.

Clements said he will urge increased funds for the small watershed program now administered by the Department of Agriculture through the Soil Conservation Service.

"A full program for conserving natural resources through our stream development requires that this program be implemented by substantial funds and a realistic policy on the part of the Administration," Clements declared. Besides himself. Clements

iots at their favorite target on Saturday, Nov. 19, with indications of good supplies of both rabbits, and quail in the fields. Already waterfowl hunters are seeking out the ducks and geese and with the opening of the rabbit, quail and ruffed grouse season Kentucky's hunting picture will be complete.

Kentucky's rabbit and quail hun-

In addition to the quail, rabbit and ruffed grouse season opening the second phase of the squirrel sea son will also open on November 19 This season will end on December 16, while the season for rabbits. quail and ruffed grouse will extend through January 17.

Preliminary reports from throughout the state indicate an abundant supply of rabbits and birds in all sections, with the rabbit numbers probably being greater than for last year and with the quail population at least as great as last year. Duck and geese hunters are finding good supply of waterfowl but the main flights apparently have not arrived in Kentucky.

The hunter may take eight rabbits for his daily limit and may have in his possession a total of 16 after two or more days of hunting. The daily limit for quail is 10 with a possession limit of 20 after two or more days of hunting. For grouse the daily limit is two and the possession limit double that amount Six squirrel may be killed per day with a possession limit of 12 after two or more days of hunting.



HIGH INCOME **IS REFLECTED**

In Floyd County Spending Sales Management States; Local Food Bill Is High

NEW YORK, Oct. 17 - With incomes of Floyd county residents running at a high level, the questions arise: How much of this money are they spending? Where are they spending it and for what?

Answers to the questions are contained in a copyrighted study made by Sales Management of the spend. ing habits of people locally and in other parts of the country. Put under the spotlight are each community's purchases of foods, autos, general merchandise and the like. In Floyd county most of the earnings in 1954 went into the cash registers of the local retail stores. These expenditures produced retail business in the amount of \$22,965,000 for the year.

The chief buying emphasis was on food, which took 25 cents of each dollar spent in the local stores.

The volume of such purchases indicates a trend toward more luxurimatter, subject to publication as a in meat markets, grocery stores, delicateasens and such, came to \$5, 829,000 in the year. Divided equally among the local families, amounted to \$544 per family.

The local ability to indulge in nore and better food is but one facet of an overall improvement in

Luxury buying in Floyd county was indicated also in outlets selling new and used cars, farm machinery and other automotive equip ment. Such sales ran to \$5,209,000, accounting for another 23 cents of the retail dollar.

Another outlet was in general perchandise stores, including department and variety stores. The volume was \$4,719,000, amounting to 20 cents.

Local sales of furniture, housenold equipment and radio and music supplies were \$2,137,000, equal to nine cents.




