TO THE EDITOR Editor, The Times:

As I sat down to study next Sunday's Sunday School lesson on the subject, "Who Is My Neighbor?" based on the story of the Good Samaritan, I could not help but think of two recent events that took place last week-end. One of these gained nation-wide publicity and the other may not have been heard of outside Floyd county.

The first incident I refer to is the recent effort of the Governor of the state of Georgia to ban the Georgia Tech football team from playing ni the Sugar Bowl game in New Orleans because the opposing team, Pittsburgh, has one player who is a Negro and further because tickets were sold in Pittsburgh to fans on a non-segregated basis. While this was being aired on a nation-wide scale, here in Floyd county (which on occasion some so-called "enlightened" people have referred to as backward) a county high school basketball tournament was in progress. Among the teams participating was a first-time entrant, Palmer-Dunbar high of Wheelwright, the only Negro high school in the county. The team played in the first round of the tournament and, although defeated, displayed excellent sportsmanship, as did the opposing team and all of the fans.

Without getting into all of the ramifications of segregation and non-segregation, I merely cite this as an example to show that if people want to apply the principles of our Lord as set forth in the Parable of the Good Samaritan, they can and will work.

So, as I come back to my Sunday School lesson I am reminded that love of God is the motive for love of neighbor; further, that our neighbor includes all the people of the world and, last but by no means least, our sincerity of belief (or lack of it) is seen in our actions. The world still has need of Good Samaritans.

Samples collected and tested this fall will serve the farmer just as well as sampling and testing next spring.

"In addition to avoiding the spring wet weather and rush, farmers have more time for collecting samples this fall, technicians have more time to make tests, and county agents have more time to make fertilizer recommendations. Consequently, farmers have more time to shop around for fertilizer.

"The present economic situation relative to farm operating costs and prices received demands that farmthat each investment will return a training. profit. For investment in fertilizers to return a profit, farmers must buy the required plant nutrients that are limiting production. A proper balance of the nutrients needed will give the greatest immediate returns. able for determining what is need-

### Certified Berry Plants Available

Six and a half million Kentuckygrown certified strawberry plants will be available for planting next spring, it is announced by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics. The plants were grown under the supervision of the college and were certified by the Kentucky Seed Improvement Association. They were grown from approved virus-free stock and an insect-control program was followed to prevent the indoctrination or spread of virus diseases

Inspections were made to detect disease and to determine the general quality of the plants. Samples of roots and soils were examined for the strawberry root-knot nematode. It is believed that these certified plants will be the best available for setting this season.

In tests of virus-free plants this year, yields over ordinary plants ranged from 10 to 60 crates, worth an extra \$60 to \$300 an acre.

Some uncertified plants may be set this year, due to the large demand. These may not be a safe risk, depending on the safeguards used to prevent the spread of the virus



### SAYS FARMER **NEEDS ADVISE**

### Avers Every Farmer Should Have Social Security Information

Before income tax filing time, every self-employed farmer should make sure he has his social security number and that he knows how he is to report his self-employment for social security credit, Robert A. Flynn district manager Social Security Administration, Ashland, said

Old-age insurance payments to a self-employed farmer and his wife at age 65 and to his survivors on his death are based upon these reports of his net earnings of \$400 or more yearly. As a self-employed person, he will pay a 3 per cent soings up to \$4200 in a year. This payment goes in as a part of his income tax return. Net earnings means the amount of income from farm operation after deducting farm operatin gexpenses. These expenses (not living expenses) must be listed unless gross earnings are not over \$1800, in which case the farmer can report half of his gross as

If he is also an employer and expects to pay at least \$100 cash wages to an employee during the year, then he will need an "employer's identification number" as well as his own social security number. He gets the employer's number from his District Director of Internal Revenue, and gets his social security number from the social security office. Any post office has application blanks

Flynn said that several farm owners in the 65-or-older age group have come to his office to learn whether they can qualify to receive old-age payments. Those who are actually operating their own farms can qualify after they hav been under social security for only two years after 1954.

Persons under age 65 must work longer, depending on their age. Those whose farms are worked by someone else on a lease or share arrangement are not, ordinarily, considered self-employed, so pay no social security tax and get no credit under the program.

A typical case where the owner is considered to be a landlord and not a self-employed person is as

A landowner arranges with share-farmer to produce a crop or livestock on the landowner's farm, for which the landowner will receive a share of the total crop or livestock or a share of the proceeds from their sale, and the amount of the landowner's share depends upon the total amount of the crop or the number of livestock produced.

Flynn cautioned, however, that there are many variations of farming arrangements and, when in doubt, the owner and the operator should both contact their social security office or District Director of Internal Revenue for more exact
