Admissions and discharges, respectively, at each of the hospitals were



Miss Elizabeth Watts, with the Hindman Settlement School 47 years and its director since 1946, is resigning effective in October.


Henry J. Stites, Louisville attorney and president of the school's board, said Raymond Kane McLain, formerly of Lexington, will be the new executive director.






