**Hospital Discharges Outnumber Admissions**

Frankfort, Ky., April 30 (Spl.) — Fifteen more patients were discharged from Kentucky's six state tuberculosis hospitals in March than were taken in, it was announced today by Joe D. Miller, executive director of the State Tuberculosis Sanatoria Commission.

He warned a Louisville insurance agency that the practice must be discontinued immediately.

"Recently advertisements in some Kentucky newspapers that offer giveaway insurance have been brought to attention of this department," he said. "The practice of offering free insurance is against the law and the fact that the advertisements fail to mention by name the company writing the insurance is also in violation of Kentucky law."

He said that "insurance is not an article, but rather a service, and the assured should have free selection of the company and agent by whom the service is provided."

PARK PRICES RISE HINTED

Jackson Claims Parks Are Not Breaking Even; Swim Charges Planned

Frankfort, Ky., April 26 — The state park system may have to increase the prices it charges Kentuckians and tourists, Conservation Commissioner Laban Jackson said today.

Jackson contends the parks are not breaking even. The prices charged for food, lodging, and recreation facilities should not be so low that the parks are "underselling" hotelmen and restaurateurs in communities near the parks, Jackson said.

Jackson did not specify which prices may be raised. Earlier this month, the Division of State Parks announced that it would build fences around swimming areas in three more parks and charge an admission fee. Tentative plans called for a charge of 25 cents for adults and 15 cents for children.

Claims by the conservation commissioner and Mrs. Ben Kilgore, director of state parks, that the parks lost about \$375,000 last year were based on an audit that compared income from park facilities with operating costs, according to Jackson.

This was the reason that the audit, made by the Conservation Commission auditor did not take into account the \$275,000 State subsidy appropriated last year for the parks, said Jackson.

"That was not actual income," he declared. And he said that if the park system ever gets to a point where it operates within its actual revenue from patrons "we could use the State appropriation to develop new parks or expand existing facilities."

The annual appropriation will be \$225,000 in 1956 and 1957. Jackson said he is "not contending that we should make money" with the parks. "But if we are going to spend all this money on schools" the park system will have to institute charges for some services now provided free and increase charges on other services to operate within its income, Jackson said.

He said "it isn't fair" to private operators in communities near the park sites for the parks to charge less for food and lodging. "They (the private operators) can't survive" under those conditions, he said.

This award is sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary, Department of Kentucky, and is a phase of the Award of Merit program carried on at the hospital. It is under the direction of the Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation Service.

Mr. Mullett was admitted to the hospital May 9, 1955 and was referred for treatment on June 30, 1955. He was assigned to educational therapy where he took up the study of mathematics. **Three Ky. Congressmen Ask Legislation To Give Distressed Areas Help**

Washington, April 26 — Three Kentucky congressmen today urged the passage of legislation to give federal aid to economically distressed areas in Kentucky and elsewhere.  
 Senator Clements testified before the Senate labor subcommittee of Chairman Neely (D. W. Va.)  
 Representatives Siler, Williamsburg Republican, and Perkins, Hindman Democrat, testified before the House Banking and Currency Committee headed by Representative Spence, Fort Thomas, Ky., Democrat.

Clements, cited the 11 Kentucky areas classified as "substantial labor surplus areas."

Corbin, Frankfort, Hazard, Henderson, Lexington, Madisonville, Middlesboro - Harlan, Morehead, Grayson, Owensboro, Paintsville, Prestonsburg, and Pikeville have more than 6 per cent of their labor force unemployed, he said.

The situation is so critical that a federal-aid program is essential immediately, he declared.

He said there are many legislative proposals now before Congress, such as the highway and school-construction bills, that would help the areas, but that more specific steps are needed.

What is needed, he said, is an immediate public-works construction program in the affected areas.

Siler urged the creation of a federal corporation in the Labor Department, patterned after the Tennessee Valley Authority, which he

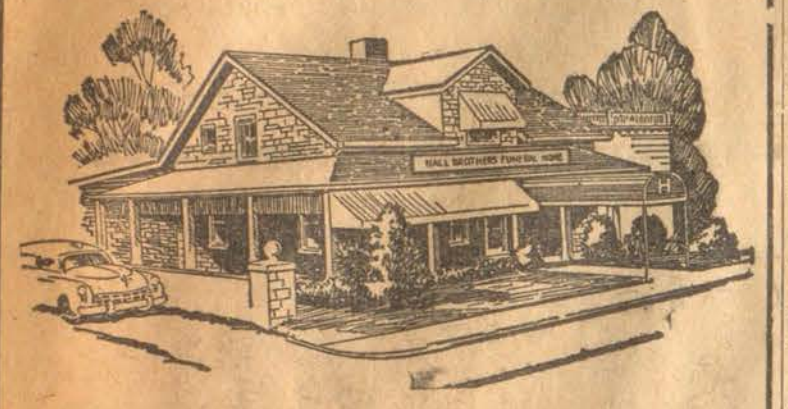

## SITES YET TO BE PICKED FOR HUGE POWER PLANT

Two 450,000-kilowatt coal-burning steam-electric generating units—the largest ever undertaken in the history of the electric power industry—will be built on the American Gas and Electric System, it was announced this week by Philip Sporn, AG&E president.

Locations for the two units on the seven-state AGE system have not been selected. The units will be installed on the power systems of two of the three largest companies in the AGE system—Appalachian Electric Power, Ohio Power Company and Indiana & Michigan Electric Company. Studies of site and fuel considerations, however, will not be completed for several months, at which time the exact locations will be announced.

Each will cost an estimated \$55,000,000.

Mr. Sporn said that the units will attain a higher level of efficiency in the production of electric power than has ever been achieved before. They will combine a great many outstanding features, including a large number of record-breaking specifications or performances, and are the result of several years work in research and development carried out by the three organizations involved.

The turbine-generators will be built by the General Electric Company and the boilers by Babcock & Wilcox Company.

"The urge—indeed, the compulsion—to proceed along these lines," Mr. Sporn explained, "stems from the rapid growth of the AGE system's load and from its determination to do everything possible to keep its efficiency in the use of capital and in operation as high and the cost

of power to our customers as low as modern technology will allow. Although the cost of materials and equipment and the price of labor have been rising, we are aiming at keeping the cost of a kilowatt of capacity—with its improved efficiency, made possible by projects like this—at its present low level.

"The size chosen, 450 kilowatts, was made possible by the growing size of our system and by the ability of the AGE system's 330,000-volt transmission network to supply the necessary back-up power from other major generating sources whenever one of these large units must be shut down for periodic maintenance," Mr. Sporn said.

Each of the 450,000-KW units—equivalent of more than 600,000 horsepower—will be 73 per cent larger than any single power unit operating today anywhere in the world; be capable of supplying all the residential electric requirements of a city with a population of 4,000,000, and consume 1,300,000 tons of coal a year.

Each unit will consume over 150 tons of coal per hour for every one of the 8,000 hours a year it is expected to operate. The fuel will be either pulverized or finely crushed.

### 47-Year School Director Resigns; Lexington Man To Succeed, Announced

Miss Elizabeth Watts, with the Hindman Settlement School 47 years and its director since 1909, is resigning effective in October.

Henry J. Stites, Louisville attorney and president of the school's board, said Raymond Kane McLain, formerly of Lexington, will be the new executive director.

Miss Watts went to Hindman from Bristol, R. I., in 1909, and started teaching in the elementary school. In 1920 she became principal of the grade school.

The school has about 60 boarding pupils who attend public schools supported by settlement funds and public-education money. The settlement provides recreational facilities and a small hospital for the boarding pupils of the area.

After four years as school principal Miss Watts joined the administrative staff as assistant to the director, later became a member of the executive committee. In 1946 she became executive director.

Miss Watts' successor has been a member of the Hindman staff the past two years. He received his bachelor-of-arts degree from Denison University, Granville, Ohio, and has done graduate work at Harvard and the University of North Carolina.

McLain is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Raymond P. McLain, Dr. McLain, a former president of Transylvania College, Lexington, now is president of the American University at Cairo, Egypt.

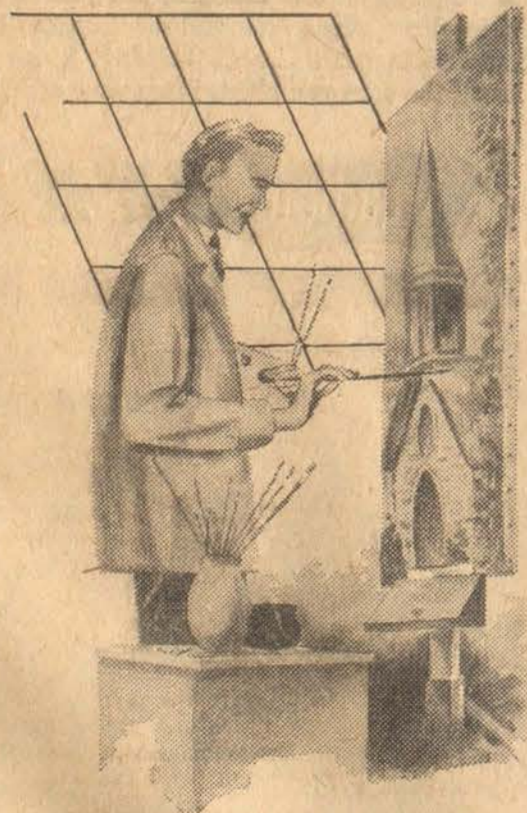

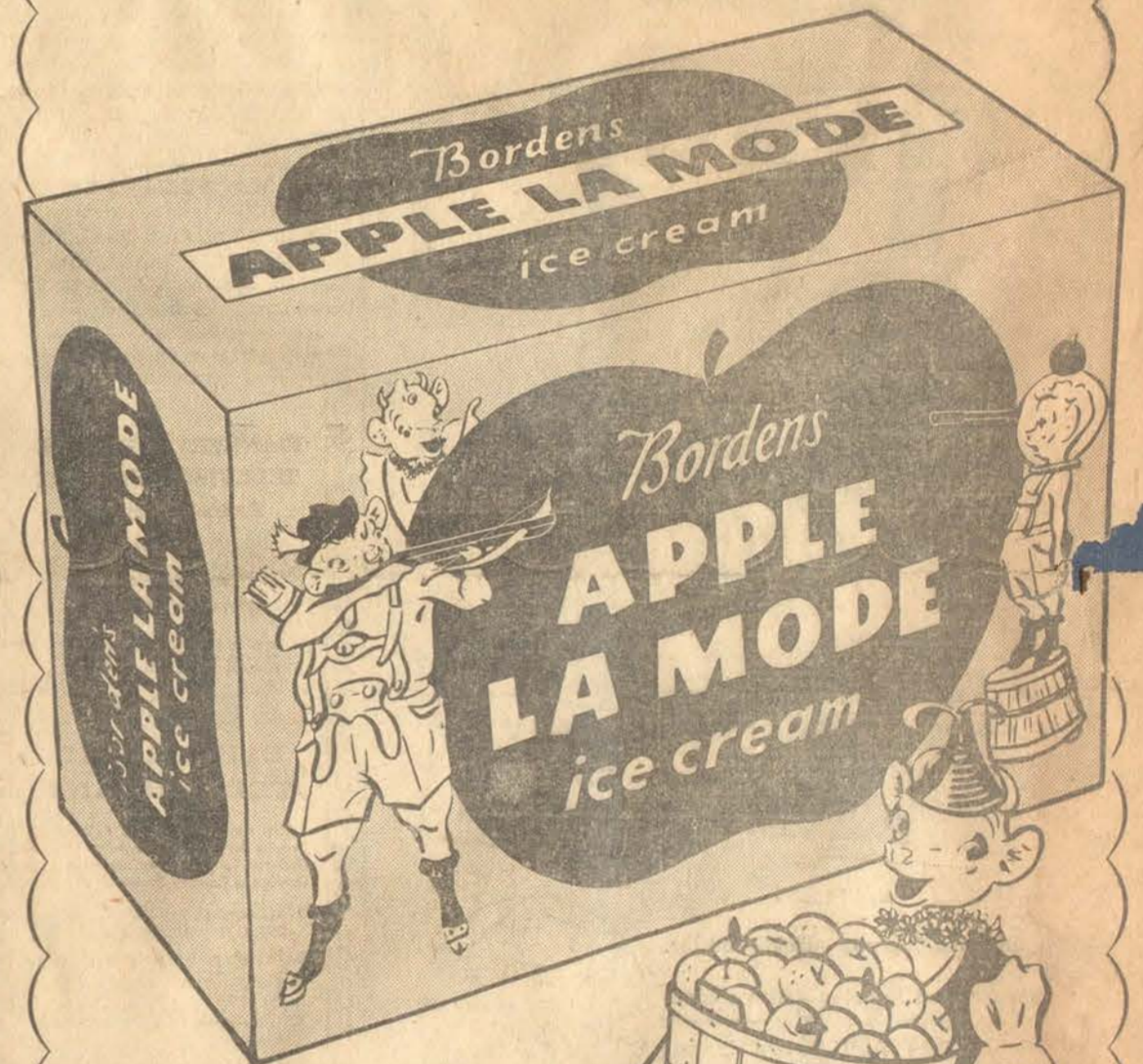

FARMER IS SOIL'S STEWARD  
AND RESPONSIBILITY GROWS

Something more than material is impelling American landowners and operators to become conservation farmers or ranchers. Something more than the established fact that soil and water conservation increases farm buying power is motivating businessmen and countless others to support conservation work.

A farmer or rancher finds pleasure in the beauty of his conservation-treated fields, pastures, woodlands, and wildlife areas. And I feel that all the rest of us share his pleasure as we drive by or fly over his acres; or, when we're extra fortunate, have a chance to feel healthy soil or vigorous sod beneath our feet, or join the owner in harvesting a wildlife crop more abundant now than a few years ago.

But there is another important motivating force for conservation. I believe it is the fast-growing realization in every community I know about that wise use and treatment of soil is a moral responsibility—that soil is a gift of the Creator, and that we, all of us, have a steward's responsibility for it.

Unless we pause to consider the spiritual man, we may be amazed by this spread of the soil stewardship concept in a time when we are troubled by temporary crop surpluses and when only one person in 25 actually tills the soil for a living.

Unless we accept as a fact that men do recognize the spiritual values of soil and water conservation, we are unable to explain fully the personal sacrifices thousands of them make to serve as members of the governing boards of nearly 2,700 locally-organized and managed Soil Conservation Districts. These men—and there are some women in these governing boards—already are conservation farmers or ranchers. They already are, personally, reaping the material benefits of greater net income, lower production costs, and greater efficiency in the use of labor and machinery that comes with conservation.

But these local leaders cannot, and do not, expect material gain from their services as District Supervisors, commissioners, or directors. They receive no salaries. In some states, they are not even reimbursed in part for their expenses.

They surely must be motivated by the truth of the Psalmist's words: "The earth is the Lord's and the fulness thereof. . . . They are heeding the Creator's command, when He placed man in the Garden of Eden, "to dress it and keep it."
