Ky. Motorists Reminded **Gasoline Prices Will** Climb One Cent Sunday

Motorists of Kentucky were reminded this week that on Sunday the federal tax on gaseline will go up one cent a gallon, as part of the \$13 billion increase in federal automotive taxes enacted by Congress this year for financing the 13-year federal highway program.

Herbert L. Clay, executive secretary of the Kentucky Petroleum Industries Committee, noted that this increase, added to the present 2cent federal tax and the 7-cent state tax, will bring total state and federal taxes on gasoline in Kentucky to 10-cents a gallon. This, he said, is equivalent to about a 50 percent sales tax on gasoline.

Commenting on the "amazing growth" in motor fuel taxation in this state through the years, Clay pointed out that the Kentucky gas tax, first imposed at a one-cent rate in 1920, brought in only \$441,000 the first full year it was in effect


Civil Service Examiners Will Hold Interviews On Monday, July 2



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

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
