

It was the second auto dynamiting at Martin this year. The auto of Deputy Sheriff Hershell Lester, former Martin policeman, was ruined by a blast, a few months ago. That blast was investigated but nobody has ever been arrested.

Mr. Goff, who is C. & O. yardmaster at Martin, was working at the time of last Thursday's dynamiting. His brother, Anthony Goff, who was at the home at the time, said he and others were awakened sometime between 3:15 and 3:30 a.m. by the blast. He said that he went to the car, found links of standard dynamite fuses and detected the odor of exploded dynamite. A tire was destroyed, the right headlight and chrome work of the car were damaged.

State Detective Chester D. Potter is leading the investigation in the case.

## Chandler Orders 203 More Soldiers To Harlan Coal Fields



### 740 Troops Guard Mines

**Persons Who Would Work May Do So**

Announcement that 203 additional soldiers and men had been ordered to supplement the 537 Kentucky National Guardsmen on duty in Harlan county coal fields was made late yesterday by Adjutant General Lee McClain.

The necessity of having more men there to enable a larger number of mines to resume work and not on account of any trouble, caused the order to be given, McClain explained.

He added the guardsmen were instructed to report last night to Brig. Gen. Elbert W. Carter, who had requested them. The units ordered out were:

Company K, 18th Infantry, of Olive Hill, two officers and 10 men, Capt. William D. Foster.

The 10th Cavalry, 113th Infantry of Carlisle, Capt. George G. Woodward and 40 men.

Headquarters company, 14th Infantry of St. Matthews, Lieut. James C. Tomlinson and 40 men.

The 88th special tank company of Harrodsburg, two officers and 40 men, Capt. Bacon R. Meany.

Headquarters company, 113th Quartermasters' regiment of Frankfort, two officers and 45 men, Capt. Walter H. Hays.

**BREAK IN PHALANX OF KENTUCKY OPERATORS**

Above are two pictures which show that Happy Chandler sent troops into Harlan county, Kentucky, in May, 1939, when organized labor was striking to organize the mines of Eastern Kentucky.

Miners were shot trying to protect their rights and organize for better conditions. They were met by troops sent at the direction of Happy Chandler, who was then Governor of Kentucky.

Only a year earlier, in May, 1938, in Harlan county, Kentucky, Happy Chandler pledged labor the right to organize, but when labor had to strike to organize they were met with troops and machine guns sent by Happy Chandler who was then Governor. But today Happy Chandler is in a political race again pledging his support to labor in order to get votes.

However, the record shows that during labor's most trying hour Happy Chandler

was against them. Labor will not be deceived by the promises of a man who has shown such a bad attitude toward them in the past.

Happy Chandler's loyalty to labor is the same loyalty he has given the Democratic party. When he needed the party's help, he was loyal, or pretended to be; when he didn't, he was Dixiecrat — and made few pretenses about it. That is another record Mr. Chandler would like for the voters to forget.

Chandler declared he was a "friend of union labor and of all labor." Then he added, "No one and that includes John L. Lewis can compel a Kentucky worker to join his union and pay dues to it in order to work."

Union, by Resolution adopted in Louisville on June 25, 1955, in giving Bert Combs their endorsement, said this about Happy Chandler.

"By his efforts through the use of troops while Governor in 1939 to break the miners' strike, by his very reactionary and viciously anti-union voting while U. S. Senator, and by his repeated placing of selfish personal ambition and advancement above service and loyalty to his constituents and his party, Chandler has demonstrated a conspicuous lack of those basic qualities needed for public office."

Do not be deceived. Vote for Bert Combs, who was born and raised in our coal region. Bert Combs knows the problems of the coal miners and will work hard to increase employment and improve the economy of our coal mining section.

### State Federation Condemns Troop Use

Alexander Jeffrey, President of the State Federation of Labor, Tuesday night said his organization "condemns in no uncertain terms the action of our Governor in resorting to the use of troops in the coal fields of our state, as it will the action of any Governor in such instances.

The statement added: "It is not in the interest of the working class of people of our state and it is not in the blood of true Kentuckians to allow troops to drive our workers either to work or from work. It is to be regretted that the Governor saw fit to do this thing that he has, violating the confidence that the members of organized labor placed in him.

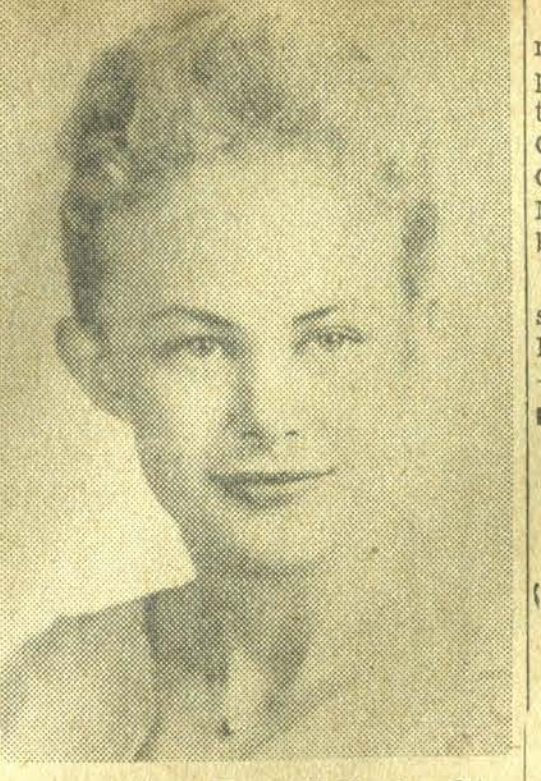

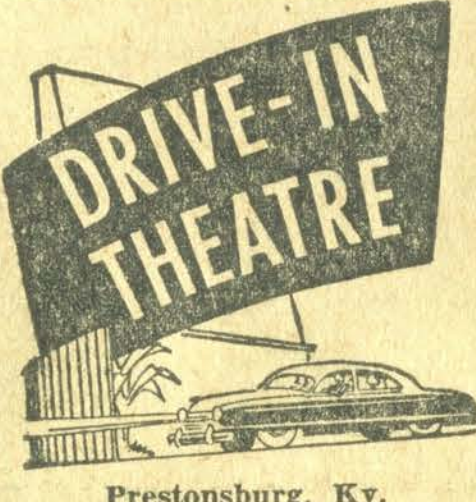

On August 8, 1924 the Navy landed an airship on one of its ships for the first time, when the dirigible USS Shenandoah tied up to a mooring mast mounted on the USS Patoka.
