The delegation also gave support to a proposed "new start" in Virginia, asking the Bureau to approve \$2,500,000 to complete engineering and begin construction of a flood-control reservoir on the Pound River which flows into the Big Sandy in Kentucky. The project is in Dickenson county, Virginia. Perkins, whose district is just across the line from the Pound undertaking, asked that the sum to begin construction be raised to tional million for Greenup, Dam 41, Warsaw-Markland, and New Rich.

The Kentuckians asked \$300,000 to draw plans for the Fishtrap floodcontrol reservoir on the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy near Pikeville. Perkins termed that estimate by the Engineers "entirely inadequate" and called on the Bureau to request driving in the direction of Lackey, 'at least \$1,000,000.'

Another Pittance for East Kentucky?

Congressman Carl D. Perkins and U. S. Senator John Sherman Cooper are certainly not unreasonable n their claims that the Kentucky Congressional deleration did not ask of the Budget Bureau sufficient funds for Eastern Kentucky flood control and river improvement work.

When the needs of this flood-tortured, depressionridden area are considered alongside those of other parts of Kentucky, and when those comparative needs are tossed alongside the huge amounts asked for those other parts of the state, even the blindest can see that \$6,327,000 for the needs of the Big Sandy and Kentucky rivers is a ridiculously small portion of the total of \$57,000,000 sought for all Kentucky proj-

For Barkley Dam alone the delegation asked an appropriation of \$22,000,000. And less than one-third that amount for Pound, Fishtrap, Haysi and Buckhorn reservoirs, plus the Big Sandy river itself!

Barkley Dam is an important project, or should be, o deserve so much money. But the lives and property of many thousands of Eastern Kentuckians are more important.

The Times recalls the address made before the League of Kentucky Sportsmen, a few months ago, in which an official of the U.S. Wildlife Service, Washington, D. C., tossed the proverbial red flag in the bull's face by telling League representatives from all parts of Kentucky that impoundments should be created in Kentucky but that they should be where they are reeded—in Eastern Kentucky, and not in those other sections which already have their great reservoirs and where the danger of flood is not a day-to-day night-after-night threat.

The Budget Bureau and all members of the Kentucky Congressional delegation are respectfully referred to this gentleman who has no political fences to build and no demanding constituents to satisfy.

Disabled workers whose social security disability benefits were reduced or were not payable because they received workmen's compensation or other Federal disability payments will begin to receive the full amount of their social security disability pay-

Under the amendments it is easier for certain employees of non-profit organizations and State and local governments to be brought under the law.

There is a slight change in the rules on how much a social security beneficiary may earn and still get social security benefit payments. Under a new provision a person's social security benefit will not be withheld for any month in which he neither work-Electrical Repair Shop ed in his own business nor earned over \$100 in wages.

Beginning, January 1, the social security tax rate for employees and employers will be 21/2 per cent each. The rate for selfemployed people will be 3% per cent. These rates are scheduled to increase every 3 years until reach 41/2 per cent for employees and employers and 6% for self-employed people in 1969. Starting with 1959 the first \$4,-

800 of earnings in a year will be taxed for social security and will count toward social security bene-

Thompson emphasized that it is not necessary for people already receiving monthly payments to apply for the automatic increase. It will be added to the January checks, which will be delivered early in February.

"Inquiries about the automatic increase will slow down our effort to start payments promptly to the people who can now get payments for the first time," he



The Eastern Kentucky Regionhave its 13th monthly meeting at Morehead State College, Oct. 6. The meeting is scheduled for The 12-week course convened 9 a. m. C. S. T. and will last through most of the day.

The Commission observed its first anniversary at its meeting in Hazard last month, and will begin its second year of discussion and preparation of a comprehensive planning and development program, aimed at relieving the chronic economic and oth-

He was a son of John W. and Mary E. Moore of the Burning Fork section of Magoffin county. He was a brother to Albert Moore, editor and publisher of the Salyersville Independent.

The funeral rites were held at the Baptist Temple, the Revs. Oscar Myerscough and Kyle Maseldon officiating. Members of the Kanawha County Bar Association acted as pallbearers. Burial was in a Charleston cemetery.


