## JAP BEETLES INVADE PIKE

#### Intestation by Insects Causing Deep Concern; Insecticides Being Used

Japanese fliers in December, 1941, made their presence felt at Pearl Harbor - but another Japanese flier, in existence a lot longer than the Nipponese air fleet, still is doing more damage every day to U. S. possessions.

This "flier" is the dreaded Japanese beetle, an insect pest first dentified in this country about World War I. It is a voracious feeder on about 280 species of plants, and a pest extremely hard to wipe out.

It first was noticed in Louisville in 1937 in one Jefferson county area. Prompt control work reduced the danger, though a constant check is kept for the insect. Several other counties have reported it since but the beetle has been kept under tight control.

In Pike county, the control job, says Howard Tilson, deputy state entomologist, is not a "one-shot" job. The current campaign is on a large scale—but after the beetle is brought under control, a constant check must be made to see that it will not recur.

The Pike method involves use of Dieldrin, a powerful phosphatic insecticide applied in granular form. The granules are like unto sand in consistency; in hilly Pike county, it was applied from airplanes since ground application was difficult. The granules are dropped in Jap beetle areas. The "sand" sifts down through the grass to which it is applied and stays there until it

The granules dissolve in rainbut the Dieldrin, not being soluable in water-penetrates a few inches into the subsurface and stays there. Jap beetle grubs, which live in this area, come in contact with the poison and die.



The traps are set out generally in a straight line for as much as a mile or two and a few yards apart. Accurate counts are kept of the number of Jap beetles found in each trap. When this is finished, the traps are then set in a similar line at right angles to the first line, and a new count made. By plotting the trap counts from this gian "X" the entomologists can find the center of the population.



#### Historical Unit Probably Has The "TickLicker"

Historians are reasonably sure that the famed "Ticklicker" is located in the Kentucky Historical Society Museum in Frankfort. "Ticklicker" was Daniel Boone's favorite

onel Gilbert Walden, a self-styled "Southern Elocutionist, Rough Rider, and Cow-boy Orator." According to Walden it was made for Daniel Boone by a North Carolinian gunsmith by the name of Graham, whose muzzle mark consisting of eight stars indicates that it was made sometime in the latter part of the 18th century.

"Ticklicker" was featured in the February 25, 1925, issue of THE AMERICAN RIFLEMAN. According to the article, there is no contradiction between the period ascribed to the historical-societyowned rifle and the characteristics of the first of the Kentucky rifles. It lacks the pronounced crescentshaped butt plate common among flintlocks of the following century. Furthermore, the absence of a patchbox in the stock marks it as a Southern rifle, perhaps, one made in North Carolina.

The Boone rifle was passed on to Gilbert Walden with the information that Graham made the rifle for Boone around 1760. This, then, was the rifle in al lprobability which Daniel Boone had with him when he first entered Kentucky in the Prestonsburg area in 1767 and which he continued to use until the year 1784 when he gave it to a mountain trapper by the name of Dedman.

It remained in the Dedman family for years, hidden away, almost forgotten in a closet, until it was discovered and publicized in a newspaper. Colonel Ellis of Louisville read the news articles, looked up the family, purchased the rifle. Dr. Percy W. deBarnay of Tallulah Falls, Georgia, was the next owner, and it was from this last named gentleman, a gun collector, that it was purchased by Gilbert Walden. What proof can be found in the Draper or other original manuscripts that this is indeed Boone's famed "Ticklicker"? Several references mention this rifle by name, but a complete description of it in manuscript awaits the diligent re-

"I regret very much that I do not know where Isaac lived in Kentucky My father and aunt both thought that he at one time lived and owned property at Crab Orchard Springs, that perhaps he even died there, but they were not sure that they remembered the name of the place correctly. I am of the opinion that he moved, or perhaps traveled would be a better word, about considerably. The family tradition is that he made two or three trips to Kentucky before moving his family there. It is thought that he went with Daniel Boone before the Revolution. I think that it is possible that he was a young relative of John Williams of N. C. who was a member of the law firm of Henderson and Williams. They were cousins and formed the Louisa Company that sent Daniel Boone to Kentucky to locate land. I think it quite possible that young Isaac went along, thrilled at the prospect of such a trip and proud to represent the family. The first explorations were made in 1764-65 by Henry Scraggs, Richard Calloway, and Daniel Boone who were to study the land along the main rivers. On this trip it was the Cumberland and Tennessee. The Louisa Company was organized in 1774. The purpose was "to rent or purchase a certain territory lying on the west side of the mountains on the waters of the Mississippi from Indian tribes now in possession thereof," On Jan. 6, 1775, the company was reorganized as the Transylvania Company. Henderson's company bought the title to the lands which were to be sold to individuals. The idea was to form "fourteenth colony." A report of these land companies can be found in "North Carolina, the Old North

State," by Archibald Henderson. "Isaac Williams moved his family to Kentucky about 1795. His wife, who before her marriage was Mary Anderson, died on the trip. Sarah (Sally) Williams their elder daughter did not move with them, but remained in North Carolina near Charlotte. In 1800 my great-grandmother Charity Williams was married to James Power in South Carolina. So apparently the family had either moved back to Carolina or they had gone back for her wedding. James Powers' family had lived at Laurens, South Carolina; a younger brother Lewis was born in Laurens, January 1, 1786.

"However, James Power's eldest son was born in Floyd county, Kentucky, April 14, 1802. They named him Holloway Lee Power. When





OUTSTANDING COUNCIL

Each year the Floyd county 4-H Council selects one of their members to receive the outstanding council member award. The selection is based on the work of the council member in promoting the 4-H program during the previous year.
