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#### Thoughts On "Operations"

Will "Operation Moonshot" succeed? Or will "Operation Bootstrap" be effective in Eastern Kentucky? We give the first the better chance of success.

Operation Bootstrap, as most of us know, is that economic pipedream entertained for us by some who know only that the economy of this area needs an emergency operation. It is that fine theory which holds that Eastern Kentucky must rise from the depths by "its own bootstraps." It doesn't say where we are to get the boots.

All are agreed that Eastern Kentucky has many of the natural resources needed to become a producer and shipper and seller rather than a consumer and buyer. It has, also, a wealth of manpower that for years has either been going to waste or going elsewhere to expend its energies and talents. The basic ingredients are here.

Except one. That is capital. If that is made available, then we will be on our way. But that is the big "if," the great imponderable which neither economist nor practical business man can escape. Where can investors be found who will risk their money on Eastern Kentucky without demanding gold bullion for security?

Eastern Kentucky capital, outside those agencies in the lending business, is either committed to businesses that are struggling for existence in this stricken area or is being held in reserve against the day when it will be needed. There are few, if any, with that quixotic spirit that would induce them to risk their savings on a long-range financing program for rehabilitation of the area.

Yet the Eastern Kentucky picture is not all black. There is hope, and yet that hope rests not very heavily on our own bootstraps.

The area, it is agreed, needs more and better roads, improvements which, if made, will be with state and federal funds, not ours. Then, after those highways are realized, the section may realize its potential as a mecca for tourists—a business which, if added to what we already have, could mean the difference between mere existence and prosperity.

And that is where all may figure in the job of lifting our section out of its depressed state. If tourists are to be attracted to Eastern Kentucky, a lot of work must be done-roadsides cleaned up, the garbage dumps eliminated, nature's beauty given a chance, and squalor replaced by orderliness. But, after all, state funds must be expended to make centers of attraction such as Jenny Wiley State Park at Dewey Lake more than a never-never land. That means buildings erected, planks nailed for housing rather than planks laid for political platforms.

Highways, tourist attractions—these are two of the needs recognized by planners. Then there is the third —leadership. Eastern Kentucky has exported a great part of its talent but there yet remain many men of vision and initiative. The services of such men are perhaps more sorely needed at this time than at any other. But for such men to work effectively Eastern Kentucky must quit its feuding. Politics, personal ambition, the clash of personalities, cheap suspicion -all these have worked to cancel out the influence and leadership many of the area's most talented individuals would and could give. There is among our people a wild, unreasoning urge at times to scuttle the whole ship if even one member of the crew does not perform to the satisfaction of all.

Then, too, there is that vitiating habit many have of refusing to support the business the area already has. We talk of keeping Eastern Kentucky green. Spend the "long green" you have at home and you will be doing your part toward keeping it alive and growing.

As we see the area picture—if, indeed, we are not too near it to see it all clearly—the rehabilitation of Eastrn Kentucky is not to be any Operation Bootstrap nonsense. It is, if it is to be done, a task for the people of the section, naturally, but one that can be done only with the interest and help of state and federal agencies which have too long neglected us. And that is not asking for any WPA-it is not asking for more than already has been given more fortunate sections of Kentucky.





#### SCHOLARSHIPS ARE OFFERED

National Foundation Plan Allots 15 Grants for Ky. For Medical Field Training

Outstanding Floyd county high school and college students will have an epportunity to compete for 15 \$2,000 four-year scholarships to be offered soon in Kentucky as part of The National Foundation's new multi-million-dollar program train urgently needed personnel for the health professions.

The scholarships program, supported by the March of Dimes, is a part of The National Foundation's expanded attack on disease, which has arthritis and birth defects as

new targets in addition to polio. The program will provide scholarship winners with \$500 a year toward four years of college or university training in medicine, medical social work, nursing, physical therapy and occupational therapy, Ray Howard, chairman of the Floyd Chapter of The National Foundation, said. The first National Foundation health scholarships will be offered before the end of the 1959-60 school year, the chairman said. Mr. Howard said the objective of

the new program, expected to cost \$12,000,000 over the next 10 years, is "to relieve acute shortages of trained health personnel in the SATURDAYhealth field - shortages that are becoming more serious every day. Through the support of the March of Dimes we hope to help ease this situation considerably by stimulating interest in the health professions and making it possible for young Americans to choose careers that count in the nation's welfare." Howard said that details on how to apply for a scholarship will be

announced at a later date. High school graduates who have been accepted by accredited institutions in nursing, physical therapy and occupational therapy are eligible for scholarships. The chairman said that a total of 505 Health Scholarships costing \$1,000,000 will be offered in 1959, and a new series will commence each year thereafter. Each scholarship will pay \$500 a year for four years, or a total of \$2,000—providing that scholastic standards are main-

The scholarships will be distributed to American citizens on a geographical basis, with heavily populated states receiving as many as 25 scholarships—or five from each of the five professions involvedand with no state or territory receiving less than five.
