Big Sandy Gets a Break

Wednesday's announcement of the major electric power generating plant to be located on the Big Sandy by the American Electric Power Company, parent firm of Kentucky Power Company, is quite naturally hailed as great news to this region.

Three-quarters of a million tons of coal will be needed in addition to the present output from this field. The plant will provide a nearby market for low-grade coal —something the area has never before had—and this new demand for the fuel will ease the market for the field. This will be cheap coal that the plant will consume, it is true, but its mining will provide jobs.

Better still, this new source of electric power and the still-cherished hope that the Big Sandy one day will have, with upstream dams built and canalization a reality, sufficient water supply and transportation facilities to make the area a great industrial center. This one plant will doubtless mean industrial development in the lower reaches of the river, even without river development. Major industry naturally follows major sources of electric power.

We salute all who had any part in bringing to this valley American Electric Power's plant-top officials of the company and its subsidiary, Kentucky Power Co., of course, and Governor Combs, industrial and civic leaders of the Big Sandy and all others. Yet, as we look more optimistically to the future, there remains one subduing thought:

Regardless of all the coal that is mined in the Big Sandy, the number of miners will not greatly increase while coal operations are for various reasons driven to mechanization. This area, as others, depends upon human beings, individual human beings, not upon corporations, for the dollars and cents that keep the economy in gear.

Unlike the Salk vaccine, which contains a killed polio virus, the new vaccine uses a live virus weakened below the danger point. Also, unlike the killed vaccine it is taken by mouth. Whereas three or four njections of killed vaccine are now recommended, the new live-virus may provide immunity for several years with its one dose

The new oral vaccine was developed under the leadership of Dr. Herald Cox of the Lederle Laboratories division of American Cyanamid Co., in Pearl River, N. Y. Dr. Cox aunched his research from this

base: that the best existing virus vaccines—namely those against smallpox and yellow fever-were made not from killed but from living, weakened midget microbes. In the early 1950's, he fortified this basic principle by perfecting practical live-virus vaccines against rabies, dog distemper and other

Attendance at Cumberland Gap National Historical Park last year ncreased by 87,240 over the previous

Officials said 165,424 visited the park in 1959. Located off U.S. 25-E, near Middlesboro, the park was officially dedicated last July 4, after a new Visitor Center, including a theater and museum, was built.

Besides the Gap itself, the park contains about two miles of the historical Wilderness Road, the Pinnacle, from which several states can be seen; the ruins of an early mill and iron foundry; Civil War fortifications; Tri-State peak where Kentucky, Virginia and Tennessee meet; caves and other interesting geological features.


