RIVER SLOWS **BODY SEARCH**

Two Pike-Co. Victims Of River, Unrecovered;

The swollen Big Sandy River the work gets under way. continued to defy efforts of search- The project would include reloito deep water and overburned.

Last Sunday, 107 organized rescue squadmen from three states joined independent searchers in the quest, and the river was probed from Payton's Creek to Millard, a NEEDS TALKED

The missing men are Wade Akers, 32 and Randall May, 33, both of the Grapevine section, near the tragedy scene. A thrid man, Billy Bevins, 22, swam to safety.

Mrs. Regina B. Mayo represented Kentucky in the category dealing with the Rural Child, His Physical and Social Needs. As Floyd county chairman for the White House Conference she was one of 7,000 delegates at last week's five-day gathering in the nation's capital.

The suggestions for this area vere arrived at after a series of local meetings. Needs pointed out

1. Education. Increased teachers alaries; adequate school buildings; ore supplies and materials for teachers, provision for the teaching of gifted and retarded children, more federal aid.

2. Health: A full-time health officer and added personnel; an intestinal parasite control program with environmental changes, additional federal and state aid to supplement local health tax fund.

3. Welfare: More social workers to guide negligent parents, that children may be reared in decent homes where they would receive ove and understanding adequate

food and clothing. 4. Moral Values: Knowledge and regard for the laws of God; added emphasis on family integrity; the stressing of the rewards of decency and of good reading; creative projects for children and adolescents; a countywide Youth Council composed of both youths and adults.

5. Recreation: Creative activities. as well as play, that require active Ferguson, gdn., etc. vs. Curtis Oney, participation, both physical and mental under year-around trained supervision and leadership.

Grand Jury Recesses Today: Indictments Are Made Against 31

Bootlegging, stealing and burgaries were listed by Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill Monday morning as the three crimes most seriously affecting Floyd county at this time, and he called on the grand jury to take special pains to do all that can be done toward curbing them.

Judge Hill, in his instructions to the grand jury of the new April court term, remarked that "talking about the same thing grows monotonous" but emphasized the duty of officials in relation to such of-

Admitting that bootlegging is an offense that is difficult to control, he discussed the part "private" clubs play in the handling of intoxicants. "Service clubs sell plenty of beer and whiskey. If they're strictly private, it's legal and you and I can't do much about it," Hill told the jurors. "But young veterans and young men with families go there and form destructive habits. I have the impression some keep intoxicating liquors for mempers and outsiders too. If you find evidence of that, something should

WRITING AUTOBIOGRAPHY Occasionally Dr. Gordon Wilson

head of English department, Western State College, Bowling Green, takes time out to write this column. He is the author of the column, Tid-Bits of Kentucky Folklore, that has been running in most Kentucky weekly newspapers for

Although retired, Dr. Wilson is still a very busy man. He writes:

"Since my retirement, last Auguest 9, I have written extensively on an autobiography, at the special request of my president, Mr. Thompson. In the last several months of my teaching I kept a diary just for him, to recount some things about our school that I felt should be preserved as a sort of local history and my own part in the half century of my life here. He liked it so much that he insisted that I keep on. As a result, I have typed 500 pages like this; doublespaced, and am far from being through. I hope to rearrange my material and get the whole copy ready for publication, maybe; at least, it will not hurt to have it in our archives at Western,

"In general, I cannot follow one course too long without getting tired and without using up whatever inspiration I may have. Hence, I have two other projects at which I work all the time: (1) I am adding to my studies of birds here and at Mammoth Cave National Park; (2) I am working on a very long and exhaustive study of the folk language of the Mammoth Cave region. I hope to have a monograph ready for publication within a year or less. In these winter days I have worked from 40 to 75 hours a week on the study and have had a great time. I have several well-trained helpers, who are conscious of the value of this philological study. The American Dialect Society, of which I have long been a member, publishes such studies and is piling them back for a real dialect dictionary."





OSBORN FAMILY

An interesting letter from Mrs. Ethel Tangye, of Wayland, notes that she is a missionary from Seattle. Wash., and wants to locate relatives through the Osborn and other families.

"My great-grandfather, Jeremiah Osborn, was born on Greenbrier River, Greenbrier county, Va., in 1757, came to Kentucky and married Lucy McDaniels. He joined the United States Army under General Jackson and participated in the Battle of New Orleans.

"After the war they moved to Clarke county, Ohio, lived there until 1834. His wife died there in 1818. In 1834 he moved with sons, Benjamin and Wallingford, to Coles county, Illinois, where he died three days later at the age of 76.

"He had ten children, to wit: McDaniel, Hulday (who married Charles Shaw), Martha (who married Thomas Segar), John, Joseph, Benjamin, Sarah (married John Cooper), Mar (who married William White), Winnie (who married Peter Olinger) and my grandfather, Wallingford Osborn, born May 20, 1816. Lucy McDaniels, the wife of Jeremiah Osborn, was born in Kentucky. Her father, Ben McDaniels, was born in Ireland.
