Mobile Clinic Unit Work To Begin in This District; TB Rate High in Kentucky

A shocking 25% positive reaction among Floyd county high school seniors to TB tests means that this will be one of the first counties in Kentucky to benefit from new and concentrated attack on the disease by the State Department of Health,

Announcement of the change in tactics in the war on TB was announced last week by Dr. Dorothy Magallon, director of the new pro-Kentucky ranks second in tuber-

culosis deaths and cases, and more effective control of the disease is in line with Gov. Ber! Sombs' pro-Strategy behind the new tactics according to Dr. Magallon, provides

that the department's TB fighters concentrate their main forces on the strongholds of the disease in Priorities have been established among the six tuberculosis hospital districts of the state, and the most

seriously affected are marked for attack first. Then, under the direction of a physician just assigned from the U.S. Public Health Service, Dr. Tuberculosis Control will send a mobile clinic unit to follow up the cases newly detected by the mobile

The best way, as a rule, is to cast the surface lure out and not reel in—that is, not until the ripples sent out by the dropping lure have completely disappeared; and some foxy anglers often wait several times this long before beginning to retrieve. Then, you can be scarcely said to retrieve, for all you do is twitch the lure very gently, with (a mechanical monotony should be strictly avoided here as in all other retrieves for bass). You're trying to make the lure resemble some half-drowned or injured creature that is putting up a rather feeble struggle, often having to rest. A bass, of course, will almost never bite any object unless he thinks it's alive-but, smart as he is in ways, he thinks that anything moving even a little, apparently of its own volition, must be alive.

Surface lures are likely to do best just after daylight in the morning and again close to dusk—when bass fishing is at its best anyhow in a great majority of places and times.



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
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
