We Cast an Envious Eye Toward Cumberland, Ky.

Even the most optimistic were surprised when it became known this week that already 325 young women and men have applied for enrollment in the University of Kentucky's new Southeast Center at Cumberland, Kentucky.

Buildings are barely being completed in time for the opening of classes on Sept. 6, and yet the response to the opportunity offered youth of the region through facilities of the new Center is outstanding. No thoughtful student of the situation there had predicted an enrollment this first year as high as 300.

Thus the urgent need of a University of Kentucky branch in that area is proved. The enrollment in that part of Eastern Kentucky points strongly toward the fact that the same sort of University of Kentucky facility is needed in the Big Sandy valley.

The Southeast Center at Cumberland is opening in a field already served by Union College at Barbourville and Cumberland College at Williamsburg. Sue Bennett College at London and Lincoln Memorial at Harrogate, Tenn., serve the area. The Big Sandy and neighboring valleys are in the educational area served by Pikeville College, Morehead State College and a University branch at Ashland. Pikeville College, 30 miles from Prestonsburg, is nearest Floyd county, and already it is bulging at the seams. Morehead State College is in much the same condition. Ashland is approximately 85 miles from this county and still farther from other counties which share Floyd county's need for higher education nearer home.

The parallel between the area to be served by the new educational center at Cumberland and the Big Sandy area, plus some counties in the nearby Licking river and Kentucky river watersheds, continues in their similarity of topography, industry (or lack thereof), roads and economic handicaps. The same needs young people feel so keenly in the Cumberland area torture youth of the Big Sandy and the Licking and the Kentucky.

The Jamboree officially opened on July 22, with a large celebration in the arena. That night the bands from most of the regions played on stage. Incidentally, our own Jesse Elliott was director of the Region 4 band. Then Jim Arness was introduced on stage. He then went to the control booth to narrate the rest of the celebration, They had speeches from some of the national leaders, and Governor McNichols, of Colorado made a speech. It was topped off by a huge fireworks display.

The next thing that occurred of that nature was the rodeo which they had at the back of the arena. They were presented by the directors of the Pike's Peak or Bust Rodeo. They had such things as calf roping, bareback riding, bronco busting, and bull riding. Then the night of July 28, the Jamboree officially closed with the appearence of Herb Shriner and the harmonica chorus.

On July 29, we toured Pike's Peak, which is 14,110 feet above sea level. We left Colorado Springs at 3:30 p.m., July 30, and during the hight we traveled through the states of Colorado and Kansas. Then, on July 31, we toured St. Louis, Mo., visiting the zoo. We saw nany kinds of animals including makes, monkeys, seals, lions and elephants. The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced Aug. 2, a change in regulations governing farm hous-

ing loans made under Title V of he Housing Act of 1949. Walter S. Atkinson, Jr., count upervisor of the Farmers Home dministration at Paintsville, said that effective immediately a farmer who owns a farm that will annually produce for sale or home use at least \$400 worth of commodities based on 1944 prices, if he meets other eligibility requirements, may be able to obtain a farm housing oan.

Previously to be eligible an applicant had to own a farm that would produce a substantial amount of the operator's income. Farm housing loans are made by

USDA's Farmers Home Adminisration and are used to construct and repair needed farm houses and farm service buildings. USDA said its experience demonstrates that there bond.




