

7-CENT RISE OFFER MADE By Gas Firm Spokesman At City Council Meet; Sewers Claim Attention

The Prestonsburg City Council vas told at its Monday evening neeting by a spokesman of the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company that the company will accept an increase of seven cents on the new gas contract pending between it and the city.

The offer is a reduction of three cents per 1,000 cubic feet from the rate originally asked.

The Council deferred until this evening (Thursday) any action toward acceptance or rejection of the proposal. Paintsville officials who ulso will be negotiating with the gas company on a new contract vill attend tonight's meting.

Prestonsburg's sewers again claim. ed the attention of the Council, but no definite action is expected before early in 1961 when engineering work will be completed. Financing methods were mainly discussed.

The Council set the tax rate for all real estate and personal property as of April 1, 1961-75c per \$100 valuation and \$1,50 poll tax for all males 21 years of age and above. The ordinance adopted provided for a 2% discount on all city taxes paid on or before Dec. 1, 1960 and an interest charge of 6% on all taxes unpaid on April 1, 1961.

Prestonsburg Must Make a Decision Brown, West Prestonsburg, and were forwarded Nov. 9 by Draft

The next election at which Prestonsburg voters may be asked to make a decision could be a vote on a bond issue to finance a sewerage system and sewage disposal plant for the community.

Direct action by the City Council or a decision to decide nothing and let the festering problem fester longer and multiply the community's troubles are the only alternatives to such a vote. Surely the people will not be content to let matters stand and do nothing until dire emergency in the form of pestilence or federal government action forces a decision.

It is a big task that Prestonsburg faces. The community itself will be required to pay around \$600,000 of the total cost of this project on which the health of its citizens and the progress of the town depend. New taxes, increased water bills or some similar revenueproducing plan will be necessary; and, whichever is adopted, none will be painless. The cure for a longstanding malady seldom is.

But, if Prestonsburg is to advance it must get out of the filth and slime that are more than figurative expressions in our case. Dr. Russell L. Hall, of the Floyd County Health Department, stated the situation in forceful language recently, but he did not exaggerate. The danger of disease in epidemic form is a dreadful reality. And the passing of time multiplies the perils.

The community and its elected officials must take action for yet another reason. If Prestonsburg is to compete with other towns for new business and new people, if it is even to hold its own in competition with other communities, it must clean up, starting with this basic matter of sewerage and sewage disposal.

And the longer we postpone the moment of decision, the farther behind we shall be and the greater the distance to be covered in drawing even with others.





The Big Sandy logging industry reached its height in the three decades of 1880-1910. By the latter date the great reserves, except for the Sandy Basin in Southwest Virginia, had been cut away. Left were only minor sections of timber on small tributary streams.

Logs were gathered into small rafts on streams like Johns Creek and Big Paint Creek and floated down to the river where three or four were joined together for the trip to Catlettsburg.

Shown here in this picture is a crew headed by Tom James (extreme left on raft) at the mouth of Sycamore Creek, Pike county, about 50 years ago. The teamsters on the bank hauled the logs to the stream and the rafting crew put them together with "tie poles."

battle of Camden and King's Mountain: then was two months in Capt. Lewis' company, Col. Cleveland's regiment. After this he served in Capt. Charles Gordion's company, Col. Joseph Lewis' regiment.

"In the fall of 1781 he served seven weeks in Capt. Benjamin Herndon's company against the Cherokee Indians.

"David Benge also served in the War of 1812 in Capt. (McMitton's) (McJillson's) or McMillion's Co. of Ky Mounted Volunteers in the company's command of Governor Isaac Shelby. Filed for pension claim, 1830.

"John Benge, son of David Benge, married Philadelphia Hart (nee) Harrison in Clay County, Ky., Jan. 9, 1817, Clay Co. marriage records.

"Elizabeth Ann Benge, born Clay County, Ky., daughter of John and Philadelphia Harrison Benge, married Henderson House, son of William House, Dec. 19, 1844; Marriage records of Clay County, Ky.

"Lucy House, daughter of Henderson House and Elizabeth Ann Benge House, married Benjamin Franklin Caudill, Dec. 26, 1883, Clay County, Ky. (My mother and father).

"Eld, Benjamin Franklin Caudill was the son of Col. Benjamin Everett Caudill and Martha L. Asbury, daughter of Wyatt Asbury. Born Tazwell Co., Virginia. Col. Benjamin Everett Caudill buried in Slate Hill Cemetery London, Ky.


