Identification was made through clothing and papers found on the body. Coroner James J. Carter said no inquest was held because members of the victim's family and state police at the scene agreed such action was unnecessary. The coroner and State Detective E. L. Cornett agreed that death resulted from exposure. Both said there was no evidence of foul play.
