Lexington, Ky.—Testing of standard lespedeza varieties for Kentucky used by the Experiment Station last year showed some experimental lines had a delayed susceptibility to certain blights.

Cottage cheese is a soft, uncurd cheese made from pasteurized skim milk or reconstituted skim milk. The milk is heated under controlled conditions while the curds and whey form. Then the whey is drained, leaving the white curds.

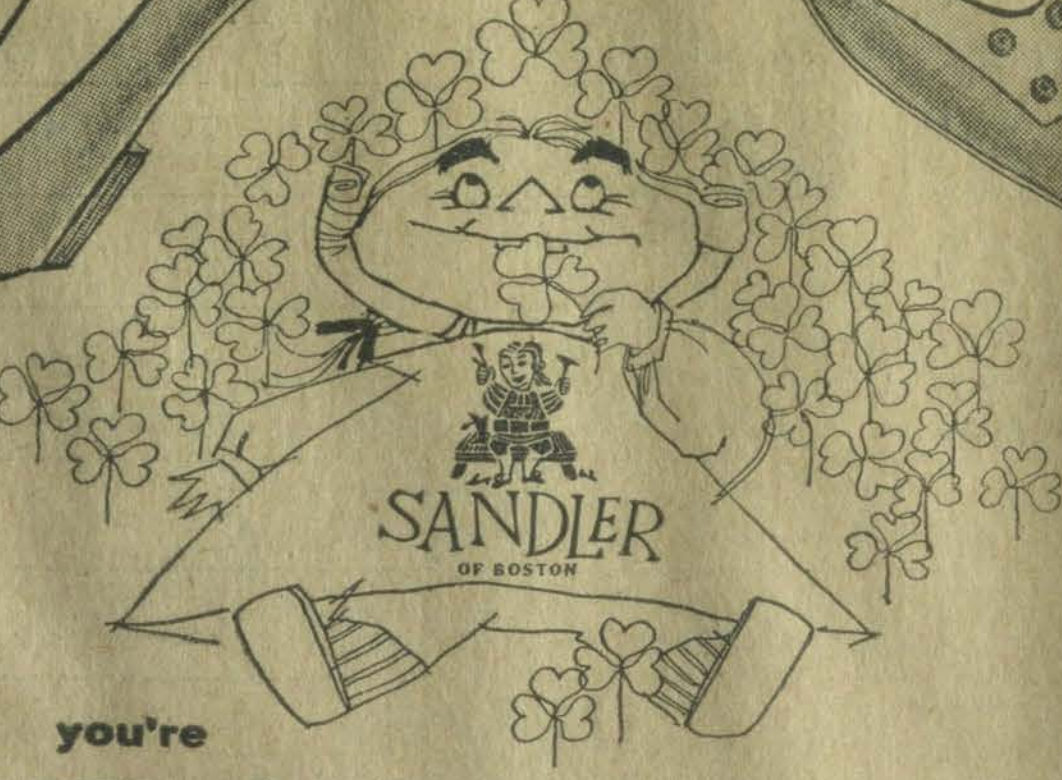

portal-to-portal pay benefits obtained by ex-union president John L. Lewis in his wartime struggles with the operators. The Southern producers say they must get a softer contract or they cannot stay union and compete.

The bulk of the country's soft-coal production, that of the big coal companies, and public utilities is in Northern states and the owners belong to the Bituminous Coal Operators Association, which bargains with the U.M.W.

The non-union movement in the South is a serious problem for the U.M.W., American Metal Market said, because it comes when technological advances and more severe competition of other fuels is greatly reducing the union's membership.

"I can think of no other way to meet this problem except to start immediately the building of community colleges, or so-called junior colleges," he asserted. Private colleges offer little hope in meeting this need, Stone said. He added that Kentucky is losing industrial opportunities because the state cannot provide prospective trained workers.

Rep. Stone told the House in his speech last Wednesday that the people in this area had in 21 days raised more than \$115,000 toward purchase of a site for such a school. "As hard as times are at home," he said, "the people out of desperate need for this college dug down and pledged this money. School children broke into their piggy banks, miners gave a day's pay, gas workers gave a day's pay, companies pledged, banks donated—people from all walks of life met this challenge. . . . Give this bill your support and earn the undying gratitude of countless thousands of boys and girls who desperately need and want a better education."

be added to the proposed budget, recommended that a city the size of Prestonsburg should get \$10,000 yearly from the Police Court and that enforcement of traffic violations should be pushed.

Board of Education which acquired an equity in the addition to the courthouse when it contributed to the construction, had turned its interest over to the Fiscal Court but reserved the right to reassume its equity if it is ever needed.

He envisioned an increase in efficiency at the new quarters due to centralization of activities. The office will be near the Floyd county regional library, and the textbooks and custodial supplies will be under the same roof.

"The move was prompted by the realization that the Board owned the old high school building and we felt, in the second place, that our administrative staff could do a better job for Floyd county school children," Clark added.

Part of the furniture for Clark's office was donated by the Harkins family from the former Harkins law offices here.

Clark's office is the only one that will be on the first floor. All others are on the second floor.

## KENTUCKY IS PIONEER IN A-ENERGY CONTROL

Frankfort, Feb. 10—Kentucky last week became the nation's pioneer state in control of atomic energy.

Gov. Bert Combs and Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg, chairman of the United States Atomic Energy Commission, formally executed the agreement last Thursday (February 8).

Seaborg, in a Friday address to a joint session of the Legislature, said Kentucky won qualification ahead of New York, California, Texas, Mississippi, Tennessee, Washington, Oregon, Florida, Indiana, Idaho, and Illinois.

Combs singled out Attorney General John B. Breckinridge and Kentucky Atomic Energy Coordinator James N. Neel, Jr., for their efforts in bringing the industrial uses of the atom to Kentucky.

In complimenting both Breckinridge and Neel, Combs said "Anytime you whip the federal bureaucratic machine, you've really done something."

The agreement transfers to Kentucky control over various nuclear materials widely used by industry, agriculture and medicine.

Kentucky unofficially became the first state to gain control of nuclear materials January 23 when Breckinridge achieved a compromise breakthrough with AEC mediators heavily in favor of Kentucky and all applying states.

The final negotiations in January marked the conclusion of more than 17 months of state-federal talks.

Breckinridge describes Kentucky's future in the field of atomic energy as fantastic and fabulous.

"The industrial potentialities now available to Kentucky for control of atomic energy are beyond speculation, imagination or projection, if not beyond conception at this time," Breckinridge has said.

He feels Kentuckians may see a revolution in their state within the next 10 years as a result of the agreement with the AEC.

"This revolution could be tantamount to the advent of the combustion engine. It could bring industry to Kentucky as important, if not more important, than the steel industry is to Pennsylvania or the Detroit automobile industry is to Michigan," Breckinridge said.

Kentucky started nuclear competition behind New York and California but rapidly gained ground once the concerted strength of the Combs-Wyatt administration focused upon atom qualification.

Kentucky achieved eventual qualification through hairbreadth passage of key legislation and pressure.

In both instances, Atty. Gen. Breckinridge proved to be a vital figure.

Kentucky's tradition of holding General Assembly sessions proved to be an advantage over states scheduling odd years' sessions of their legislative bodies.

Congressional legislation in December, 1959 amending the 1954 Atomic Energy Act permitted control of nuclear materials by qualifying states. The Kentucky General Assembly, meeting a scant month later, then had the opportunity to jump into atom competition.

A bill was drafted by Atty. Gen. Breckinridge's office and presented on the 32nd day of the 1960 legislature. Peculiar circumstances set in when the bill was "lost."

Fortunately enough for Kentucky, the bill was "found" and passed on the last day of the 1960 General Assembly. If the bill had not been retrieved, officials have said, the atomic energy program of Kentucky would have not only been set back three to five years but also virtually ruined.

On March 8, 1960, Kentucky received advice that the state which qualified first would get the most. Immediately, Kentucky leaders Atty. Gen. Breckinridge, Gov. Combs, Lieut. Gov. Wilson W. Wyatt, Commissioner of Economic Development E. B. Kennedy and Health Department Russell Teague expedited the drafting of Kentucky's atom program.

E. B. Kennedy's Department of Economic Development loaned Neel in early 1960 to draft a proposed program for eventual submission to AEC officials. Neel amazed former AEC bosses by creating a program within two months.

On September 20, Kentucky leaped ahead of New York and California by presenting the nation's first program for assuming control of various nuclear materials. Neel had ingeniously designed the Kentucky program to coincide as closely as possible to the AEC regulatory program. The program was accepted.

Neel's translation of the complex AEC code of regulations, according to Business Week magazine, will be a model by which other applying states will follow. Atty. Gen. Breckinridge has said that without Neel's knowledge and indefatigable drive, Kentucky could never have won the race for atoms.

Shortly thereafter, the AEC and Kentucky created task forces to fight the battle of appropriate clauses, commas and periods in Kentucky's draft. Breckinridge's and Neel's life then entered into almost daily Washington flights, midnight conferences and tense high level meetings with the tough, technical minds of the AEC staff.

Breckinridge, in the meanwhile, was appointed head of the Kentucky Task Force on Atomic Energy and, on the basis of his work as chairman, was appointed chairman of the Kentucky Advisory Committee on Nuclear Energy by Governor Combs.

In July of 1961, the AEC and Kentucky stopped wrangling. The Kentucky program for atoms was published in the Federal Register for public comment. Here, however, the AEC initiated a furor. At the same time the AEC published its Part 150 for public comment.

Part 150 would have prohibited applying states from licensing the marketing of atomic devices for distribution in the United States. It also would have barred the states from licensing the commercial disposal of atomic wastes.

Immediately, Breckinridge set in motion a campaign to awaken the states to the impact of the proposed regulation. Letters were sent to all governors, attorneys general, nuclear-energy coordinators, health department commissioners and commissioners of economic development departments by their Kentucky counterparts. They were asked to write letters opposing Part 150.

Governor Combs successfully introduced a resolution opposing Part 150 at the Southern Governors' Conference. Combs said the adoption of Part 150 would harm the nation's race with Russia to discover new and constructive uses of nuclear material.

"Understanding Youth" will be the topic for discussion at a county conference for Floyd county 4-H Club leaders and invited guests on Feb. 21, at the Betsy Layne luncheon, starting at 6:30 p.m.

"We need to understand more about our boys and girls in order to be able to give them the best possible help in their 4-H Club work," pointed out Mrs. Estill Meeks, president of the Floyd County 4-H Council, in announcing the meeting. Floyd county's 4-H leaders are men and women who are interested in young people and who help the 1,277 4-H'ers in this county by giving them guidance and advice on their 4-H projects and activities.

This will be the second in a series of conferences for 4-H leaders in this county. At the first session, held here last January, they learned about philosophy and objectives of 4-H Club work.

Mrs. Herschel Spradlin, chairman of the program committee, said that this is one of the most important training meetings ever planned for 4-H leaders.

Applying states climaxed a crescendo of protests, threatening to refuse to negotiate with the AEC for control under the conditions of Part 150. The states felt that until it was shown they did not possess the competence to regulate in these areas, they, rather than the AEC, should maintain control.

On January 23, Breckinridge and Neel once again flew to Washington. In this meeting, however, the AEC staff and Breckinridge effected a compromise which led to an agreement in principle.

Breckinridge's breakthrough to an agreement effected last week constitutes a historic reversal of authority from the central government to the states. Kentucky's program will also serve as a model of procedure which other states may follow in applying for atomic controls.

Since the pot at the end of the atom rainbow is filled with unimaginable riches, it is a sure thing other states will quickly follow in the footsteps of Kentucky.

An opening must be made big enough and deep enough for the roots of the tree seedlings, then the soil must be firmed or tightened around the little trees, and the tree planting bars are the best thing to do this with.

If you are interested in using the bars, stop at the Soil Conservation office.

Several farmers have signed up for conservation practices that require technical assistance, or engineering assistance; but there are others who have planned to do so, but have not signed up as yet. There is still time, but it is not wise to wait too long.

The work done for your neighbor was good, it did the job that was required, he is well satisfied. Visit his farm and talk with him about his conservation work, then see one of the supervisors of the Soil Conservation District or L. R. Johnson, soil conservationist.

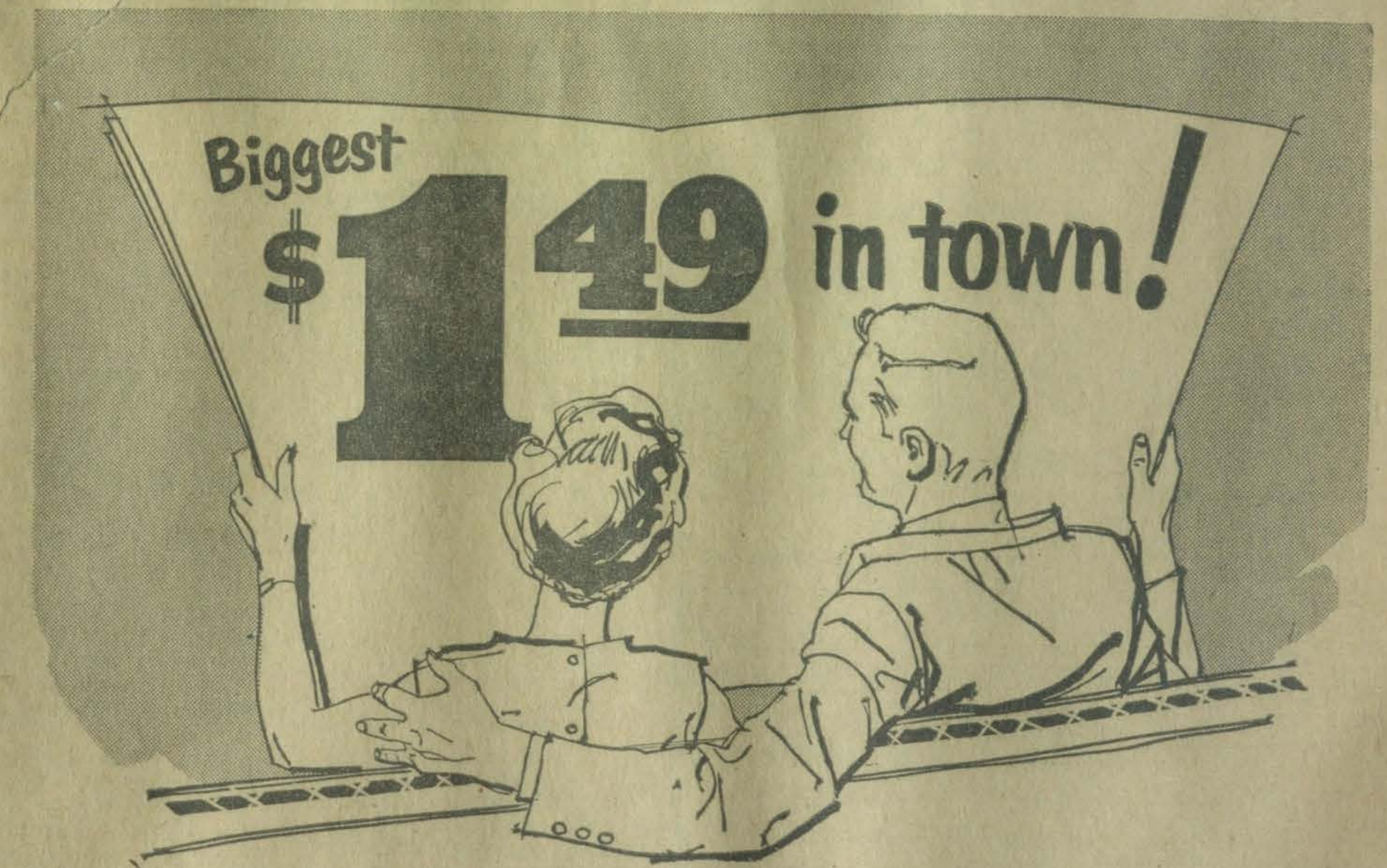
