## NEW HOUSING GROUP PLANS RENEWAL JOB

### LATTA NAMED AS SUCCESSOR TO DIRECTOR

Archer Extends Thanks  
To Old Commission; Bid  
Opening Not Affected

With the naming of a new Municipal Housing Commission last Thursday, urban renewal for Prestonsburg was resurrected, and that project stands exactly where it was two years ago.

All urban renewal ordinances in effect at that time and later voided were reinstated.

Appointment of a new Housing Commission followed expiration of the terms of the old. Three members of the four-man commission were named and took the oath of office. They are R. V. May, chairman, Ed Music and Frank Heinze. The fourth member will be named Friday of this week, Mayor George P. Archer said.

Clifford B. Latta, Prestonsburg attorney, was named by the new commission as its executive director. He succeeds Joe Hobson, who resigned last week.

The old Housing Commission, composed of Clabe Bingham, J. O. Webb, Otis Cooley and W. A. Spradlin, received Mayor Archer's thanks for the work it has done during the past two years and for the effort of each member as a good citizen of Prestonsburg. Commenting on the new commission, the Mayor said:

"These men are progressive citizens, sound business men and individuals who have at heart the progress of this community."

Mayor Archer said the change in Housing Commission personnel will not affect the schedule providing for the opening of bids April 17 on construction of the 40 low-rent public housing units here. ## WOMEN WIN DAMAGE SUIT

\$57,496.94 Judgment  
Awarded As Aftermath  
Of 1959 Auto Accident

Three women, all natives of Floyd county, recently were awarded a total of \$57,496.94 damages by a jury of the Rowan circuit court for the largest civil judgment ever granted in the history of Rowan county.

The award was made as an aftermath of an auto wreck which occurred in August, 1959, 12 miles from Morehead on Ky. 173. Involved in the wreck were the auto of M. J. Hall, husband of one of the plaintiffs and brother-in-law of the other two women, and a car operated by James Arthur Pernel and owned by Jack Winters, of Morehead.

Damages awarded by the jury were:

To Mrs. Nannie B. Hall, of Flemingsburg, \$19,197.15 for bodily injuries and \$3,313.03 medical expenses.

Mrs. Birdie Hall, of Flemingsburg, \$19,161.62 for injuries and \$3,323.25 medical expenses.

Mrs. Bertha Turner, of McDowell, \$10,000 for injuries, \$1,501.79 medical expense.

Mrs. Nannie Hall is the widow of E. V. Hall and is a sister-in-law of M. J. Hall. Mrs. Birdie Hall is the wife of M. J. Hall, and Mrs. Bertha Turner is her twin sister.

Mr. Hall's earlier suit against Pernel and Winters for \$20,000 damages was settled out of court.

## ASHLAND MAN QUITS RACE

Withdrawal Is Advised  
By Lowman Physician;  
Stumbo Is Wyatt Aide

Harry King Lowman withdrew Saturday from the race for the Democratic nomination for U. S. Senator, leaving his principal opponent, Lieut.-Gov. Wilson Wyatt, opposed only by Marion Vance, of Glasgow.

Lowman's state campaign manager announced that the candidate's withdrawal from the race was made upon advice of his physician after the Ashland man had undergone an operation for removal of a rectal polyp.

Ex-Governor A. B. Chandler and Former U. S. Senator Earle C. Clements had little comment to make on Lowman's decision. Clements told newsmen he would not make a statement till he had talked with Mr. Lowman.

The Ashland legislator, who announced his candidacy while serving as Speaker of the House during the recent General Assembly session, had organized about 100 counties for the campaign, it was said.

Although Wyatt's main primary opposition has been eliminated, he announced he would continue with his schedule of appearances over the state. He expressed concern about Lowman's condition and the hope that his erstwhile opponent would soon recover. (See Story No. 7, Page 3)

## INDICTMENTS NOT REPORTED

Grand Jury Recesses  
To April 17; Stratton  
Draws 3 Prison Terms

The grand jury of the Floyd circuit court recessed last Friday till April 17 without an indictment being officially reported to Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill and thereafter recorded in the office of the Circuit Clerk.

Indictments were voted, however, it was learned. The number is expected to be below normal for a Floyd grand jury. One day may complete the jury's work when it reconvenes, it was said.

One man, Darrell Stratton, who escaped jail this week, drew three three-year pen terms last Friday when he entered pleas of guilty to separate indictments accusing him of grand larceny in one bill and breaking and entering in the other two.

Corbet Chaney, who joined Stratton in flight from jail, was given a one-year term at the conclusion of his trial for grand larceny. The case against Curt Sizemore, his co-defendant, was dismissed.

Others convicted: Tommy Collins, accused of obtaining goods under false pretense, plea of guilty, two years; L. P. Montgomery, charged with grand larceny, convicted by the jury "on the lesser offense," which was described as petit larceny, 30 days in jail; Raymond Crider, plea of guilty to a charge of child desertion, two years; M. V. Clegg, third offense possession of alcoholic beverage, \$40 fine and 60 days in jail. The reporting and winding trial of Clabe Trambell was continuing. (See Story No. 8, Page 8)

## HALE EXTENDS TRUANT HELP

Attendance Officers  
Accompanied by Deputies  
On Visits To Parents

Deputy Sheriffs, under authorization of Sheriff Henry C. Hale, have been cooperating with the attendance officers of the school system to seek compliance with the compulsory attendance laws. This week with Richmond Stone, of the Department of Pupil Personnel.

County Superintendent Charles Clark notes that in communities where the deputies have accompanied the attendance officers that attendance, and in a few instances, enrollment, has increased.

Officers, on their rounds with Stone, have informed the parents of children out of school that warrants will be procured in the future if the law is not observed. ## FREAK MISHAP KILLS SLONE

Knott County Native  
Fatally Hurt in Ohio,  
Succumbs in Hospital

Seventeen-year-old Kanawha Slope, of Boleyn, Knott county, was fatally injured last Friday in a freak accident on an Ohio highway and died two hours later in a Dayton hospital.

Riding in the bed of a truck, young Slope sought to attract the attention of the driver, and finally leaned out to speak to the truck-owner. At that time the side mirror of a passing trailer-truck struck his head.

The victim was a son of Maryland and Emily Tuttle Slope, of Garrett. Surviving brothers and a sister are Albert Moore, Bradshaw, W. Va., Isom Moore, and Joe Moore, both of Garrett, Steve Moore, Willie Moore, Bobby Ray Slope and Anna Sue Slope, all of home.

Funeral rites were conducted Monday at 10 a.m. from the home of Bob Bolen, at Garrett, the Revs. Garland Stone, Lee Mosley and Charles Gibson officiating. Burial was made in the Bolen cemetery at Boleyn, under the direction of Hall Bros. Funeral Home.

## '62 DRILLING PROGRAM TOLD BY UNITED FUEL

United Fuel Gas Company's annual drilling program to develop natural gas reservoirs in the Appalachian area, an activity as old as the company itself, will cost \$6,161,000 this year.

James S. Phillips, president, said the companies plan to drill a total of 102 wells in areas of known gas production in West Virginia, Kentucky and Virginia. Up to the present time, United Fuel has already completed nine productive wells. The producers have a total open flow of over nine million cubic feet of natural gas a day.

The companies' drilling program is being done in the following counties: Kentucky—Pike and Martin; West Virginia—Boone, Raleigh, Kanawha, Mingo, Wyoming, McDowell, Logan, Wayne, Lincoln, Clay, Boone and Preston; Virginia—Buchanan. The exact locations of most of the wells have not yet been determined.

A major item included in the program will be the cost of laying approximately 75 miles of field lines to gather the gas produced by the wells. Cost of the lines, most of which will be either four or six inches in diameter, will be approximately \$1,319,000.

Although final plans have not been completed on this year's exploratory or test well program, a total of \$600,000 has been allocated. Last year United Fuel drilled seven test wells in a program which cost \$388,000.

One test well will be drilled on a tract of land the company has under lease in Buchanan county, Virginia.

All of the test wells will be drilled by rotary rigs, which are faster and generally more efficient than conventional cable tool rigs. The efficiency of cable tool rigs falls off rapidly at depths over 5,000 feet. In rotary drilling, a metal bit is attached to a special hollow drill pipe. The drill pipe rotates, causing the bit to cut the rock away. Cuttings are brought to the surface by continually circulating air or fluid down the drill pipe. One of the test wells will probe into rock formations 10,000 feet under the surface of the earth.

Phillips said exploratory wells differ from regular production wells in that they are drilled on unproven acreage in areas further removed from known production and generally to deeper horizons. He said United Fuel drills such wells in the hope of discovering new gas reserves in its own operating territory.

## FOUR ESCAPE FLOYD JAIL

Mid-Day Break Made  
By Prying Open Door;  
Castle Injures Back

Four prisoners, two of whom were under penitentiary sentence, escaped from the Floyd county jail Monday in a mid-day break which went undetected until one of the four telephoned the Sheriff's office with an offer of surrender.

Still at large are Darrell Stratton, who three days earlier had been sentenced to three three-year pen terms; Corbett Chaney, whose pen term had been fixed at one year last Friday for grand larceny, and Noah Adkins, who had been jailed on a peace warrant.

The four escapes, Kermit Castle, was charged with breaking and entering. He telephoned the Sheriff's office from Bull Creek, saying he had injured his back in a fall during the escape from the jail and that he wanted to be returned to jail.

Strips of steel from a cot inside the jail were used in prying, or attempting to pry, open the jail door leading to the catwalk from the jail to the rear of the circuit courtroom. Jailer Lawrence Hale expressed the belief a key may have been made to the lock and that the prying was done to help spring the lock open. He found one of the pieces of steel beneath Stratton's bunk in the jail.

The prisoners worked so silently that Jailer Hale was unaware that a jail delivery was under way. Castle said, upon his return here, that, once inside the cage-like catwalk connecting the jail and courtroom, the four climbed out the top of the cage and dropped approximately 15 feet to the pavement below. Once outside, the four split up, Stratton and another hiring a taxicab at a stand, less than a block from the jail, to drive them to West Prestonsburg.

Jailer Hale said jail records indicate Stratton had made three previous dashes for freedom. (See Story No. 5, Page 4)

The Council ratified the contract entered into with Corbin Joseph by the former Council last year providing for a 10-year lease from Joseph of the garbage dump now in use at a monthly rental of \$75.

An ordinance also was adopted requiring garbage and other refuse to be placed in approved containers in an alley adjacent to the property line of each home or place of business or at other place convenient to trucking. The ordinance prohibits transportation of garbage over city streets by any person or firm except those authorized by the city official in charge of the municipal garbage collection and disposal system.

One purpose of the ordinance, it was explained, is to require the placing of garbage in containers at locations easily accessible to the garbage truck, so that workers can more quickly make their rounds and have time left in which to do street work or perform other assigned duties.

Scott Collins, delinquent tax collector, reported to the Council that he had collected \$300 in 1957 taxes and is now beginning work on taxes, 1958, through 1960.

## STATE NOTES ROAD WORK

**252 Miles Are Improved  
In Floyd In Two Years;  
Detail of Work Issued**

Frankfort, Ky., April 5 — The Kentucky Highway Department has improved 252 miles of rural secondary roads in Floyd county since December, 1959.

In addition, the rural highway program is providing \$64,885 this year to assist in maintaining 101.3 miles and constructing 12.9 miles of county roads, Floyd county participates in the co-operative program by renting equipment to the Department.

The secondary road program is financed with two cents of the seven-cent state gasoline tax, and the county road money comes from a statewide appropriation of \$5,000,000. Both these state funds are allocated among the counties by formula.

The statistics were announced in Frankfort by Rural Highway Commissioner T. R. Marcum.

"Governor Combs, Commissioner of Highways Henry Ward and I are aware that a good part of the traffic which will flow over the vast system of arterial highways now being built will begin and end on a rural road," Marcum said.

Under rural secondary contracts, 8.7 miles of bituminous surfacing has been put on the Melvin-Weeksbury, Maytown-Garrett and Estill roads, and on streets and roads in upper Betsy Layne, Maytown, Eastern, Garrett, Mare Creek, Dwyale and McDowell. A bridge on the Whittaker road, also under contract, is to be finished this summer.

State forces have completed construction or improvements on the following roads: Hen Pen Branch, 2.2 miles; Wilson Creek, 0.8; Bull Creek, Right Fork, 2.5; Dinwood Station, 1.1; Bonanza-Lick Fork, 0.1; Godie Branch, 0.1; Prater Fork, 1.3; Maytown-Garrett, 1.2; Otter Creek, 1.0; Caleb Fork, 1.0; Millard Allen, 0.5; Tom's Creek, 1.4; Buck's Branch, 3.0; Dewey Dam-Auxier-East Point, 2.0; Diecktown-Bays Branch, 1.5.

Other projects remain to be completed on these roads: Branham Creek, 1.4 miles; Henry Branch, 2.0; Bonanza-Lick Fork, 0.1; Bufalo Creek, 3.0; Mays Branch, 0.3; Toler Creek, 2.5. Road has been placed on 224.5 miles of roads.

It might interest KEA and NEA to know that only a few weeks ago, when members of the minority group maintained they were called upon to support Heman McGuire in his legal battle or battles, this man John Curt Stringer, who is president of the Carter County Teachers Association and who is having the Board of Education investigated, threatened the "rebels" in the Association with investigation by the ethics committee of the KEA.

"Ethics!" Shades of Noah Webster! Since when did it become unethical for an individual to speak out against the Heman McGuires of any school system if it is ethical for the president of a teachers association to maintain the virtues of the aforesaid McGuires?

Appalachian area. While the volume of Appalachian production has been maintained at a constant level, increased demands have caused this production to represent a continually declining percentage of the total amount needed.

"Altogether, we now have 3,320 producing gas wells," Mr. Phillips said. "These wells and the privately-owned Appalachian wells from which we purchase gas provide United Fuel and its affiliates with about 15 per cent of what we need to supply our customers. The other 85 per cent is produced in Louisiana and Texas."

**Food Stamp Violations Result in Indictments**

Federal grand juries in Detroit and Pittsburgh, investigating charges of misuse of federal food stamps have indicted Anthony Zatina, owner of Forrest Market, Detroit, Robert K. Wright, former official of the Liberty Loan Corporation, Detroit, and a Fayette county (Pa.) grocer and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. David Lebowitz.

The Detroit men were charged in two counts in the indictment, one charging Zatina with making and using a false and fraudulent food stamp redemption certificate. The second count charges both Zatina and Wright with conspiring to defraud the U. S. government by using federal food stamps in a manner contrary to the regulations of the United States Department of Agriculture.

The Pennsylvania couple was accused of paying cash for stamps at a price below face value and of accepting stamps for illegal items. Possible penalties for these charges are five years in jail and/or \$10,000 fine on each count.

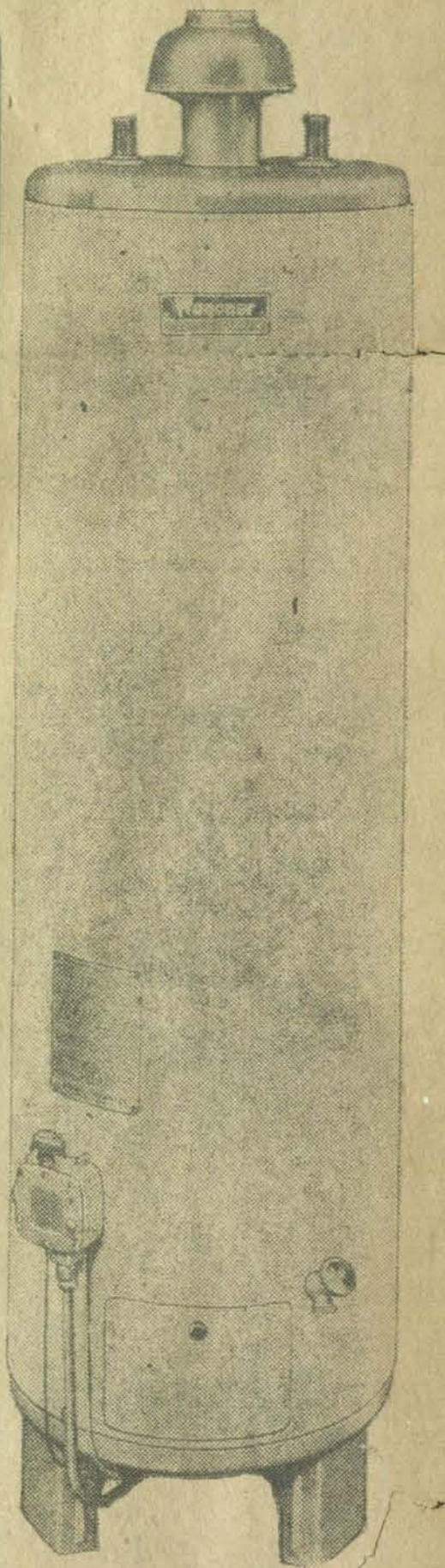

**Meager Finances Noted  
 By Sportsmen President;  
 Commission Is Praised**

"No other department in state government has accomplished more on a declining budget than has the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources", Arthur Curtis, president of the League of Kentucky Sportsmen, speaking on behalf of the League and Kentucky sportsmen in general, told the Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission in session today at the Department's office.

Curtis was also high in his praise for the Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission. He pointed out that selection of commissioners on a regional basis is a method used in many other states. Additionally, Kentucky by having the prospective candidates screened by the sportsmen of the area in order to be placed on the eligible list from which the Governor makes a selection, names only the more highly respected businessmen. Through this sportsmen selection the commissioners are not named because of any activities for any one political party or faction, Curtis added.

While the commissioners are selected on a regional basis, Curtis said, members have almost invariably considered the service from a statewide standpoint and have worked for the good of the state as a whole. They have not exploited the district conception in this system any more than would be possible under any other system of appointments.

In addressing the Commission Curtis pointed out again that although the sale of hunting and fishing licenses, the source from which finances for the Department are obtained, has declined, progress has continued even through the lean years and new projects have been initiated and carried out to completion. This has been accomplished through streamlined programs, better planning and management, even with reduced personnel, Curtis pointed out, and the overall long range program of the Department has been solidified during the past few years, Curtis declared that through frugal use of funds the Department has been able to pay off most of a million dollar committed indebtedness inherited in 1958, which included among others, the construction of four major lakes, maintenance of 26 state owned lakes, payments on the Ballard County Waterfowl Management Area, construction of previously committed river dams while, at the same time, carrying out old projects and initiating new ones. One of the new projects highly praised by Curtis was that of producing quail in the dead of winter. The quail so produced are apportioned to sportsmen clubs that are equipped to rear them through the cold months. In the spring these quail are released as adults and it is believed that they produced covets of their own that same summer.
