West Virginian Drowns Despite Friend's Effort; Little Known of Maynard

Less than 20 minutes after he kitchen was on fire when the fam- had driven from West Virginia to Dewey Lake last Thursday, Randolph Maynard, 26, of Delbarton, W. Va., was drowned.

The victim's body was recovered by the Floyd County Emergency & Rescue Squad in 12 to 15 feet of water, about 500 feet downstream from the German bridge. The tragedy occurred about 7:30 p.m.





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

With the dedication on Labor Day of its new lodge, Jenny Wiley State Park will become a full-fledged park and a bright unit in Kentucky's park system which has been termed the nation's greatest.

"But what will it mean to us?" is a question not often but occasionally heard.

One answer to that question is, "Just what you and the rest of us make it." But we might well particularize a bit in giving answer.

Jenny Wiley State Park, destined to be the No. 2 park in the best park system in the United States and perhaps the most beautiful in Kentucky, with Dewey Lake for boating, fishing and other water sports, its million-dollar plus lodge, vacation cabins, golf course, swimming pool and, eventually, its amphitheatre, will certainly do no less than other parks-which means that it will attract thousands annually from all parts of the country. Reservations may reasonably be expected to be at a premium.

Few vacationists or tourists go to a park and stay there for a week or two weeks. As the days pass they begin to be curious about the countryside; they drive around, enjoy the scenery, see people, talk with them, ask questions.

And that's where we all come in.

What these visitors see and hear will mean a great deal, not to them but to us. A clean, bright countryside, a courteous, friendly people, towns with their ambition showing—these will make Jenny Wiley State Park mean much to all of us.

Among the future visitors to that park will be men and women with the means to do much for this entire county and area. With a great, new highway, flood control a thing of the foreseeable future, communities thinking and acting more aggressively toward improving themselves, and with a great tourist playground here, deep within the hills-who knows?-it may indeed be that one or more of these people who are heads of industry in other states may find here what they like and want.

We think it is not a matter of wishful thinking for us to anticipate that perhaps one of these just might want to have a hand in developing industrially this depressed bit of America.

With all our messiness and don't-care attitude, the mountains have a singular attraction to a great many people. The "outsider" coming to Prestonsburg and residing here a few months leaves only with deep regret. With this great, new park as a central beautyspot and with the area surrounding it cleaned up and presented at its best to the visitor, the attraction to others will be all the stronger.

This is what folks mean when they say Jenny Wiley State Park will mean to us just what we make it.

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
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## SCENE OF BATTLE OF JENNIE'S CREEK

The Battle of Jennie's Creek occurred January 7, 1862, three days before the Battle of Middle Creek. It was fought between contingents of Union cavalry under the indirect command of Col. James A. Garfield and Confederate cavalry under Gen. Humphrey Marshall, who, at the time, was entrenched at Hager Hill.

The Confederates were defeated and hastily retreated up Jennie's Creek, leaving a quantity of military paraphernalia on the field. Marshall retired to Middle Creek and entrenched at the forks of the stream. The Battle of Middle Creek was fought there, January 10, 1862.

Shown here is the old Davis home, built of bricks manufactured on the site following the Civil War.

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


