## PLANE SEARCH IS CONTINUING

### Craft with 3 Missing Since Sunday; Elliott Thought Crash Scene

Search of the Elliott county hills for a plane missing since Sunday afternoon with its pilot and two passengers continued Wednesday afternoon without result.

While 20 planes from the Civil Air Patrol crisscrossed the region, State Police and the Pike County Rescue Squad conducted the ground search for Dana Byers, his wife, and their 15-year-old daughter.

They disappeared Sunday shortly after Byers notified the Huntington, West Virginia, airport he was down to less than two hours' fuel. The family was on the way there from Atlanta to attend a funeral for Byers' father.

The pilot's sister, Mrs. Wanda Beck, Fort Myers, Florida, refused to give up hope that her brother would be found alive.

"He's an experienced pilot," she said, "and has logged 1,000 hours in the air. Dana's been tinkering with planes since he was a teenager in Middletown, Ohio."

Mrs. Beck, who was in Huntington for the funeral, said, "I've no reason to believe they won't show up, maybe in one of those little towns."

Byers' 21-year-old son, Robert, expressed similar confidence. "Dad's pretty well acquainted with that country. He's flown it many times before," said young Byers, a student at Bowling Green, Ohio, University.

## HOUSING PACT OKEHED, WORK READY TO START

### NEW VILLAGE OF 40 HOMES TO BE RESULT

#### Hunter's Bid, Plus Cost Of Site, Other Services In Excess of \$600,000

Construction of a brand-new, modern village as an addition to Prestonsburg was ready to begin this week as the Prestonsburg Municipal Housing Commission received from the Housing & Home Finance Agency of the Public Housing Administration authority to award a contract on the construction of 40 low-rent public housing units here.

A telegram received Tuesday authorized the Commission to award the contract to the G. H. Hunter Company, Betsy Layne, on its reduced bid of \$498,637. And Hunter was ready to start work, almost immediately.

The Betsy Layne firm's original bid of \$520,000 was lowest of two opened here last April 17, and the work of negotiating a contract has been going on since that time. Approval of the contract was made two weeks after members of the Housing Commission -- R. V. May, chairman, Ed Music, Otis Cooley and Frank Heinze--with Clifford B. Latta, its executive secretary, and the contractor flew to Atlanta to confer with federal housing officials. They were notified by telephone, late last week, that the contract was being approved.

The contractor's bid, plus \$35,000 paid for the 6.1-acre site, plus architect's fees and administrative costs, brings the total cost of the project above \$600,000.

Hunter will construct the 40 rental units and a combination maintenance and office building, do all landscaping, build streets and sidewalks, prepare lawns, plant shrubbery, install storm sewers and lay gas and water lines from the end of the water and gas company mains to the new structures. He also will install gas furnaces for forced-air heating of all units.

The federal agency will add kitchen ranges, refrigeration and other conveniences.

The Prestonsburg Municipal Water & Gas System, now busy laying a line to the new Jenny Wiley State Park lodge and vacation cottages, will soon turn its attention to extending gas and water mains to the vicinity of the housing development.

The units to be built will be of brick veneer and will range in size from one bedroom through four. The contractor has 360 working days in which to complete the entire job.

The housing development will lie in a triangular plot of land between the old Auxier road and the new U. S. 23 between Prestonsburg and Auxier, in the vicinity of Radio Station WDOC.

### Bibee To Open Store On Lake Drive Here

Bert Bibee will open the Home Office Supply Store Friday on Lake Drive, across the street from the bus station, and will soon announce a date for official opening of the business.

Mr. Bibee is owner of the Home Office Supply Company at Hazard. Clarence Martin will be in charge of the Prestonsburg store, and Carada Terry is a sales representative.

## Dr. Adams Named Medical Adviser To Draft Board

Dr. James Douglas Adams, of Prestonsburg, has been appointed by President Kennedy to serve as medical advisor of Selective Service Local Board No. 166 here, it was announced this week.

Other members of the local board are Clive Akers, Drift; J. C. Wells, Estill; Mike Little, Melvin; O. C. Howell, Allen; Harry T. Hill, Prestonsburg. Preston Marshall Davidson, of Prestonsburg, is the appeal agent, and the local board clerk is Mrs. Gloria W. Hager.

Each boy becoming 18 years of age and living in Floyd county should visit the local board and register within five days after reaching his eighteenth birthday. The clerk at that time will inform him of his obligation under the present Selective Service Law.

One of the most important aspects of the Selective Service System in being today is its capability for rapid expansion in time of emergency. The Selective Service System is the only agency with an inventory of manpower, and in event of disaster or catastrophe it is the only agency organized in each of the communities throughout the United States capable of expanding its present functions and assuming necessary additional responsibilities in connection with the mobilization of manpower, not only for the military, but for all civilian activities, including Civil Defense.

### Funeral Home Tiff Results in Filing Of 3rd Court Suit

The breach between stockholders of the Floyd Funeral Home, Inc., widened this week as a second circuit court action was filed.

In this latest complaint Magistrate Bryant Derosssett, Mae Martin and Roger Turner claim that Victor Hale, president, and his wife, Vivian Hale, secretary-treasurer, of the funeral home have refused to deliver to them the \$2,900 stock which they purchased with borrowed money. They also claim the defendants have refused the plaintiffs permission to inspect the corporation books and have failed to employ a licensed embalmer as required by law.

A writ of mandamus to require defendants to perform all three items of the allegation is asked of Circuit Court.

## COUNTY ADDS TO EQUIPMENT

### Court Employs Conn To Inspect Bridges; Conference Slated

Floyd county added to its road equipment this week a used 1956 model White tractor which was purchased Monday by the fiscal court on a low offer made by the Callahan Distributing Company. Purchase price of the tractor was \$2,200.

The fiscal court employed George Conn to inspect "dead-men," or anchors, of the Dwale and Emma bridges. This inspection was suggested by the recent collapse of the bridge at Knotley Hollow, near here, which resulted in the deaths of three persons.

County judge Henry Stumbo said he and Wendell Bayes, district engineer, Department of Highways, will confer with residents of the Goble-Roberts Addition within the next few days as to community wishes in the matter of bridge restoration there.

There is a possibility, it was said unofficially, that if residents of the community approve, a foot-bridge would be built there and the road connecting with the Bull Creek-Prestonsburg route would be improved and used for motor vehicle traffic.

Raymond Joseph, who was arrested here last Thursday by Sheriff's deputies, was returned to Lexington Friday by Fayette county officers to face there a charge of contributing to the neglect of his children.

Another Floyd resident, returned here from Lexington, Mrs. Grace Burke, of West Prestonsburg, was jailed Saturday as an escapee from the Eastern State hospital.

Others jailed within the week and charges on which they were booked: Carl Reed, attempted rape, arrested by deputy sheriffs; Bill Mann, drunk driving and Hansford Austin, seduction, also arrested by members of the Sheriff's force; Hansford Burchett, operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol, booked by Trooper Conley.

## HYDEN QUILTS REGENT POST

### Martin Dentist Resigns Morehead Regency, Says He Owes Caney Service

Resignation of Dr. Joe Taylor Hyden, Martin dentist, from the board of regents of Morehead State College was accepted last Thursday by Governor Bert T. Combs, it was announced by Dr. Hyden.

The Governor had not appointed a successor this week. Dr. Hyden gave as his reason for resigning from the Morehead board the fact that he has been named a trustee of Caney Junior College at Pippa Passes and that he is anxious to devote whatever spare time he may have to that school.

Although born in this county, he spent his boyhood on Greasy Creek, Johnson county. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Daniels. He moved to New Jersey 22 years ago.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Dorothy Robinette Daniels, five sons and four daughters. He also leaves several brothers and sisters.

The body is being returned to the home at Drift of a brother, James Daniels. Funeral arrangements were incomplete Wednesday, but it was said that burial will be made on Greasy Creek under direction of the Hall Brothers Funeral Home.

# Student Body of 350 First Year Seen for College Here by U. K.

## SEPTEMBER 29 DESIGNATED SUNDAY SCHOOL DAY HERE; PLAN PARADE, PARK PICNIC

Saturday, September 29, will be "Sunday School Day" in Prestonsburg and at Jenny Wiley State Park.

Plans are being made for this day, and all Sunday Schools in the Prestonsburg neighborhood are being invited to join in the celebration, it was said this week.

The occasion will start with a parade by the various Sunday Schools. The City Council has approved the setting aside of the streets needed for the occasion, and will provide police escort for the parade. Neighborhood school terms will be open and it is hoped that many of them will send their bands.

Plaques for the best decorated cars in the parade will be given, but the general committee for this,

the first annual Sunday School Day, is not encouraging big floats, it was pointed out.

Windows of many of the stores will be decorated, and displays of modern Sunday School materials will be shown. It is known that one display will feature an "Octapia," or eight-verse translation of the New Testament. Five of these translations were made before the King James Version, and two after.

After the parade and exhibits, the groups will go to Jenny Wiley State Park, to enjoy picnic dinners and engage in various games and contests, for which prize ribbons will be given the winners.

A number of the Prestonsburg civic organizations have approved of the idea, as has the Ministerial Association.

## Rev. Moran To Lead Countywide Crusade Of Methodist Church



The Rev. Edditt Moran, Lexington, Kentucky, veteran of 400 evangelistic crusades in the United States, will lead the Floyd Countywide Methodist Crusade which will begin August 19 and continue nightly at 7:30 through September 2, it was announced this week.

The countywide crusade will be held in a tent large enough to accommodate several hundreds of persons, on U. S. 23, just above Allen.

Bob Fraumann, minister of music at Centenary Methodist Church, Ashland, will direct the music for the evangelistic series and provide special music. Mrs. Jeanne Moran, wife of the evangelist, will render special organ numbers.

# GOV. COMBS PUSHES SITE PURCHASE HERE

At the urging of Governor Combs, State Finance Commissioner Robert Matthews will send a representative here Friday to effect immediate purchase of the 40-acre site of the proposed Prestonsburg Community College.

Contributions to the college development fund are near \$90,000, and it is proposed that all such funds be paid directly to the landowners, after which the Finance Department will pay the remainder due on the site.

The Finance Department representative will meet here with W. J. Reynolds, Jr., of Allen, chairman of the college fund finance committee. After that, title to the site is expected to pass to the Commonwealth within a matter of a few days.

Meanwhile, architects await a decision from the University of Kentucky as to the size of the original structure to be erected. This decision, originally slated July 15, is now expected within the next few days.

## Combs Names Minister To County Committee On Social Services

Gov. Bert T. Combs this week appointed the Rev. Robert Martin, of Martin, to the Floyd County Social Service Advisory Committee to fill the vacancy created by the removal to Ashland of the Rev. Ira McMillen.

The Martin minister will serve on the committee with County Judge Henry Stumbo, Regina B. Mayo, Tom James, J. B. Clarke and Paul Martin, all of Prestonsburg, and Mrs. Foster Stumbo, of McDowell.

One of the duties of the committee is to study the lists of recipients of social services rendered by the state, including aid to dependent children.

## July Stamps Worth \$90,000; Bring Total Issued to \$1,214,994

The \$90,000 worth of food stamps distributed during July brought to \$1,214,994 the total issued since the pilot food stamp program was initiated in this county, June 1, last year.

Carl R. Horn, supervisor of the food stamp office, said stamps issued last month went to 1,494 families, or 7,863 individuals. All but 168 of these families, he said, do not benefit from any other form of public aid.

The food stamp office in the courthouse here reopened Wednesday. During the last two weeks stamps have been issued from the Martin office.

## STUDY REPORT TO SPUR JOB OF PLANNING

### 10% Growth Per Year Seen for Five Years; Space Needs Outlined

The University of Kentucky has completed its study for architectural design of the Prestonsburg Community College, and from that study it envisions a potential of 350 fulltime students the first year of college operation, plus 150 adult part-time students.

Growth factor of the college is estimated in the report as 10% annually, which would bring the full-time student enrollment at the end of five years to 525 and the part-time students to 225.

With the receipt of this information, George Lee Shamon and Jack Hatcher, architects, are ready to begin work on design and plans for the structure to be erected on the 40-acre site under option here for the institution.

The University report, signed by R. D. Johnson, executive dean, indicates instructional and program space needs in the original structure of 13 classrooms, three laboratory rooms and one multi-purpose classroom, which would accommodate up to 532 students. The overall floor space of the proposed building would be 36,700 square feet.

Non-instructional space to be provided in the building would include these rooms:

A library, 15 regular staff offices, one part-time staff office, separate offices for the director, his assistant and the bursar, a secretary-reception area, a general clerical room, study lounge, book room, faculty conference room, bookstore, vending room, a 40x40 (See Story No. 1, Page 8)

## STEP UP PACE ON ROAD LINK

### Contract on Turnpike Extension in County Seen in September

The Kentucky Department of Highways legal staff and right-of-way division are intensifying their work to acquire all property rights needed to make possible an early September letting to contract of the remainder of the Eastern Kentucky Turnpike extension on Middle Creek to the Floyd-Magoffin line.

Thirty-seven condemnation actions have been instituted in county court here, and seven or eight others soon will be filed. Agreements with more than 50 property-owners have been reached, it was said.

To clear right-of-way, the Department of Highways this week asked bids on nine buildings along the route. Some of the structures are on land which is now in the process of condemnation, so possession of the buildings cannot be given until the Department of Highways has posted the amount allowed the property-owner by the court. The judgment of the court is expected about August 27.

Properties on which bids are asked are:

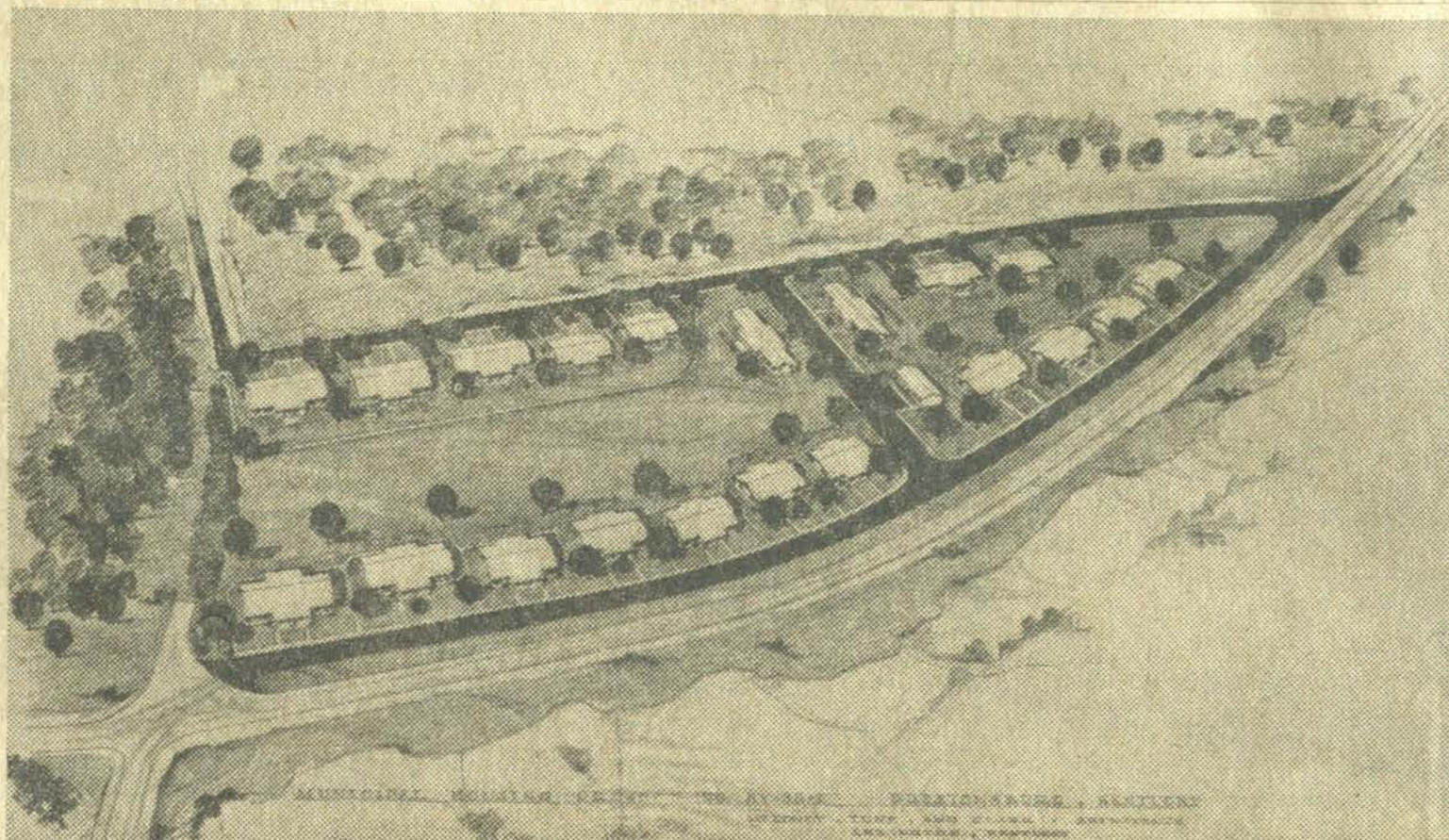
Store, shed and feed-room of R. D. Prater; garage of Bennie Adams; barn on property of E. D. Prater; abandoned house and crib of Amanda Richardson; shed on the property of Henry and Aralee Allen; two-story residence, a one-story residence and shed, property of G. R. Spradlin; two houses on land of Dock Meador heirs.

Contract for the bridge repair project on the Prestonsburg-Water Gap-Allen road was awarded to the Mattingly Bridge Company last Thursday and work is expected to start soon.

Mattingly Bridge Company submitted the low bid of \$65,427.50. The firm hopes to finish the work within eight weeks.

This highway improvement is being financed entirely out of the state road fund.

Looking toward construction of a road up Buffalo to the Pike county line, the fiscal court at its July 19 meeting authorized the County Attorney to file a condemnation suit against Harve Spears to acquire a 40-foot right-of-way through his property.

**Procedure for Audits Of School Districts Subject for Study**

Frankfort, Ky., July 30—A set of recommended procedures for auditing local school districts is being studied by the State Committee for School District Audits.

The state committee is composed of Finance Commissioner Robert Matthews, chairman; State School Superintendent Wendell P. Butler and Attorney General John B. Breckinridge.

"The committee will cooperate with the State Board of Accountancy and work with it and with local school boards in selecting certified public accountants to conduct these normal school district audits required at least once every two years," Matthews said.

The committee was created by the 1962 General Assembly in House Bill 207.

## TROOPER HARDY ONE OF TWO HONORED FOR HEROIC ACTION

Frankfort, Ky., July 30 (Spl.)—Two Kentucky State Troopers have received Certificates of Merit from Col. David A. Espie, director of the Kentucky State Police, for meritorious service and bravery which was in keeping with the highest tradition of the Kentucky State Police.

The certificates were presented to Trooper Robert Morris, Harlan, and Trooper Arthur Hardy, Pikeville.

In December, 1960, Trooper Morris, following a drunk driver, was fired upon by the man when he got out of his cruiser. Morris rolled on the ground behind the cruiser while the drunk emptied his revolver at him. Morris rendered the man unconscious while he was attempting to reload.

**'Traffic Trap' Stigma Lifted from 3 Towns, Auto Club Announces**

Lexington, Ky.—The designation, "traffic trap," has been lifted from three Kentucky communities—Bedford, Hanson and Crofton—by the American Automobile Association, it was announced by the Blue Grass Automobile Club. The action was taken after findings of a special committee appointed by Governor Bert T. Combs to investigate the traffic trap charges and the acceptance of recommended changes by local officials to improve the enforcement situation.

The towns of Hanson and Crofton will continue to be on a special AAA "alert" list where enforcement is reported as unusually strict. In a letter to Governor Combs, AAA Executive Vice President Russell E. Singer pointed out that placement of a community on the "alert" list is in no sense a criticism of the community but simply a warning to members to be doubly cautious in observing all traffic rules and regulations.

The town of Bonleville—most recent addition to the AAA list—will continue to be listed as a "traffic trap" pending further review of the situation. A special "alert" continues to be posted for Earlington, while the "alert" for Slaughters has been removed.

The AAA praised the action of Governor Combs in appointing a committee of state officials and motor club representatives to investigate the traffic trap charges and also commended the cooperative attitude of local officials in making recommended changes to improve their enforcement program.

In another incident during September, 1961, Morris was investigating an accident, another drunk driver kicked him in the stomach

after having been placed in the cruiser. As he stepped out of the police car, a shot rang out from nearby bushes and Morris fell to the ground with a bullet abrasion over the right eye.

Spectators informed the trooper of a companion to the first man. Though temporarily blinded, Morris made an attempt to follow the man until he was too ill to continue. Morris returned to the cruiser to find the man had already come back to the scene and was beating the other driver with his gun and threatening to kill him. The trooper approached him from the rear, disarmed, handcuffed and placed him in the cruiser. Morris was treated for concussion, shock and a skin abrasion.

Trooper Hardy answered a call about a man shooting inside a house. As his cruiser approached the house, a man on the porch opened fire at Hardy, who jumped from his cruiser, returned the fire and wounded the man, who later died. The dead man had previously killed two police officers in two separate bouts with the law near Paris and also had had a gun battle with another State Trooper.

## State Health Dept. Gets \$20,000 Grant

Frankfort, Ky.—A Public Health Service grant amounting to \$20,000 has been awarded the Kentucky State Department of Health to develop a comprehensive five-year plan for chronic disease and health of the aging activities in Kentucky, according to Dr. Russell E. Teague, state health commissioner. The grant will be administered by Dr. William H. McBeath, director of the Bureau of Medical Services.

The plan to be worked out will include an estimate of the magnitude of current and projected problems of the chronically ill and aging based on the extent of the problem in Kentucky and facilities and services available here. Solutions of these problems will be proposed with an estimate of the support, federal, state and local, needed to carry them out, Dr. McBeath said.

Similar grants have been given eight other states, one in each public health service region. Kentucky was selected to make the study from Region III, which also includes the District of Columbia, Maryland, North Carolina, Virginia and West Virginia.

Dr. McBeath stated that at the beginning of the project data available through divisions of the State Department of Health on chronic disease and aging care and facilities would be compiled by a central staff. Support from local community groups will supplement staff activities as the project continues.

## Says Arrangements Ready For Travel To Convention

According to Burnis Jones, presiding minister of the local congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, travel arrangements have been completed for the delegates to attend the "Courageous Ministers District Convention" at the Watt-Powell Ball Park, Charleston, West Virginia, August 3-5.

Mr. Jones said that most of the local residents who plan to attend the convention will be leaving August 2 so as to arrive in time to get to their accommodations and attend the opening sessions of the convention. Many of the delegates will stay in private homes in Charleston.

## 100 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

**The Civil War in Kentucky**

By **JOE JORDAN**  
(Kentucky Civil War Commission)

One hundred years ago this week elections, or what passed for elections, were held throughout Kentucky to name certain judges and the county officials of all the 110 counties then existing. A good many Kentuckians did not consider the affairs real elections because the voters had no choice; only the "Union Ticket" candidates had been permitted to run. The military governor of Kentucky, the Union Army's Brig. Gen. Jerry T. Boyle, had accomplished that by issuing a general order which said that no one "hostile in opinion to the government" could be a candidate.

And coming out in opposition to a Union Ticket candidate was considered proof enough of hostility to the government.

"Under these conditions, a small vote was cast everywhere in the state. But only a few votes were needed to elect unopposed candidates. (The Louisville Journal, a firm Unionist newspaper, would charge later that Boyle's order had been violated in Morgan county, where no Federal troops were stationed to enforce it. But there was no doubt that in the 109 other counties the sheriffs, county judges and all other local officials thereafter would be men approved by the Union Army.)

Friction between the military and the old set of state and local officials who had been chosen by the people in free elections had been increasing for months. As far back as the middle of May, the clashes between military and civil authorities had begun when a troop of Union cavalry had surrounded the courthouse at Marion in Crittenden county and guards had been put at the doors of the courtroom in which Circuit Judge Wiley P. Fowler was holding court. A letter from Col. S. Noble, commander of U. S. forces at Paducah, was handed to Judge Fowler, directing him to follow certain procedures.

Judge Fowler "refused to comply with the order, declined to yield to any dictation by military authority as to the discharge of his duties as presiding officer of the court, and ordered an immediate adjournment." The judge and four lawyers were immediately arrested

## EAST KY. SQUIRREL SEASON DELAYED TILL AUGUST 26th

Frankfort, Ky., July 30—Kentucky's squirrel hunters will take to the fields in a section of the state designated as the "Western" part on August 15 with early reports indicating a good supply of bush-tails, the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources reports.

For those residents of the "Eastern Section" hunting will not be permitted until August 26. The seasons have been divided into two phases in each section of the state with a full 90 days of hunting provided in each area.

After the "kickoff" on August 15 in the western section, the season continues through October 31, reopens on November 15 and continues through November 26. For the eastern section the season

opens on August 26 and continues through October 31, reopens on November 15 and continues through December 7. The bag limit is six with a possession limit of 12 after two or more days of hunting.

The area designated as Eastern includes these counties: Lewis, Rowan, Menifee, Powell, Estill, Jackson, Rockcastle, Pulaski and Wayne and all counties lying to the east of this group. Naturally, the western section includes all counties lying to the west of this demarcation tier of counties.

According to surveys and bag checks conducted last season by biologists and conservation officers Kentucky hunters bagged 1,672,770 squirrels. The bush-tail, as this figure reveals, is one of the heaviest hunted game animals in Kentucky and attracts a large number of hunters in all sections of the state. Rifles or shotguns may be used by the hunter except rifles above .243 caliber are illegal.

### Espie Says Copying Of State Police Garb Leads to Confusion

Frankfort, Ky., July 30 (Spl.) — What he describes as "a growing tendency to copy the Kentucky State Police uniform by local and private police officers throughout the state," is reported by Col. David A. Espie, director of State Police.

"While I'm sure there is no actual intent to misrepresent, this similarity of uniforms between the State Police and the local and some industrial policemen can lead only to a confused public," Espie said.

Captain William Mullins, legal officer for the State Police, points out it is illegal to imitate the uniforms in any way.

Kentucky law was quoted by Mullins as follows: "No person shall falsely represent himself to be an officer, agent or employee of the Department (division) of Kentucky State Police and in such assumed character, arrest or detain or search in any manner the person or property of anyone, nor shall any person without the authority of the department wear its official uniform or insignia or any uniform or insignia likely to be confused with the official uniform or insignia of the Department (division)."

Espie added, "Of course, we desire voluntary compliance with the statutes; however, if we learn of violations, we will have no alternative but to enforce the law."

### Interior Department Experts to Inventory Economic Resources

Frankfort, Ky., July 30 (Spl.) — An intensive economic resource inventory of a 12-county area in the Cumberland Valley has been launched by a team of experts from the U. S. Department of the Interior. The inventory will provide a basis for development with emphasis on the area's tourist industry potential.

The Kentucky counties of Pike, Letcher, Knox, Harlan and Bell, plus five Virginia and two Tennessee counties, are in the study area.

Gov. Bert Combs said the Conference of Appalachian Governors had focused attention on the need to develop economic possibilities of this particular area. Combs is conference chairman.

Sponsoring the project in Kentucky is the Beautiful Cumberland Association, headed by Clinton Broadwater, Middlesboro.

The study team will stay in the area two weeks. Two more weeks will be utilized in formulating recommendations to the three states.

John Whisman, area program administrator for Kentucky, said the team will explore all possibilities for development of natural resources.

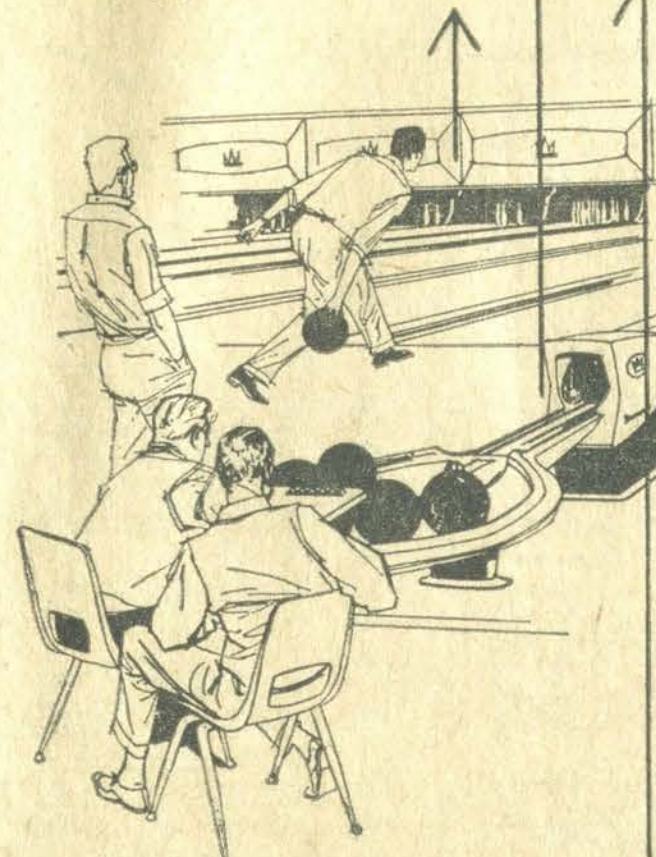

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

### A TEACHER WRITES ON PROCEDURES

Through working, studying, observing, interviewing and corresponding with well-trained and dedicated people in various school systems, it has been my privilege to learn and see in practice the following procedures which, from every aspect, appear to be just, sound and prudent administrative procedures:

1. Fair employment practices — The employment, tentative placement, and forthwith notification of all certified teachers in late April or early May. Publication of same in a newspaper of general circulation.
2. Placement of all school people strictly on the basis of academic training and professional experience.
3. No arbitrary transferrals—No transferrals of teachers to be made unless in consequence of a teacher's request or after a hearing, in the presence of the teacher, before the full membership of the local board of education.
4. A classroom teachers' organization independent of all administrative or supervisory personnel.
5. The formation of a curriculum and budgetary committee comprised solely of members of the classroom teachers' organization and selected exclusively by that body—the function of the committee being to represent the teachers and appear at all school board meetings, particularly to appear and assist in the formulation of the school budget.
6. Mimeographed copies of the annual school budget, as approved by the local board of education and State Department of Education, and placed in the hands of all school employees immediately after the opening of the school year.
7. A cumulative financial report, setting forth all revenues and listing the sources thereof and all expenditures and the major items thereof, mimeographed and placed in the hands of all school employees and the public in general within the school district. Such report being prepared during the summer months is made available for distribution immediately after the beginning of the school year. The content of report reveals income and expenditures of the preceding year in the view that the citizens of the school district may become better informed and made more fully aware of the urgency of educational needs.
8. The publication of a brochure setting forth the policies of the local school board and distribution of same to all school employees.
9. The following characteristics were especially noteworthy:
  - a. Only people with a Master's degree and a number of years of teaching experience were considered as candidates of school principalships or other positions of key responsibility.
  - b. Supervisors functioned as helping teachers and performed by demonstrative teaching in classrooms visited and by group project activities.
  - c. School principals were the first to arrive and the last to depart at their respective schools.

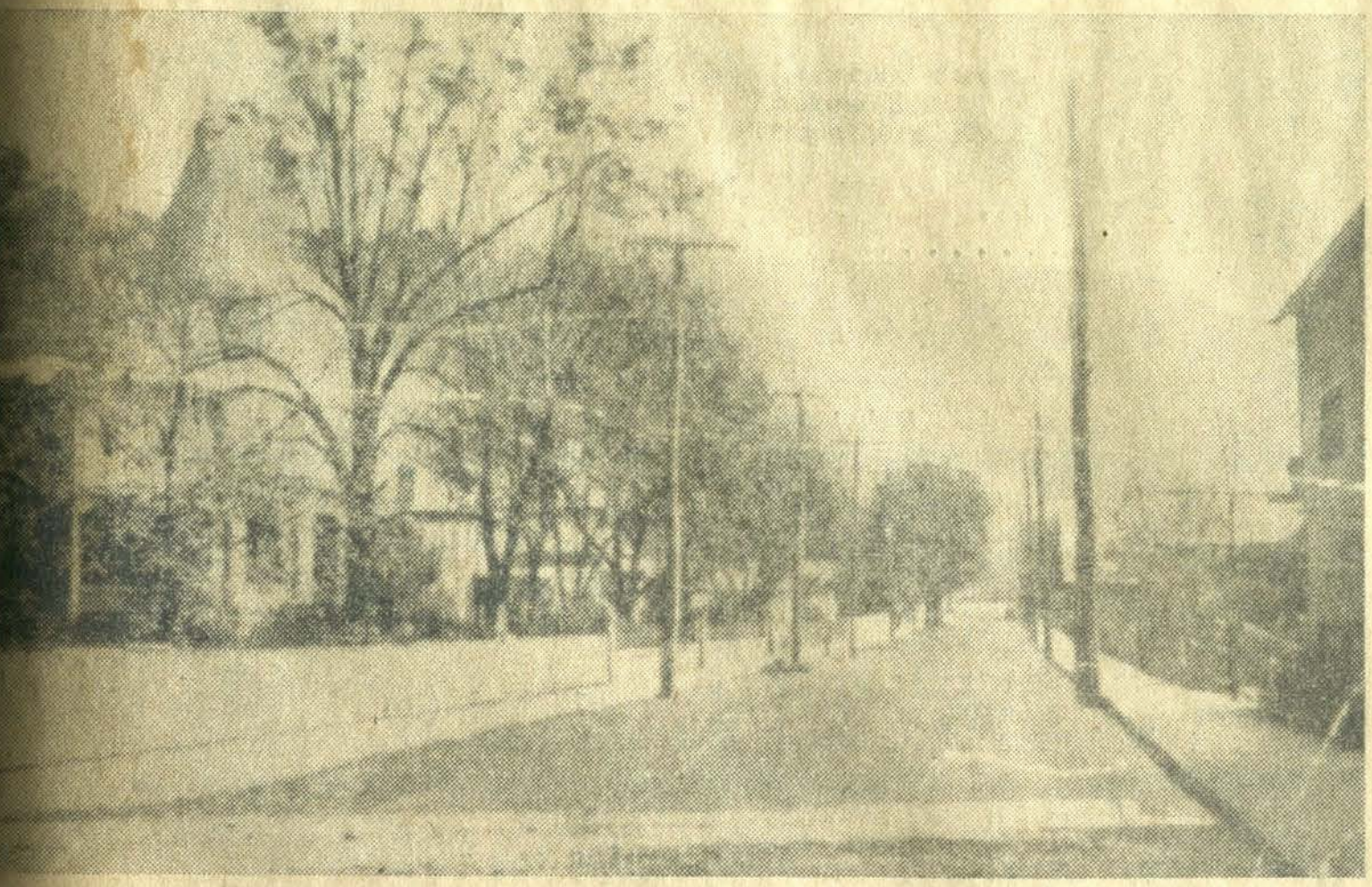

SECOND STREET, PRESTONSBURG, BEFORE 1910

Prestonsburg, founded in 1797 by Col. John Preston, who had a land grant of 100,000 acres in the Big Sandy valley from the Commonwealth of Virginia, was originally called Preston's Station. The name was changed to Prestonsburg when Floyd county was organized in 1800.

Shown here is Second Street, looking south, in the first decade of the present century. On the left is the residence of W. S. Harkins, and on the extreme right is shown a corner of the H. H. Fitzpatrick general merchandise store. The streets were ungraded then.

A young man lived with his parents in a public housing development, attended a public school, and participated in the "free lunch" program. He entered military service and, upon discharge, retained his National Service Life Insurance.

He attended the State University and worked part-time at the State Capitol to supplement funds provided by his GI education check. Upon graduation he married a public health nurse, bought a home with a FHA loan, and obtained a RFC loan to go into business.

Their baby was born in the City hospital. Wanting some farm land and a home for his parents, he bought a small ranch with the aid of the veteran's land program. For his livestock he obtained emergency feed from the government.

Later he put part of his land in the soil bank and the payments he received soon paid for the ranch. His father and mother lived comfortably on the ranch with the help of their Social Security and old age assistance checks.

REA lines supplied electricity; the government helped him clear his land; the county agent showed him how to terrace it, and the government built a fish pond.

The writer of this article possesses materials to substantiate the precise accuracy and correctness of the facts as herein reported and will gladly make available same to anyone who wishes to avail himself of them. This person holds the B.A. degree and an Administration and Supervision Certificate from Morehead State College, the M.A. degree from the University of Kentucky and has completed one and one-half years of graduate study beyond the M.A. at the same institution. He has taught a number of years on the grade school and high school levels, and has served in administration and supervision.

On the basis of these findings, I, therefore, as a teacher in the Knott county schools, urge upon local school superintendents and local boards of education immediate adoption of the practices and procedures set forth herein. Such adoption would greatly improve our public school systems, place them on a strictly professional basis, encourage our teachers to remain in the state and in the profession of teaching, and elevate the dignity and service of the entire educational profession.
