### MUSIC DEATH UNRESOLVED BY OFFICERS

JUNE 20, 1963

Report of Pathologist At Ashland Is Awaited; Say Rumors Unfounded

The body of 18-year-old Hillard Gene Music, missing since Sunday, June 9, was removed last Sunday morning from Dewey Lake, approximately 250 yards from Terry's Boat Dock where he was last seen alive

But recovery of the body did not clear the circumstances surrounding his death. The body, recovered by nembers of the Floyd County Emerency & Rescue Squad, was immedately taken to the Kilgore-Collier Puneral Home, Catlettsburg, where an autopsy was performed by Dr. Stewart, Ashland pathologist,

Until the pathologist's report is made authorities will be without conclusive evidence as to the manner of the youth's death. Officials said rumors heard locally are without foundation, that condition of the body prevented their determining any of the circumstances of his death by physical examination.

The autopsy report is not expected until later in the week. The body floated to the rface

of the lake at 10:30 a.m. Sunday while Emergency & Rescue Squad divers were searching the lake bottom, a short distance from where recovery was made. The squad had dragged the lake two days without result

Music had been missing since about 5 p.m., June 9, when he leaped from a car driven by Fred McCoy, 19, near Hager Gap. He was last seen after he had waded across the shallow waters in the lake inlet, between Terry's dock and the shore. and had six led walking down-lake along the shore.





Dr. Kurt W. Deuschle, chairman of the steering committee which laid plans for the project, has previously stated that it is likely the case finding, treatment, prevention and surveillance methods which it is hoped to establish in Martin county, can be applied to other rural population groups in Kentucky and similar areas of the Appalachian region.

Those involved in the project are stressing the home treatment feature. All persons found with the active disease will receive prophylactic treatment managed by a clinical team based at the Ashland Tuberculosis hospital. Active cases requiring hospitalization will be admitted to the hospital, it was stated. BOG vaccination will be given only to those individuals where home prophylactic drugs are not advisable, Dr. Deuschle said.

He said it is recognized that a certain number of families will be uncooperative, therefore, social studying the problem and attempting to make recommendations to the medical team to enable them to obtain maximum cooperation in case finding and treatment.

It was revealed that patients being treated at the six state TB hospitals in Kentucky as of March 7, 1963, totaled 813. Patients with histoplasmosis or other pulmonary fungus diseases are now eligible for treatment in Kentucky's TB hospitals if facilities are not fully utilized in the treatment of TB patients.

During the past year, Dr. Hall pointed out, the Martin County Health Department has had one of 24 "field" outpatient clinics, viewed as one of the most significant recent developments in the fight against TB in Kentucky. Among the various advantages of such a system, he said, is the fact that medically indigent outpatients are issued drugs at the clinics instead of having to make a long trip to the tuberculosis hospital.

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

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

A question-and-answer period followed Dr. Wilson's presentation,


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
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
