The Floyd County Times is, essentially, a friend and supporter of the coal business, an industry upon which Eastern Kentucky has, in the absence of other industries. found it necessary to lean heavily.

Although the number of men which it employs is steadily dwindling, the coal business provides the area its biggest industrial payroll. Nobody has gone out hunting for representatives of this industry to locate here. No sites have been bought and given to coal-mine operators in return for the location of a mine in a county or near any given community. The men who have risked their capital have financed their own ventures, not even receiving any quarter from the federal government.

Yet, for all our awareness of the economic importance of the coal business to this region, we sincerely hope that the Pike countian who has sued in U. S. district court to restrain strip-mining of his lands wins his case.

Those old Northern Coal & Coke deeds simply had too much of infinity about them for this earth. Stripmining was not even a dream when they were executed. As the plaintiff, Elbert Roberts, has pointed out, the company now removing the coal on his land has a right to mine coal but it does not have a right to destroy his surface property.

Our sympathy with the plaintiff in this action does not necessarily mean that we are irrevocably opposed to all strip- or auger-mining. Men who have invested heavily in machinery to carry on this type of work have their rights, and if coal is not to lose out entirely to other fuels its production must be continued.

Yet we are committed to the theory that the landowner, his neighbors, the general public and the nation are entitled to consideration and that the mining of coal by stripping, augering or any other method which leaves the surface a livid sore and a disgrace to the society which countenances it must mend its ways

The twin dangers of erosion and flood are too great, the loss of top-soil and natural beauty in a land whose great natural beauty may indeed be its greatest resource is too heavy. Something has to give, and the land-owner has given too much, already.

Wherever the state and/or federal governments can and will enforce full and immediate steps to reclaim the damaged surface and where these types of mining can be carried on without permanent damage to the immediate vicinity and to other downstream properties and interests, work should be permitted to continue. But if this work is to demand of others a sacrifice of rights and possessions, it should be stopped.

And the land-owner does have some rights as possessor of the surface-rights, it is to be hoped, which are not to be violated by a mining method which takes not only the coal that is the company's but also much of the land that is the farmer's.

If Child Has School Problem Parents Usually Are At Fault

Last week I wrote about the school health examination. Today I must impress on you parents certain ideas that I consider of utmost importance.

lem-girls who cannot get along in school. How does all this start? Whose fault is it? Now I don't intend to lecture to you or to give you uninteresting psychological statements. I'm going to tell you just what I believe from having had a lot of grass-roots experience with problems of children.

First, it isn't true that it is always the parents' fault when something goes wrong. But it is almost always the parents' fault and it is always their responsibility.

Now let me tell you just a few of the many reasons some children cannot "make it" in school and "wind up behind the eight-ball:" I. Failure of the parents to supply the know-how of culture. of experience, of knowledge, and failure to set proper examples in the home from the time the child is born.

2. Illness of the child. 3. Mental retardation.

This may lead to frustration, to defiant behavior, to truancy and to

5. Having an unrecognized hearing loss or vision defect leading to poor schoolwork and then leading to faulty behavior and all

6. Getting in with wrong buddies-which leads to bad behavior. truancy, delinquency. Missing so much work that discouragement takes over, lead-

ing to truancy and faulty behavior. If your boy or girl gets a failing mark in school you should consider it as important as a bad case of scarlet fever or measles.

You should investigate immediately to find the cause and do everything you can to see it rectified and that it doesn't happen again. Work missed because of unnecessary absenteeism from school can never be made up completely. You must not allow your child


to stay out of school except for very serious reasons It is a parent's duty to know how well or how poorly his child is doing and not wait to find out until it is too late. This requires inquiries and interviews with the teacher from time to time. It

requires a thorough health examination of the child. Parents must take an interest in the curriculum, the homework, the child's friends, his hours of sleep and play and work, his whereabouts at all times and the possible need for extra help for school

work. Lack of parental responsibility is the cause of so many dropouts and so much delinquency. The home must be strengthened

How is your boy or girl going to make a living later if he or she doesn't learn now? I know there are fewer and fewer jobs for unskilled, uneducated boys and girls. Give your child a chance,

KENTUCKY CARDINAL, STATE BIRD OF SEVEN STATES

The colorful Kentucky Cardinal is the state bird of Kentucky, Indiana Illinois, North Carolina, Ohio, Vir ginia and West Virginia. It is also highly favored in many southern states, as it is of great value to southern cotton growers, since it destroys boll weevils. It also devours the codling moth, responsible for the white worm inside the apple.

Both the male and female card inals are the only red birds with a crest. The summer tanager is strawberry red all over but has no crest. The male cardinal is a brilliant scarlet with a black patch around his bill and throat; the female is dull reddish-brown, which affords her color protection against enemies. The cardinal has a short, stout bill, which enables it to crack seeds, or to eat grains of corn; so it does not migrate during the winter. If it flew south as do many other birds, our state would be lacking any state bird during the winter season. Some of the cardinal's famous phrases, which it whistles like a prima donna, are: "good cheer, good cheer! Wet year, wet year!" And it sometimes seems to imitate the farmers plowing their mules in the spring, when it whistles, "Gid-dup! Gid-dup!" It is an accomplished musician and is called "the aristocrat of the bird world;" perhaps the cardinal is. after all, the true "Kentucky Col-

The mockingbird, famous for its versatile powers of mimicry, runs the cardinal a close second in popularity, being the state bird of Arkansas, Florida, Mississippi, Tennessee and Texas - all southern make its home in the cottonfields.
