12-Mile Project Seen As Aid on Extension All Way To Letcher

An authorization of \$2,300,000 by President Kennedy of extra federal aid to match an equal amount provided by the Kenthe construction of a 12-mile sec extension from Campton to Va construction of this project al the way to Whitesburg, Commissioner of Highways Henry Ward said this week.

President Kennedy last weel approved the allocation of Area Redevelop ment Administration funds for this project at the request of Kentucky. This is the first grant of extra federal money of this character in the nation.

Ward said that the Highwa Department is moving to adver tise the Campton to VanClev project as quickly as possibl The project will include grade drain and surfacing at an est mated cost of \$4,600,000. The Commissioner said that it is prob vertise for two contracts so that the project can be broken into two sections to expedite the con struction, with the objective of having the contract completed and open to traffic within two

onstruction seasons The grant resulted from months long efforts by Governor Bert Combs and Commissioner Ward, which included several trips to Washington. They had the Secretary of Commerce, and Chairman of the President's Appalachian Regional Commission kins, Congressman for much of the Eastern Kentucky area.

Whitesburg. Construction of the 12-mile section will close an important gapfrom Campton to VanCleve by way of Bethany and connecting with an already completed section from VanCleve to Jackson. At the Campton end the highway connects with the Mountain Parkway, already in use from near Winchester to Campton and due to be opened another 33 miles from Campton to Salversville

The new project will be a portion of a freeway extension to the toll road, an extension which in time will stretch all the way to Whitesburg, A second freeway leg of the Parkway will extend from Salyersville via Prestonsburg to Pikeville and beyond.
