Tragedy has struck at the Jenny Wiley State Park boat dock on Dewey Lake. All the ducks are dead, save one lonely drake.

The ducks came to the lake, flying north with their wild kind, one spring, several years ago. A few were captured and their wings were clipped. They were fed at the dock, a year or so passed, and the wild ones were no longer wild. Autumn and spring, their brothers flew over, stopped briefly, but the ducks at the lake had found quiet haven and they resisted the impulse to take again to the skyways. The flock multiplied, and the ducks became one of the fascinations of the dock area.

This spring, the usual hatch came off, and the little ones waddled into the water and followed the mother ducks. But they survived only a few days. Duck attendants were mystified as the ducklings died. Then the older ducks began dying till only one was left at the dock. Two drakes were taken to Terry's boat dock, several miles down the lake, and they are yet living, but not a female remains.

Now, the fellows at the dock think they know what happened. Greens of the nearby golf course were sprayed to kill a troublesome pest. A variety of bugs got a dose of the poison and fell into the dock area where the ducks gobbled them up.

So, it is believed, silent death came to ducks. They had been spared the lethal blast of the hunter, but death has a way of coming to all that's living in many ways and guises.

## COURT ORDERS MENTAL TEST

### For Accused Slayer Of Woman; Hale Takes Pratt To Lexington

Grover Pratt, of Garrett, accused slayer of 18-year-old Phyllis Ann Sears, was taken today (Thursday) by Sheriff Henry C. Hale to Eastern State hospital, Lexington, for psychiatric examination. He is expected to be returned to the county jail here tonight.

Pratt waived examining trial last Friday, his attorney contending that Pratt was "not of mental capacity or of physical condition to be tried." Counsel then moved that the defendant be examined to determine his mental and physical condition. The motion for examination was granted, and Pratt, held without bond, was remanded to jail.

The shooting of Mrs. Sears took place at Garrett, the night of October 3, and she died at the Williamson Memorial hospital two days later. A pathologist's report, made at the request of County Judge Henry Stumbo, said she was shot seven times instead of five as originally reported. Bullets from a .22-caliber rifle struck her in the temporal region, the back of the neck, the left side of her chin, above the left elbow, above both knees and in the left thigh. The pathologist said the shot in the neck caused clinical paralysis and respiratory failure, resulting in death.

## FLOYD, TINDERBOX DRY, FACING LOSS TO FIRES

### COMBS CLOSES FOREST LANDS OF THE STATE

#### 22 Blazes in County Burn Over 4,600 Acres; Fire Crews Reinforced

The Division of Forestry personnel went to Big Stone Gap, Virginia, today (Thursday) to procure a bloodhound to use in tracking down persons suspected of setting incendiary forest fires.

Governor Bert T. Combs proclaimed an emergency in the state last Thursday and closed all forest lands to everybody except the owners, tenants and forestry service personnel.

Floyd county, a veritable tinderbox for weeks and growing dryer day by day, was bracing itself, as one forestry worker expressed it, for "a potential holocaust worse than 1953 when thousands of acres of woodlands were burned."

Eight crews, totalling 50 men, were in the woods Wednesday battling four huge fires and the number of men was being increased daily. More than 4,600 acres have been burned over by 22 fires since October 8, it was said by Arthur Leach, service forester.

Leach, in commenting on the situation, said that only one thing, the absence of any appreciable wind, was in favor of the firefighters. Contributing to the bad situation is low visibility. Many unseen fires spread before they are reported.

Two fires, one in Pike county, and one in Floyd on the Arkansas-Prater creek ridge, are definitely of incendiary origin, it is said. The latter burned over 360 acres before it was controlled. No arrests have yet been made. The Floyd fire was set in six places.

There has been no rainfall of any appreciable importance in the area since September 13 and meteorologists hold little hope for relief for several days. If the situation gets worse it may be necessary to call the National Guard into Eastern Kentucky.

Combs' proclamation closing the woods, cited the following Kentucky statute:

"It shall be unlawful, when the forest lands, brush lands and fields in this state or any part thereof have become so dry or parched as to create an extraordinary fire hazard endangering lives and property, for any person, except the owner, tenant or owner's authorized agent, persons regularly engaged in cutting, processing, or moving forest products, or persons on official duty, to enter or travel in any state, county, municipal or private forest lands, brush lands, fields or idle or abandoned lands in the area so affected except on public highways or well defined private roads."

## FIVE FIRMS ATTACK TAX

### Claim Floyd Extension Levy Unconstitutional; Injunction Is Sought

Five of the county's larger companies have filed suit in the Floyd circuit court attacking the constitutionality of the 3-cents-per-\$100-valuation levy which is known as the Cooperative Agriculture Extension Tax.

The action was filed last Thursday by the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company, the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company, Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Company, the Kentucky Hydrocarbon Company and the United Fuel Gas Company. Monday, the five plaintiffs tendered their payment of 1963 taxes, except for the agriculture extension tax, to Sheriff Henry C. Hale, but the checks were refused since the additional 8-cent levy had been added to tax bills prepared for collection. The suit names Floyd county as a body politic and Sheriff Hale as defendants.

The companies' complaint contends that the 50 cents per \$100 levied for county purposes is the maximum tax rate authorized for counties by Section 157 of the Kentucky Constitution and that the additional 3 cents or any other levy cannot be added without the assent of two-thirds of the voters voting at an election called for the purpose of approving or disapproving such additional levy. No such election was held.

## CLERK MAILS 173 BALLOTS

### To Qualified Applicants; Morehead Vans Requests, University Rans Second

County Clerk C. Ollie Robinson said Tuesday that 173 absentee ballots have been mailed to qualified applicants from this county. The deadline for applying for absentee ballots to be voted and tabulated with the November 5 totals was passed at midnight last Friday.

Those eligible to these ballots, Robinson said, are fulltime students residing outside the county, military personnel and their spouses and federal employees.

Floyd county students at Morehead State College led in filing for ballots for the November 5 election with 53, and University of Kentucky students were next with 37. Eastern State College at Richmond supplied 27 applications, Alice Lloyd College at Pippa Passes 19, and Berea College had 10. Only 16 members of the armed forces and their spouses asked for absentee ballots, the clerk said.

Registration of voters after the May primary and ending September 8 resulted in the addition of 577 to the voting rolls. Of these, 503 were Democrats and 74 were Republicans.

## ROOSEVELT TO RETURN FOR OFFICIAL TALKS

Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., chairman of the President's Appalachian Regional Commission, will return to Kentucky next month to discuss with state and local leaders the Commission's proposals for developing potentials in Eastern Kentucky.

John Whisman, head of the Kentucky Area Program Office and coordinating officer between the Conference of Appalachian Governors and P.A.R.C., said that Roosevelt and some 40 members of various federal agencies will meet Tuesday morning, Nov. 12, with state officials in Frankfort and with local Eastern Kentucky leaders in Lexington that afternoon.

Roosevelt and his party visited Eastern Kentucky in June on a fact-finding mission, talking with state officials and local civic leaders. One of the area conferences was held at Jenny Wiley State Park. The Nov. 12 visit will begin with a 10-day return tour, covering the Appalachian area. It will consolidate P.A.R.C.'s plan of action for Appalachia, to be presented to President John F. Kennedy late this year.

Whisman commented that the new conferences will emphasize the fact that P.A.R.C. has devised an Appalachian regional organization for which there is no precedent. It signifies a new approach to regional development, one in which there is provision for direct relation to local area organizations. Roosevelt, state officials and local leaders will tackle the priority needs of Eastern Kentucky—highways, timber and coal production, water resources, and job training, plus concentrated efforts to combine state, federal and private interests in making Appalachia the heart of America's tourist industry.

Area Redevelopment Administration, Roosevelt will be luncheon speaker at a statewide Kentucky Development Day sponsored annually by the Kentucky Council for Community and Area Development. Three to four hundred Council members and other interested persons are expected to gather for the annual forum Nov. 12 on the University of Kentucky campus in Lexington.

Theme of the luncheon address will be the process of economic development for the nation and Kentucky as a whole.

Roosevelt and his party will meet separately with Eastern Kentucky area leaders from 2-4 p.m.

Whisman, who is also secretary-treasurer of the Council, noted that Kentucky's leadership in initiating the regional approach to development, and the resultant formation of P.A.R.C., has already paid large dividends for the Commonwealth. He pointed to recent successes in obtaining federal grants for projects in Eastern Kentucky, including \$3.8 million to insure continued operation of the five United Mine Workers hospitals, \$2.3 million for construction of extensions of the Mountain Parkway and a \$3.5 million increase in the President's current budget for flood control. Such funds, Whisman said, previously were available only under requirements almost impossible for depressed areas to meet.

He added that Kentucky has exceeded all other states in Accelerated Public Works grants in proportion to population.

### Floyd P.-T.A. Council Backs Dropout Program; Cost To State Is Noted

The Floyd County P.-T.A. Council adopted at its Sept. 26 meeting at Wheelwright high school a resolution in support of the "back to school program for drop-outs."

Drop-outs in Floyd county are costing the school system better than \$1.00 per pupil per day, plus the loss of education to the pupil. Kentucky is one of the leading states in drop-outs. Kentucky students entering high school in 1953, only 58 out of every 100 completed high school; 95 out of every 100 delinquents in the nation were drop-outs; 75 out of every 100 inmates in Kentucky's reformatory are drop-outs; 80 out of every 100 who are in the state penitentiary are drop-outs.

The P.-T.A. Council urges all parents to make this their sole responsibility to see that their children attend school every day, and also make it their responsibility to attend their P.-T.A. meetings and talk with the teachers about their children's progress in school.

The Council will meet tonight (Thursday) at 7 o'clock at Wayland high school.

## APPROVE RECORD BUDGET FOR COLLEGE AND CENTER

The trustees of Alice Lloyd College and the Caney Creek Community Center approved the largest operating budget in the institution's 40-year history at the annual board meeting, held October 19. Nearly \$299,000 in estimated expenditures make up the 1963-'64 budget, which will afford 256 mountain youth—60 more than a year ago—an opportunity for college-level leadership training.

The operational figure represents the largest step yet in the college's new development program. Annual expenditures totalled \$234,000 in 1962-'63, \$150,000 in 1961-'62, and \$90,000 in 1960-'61. In addition to the

passage of the operating fund proposal, the trustees approved a capital funds budget of \$200,000. In other business the board, which serves both the College and the Center, voted to establish an education committee to handle the deliberation of academic affairs. Claude Frady, of Lexington, was appointed chairman of the new standing committee.

William S. Hayes, director of the college, reported on the institution's progress. Standing committee chairman, Devert Owens, Lexington, Claude Frady, Lexington, and William Hayes, Pippa Passes, reported on respective areas of development, education and finance.

The trustees also approved the appointment of Richard Rury, Elmira, New York, as business manager of the college.

Any child with a physical defect can attend the clinic if it has been referred by a physician. The Commission will examine those children under the age of 21.

"If the child requires further treatment then it will be referred to the Crippled Children's hospital in Louisville, where it will be treated to correct the physical defect," Dr. Russell Hall, said.

"If your child has a physical defect then you should contact your family doctor and make arrangements to attend the clinic," he added.

The clinic will be in operation from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Twenty-nine children from Martin county are also scheduled to attend this clinic.

## HALL CLAIMS HEAVY LOSS

### Construction Worker Asks Quarter-Million For Damage To Fingers

Darrell Hall, laborer employed last year in the construction of a bridge across Right Beaver Creek, near Hueysville, last Thursday filed suit in the Floyd circuit court, seeking to recover from the Porter Construction Company, James Henry Porter and the T. C. Young Construction Company a quarter-million dollars in damages, plus \$2,500 for doctor, medical and hospital bills.

The claim, possibly the heaviest to be made here for personal injury, alleges that Hall lost "large segments" of the fingers of both his hands through the negligent and careless operation by a Young Construction Company employee of a boom and crane used at the bridge site. He claims permanent loss of earning power.

Porter Construction, headed by James Henry Porter, was contractor on Ky. 7 from a point near Hueysville to the mouth of Raccoon on Salt Lick, and the bridge-building job to link the new road with Ky. 80 was sub-let to Young. The plaintiff claims that while a crane used on the bridge job was not in operation he was directed by one Ray Brown, crane operator, to climb a ladder to the boom for the purpose of removing a television wire. He alleges that while he was doing this Brown, without notice or warning, so negligently and carelessly operated the boom and crane as to cause his hands to be caught between the pulleys and cable.

## 2 FIRMS HERE BURGLARIZED

### Thieves Get \$200 Cash, Jewelry Haul in Breaks; Juveniles Jailed Here

Two Prestonsburg business places have been burglarized within the week at a loss of several hundred dollars in cash and merchandise.

Approximately \$200 in silver and \$1 bills were taken Saturday night from the safe of the Paul Francis Company on Lake Drive after thieves had chiselled open the office safe. The safe, Mr. Francis said, was ruined.

Shortly before 2 a.m. Wednesday, a front window of Castle's Jewelry Store on Court street was broken and several watches and rings were taken. Earl Castle, owner of the business, said between four and six watches and four rings are in the loot. He had not fully determined the extent of his loss, late Wednesday afternoon.

Entrance to the Francis building was effected by prying open a side door. Officers found clear fingerprints, but no arrest has been made. The jewelry store window was broken by a car jack which had been wrapped in a sweater. Mr. Castle said the thieves apparently reached inside the broken window, gathered up what they quickly could and fled. An auto was seen leaving the vicinity as police approached the store.

## ROADS, BRIDGE CEREMONY SET HERE, OCT. 11

### Campton-Salyersville Sector of Mt. Parkway To Be Dedicated Nov. 1

Not one but two red letter days for Eastern Kentuckians are set for next week when white ribbons will be cut to open and officially dedicate five important highway projects.

Next Thursday at 2 p.m., Governor Bert T. Combs, Highway Commissioner Henry Ward and other state officials will participate with local officials in ceremonies dedicating the completed 3.1-mile extension of the Mountain Parkway here and the four-lane bridge which connects the new highway with U. S. 23.

At 3 p.m., the same day, the new U. S. 23 between Auxier and Hager Hill, near Paintsville will be dedicated in ceremonies to be held at the highway bridge at the mouth of Johns Creek.

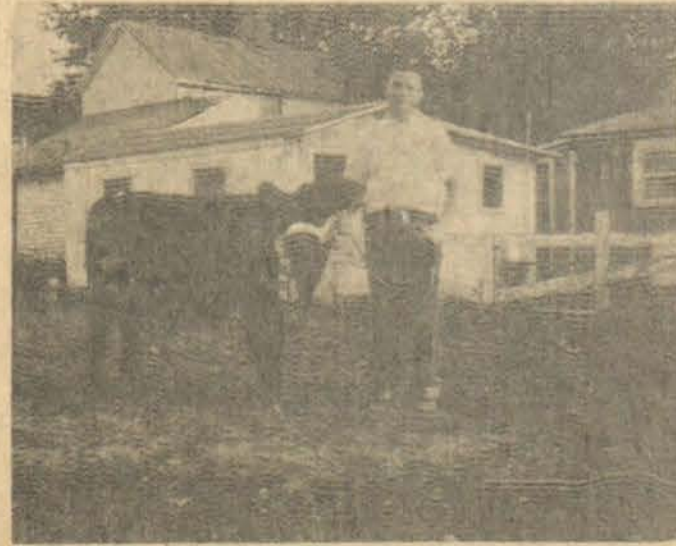
Next day, November 1, at 2:30 p.m., the Mountain Parkway from Campton to Salyersville will be dedicated on the new section of the Parkway near the Ky. 15 interchange and the toll plaza, approximately one mile east of Campton. That morning at 11, ceremonies opening the new highway district office at Jackson and the Parkway extension in Breathitt county from Van Cleve to Jackson will be held.

Governor Combs has invited all Kentuckians, and Eastern Kentuckians in particular, to attend the dedications.

Proceeds from a \$29 million bond issue were used to construct the final 3.1 miles of the Mountain Parkway in the record-breaking time of 16 months from Campton to Salyersville. The entire Parkway now stretches 76 miles from rolling Blue Grass lands into rugged, picturesque mountain country, all the way from Winchester to Salyersville.

Work was begun recently on the remainder of the Middle Creek section of the Parkway extension in this county and is set for completion next year.

Contract for the 3.1 miles of Parkway extension from Prestonsburg to the junction on Middle Creek of Ky. 114 with the David road and the bridge spanning the river was awarded jointly to the Kentucky Road Oiling Company and the Mattingly Bridge Company on their low bid of \$1,156,587. The project included two other bridges, one of which is an access route to West Prestonsburg.

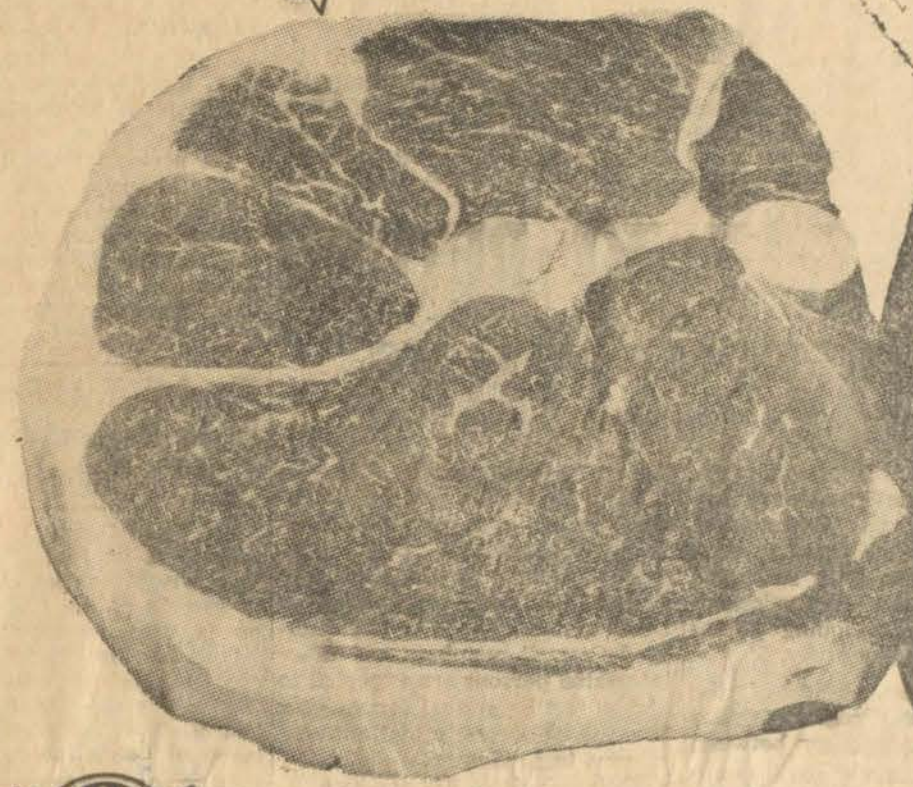

A Time To Say, "Thanks!"

Next Thursday, the four-lane bridge across the Big Sandy here, the first completed section of the Middle Creek extension of the Mountain Parkway and the new U. S. 23 between Auxier and Paintsville will be dedicated.

We know these improvements, most of which, four years ago, were not even dreamed of, are ours, whether they're dedicated to the use and benefit of the people or not. Yet it seems reasonable to expect the people of this county to express their appreciation of them by attending their formal opening.

There is a tendency on the part of all of us to take life-giving waters for granted until they dry up and are no more. By the same token, there is a human inclination to fight and scream for this improvement and that, and then when the fight is won to dismiss the victory with a shrug and a pat of our own individual backs.

Governor Bert T. Combs and Highway Commissioner Henry Ward, who joined in hand and mind and progressive spirit to make these things possible, will take part in the dedicatory exercises. They deserve our profoundest thanks, and we trust the number of us present to say so will be many.

Others Have Bootlegging, Too

Floyd is not the only county which has its liquor troubles. They're here, true; they've been here for many years—but these problems are not solely ours.

Only two Sundays ago, the sedate, Blue Grass town of Nicholasville saw approximately 25 state and federal officers in raids on five homes which yielded, according to a news report, hundreds of bottles of alcoholic beverages and which resulted in the arrests of five persons on charges of trafficking in liquor.

This is not to say that Floyd county's record is any cleaner because of the situation existing in Nicholasville and Jessamine county. It is intended to remind all and sundry that practically every county in Kentucky will surrender a sizeable number of liquor law violators when an earnest search for them is made. It is a reminder that each county needs to look to its own affairs.

Perhaps the following excerpts from the news-story dated October 17 telling of the Nicholasville situation will be helpful to the people of this county who are interested in enforcement of the liquor laws:

"The Nicholasville Chamber of Commerce, Jessamine county churches and civic organizations have formed a Citizens League for Effective Action for Nicholasville (CLEAN) in an effort to curb vice and crime here.

"Dr. D. B. Settles, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, said it had been in the planning stage for some time, but announcement of its formation was withheld until this week.

"Dr. Settles said the group would cooperate with local officials in every way but will ask for federal and state help if necessary.

"He said letters had been sent to 35 churches, seven civic groups and Asbury College. 'This is a cooperative thing, not just a chamber function,' Dr. Settles said. He said the policy-making body of the league will come from the leaders of the churches and civic groups."

Twenty Years Ago

(October 21, 1943)

Ten pre-Pearl Harbor fathers are on the list of 133 selectees notified by Draft Board 45 to appear here October 27 for examination at Huntington—but all 10 are volunteers. 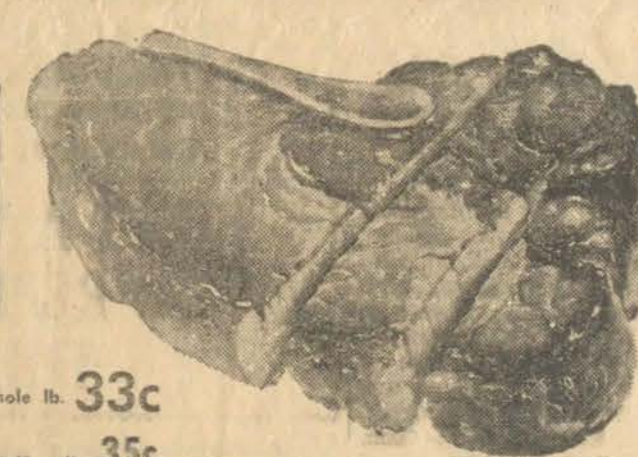

Instead, the fiscal court at its June 23, 1962 meeting acted on authority of KRS 275.010 and created the Floyd County District Cooperative Extension Service Board, specifying that the board would be composed of the county judge and six other citizens and that the board would be the governing body of the extension council.

A resolution adopted on the same date cited the 1962 District Cooperative Extension Service Act as intended to provide for aid in subjects relating to agriculture, home economics and rural and community life. The resolution pointed out that the fiscal court had been contributing to the extension and soil conservation services for several years, in an effort to provide the people of the county full agricultural opportunities offered by the University of Kentucky's extension service and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, that county revenues had been decreasing over the years and that it has been extremely difficult for the court to contribute to the two services and to cooperate fully.

This was followed by the creation of the extension district and the levying of the 3-cent tax. The order pointed out that KRS 275 authorized a levy up to 7 cents, but this amount was not asked.

The suit filed by the five companies last week asks common relief for all taxpayers of the county and seeks a permanent injunction to prevent the defendants, together with individual officers of the county and their successors, from assessing an ad valorem tax in excess of the limit prescribed by the constitution without having submitted the question to the voters. The plaintiffs also asked that the Sheriff be required to hold all monies collected by him through this levy until the case is finally decided, and that, if the levy is determined to be illegal, he be required to refund to individual taxpayers amounts illegally collected.

Plaintiffs' action pointed out that they had tendered payment of taxes in these amounts for the year 1963: Kentucky West Virginia Gas Co., \$111,557.64; Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company, \$104,956.99; Southern Bell, \$12,317.24; Kentucky Hydrocarbon, \$20,257.53; United Fuel, \$78,922.72.

The 3-cent levy, if collected, would add to each of these companies' tax total these amounts: Kentucky West Virginia, \$1,564.21; C. & O., \$1,467.14; Southern Bell, \$167.19; Kentucky Hydrocarbon, \$93.13; United Fuel, \$1,109.97.

Two other counties, Taylor and Hart, have joined the Lake Cumberland and South-Central regions, respectively, making a new total of 62 counties in the 12 library regions, Miss Willis said.

Funds spent by the State Department of Libraries for regional library and Bookmobile service during 1960-62 more than doubled the funds spent for this purpose during the two previous years, Miss Willis said, but the desire for even more service will be demonstrated again November 5 when another eight counties vote on a special local property tax for library service. (To date, 10 counties have voted favorably on the special library tax and eight have voted for additional library funds from their fiscal courts.)

Miss Willis explained that the library regions are multi-county federations headed by a professionally trained regional librarian, and an assistant in some regions, plus a clerical staff, all provided by the Department of Libraries. This headquarters receives regular shipments of library material—books, records, films, periodicals, and framed pictures—from the Department and distributes them to member libraries.

The headquarters library also contains a larger collection of specialized material and reference books which circulate among the member libraries as needed. Kentucky's 101 traveling li-

braries, the nation's largest state-owned Bookmobile fleet, visit areas which do not have convenient access to local libraries. Both children's and adults' books are carried regularly to communities and schools in 100 counties.

In the two fiscal years 1960-62, 24 new Bookmobiles, each with a capacity of 2,000 volumes, were purchased to replace older models holding only 900 volumes. Last fiscal year 16 of the older Bookmobiles were replaced with the larger ones. An additional 15 new models have been purchased by the Department and will be delivered to counties before the end of the year, making a total of 55 new Bookmobiles for the four-year period.

Funds for improved local library service and Bookmobile service totaled \$427,000 in fiscal year 1960-61 and \$517,000 in fiscal 1961-62, compared with \$209,000 for each of the two previous years, Miss Willis said.

In fiscal year 1960-61, the Department distributed Bookmobile books worth \$100,000 compared with \$60,000 for this purpose in 1959-60. In 1960-61, \$100,000 in state aid cash grants was distributed to qualifying libraries, doubling the amount distributed in 1959-60. The Department in 1960-61 spent \$45,000 in developing two library regions and distributed nine new Bookmobiles costing \$67,500. In 1961-62, funds for Bookmobile books and state aid to local libraries remained at the previous year's new high, and 15 new Bookmobiles costing \$104,000 were distributed.

Miss Willis pointed out that during the present 1962-64 biennium, the Department is providing each year \$117,000 for Bookmobile books and \$100,000 in state aid for libraries and Bookmobiles. The Department is also developing its 11th region, founded in February 1963, with headquarters in Nicholas county. It also includes the counties of Bath, Harrison, Lewis, Fleming, and Robertson and is known as the Buffalo Trace Region.

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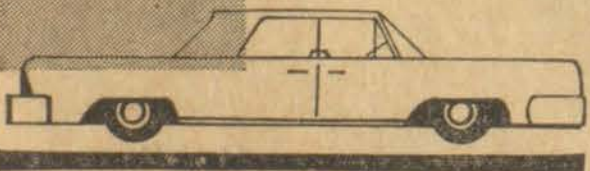

### KENTUCKY LEADS NATION IN HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

Frankfort, Ky., Oct. 21 (Spl.)—Kentucky still leads the nation in building better highways.

The U. S. Department of Commerce, which keeps a sharp eye on highway building, said that Kentucky awarded 700 contracts with its own money during the first seven months of this year. This is more than one-fourth of all such contracts awarded by 50 states. Kentucky's contracts covered improvements on 1,311 miles of roads—more than any other state.

Kentucky's strong position among the states is solidly based on local effort. In using its own money to improve its highway system, Kentucky has set a pace that is unmatched by any other state.

When the results of the state's own efforts are added to what it does with the help of the federal government, Kentucky stands second only to Texas in the number of miles of roads being improved.

In important areas of its highway program, Kentucky is moving

at a faster pace this year than in 1962, the all time record for road building in the state.

With three months yet to go in the year, both of Kentucky's programs for improving rural roads are ahead of 1962. Contracts awarded through September under the rural secondary program total \$8,013,392.61 compared to \$8,423,598.39 for all of last year. Rural highway contracts add up to \$284,143.23 for the first nine months of the year; the 1962 total was \$280,964.29.

On those roads where the federal and state governments share costs equally, contracts reached a total of \$23,262,728.06 through September. This is more than was done all of last year, and caps a steady four-year rise in this type of work.

**Facilities for Treating Women Alcoholics Slated At Danville Institution**

Frankfort, Ky., October 18 (Sp.)—The first ward for women alcoholic patients is scheduled to open this week at Kentucky State Hospital in Danville.

Dr. Harold L. McPheeters, commissioner of the State Department of Mental Health, said that 60 beds would be opened, 30 for women and 30 for men. Women will be admitted from the entire state.

Dr. William J. Kernohan is superintendent of the hospital. Dr. Mary N. Smith is in charge of the alcoholic unit.

Male patients eligible are those from the areas served by Kentucky State Hospital and by Eastern State Hospital in Lexington. A 50-bed ward for alcoholic men already is in operation at Western State Hospital in Hopkinsville.

**GIRL SCOUT COUNCIL IN SEMI-ANNUAL MEET**

The Sandy Valley Girl Scout Council held its semi-annual meeting at noon, October 10, at May Lodge, Jenny Wiley State Park.

Presiding at the meeting Mrs. Edward P. Hill, Council president, introduced Scout Troop No. 8 and its leader, Mrs. Virgil Goble, of Prestonsburg, who conducted the flag ceremony, pledge and Girl Scout proviso. Troops led by Mrs. Hubbard Francis, Mrs. Howard Doss Blackburn and Mrs. B. Howard were in charge of favors, registration and table decorations.

Representatives from each of the five districts were present.

Mrs. Hill announced that this was the final meeting of the Sandy Valley Council. She recalled that the Council had its beginning in 1943 with a lone troop of 24 girls. In 1944 Pike, Floyd and Letcher counties formed Sandy Valley Council and employed the first professional worker. In 1955 Johnson county was added. After a thorough study was made by local volunteers and advice was received from the Girl Scout national staff in 1959, Sandy Valley became a nine-county council.

**Diagnosis and Treatment Of Children Are Provided By Kentucky Commission**

Frankfort, Ky., October 18 (Sp.)—Diagnosis and treatment for 8,442 children were provided by the Kentucky Commission for Handicapped Children during the last fiscal year, according to Dr. Margaret A. Limper, acting medical director.

Total expenditures amounted to \$1,865,000, of which over \$1 million was spent for hospitalization, she added. Significant was that 88.3 per cent of the Commission's funds were used for direct medical and surgical services.

The Commission's out-patient diagnostic clinics, located in 29 centers throughout the state, made 19,500 examinations. An average of more than two clinics per working day were held, Dr. Limper said.

Services include diagnostic and treatment programs for orthopedic conditions, cerebral palsy, cleft lip and palate, heart conditions, neurosurgery, epilepsy, eye and many types of plastic surgery.

In addition to the services of physicians, surgeons, nurses, therapists and psychologists, the Commission made available for service approximately 100 part-time dentists in various areas of the state. These were primarily for cleft lip, palate cases or malocclusions associated with orthopedic conditions.

To be eligible for care, a patient must be under 21 years of age, and his parents unable to pay the total cost of medical treatment.

**High School Bandmen, Majorettes of Region Scheduled At Morehead**

Morehead, Ky., October 21 (Sp.)—More than 2,600 high school bandmen and majorettes from 40 high schools will be on the Morehead State College campus for the annual Band Day, Saturday, October 26. Prestonsburg high school's will be one of the bands taking part.

Highlighting the band day will be individual performances by 25 of the 40 bands during the morning program which will bet under way at 9 o'clock. Each of the 25 performing bands will give a six-minute show to be witnessed by the other bands and interested spectators. There will be no admission charged.

The bands will perform three numbers in a mass formation during halftime following a performance by the Morehead State College marching band.

Bill Svec, director of the Morehead State College marching band, is coordinator of the day's events which are being held in conjunction with an Ohio Valley Conference football game between Morehead and Middle Tennessee.

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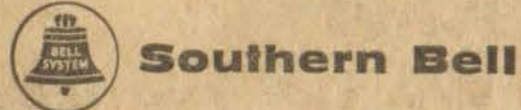

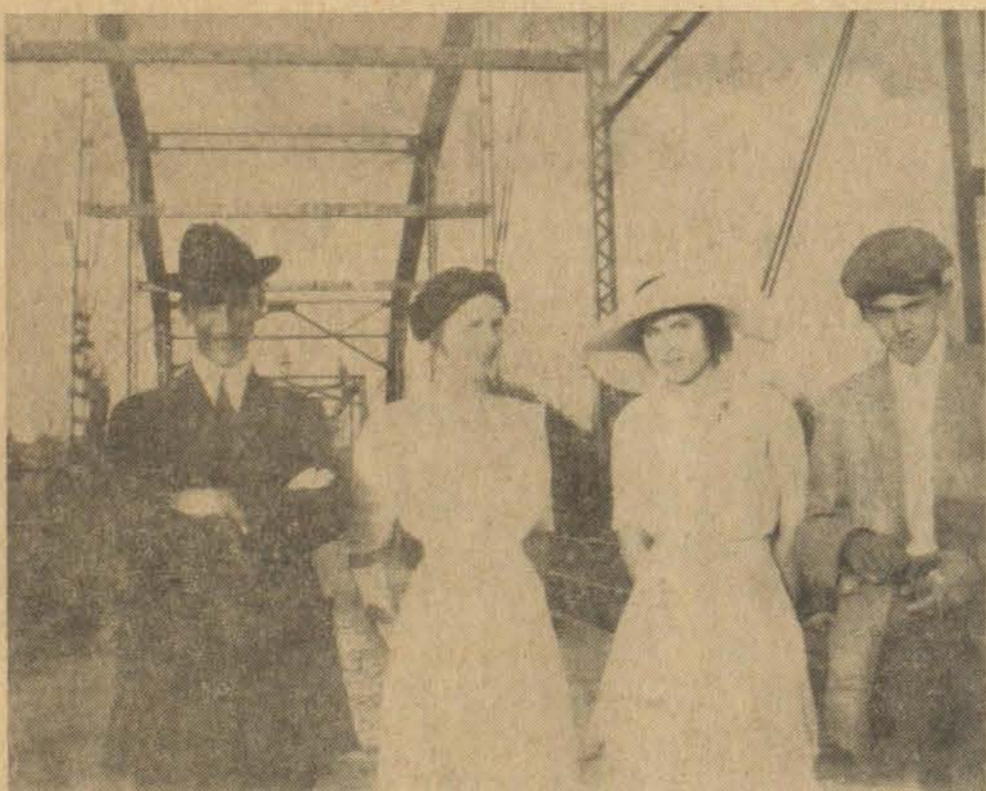

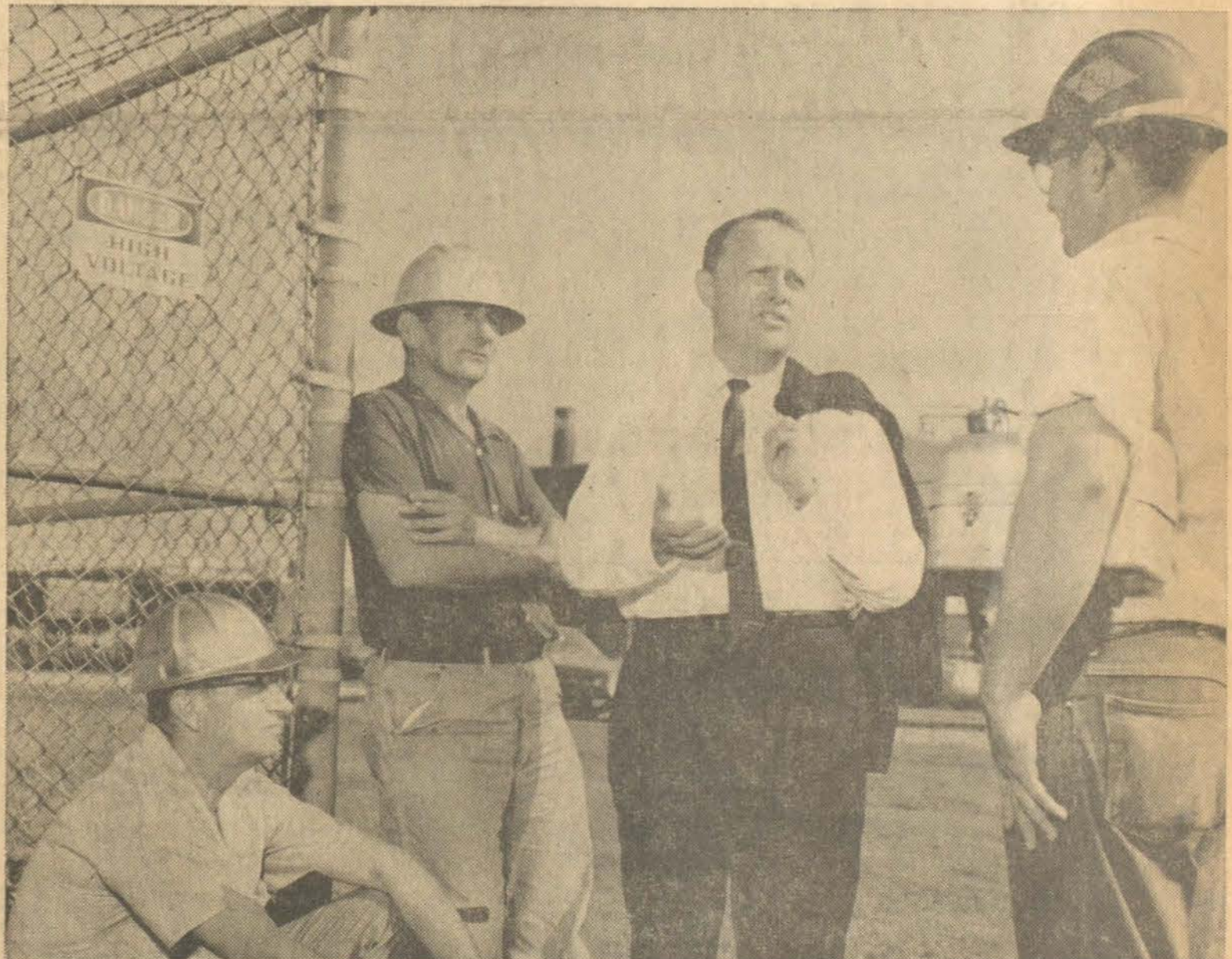

Floyd District Sponsors '63 Contest in Schools; Johnson Lists Awards

Last week the essay contest was announced, but the part the Floyd County Soil Conservation District plays was not included.  
The subject of the annual Soil Conservation Essay Contest for this year is, "Forest Conservation—How It Can Benefit My Community." The contest is sponsored locally by the Floyd County Soil Conservation District.  
The statewide sponsors, The Courier-Journal, Louisville Times and Radio Station WHAS, are offering prizes for the three top winners. First place in the state will be awarded \$200, second place will receive \$150, and the third place winner will be given \$100.

The following rules apply in this contest:

1. Any boy or girl enrolled in grade or high school in Floyd county may enter the contest.
2. Your essay must not exceed 1,000 words and the number of words must be shown on the first or cover sheet of the essay.
3. You may gather information from any source. Suggested sources include: School library references, soil conservation service technicians, vocation agriculture teachers, county agricultural agents, U. S. Department of Agriculture, University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, experience of local farmers and leaders.
4. All essays, beginning with the 6th grade and up, must be written in ink or typewritten on one side of the paper. From 5th grade down may write with pencil.
5. The essay must be signed by one of your parents and either your teacher or principal. It must bear the following certification, "I hereby certify that this essay is the original work of (your name)."
6. Place the following information on a separate sheet of paper and attach securely to the essay: Your name, age and grade, indicate Miss or Mrs., address, school and county.
7. All essays from a school must be taken to the office of the school superintendent not later than December 1, 1963.

Awards will be made by the Floyd County Soil Conservation District, first and second for each grade: For twelfth grade \$10 and \$9; eleventh grade, \$9 and \$8; tenth grade, \$7 and \$7; ninth grade, \$6 and \$6; eighth grade, \$5 and \$5; seventh grade, \$4 and \$4; sixth grade, \$4 and \$4; fifth grade, \$3 and \$3; fourth grade, \$3 and \$3; third grade, \$2 and \$2.  
In addition to these awards, there will be available a trophy to the high school and one to the grade school having the highest percentage of participation in the contest.

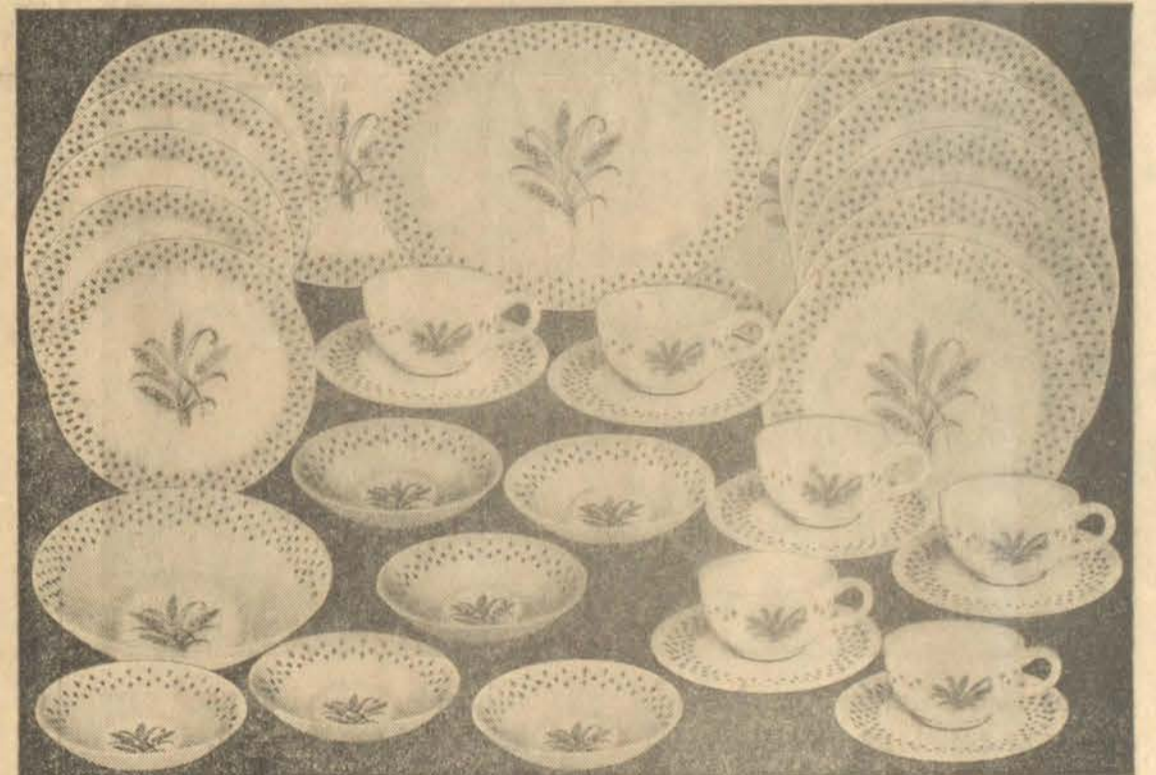

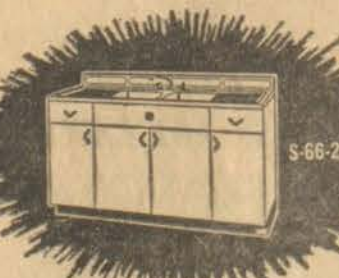

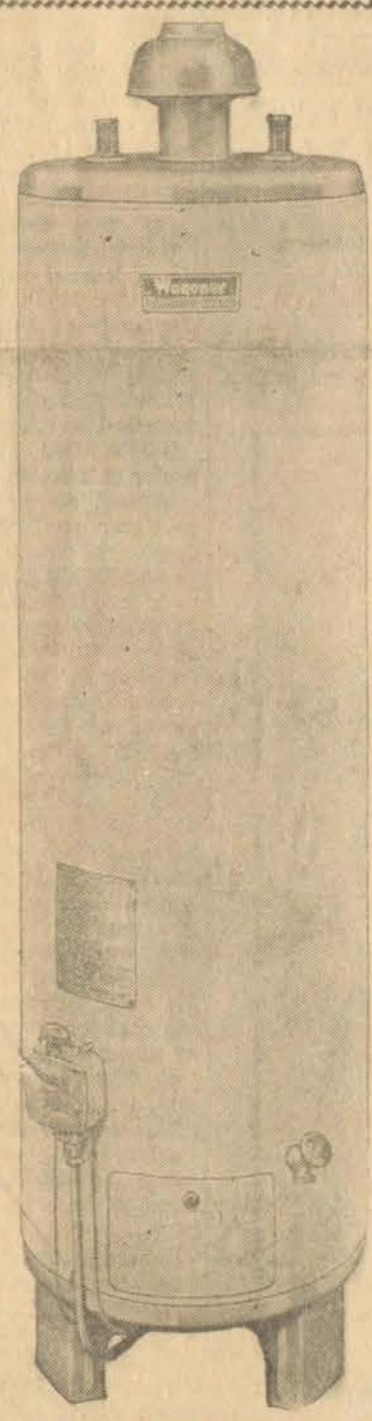

**ORDINANCE NO. 11-63**

An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Authorizing and Instructing the City Attorney of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, to Take Steps To Annex As A Part of the City of Prestonsburg Certain Territory Adjacent To the Eastern City Limits of Said City, Lying in Trimble Branch, and A Certain Area of Land and Territory Lying on the Eastern Side of the Auxier Road, Near Green Acres Housing Project, and Known As the Presbyterian Church Property.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I. That the City Attorney institute an action and file a petition in the Floyd Circuit Court, within thirty days after the adoption and required publication and advertisement of this ordinance, according to law, to annex as a part of the City of Prestonsburg the following described territory:

(a) That certain territory and property belonging to the Harkins Heirs, located adjacent to the eastern corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, as now situated, and more particularly located and comprising 163.54 acres in the head of Trimble Branch, more particularly described as follows:

BEGINNING at a stake in the center of Trimble Branch, being the southwest corner to Farm No. 4, as shown on Plat of Harkins Subdivision of Trimble Branch; thence in a northerly direction on the common line of Farm No. 4 and Baby Farm No. 4 up the point to the top of the hill; thence with the top of the hill in an easterly direction around to the head of the branch; thence with the top of the hill around the head of the branch, and thence with the top of the hill to a high knob; thence in a southwestern direction down the hill to a stake at the corner where Highland Avenue, Court Street and Cemetery Street join; thence with Cemetery Street in a western direction to the center of said Trimble Branch; thence up the center of said Trimble Branch to the point of beginning, so as to include all of Farms 1, 2, 3 and 4, as shown on said map.

(b) The Presbyterian Church property, lying on the eastern corporate limits, as now situated, and on the Auxier Road, opposite the Green Acres housing project site, and more particularly described as follows:

A certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in Floyd county, Kentucky. Said tract of land being a part of the Rainley White property near the mouth of May's Branch, off Levisa Fork of Big Sandy River, and more particularly bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a Highway Right-of-Way concrete monument about 50' from the center of and East of Highway, and also the Northwest corner of Parcel No. 1, John Burke, Kentucky Department of Highways; thence up the hill S 74° 20' E 452.70 feet to an iron pin and corner to Rainley White and John Burke, parcel No. 1, thence S 22° 56' W, 201.23 feet to an iron pin, a corner to Rainley White, Parcel No. 1 and 2, thence down the hill between Parcels No. 1 and 2, N 74° 20' W 423.02 feet to a stake and corner to Parcel No. 1 and 2, thence with the Highway Right-of-Way to the beginning.

SECTION II. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict herewith, are hereby expressly repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION III. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from this date, after publication as required by law and the provisions of this Ordinance.

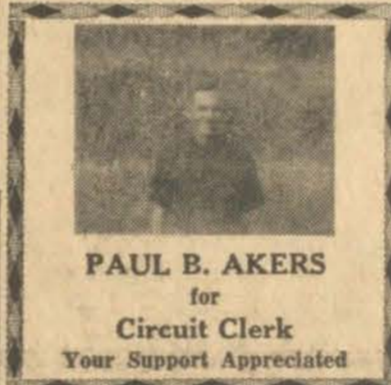
(Continued from Page One) tions of conservation officers, district supervisors and farmers have combined to project a most optimistic forecast for the bunny population this fall in just about every section of the state.

Mall carriers, cooperating with the department in a sight survey of young rabbits on given routes during the month of June, report an increase of better than 20 percent over the like observations made last year over the same routes. Granting that the rabbit population last fall was down, an increase of one-fifth would mean that shooting will be much more frequent this fall than for several years past. And the surveys of the mall carriers have been substantiated by reports of conservation officers from almost all sections of the state. They claim a moderate to excellent increase in the crop of young rabbits and all supervisors, in the nine wildlife regions, report better crops of young rabbits than last year. Further inquiries among farmers have borne out the statements of these officers and surveyors. Take, for instance, one farmer in Anderson county. Last year he cut a 15-acre pasture and weed field and saw not one rabbit. This year, the same field revealed 15 young rabbits. And so it goes throughout the state. Almost without exception the farmers are of the opinion that the rabbit population is on the increase.

Of course, the department points out, these early summer surveys can be knocked for a loop by unfavorable weather which tends to kill off young rabbits, or by a disease outbreak in the late summer or early fall that would ravage the rabbit population, but notwithstanding these possibilities, the outlook as of late August was extremely bright.

The hunting season this year for rabbits will open on the third Thursday in November. The opening date is November 21 and the season continues through January 19, with a bag limit unchanged at eight per day or 16 after two or more days of hunting.

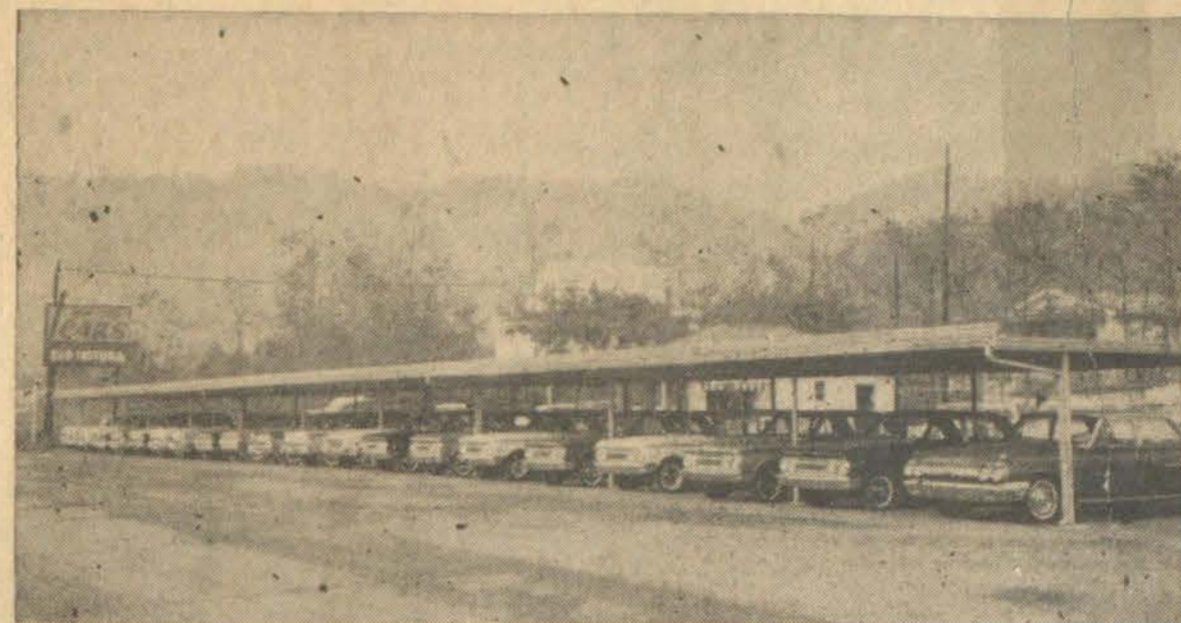

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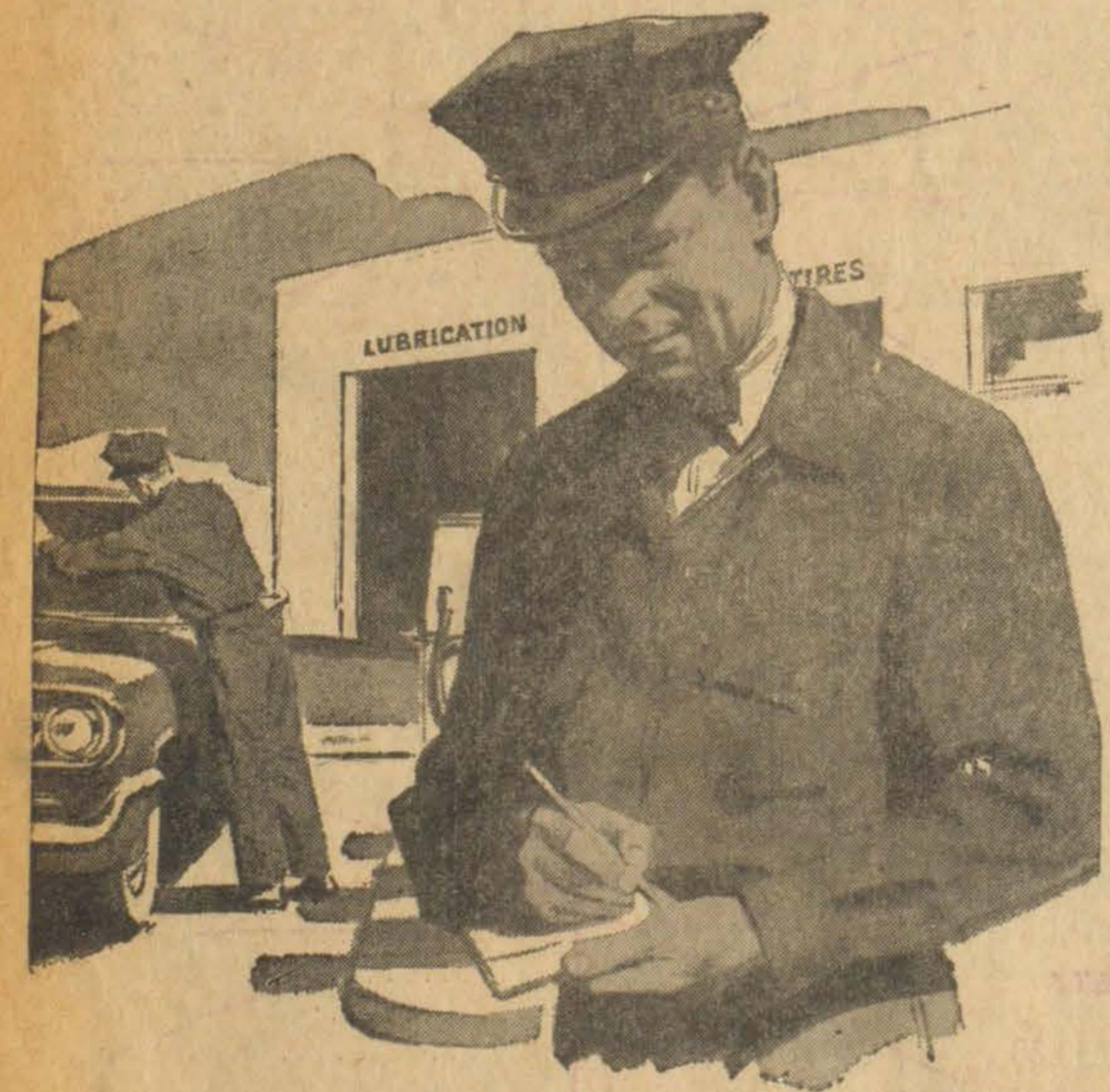
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
