## This Town... That World

October's bright, blue, smoky weather!

### THIS YEAR'S BAMBI ARE MANY

If there is a movie worth seeing, and I think there is, "Bambi" is it. The film is rather ancient now, but its story and its message are as new as the latest forest fire.

In this film the magic of Walt Disney shows the peace and the happiness of the wild things in their primeval domain. Then man, the destroyer, comes, and death—the hunter's gun. The serpent comes to Eden.

Last week, in less dramatic form because the human eye happily could not encompass all the tragedy and desperation that filled the hollows and coves, "Bambi" was re-written, here in our hills. The wild things did not speak, as in the movie, but some of the things men saw were more hauntingly eloquent than words.

In Mare Creek, far up toward the very head of it, for instance, there the fire was halted after it had turned Harmon's Branch, Cowpen and Caney, across the mountain, into a holocaust. And into this sanctuary poured literally thousands of birds, some of which were species observers said they had never seen—all fugitives from the flames. One man counted twenty-three Kentucky Cardinals in one spot. The chirruping and chattering was almost deafening, and one wondered if (See Story No. 1, Page 8)

## ACCUSED MAN IS RETURNED

### For Psychiatric Tests; Period of Observation Scheduled At Lexington

Grover Pratt, of Garrett, accused slayer of Phyllis Ann Sears, 18, of Melvin, was returned Tuesday morning to Eastern State hospital, Lexington, for a 35-day period of psychiatric observation and possible treatment.

The order committing Pratt to the institution issued Monday from the Floyd circuit court. Pratt was taken to the Lexington hospital for examination last Thursday on an order from the Floyd county court, but no attempt at a complete examination was made that day and Pratt was returned to jail here.

The statement signed by Dr. George P. Archer and Dr. J. D. Adams in connection with the petition for committal made by Pratt's brother, John Pratt, simply stated, "Court had patient sent to Eastern State Hospital for evaluation. Staff requested 35-day committal."

Pratt is not under bond. When his case was called for examining trial, early last week, he waived the case to the grand jury without preliminary hearing and was remanded to jail without bond. At the time the case was up for examining trial defendant's counsel contended he was not in physical or mental condition to undergo such a hearing.

He allegedly fired seven bullets from a .22-caliber rifle into Mrs. Sears' body, the night of Oct. 3, as she sat in an auto at Garrett, holding a kinswoman's baby in her lap. She died at Williamson Memorial hospital, two days later.

## FLOYD VOTING RESULT GUESSES VARY WIDELY

### GOP EXPECTS REDUCED LEAD BY OPPOSITION

#### But Some Democrats See Breathitt Edge Heavier Than Combs'

Party leaders on both sides of the fence in the November election campaign agree that traditionally Democratic Floyd county will give Edward T. Breathitt, Democrat, a healthy majority next Tuesday over his Republican opponent in the gubernatorial race, Louie B. Nunn—but there their agreement ends.

Some Republican leaders say Breathitt's majority will not exceed 4,500 votes—less than half the majority polled four years ago by Governor Bert T. Combs over John M. Robison, Republican. On the other hand, some Democratic leaders predict a 7,000-vote Breathitt margin, with one or two suggesting that his majority may even top that polled by Combs.

Generally speaking, the campaign has been on the same side. The faithful of both parties have made a valiant effort to whoop it up but, in the absence of a strong party fight at the county level, have not wholly succeeded.

Only two Democratic candidates to be elected solely by Floyd county votes are opposed—Frank DeRossett, by Paul B. Akers for Circuit Clerk; W. J. (Bill) Reynolds, Jr., by Ben Ferguson, Jr., for Representative in Legislative District No. 95.

A City Council election in Prestonsburg will add to local interest and is expected to increase the vote total materially. Wheelwright, Martin, Wayland and Allen have their city elections but candidates there are without opposition.

Almost forgotten are two "candidates" on the ballot—Constitutional Amendments 1 and 2. The first submits to the voters the question, "Shall Section 246 of the Constitution of Kentucky be amended so as to provide that the General Assembly shall limit the maximum compensation of all public officers and employees." The second, if approved, would (1) permit not more than five amendments to be voted upon at any one time; (2) eliminate the requirement that the next General Assembly shall concur in a law passed by the General Assembly to take the sense of the people as to the necessity and expediency of calling a convention for the purpose of revising or amending the Constitution; and (3) require that before any Constitution agreed on by a convention shall take effect, the same shall be submitted to the voters of the state, after at least 90 days' notice, and ratified by a majority of those voting.

## NUNN BRINGS EFFORT HERE

### Three Appearances Made In Floyd County; Says State Neglected Area

Republican gubernatorial candidate, Louie B. Nunn, appeared at three points in this county last Thursday—at Republican headquarters here, at Slick Rock on Cow Creek and later at Grethel on Mud Creek—during a campaign swing through Eastern Kentucky.

"Because of the failures of state government to give you schools, roads and other things you need, you're probably the most underprivileged people in the United States," he told a gathering of approximately 100 at Republican headquarters.

"He told his listeners that they were in part to blame for 'conditions that are a disgrace not only to you but to all Kentucky.'" "Past Democratic administrations 'have always counted your votes in the ballot box even before they were cast,'" Nunn said. "They've felt they didn't have to do anything for you."

"Give us an opportunity to do what must be done to open up Eastern Kentucky, to give you what you deserve, to stop the neglect that you have had to endure," he said.

The Republican said this neglect has brought about economic conditions that were the subject of newspaper articles telling of "pinched, hungry children, squalid cabins, unpainted shacks that are used for schools."

## Rev. Shockey Schedules Allen Revival Services

Rev. Robert L. Shockey, evangelist and pastor of the Second Free Will Baptist Church, of Ashland, will begin a series of revival services November 10 at Allen, it is announced by Rev. Johnnie Conley. All services begin at 7 p.m., he said.

The revival will be conducted at the old Mack Theatre building and will continue for several days. Special singing is being provided.

Rev. Shockey, a Letcher county native, has had an outstanding success as a revival minister and the public is invited to hear him.

## COUNCIL ACTS TO REFINANCE

### Old Bond Indebtedness On Assurance \$25,000 Saving To Be Result

The Prestonsburg City Council last week enacted an ordinance authorizing the issuance of water and sewer revenue refunding bonds as a means of refinancing old bond indebtedness at a lower rate of interest.

The refinancing action was taken after a representative of F. L. Dupree & Company, of Lexington and Harlan, guaranteed a saving to the city of "at least" \$25,000 in interest.

It was explained to the Council that Dupree & Company would be able to sell the new refunding bonds on the current more favorable bond market, making the saving possible. This type of refunding was recently upheld by the Court of Appeals, and it was said Prestonsburg is one of the first municipalities in Kentucky to take advantage of it.

## HILL TO HEAR CIVIL ACTIONS

### Last Criminal Term For Present Judge Past; List Jurors

Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill has presided at the last of the criminal court sessions of his term, it was said this week when it was announced that the November term of court, usually devoted to the trial of criminal cases, will hear only civil actions. The term will convene, November 11.

The January court session, heretofore devoted as a rule to the hearing of criminal trials, will convene January 6, and the first two weeks will hear civil suits, the trial of criminal cases being slated to begin January 20.

Commonwealth's Attorney Hollie Conley will begin his term of office as Circuit Judge with the January court term. (See Story No. 3, Page 8)

## WOODLAND FIRES BURN 6,500 ACRES IN FLOYD

Fifty-eight fires have burned over 6,500 acres of woodlands in this county since October 8, it was said Wednesday by Arthur Leach, service forester. Eleven fires were still burning Wednesday afternoon, most of them having been fanned to new starts by the wind which rose Monday evening.

Approximately 60 men in several crews were battling the blazes Wednesday but most of them were approaching exhaustion. Most of the crews have had 14-hour or longer days for 20 days. Attempts to recruit help in local communities have met with little success.

The largest fire in Floyd county, and the one that has given the most trouble, seared 1,800 acres of forest between Sugar Loaf and Dwayne. On the week-end firefighters had it under control but the wind whipped it to new life Tuesday evening.

Leach said that there have been 153 fires in the Eastern district composed of Floyd, Pike, Magoffin, Martin, Johnson and Lawrence counties. The biggest fire in the district was still raging Wednesday on Brushy Fork of Johns Creek and over the watershed in Martin county. It will have burned over 6,000 acres before it can be controlled.

A bloodhound, borrowed from the Virginia Forest Service, was used during the week-end in an attempt

## KSBMA TALKS '64 PROGRAM

### Board Members, Others Meet At May Lodge Here; Legislation Is Talked

The Kentucky School Board Members Association regional meeting held Friday at May Lodge, Jenny Wiley State Park, discussed the group's proposed 1964 legislative program and endorsed it as proposed. The Lawmaking program as envisioned by the group is similar to that of the Kentucky Education Association.

All county superintendents of the five-county area of Pike, Floyd, Johnson, Magoffin and Martin were present, as were 34 board members from the region. Bill Blair, Floyd county board member, and vice-president of the group, presided in the absence of Cecil Sherman, of Manton, president. Floyd County Superintendent of Schools Charles F. Clark welcomed the group in a short talk.

Blair was elected president of the Association for the ensuing year. Clark was named secretary and G. F. Johnson, of Pike county, vice-president.

The 1964 legislative program of the Association has these salient points:

1. Indemnity from tort liability to the state's public boards of education with liability protection for individual board members arising from acts of the board.
2. Establish the operating school tax ceiling rate at \$2.00 and permit boards of education to further adjust the rate when assessments decline below a ratio of 30 percent.
3. Amendment of the teacher ten-

## TOURIST AID CENTER SEEN IN P'BURG AREA

Governor Bert Combs announced this week that a major tourist information center will be built by the state in the Prestonsburg area to serve the mountain region.

The center is intended to serve the increasing number of tourists expected in this area as a result of the Mountain Parkway, other highway improvements and construction of new park and vacation facilities in the region.

Public Information Commissioner Cattie Lou Miller, whose department will operate the center, last week inspected possible sites on U. S. 23 and in Prestonsburg. She was accompanied on the inspection tour by William Knight, director of the Tourist and Travel Division of

the Public Information Department, and by Keith Ashby, Finance Department engineer.

Miss Miller said she, Knight and Ashby located at least three possible sites, "any one of which would be an ideal site for an information center to serve tourists in the scenic mountain area."

An estimate of the cost of the building which will house the information center cannot be made until architects' plans are completed, Miss Miller said. "We expect," she added, "to put up an attractive structure that will be worthy of the purpose it is intended to serve."

A tourist information center will also be opened by the Public Information Department next spring near Pineville. The two centers will provide information for tourists at locations both north and south of a mountain area whose tourist attractions are growing in number and importance.

## THREE YOUTHS ARE ARRESTED

### Jewelry Store Break, Robbery Is Admitted; Fire Warden Assaulted

Three youths who were arrested for breaking into Castle's Jewelry Store on Court street here last week have admitted their guilt and are at Liberty under \$2,000 bond each, it was said Wednesday at the County Judge's office.

The three, who are accused of breaking a window of the store and of taking several watches and rings, are Otis Cisco, 18, Fred McCoy, 19, and David Ollie Blackburn, 18. They were arrested by Chief of Police Bill Potter and Deputy Sheriff Lonnie Herald. The officers recovered most of the loot.

The youths also are accused of stealing three wheels from cars at Bruce Walters Ford Sales here, the night of the jewelry store break.

Nobody has been arrested in the break made into the Paul Francis Wholesale here, a few nights prior to the Castle store entry.

Alleged interference with a fire warden in the performance of his duties resulted in the jailing here, Saturday night and Sunday, of Curtis Goodman, Keen Goodman and Jack Lewis, all of the Buck's Branch community, near Martin. The third victim of a Nelsonville, Ohio, highway accident which occurred October 12 was claimed October 15 when Heston Scarberry, two-year-old son of Mrs. Victoria Scarberry, died at an Oak Hill, Ohio, hospital. The mother was killed instantly in the accident, and Earl Edwards, 64, Carbondale, Ohio, succumbed to multiple injuries.

The Scarberry family, formerly of Melvin, was returning at the time of the tragedy to Nelsonville after attending the funeral of Phyllis Sears at Melvin.

## MAYOR SETS SPECIAL DAY FOR GOVERNOR

### Parkway Extension, US 23 Sector Opened In Day's Ceremonies

Governor Bert Combs was back home today (Thursday) to join other officials, state and local, in the dedication of two important highways in this county.

In recognition of the Governor's part in bringing to this county and section these improvements, Prestonsburg Mayor George P. Archer has proclaimed today Bert Combs Day and has requested business houses here to close during the dedicatory ceremonies, between the hours of 2 and 3 p.m.

Dedication of the new three-mile section of Ky. 114, a part of the eastern leg of the Freeway Extension of the Mountain Parkway, is being held at 2 p.m. on the new four-lane bridge which is a part of the \$3,755,000 highway project and which crosses the Big Sandy into Prestonsburg.

Appearing on the program with Governor Combs were Highway Commissioner Henry Ward, state and local officials. The Prestonsburg high school band rendered the music program.

Following the dedication ceremonies here, the Governor and members of his party drove to the Floyd-Johnson line where a ribbon was cut on the new bridge spanning Johns Creek, formally opening a five-mile section of the new US 23 from Auxler to Hager Hill. This work was completed recently at a cost of approximately \$5 million.

Governor Combs, Mr. Ward and other state officials arrived this morning by plane, landing on the new runway at Prestonsburg-Paintsville airport, which borders the new US 23, on Route East Point. These were among the first planes to use the field, surfacing of which is not expected to be completed before early next week.

The airfield is 3,800 feet in length, the landing strip itself is 2,300 feet long and will accommodate two-engine planes, it was said.

## CITY RECEIVES \$20,400 AID

### Federal Check is 75% Of Allocation Made For Restoration Job

The City of Prestonsburg received a grant of \$20,400 this week from the federal government for restoration of facilities needed following the flood last spring. The grant is 75 percent of a total of \$27,227 allocated to meet expected expenditures.

A check for the outright grant was mailed to Mayor George P. Archer by Arthur Y. Lloyd, Major-General, Kentucky National Guard, and director of Kentucky Civil Defense, Frankfort. The work, chiefly the repair of damaged sewer service, must be completed by March 12, 1964, which is one year from the date the damage occurred.

Partial completion of the sewer and other work has been made, it is said. The grant was a result of estimates made by federal specialists here following the flood.

It was not indicated when the remainder of the grant would be made available to the city.

## LIBRARIANS HOLD MEET

### At Prestonsburg High; Pike Supervisor Talks On Effective Programs

Mr. Maynard again addressed the general session on the topic, "What the Assistant Can Do to Promote the Library Program." Doom of Ishmael Scott, convicted murderer of Martin Stephens, Garrett merchant, was sealed last week when Governor Ruby Laffoon signed the death warrant setting November 3 as the time for Scott's electrocution at Eddyville prison. Ex-Congressman William D. Upshaw, 1932 candidate for the Presidency on the Prohibition ticket, will appear here Tuesday morning in an address against repeal of the 18th amendment. Richard Sammons, 59, of Greasy, Johnson county, was found dead on the May 9 trail at the curve near Bald Alley, Sunday night, the victim of a hit-and-run driver. Carlos King, 30 years old, motorman for the Inland Steel Company, was fatally injured Friday in the mines at Wheelwright, when a "trip" of cars struck his motor at high speed and piled onto him. Frank Ratliff, 23, was shot and instantly killed Sunday afternoon on the Raccoon Fork of Salt Lick Creek, as the result of objections Ratliff made to obscene language then being used in the presence of girls. Mr. and Mrs. John W. Caudill were injured, the latter seriously, Thursday night when their auto collided with another a few miles from West Liberty. ## Twenty Years Ago

Kentucky's long drought was not ended by the light rain that fell over the week-end, but the dampness was considered extensive enough by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources to open the woods again to hunters. Monroe Watkins, 32, of Buckeye Fork of Middle Creek, became the first fatality ever to occur in the No. 2 mine of the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company, at Permele, Tuesday, when he was caught between the roof of the mine and the top of a moving coal car. Dr. Robert M. Sirkle, of Prestonsburg, retired as grand master of the Grand Lodge of Kentucky Masons with the close of the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge, last week in Louisville, while John Wesley Hall, of Martin, was elected grand junior warden. A U. S. Air Force jet, low on fuel, crashed into a hillside near Blaine, Morgan county, Tuesday evening. The pilot, Maj. William D. Britton, parachuted to safety. Congressman Carl D. Perkins has protested to Arthur S. Flemming, director of the Office of Defense Mobilization, against O.D.M. action in suspending a regulation that gave defense contracts to labor-surplus areas, such as Eastern Kentucky, if the area could meet low bid specifications. A total Floyd county vote of 12,000 more is predicted for next Tuesday's election. Past performances and records mean little, if anything, in this friendly grid rivalry that is one of the oldest in the Big Sandy area. Paintsville has won the last four meetings, but, prior to that, Prestonsburg won three in a row.

Bert Dixon's Black Cats showed considerable improvement in blocking in rolling over M. C. Napier, 33-0, last Friday and Paintsville was suffering its first defeat in 18 games in losing, 19-7, to Jenkins, a team which beat Prestonsburg 46-0.

Walter Brugh's team won, 20-6, last year and from that team he has quarterback Bobby Porter, halfback D. B. Kazee and Jim Allen as the main weapons in last season's victory.

Paintsville has one more game with Mt. Sterling, next week, while the Black Cats will begin basketball practice in full force.

On the basketball scene, the Wayland Wasps won the area's first game of the 1963-64 season last Saturday night as they belted 81-75, 109-58. This Saturday night, Wayland will visit Maytown and in another Saturday night game Martin goes to McDowell.

Friday night, Martin will open its home season against the Betsy Layne Bobcats.

**WEEK-END TO RING DOWN**  
**CURTAIN ON GRID SEASON**

This week-end will mark the end of the high school football season for the majority of the schools in the area. Paintsville, Jenkins and Elkhorn City still have a stake in the playoffs and league title.

The Cavaliers have already salted away the Class AA Region 4, District 2 title and if they can win over Pikeville this Saturday afternoon, Raymond Rickett's eleven will also wear the Eastern Kentucky Mountain Conference crown.

Jenkins added to its prestige by dumping previously unbeaten Paintsville, 19-7, ending an 18-game winning streak for the Johnson county Tigers. 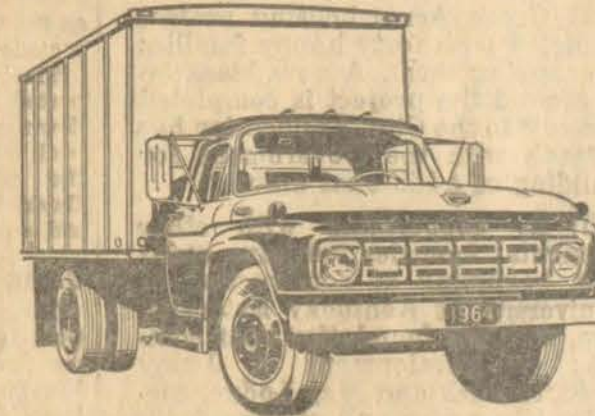

for themselves."

He noted that his Democratic opponent, Edward T. "Ned" Breathitt, had promised jobs if elected governor. Saying that Breathitt had as "right-hand man" of Governor Bert T. Combs for 3 1/2 years, Nunn said that Breathitt "doesn't deserve your vote if he let the people of Eastern Kentucky remain jobless, starving, and on welfare during that 3 1/2 years. If he has the secret of new jobs why didn't he let the Governor in on it?"

The Republican said he would complete the Mountain Parkway and also said he would work to link it with Interstate 64 with a road from Campton to Grayson. He said this would "open up this entire area and promote new industry and a great tourist industry."

Nunn said Breathitt was distributing "disgraceful" handbills promising to increase welfare checks by \$18 a month and saying the Republicans would cut them if elected.

"Let me promise you this. I will never use your very life's subsistence in order to try to control a political campaign."

The Republican candidate said his welfare program would be based on the cost of living and more state funds would be used to match federal money available for such programs.

**STATEMENT OF MAYOR ARCHER ON BEHALF OF THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT TICKET FOR CITY COUNCILMEN OF PRESTONSBURG.**

As Mayor I wish to state that the claims by some of the opponents of the present City Council are rather ridiculous when they say that the present City Administration has not accomplished very much.

These loose statements of the opponents of the Community Development Ticket must be answered if for no other reason than to present the record to the people of Prestonsburg of what has actually been accomplished by T. J. (Jody) Fannin, Winston (Sonny) Ford, Jr., E. B. Leslie, E. B. (Junior) May, Jr., Tom O. McGuire, Byron Nunnery, H. G. Salisbury, Jr., Clifford Wright.

Outlined below are the steps that were taken to equip this City to meet the challenge of growing and progressing, which steps MUST be taken by every town which hopes to compete for economic growth and to take advantage of any and all economic opportunities that may come our way:

(1) **Recertification of the Workable Program** until September 1, 1964. This certification had been allowed to expire for lack of payment of \$750.00 to the Government. It was by this means that our low-rent housing was obtained and is now a reality—without it the housing project would have been lost.

(2) **Adopted Future Land-Use Plan and Zoning with Codes.** This program has enabled us to help obtain a new Courthouse and to be in position to acquire two new municipal off-street parking lots. Parking facilities are essential to prepare our town as a college community, and to assist business in our community. Our over-all planning will be completed in 1975.

(3) **Improvement of our Fire Department.** We have purchased and paid two of five installments on a new fire truck, which kept our City in 7th class rather than 9th class, which is a saving to our citizens of 20% on fire insurance premiums. We have modernized and rebuilt our fire station to accommodate our three fire trucks. We now have a full-time Fire Chief, full-time Assistant Fire Chief, and an adequate number of volunteer firemen.

(4) **Two New Accelerated Public Works Grant Applications Pending.** Application for APW Ky. 246 GL will provide for bringing our water and gas systems into first class condition. It will provide for water line extensions necessary to reduce the rates charged for fire insurance in the City.

Application for APW Ky. 251 GL will provide for paving, storm sewers, curb and gutter for all streets in Prestonsburg.

These applications have cleared the Atlanta office and are now in Washington for final approval.

(5) **Land Ownership-Tax Equalization.** This program has accomplished front-footage maps with photographs of all improvements and card index references to each piece of property in the City. In order to complete our tax equalization program, all that needs to be done is to have the improvements evaluated.

(6) **Street Program.** New street lights have been added throughout the entire town. Streets are systematically cleaned—all existing streets, not just a few. Dirt streets were graveled last winter and will be graveled again. Drainage and improvement of part of our streets has been accomplished at no cost to the taxpayers.

(7) **Fiscal Affairs.** Our City has had its first complete audit by a firm of certified public accountants. This audit will be made at the close of each fiscal year. We have paid off all warrants, all bank loans, and we pay all current debts as they come due. No new debts have been incurred. All Sinking Funds for retirement of bonds have been brought back up-to-date in the last two years, as required by law.

(8) The Prestonsburg-Pointsville Airport will be in operation in two weeks—at no cost to our citizens.

(9) Green Acres housing project is completed with forty happy families now occupying them. A new blacktop street around the project is completed—at no cost to the City. Application has been made with the Government for the building of additional units.

(10) By cooperating with other governmental agencies we have seen: (a) the beginning of construction of our University of Kentucky Extension College, with the foundation near completion; (b) development of Jenny Wiley State Park and May Lodge, serviced by city water and sewage facilities; (c) completion of the Mountain Parkway and Bridge, and acquisition of an additional pump for flood control protection.

(11) **Sanitation Department.** We have purchased a new garbage disposal truck and paid two of the four payments due on the unit.

(12) **Storm and Sanitary Sewers.** Cleaning and repair of all existing sewers in the City, at a cost of \$24,000, is now being accomplished. This service is being paid for without any expenditure from the General Fund.

The new sewer system and sewage processing plant are approximately fifty percent complete, and the City's one-half of the cost of this improvement will be paid for by a charge of 70% of cost of water used per month.

This is a record of extraordinary accomplishment, and the value to the citizens of Prestonsburg far exceeds the actual cost.

**COMBS URGES CITIZENS AID**

**In Health Progress; Conference Stresses Health Service Needs**

Active lay citizen participation was stressed by Governor Bert T. Combs last Thursday as he urged approximately 200 delegates to the 11th annual Kentucky Health Conference at Jenny Wiley State Park to strive for the development of better community health programs.

The conference theme stressed the importance of adequate health services and facilities for area and community development in Eastern Kentucky. Prior to Governor Combs' address, speakers had noted that, while Eastern Kentucky's medical services have improved in the last 10 years, the area generally still suffers from a serious shortage of doctors, dentists and pharmacists.

"There has been a tendency for citizens to leave health and medical programs to the doctor and professional health workers," Governor Combs told the gathering.

"Of course, that's a mistake," he continued. "I think you will find the better community-health programs have active lay citizens' participation."

Adequate health facilities were labeled a prerequisite to industrial development by Dr. G. W. Schneider, Lexington, chairman of the Kentucky Development Council.

"Industry is not willing to move into a community unless their key employees are willing to live there," Dr. Schneider said.

**GIANT MINE PLANS TOLD**

**Bethlehem To Develop 1150-Acre Pike Tract; C. & O. Building Spur**

The giant Bethlehem Mines Corporation—one of the three largest mining firms in Eastern Kentucky—announced plans Friday for developing a "multimillion dollar" underground coal mining and preparation plant in southwestern Pike county.

The modern plant and mine will be located on a 1,150-acre tract of land on Pigeon Fork of Elk Horn Creek within nine miles of Jenkins, in Letcher county.

Announcement of the new operation was made by D. A. Zegeer, Jenkins, superintendent of the Elk Horn division of Bethlehem mines.

No details of production and employment were disclosed by the company.

Bethlehem Mining Corporation is a subsidiary of Bethlehem Steel Company.

The mining firm operates three mines along the borders of Pike and Letcher counties in the vicinity of Jenkins. It employs around 33 miners.

Zegeer said the new mine, to be known as Bethlehem Pike No. 26, will begin operations soon.

It will produce a metallurgical coal that can be reduced to coke for the production of iron, presumably at the parent company's blast furnaces in Baltimore, Buffalo and Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.

Announcement of the new mine had been expected here since earlier this year when the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway started construction of a five-mile, \$4 million spur from Jenkins to the mine site.

One of the features of the new plant will be a railroad yard capable of handling 240 cars, Zegeer said. The yard will include six parallel tracks, each a little more than a third of a mile long.

fright caused the birdland babel, or if indeed the birds were saying in their own language some of the things Bambi put into words in the picture.  
How many hundreds or thousands did not escape we cannot say. These could fly, but a giant poplar—a yellow poplar, the kind so valued in the days when the forests of the region were raped—could not. And those nearby saw the fire hit dead beech branches at its base, then race up the trunk and sear the bark, burn deep wherever it touched. And so died a tree which rose possibly seventy feet and which had been from seventy-five to a hundred years in the rising.  
Multiply these incidents by a thousand, or by ten thousand, and you begin to sum up some of the tragic cost of the carelessness, the willfulness and the maliciousness of human beings.

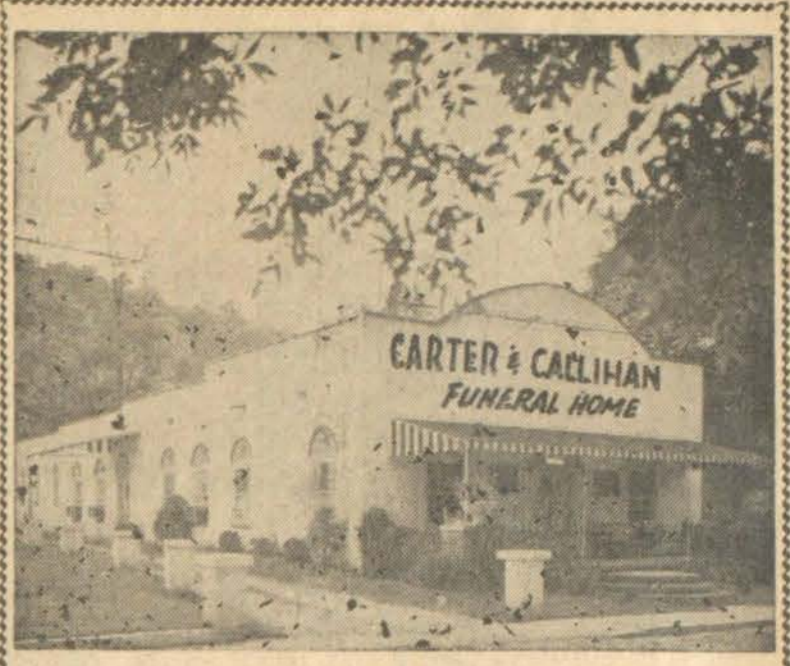
**SUCH IGNORANCE!**

An Ordinance of The City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Authorizing the Issuance of Water and Sewer Revenue Refunding Bonds for the Purpose of Refunding at A Lower Interest Cost Certain Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds Previously Issued and Outstanding (and in Continued Recognition and Acknowledgment of Liens, Pledges and Other Security Rights Existing in Connection With Said City's Outstanding "Water Works Revenue Refunding Bonds," Dated August 1, 1944); Providing for the Continuation of Various Special Funds Heretofore Created in Connection with the Revenues of the Previously Combined and Consolidated Municipal Water and Sewer System, and Making Provision for the Segregation, Administration and Disposition of Such Revenues; Prescribing Certain Terms and Conditions Upon Which Said Refunding Bonds Are To Be and May Be Publicly Sold and Issued, Together with Terms and Conditions Upon Which Parity Bonds May Be Issued in the Future; and Providing for the Redemption and Payment of the Previously Issued Bonds Intended to Be Refunded.

WHEREAS, the City of Prestonsburg, Floyd County, Kentucky, has long owned and operated as municipal revenue-producing undertakings the properties, installations and facilities providing water service and sanitary sewer service in said City and its environs, and in connection therewith:

(a) By a certain Ordinance adopted and approved June 19, 1944, authorized its noncallable \$117,000 "City of Prestonsburg Water Works Revenue Refunding Bonds," dated August 1, 1944, which bonds were thereafter sold and issued, and of which \$43,000 remain outstanding and unpaid, without default, at the date of the adoption of this Ordinance;

(b) By a certain Ordinance adopted and approved December 4, 1950, authorized its \$22,000 "City of Prestonsburg Sewer Revenue Refunding Bonds," dated February 1, 1951, all of which were thereafter sold and issued, but have been redeemed, paid, cancelled and retired as hereinafter recited;

(c) By an Ordinance adopted and approved October 24, 1956, combined the properties, installations and facilities providing water and sewer services in the establishment of the combined and consolidated municipal water and sewer system; and by said Ordinance authorized its \$569,000 "City of Prestonsburg Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds," dated November 1, 1956 (in full recognition and observance of the lien upon and pledge of the water revenues previously created for the security and source of payment of the aforesaid "Water Works Revenue Refunding Bonds," dated August 1, 1944), all of which bonds were thereafter sold and issued, a portion of the proceeds applied to the redemption, payment, cancellation and retirement of the aforesaid "Sewer Revenue Refunding Bonds," dated February 1, 1951, and the remainder of the proceeds applied to defraying the costs of improvements to said combined and consolidated water and sewer system; and of which bonds \$17,500 have matured and been paid at the date of the adoption of this Ordinance, and \$5,000 will mature on November 1, 1963, leaving \$538,000 thereof maturing serially in various amounts on November 1 in each of the years 1964 to 1991, inclusive, and bearing interest in part at 4-3/4% per annum and in part at 5% per annum, secured by and payable from a first lien upon and pledge of sewer service revenues, and a second lien upon and pledge of water service revenues; and such outstanding bonds which mature on and after November 1, 1967, are subject to redemption and payment at the option of said City on November 1, 1966, or upon any interest payment date thereafter at the face amount thereof, accrued interest at the respective applicable coupon rates to the date of redemption, and additional interest or a redemption premium in the sum of \$30.00 per bond;

(d) By another Ordinance adopted and approved October 24, 1956, created and established a "Utility Commission" of the City, and vested therein full authority to manage, control and operate the combined and consolidated water and sewer system and also the municipal natural gas distribution system, subject to the provisions of controlling Ordinances, contracts and commitments of the City in connection therewith;

(e) Has obtained from the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States an "Offer" dated November 19, 1962, which was accepted by the City by proper action of the Mayor and City Council on November 21, 1962, and thereby became a "Loan Agreement" as therein provided, wherein and whereby said Agency agreed (subject to specified conditions) that if the City should combine the municipal natural gas distribution system with the previously combined and consolidated municipal water and sewer system, and authorize and offer at public sale the City's \$538,000 "Water, Sewer and Natural Gas System Revenue Bonds," payable solely from the revenues thereof, then said Agency would appear at the public offering of such Bonds and submit a proposal for the purchase thereof upon prescribed terms and conditions; and it is the fixed and declared purpose of the City to combine and consolidate the municipal

the municipal combined and consolidated water and sewer system, and to authorize and offer at public sale in due course of time the Revenue Bonds as described and set forth in said Loan Agreement; but said steps have not yet been formally taken;

(f) Has obtained from Agencies of the United States Government under existing laws various Grants in the aggregate amount of \$554,250 which the City is applying and will apply, together with the proceeds of the Bonds proposed to be issued by the City according to the said Loan Agreement to the construction and installation of substantial utility improvements, including a sewage treatment plant or plants, lift stations, outfall lines, gathering lines and appurtenant facilities; and

(g) Has heretofore made effective certain ancillary Ordinances which are in full force and effect including, inter alia, an Ordinance adopted December 20, 1962, establishing rates and charges for use of the services and facilities providing water, sewer and natural gas service, and another Ordinance adopted December 20, 1962, mandatorily requiring that properties be connected to the sanitary sewer facilities when and as the same are capable of receiving flowable wastes; and

WHEREAS, the City has received and accepted, with the concurrence of its Utility Commission, a proposal of a Fiscal Agent to assist in the refunding of the outstanding Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds, dated November 1, 1956, in such manner as to effect a substantial savings to the City, notwithstanding the issuance of Bonds in an increased principal amount, and notwithstanding provisions for the redemption and payment of Bonds at a premium on November 1, 1966, and duplication of interest until that time, all as hereinafter provided; and it is the opinion and judgment of the Mayor and City Council, with the concurrence of the City's Utility Commission, that the refunding program for which provision is made in and by this Ordinance is wise and expedient and should be undertaken; and

WHEREAS, in the case of HEMLEPP v. ARONBERG, 369 SW 2d 121, decided June 28, 1963, by the Court of Appeals of Kentucky, such a plan for the refunding of outstanding revenue bonds in advance of the earliest permissible redemption date thereof was held to be lawful under the circumstances hereinafter shown; and such refunding can be accomplished without prejudice to the holders of any of the City's outstanding Revenue Bonds and without breach of the City's aforesaid "Loan Agreement" with Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, DOES HEREBY ORDAIN, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. In the interests of brevity, clarity and convenience of reference, certain terms, phrases and abbreviations are used in this Ordinance; and in each use thereof there shall be attributable thereto the following respective meanings, unless the context shall clearly indicate a contrary meaning or interpretation, in which event the context shall be controlling:

- (a) "City"—the City of Prestonsburg, in Floyd County, Kentucky;
(b) "Mayor"—the Mayor of the City, or anyone authorized by law to perform the functions of the Mayor;
(c) "City Clerk"—the City Clerk of the City or anyone authorized by law to perform the functions of the City Clerk;
(d) "Treasurer"—the City Treasurer, or anyone authorized by law to perform the functions of the City Treasurer;
(e) "City Council"—the legislative governing body of the City, from time to time, by whatsoever name or title may be applicable thereto according to law;
(f) "Refunding Bonds" or "bonds" (without other identification)—the Bonds authorized by this Ordinance;
(g) "1944 Bonds"—such "City of Prestonsburg Water Works Revenue Refunding Bonds," dated August 1, 1944, as may be outstanding and unpaid from time to time pursuant to the City Ordinance, referred to in the preamble hereof, adopted and approved June 19, 1944;
(h) "1956 Ordinance"—the City Ordinance, referred to in (g) above;
(i) "1944 Bond Fund"—the "Water Works Revenue Refunding Bond and Interest Redemption Fund," created and established in the 1944 Ordinance;
(j) "1944 Depreciation Fund"—the "Water Works Depreciation and Reserve Account," provided for in the 1944 Ordinance;
(k) "1956 Bonds"—such "City of Prestonsburg Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds," dated November 1, 1956, as may be outstanding and unpaid, from time to time, pursuant to the provisions of the Ordinance adopted and approved October 24, 1956, authorizing the issuance of the City's bonds, as so designated;
(l) "1956 Ordinance"—the City Ordinance, referred to in (k) above;
(m) "1956 Revenue Fund"—the "City of Prestonsburg Water and Sewer Revenue Fund of 1956," created and established in and by the 1956 Ordinance;
(n) "1956 Sinking Fund"—the "City of Prestonsburg Water and Sewer Revenue Bond and Interest Redemption Fund of 1956," created and established in and by the 1956 Ordinance;
(o) "1956 Depreciation Fund"—the "Water and Sewer Depreciation

Fund of 1956," as created and established pursuant to the 1956 Ordinance;

(p) "Ordinance" (without other identification)—this Ordinance;

(q) "HFAA"—the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government;

(r) "Loan Agreement"—the City's Loan Agreement with HFAA, identified as "Project No. PFL-KY-432, Contract No. H-332-1017," accepted by the City by Resolution of the City Council on November 21, 1962;

(s) "FDIC"—the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation;

(t) "Utility Commission"—the Utility Commission of the City, created and existing by a certain Ordinance adopted and approved October 24, 1956, and having charge of the general supervision and control of the municipal water, sewer and natural gas distribution facilities of said City, subject to applicable Ordinances, contracts and bonds;

(u) "System" (without other identification)—the municipal combined and consolidated water and sewer system, as said water and sewer systems were combined and consolidated by the 1956 Ordinance.

SECTION 2. Said City hereby recognizes and acknowledges that it has previously created for the benefit and protection of the owners and holders of the aforesaid "Water Works Revenue Refunding Bonds," dated August 1, 1944 (the "1944 Bonds"), as more particularly identified in the preamble of this Ordinance, certain liens, pledges and security rights relating to the City's municipal Water Works and System, all as set forth in said bonds and in the Ordinance adopted on June 19, 1944, authorizing the issuance thereof; and it is recognized and acknowledged that there shall be a separate accounting at all times of the income and revenues produced by the operation of those facilities of the System providing water service, and that said liens, pledges, and other security rights are with respect to such income and revenues, prior and superior to any and all liens, pledges and other security rights hereinafter created in connection with the issuance of City's Refunding Bonds until such time as said previously issued and outstanding 1944 Bonds shall have been fully paid, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms hereof.

SECTION 3. Said City hereby further recognizes and acknowledges that by the 1956 Ordinance the municipal properties, installations and facilities providing water service and sanitary sewer service were combined in the creation and establishment of a municipal combined and consolidated water and sewer system, that authorization was there given for the issuance of the City's "Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds," dated November 1, 1956 (the "1956 Bonds"), payable as to principal and interest solely from the revenues of such combined and consolidated water and sewer system; that the 1956 Bonds were thereafter issued, and a portion thereof remain outstanding and unpaid at this time; and that for the security, benefit and protection of the holders thereof the City has created certain liens, pledges and other security rights (subject to the similar liens, pledges and other security rights therefore created in the 1944 Ordinance with reference to the 1944 Bonds); and it is recognized and acknowledged that (subject to the separate accounting for water revenues as set forth in SECTION 2 hereof) there shall be a separate accounting at all times of the income and revenues produced by the operation of those facilities of the System providing water service and sewer service; and all security rights with respect to such income and revenue are recognized and acknowledged to be prior and superior to the liens, pledges and other security rights hereinafter created in connection with the issuance of City's Refunding Bonds until such time as said previously issued and outstanding 1956 Bonds shall have been fully paid, both principal and interest, in accordance with the terms hereof.

Provisions are hereinafter made for the segregation, security and application of funds sufficient to provide for payment at their respective maturities of the outstanding 1956 Bonds which mature on and prior to November 1, 1966; the payment of semi-annual interest on all of the outstanding 1956 Bonds until said date; and the redemption and retirement on said date of all of the 1956 Bonds maturing on and after November 1, 1967; all in accordance with the terms and provisions of said Bonds and coupons and of the 1956 Ordinance pursuant to which the same were issued and are outstanding.

SECTION 4. For the purpose of refunding at a lower net interest cost, the City's \$538,000 "City of Prestonsburg Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds," dated November 1, 1956, and for the payment of all expenses in connection therewith, as hereinafter provided, there shall be and there are hereby authorized and ordered to be issued the negotiable "City of Prestonsburg Water and Sewer Revenue Refunding Bonds," in the aggregate principal amount of \$623,000, to be dated as of November 1, 1962, and to consist of 623 bonds of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered consecutively from 1 to 623, inclusive, bearing interest payable semi-annually on the 1st days of May and November in each year, to be represented by appurtenant coupons. Said bonds shall bear interest at such coupon rate, or rates, not exceeding 6% per annum, as may be

fixed by one or more supplemental ordinances, as a result of advertised sale of said bonds in competitive bidding therefor, as hereinafter provided. Said bonds shall mature, serially, and in numerical order on November 1 of the respective years, as follows:

provided, however, said City shall reserve the option to call and redeem said bonds numbered 185 to 623, inclusive, or such of them as may be outstanding from time to time, prior to maturity on any interest payment date on or after November 1, 1973, as a whole or from time to time in part in the inverse order of their maturity (less than all of a single maturity to be selected by lot), and in the event any of said bonds are to be redeemed, it is agreed that there shall be paid to the holder upon surrender thereof interest in addition to that then accrued and evidenced by interest coupons in the sum of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) per bond if such bonds are called for redemption prior to November 1, 1973; Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) per bond if such bonds are called for redemption on or after November 1, 1973 but prior to November 1, 1983; and Ten Dollars (\$10.00) per bond if such bonds are called for redemption on or after November 1, 1983, but prior to final maturity. Notice of such redemption, identifying the bonds to be redeemed, shall be given by publication at least one not less than thirty (30) days prior to the redemption date in a newspaper of general circulation throughout Kentucky.

SECTION 5. Both principal of and interest on said bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the principal office of The First National Bank of Cincinnati, in Cincinnati, Ohio. Each of said bonds shall be executed on behalf of said City by an authorized facsimile reproduction of the signature of the Mayor and sealed with a facsimile reproduction of the corporate seal of said City and attested by the validating manual signature of the City Clerk, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds shall be executed with the facsimile signatures of said Mayor and City Clerk. If any of the officers whose signatures or facsimile signatures appear on the bonds or coupons shall cease to be such officers before the delivery of the bonds, the signatures or facsimiles shall, nevertheless, be valid for all purposes, the same as if the officers had remained in office until delivery. All of said bonds, together with interest thereon and any additional bonds ranking on a parity therewith which may be issued and outstanding from time to time under the restrictions and conditions hereinafter set forth, shall not constitute an indebtedness of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, but shall be secured by and shall be payable solely out of the "City of Prestonsburg Water and Sewer Revenue Bond and Interest Redemption Fund of 1956," (the 1956 Sinking Fund), as created and maintained pursuant to the 1956 Ordinance; and out of the revenues of the municipal combined and consolidated water and sewer system pledged to said 1956 Sinking Fund (but subject to the previously-created security rights incident to the 1944 Bonds and the 1956 Bonds, so long as any thereof remain outstanding and unpaid).

SECTION 6. That said bonds and coupons shall be in substantially the following form:

(FORM OF BOND) UNITED STATES OF AMERICA COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY COUNTY OF FLOYD CITY OF PRESTONSBURG WATER AND SEWER REVENUE REFUNDING BOND NUMBER ... \$1,000.00 KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That the City of Prestonsburg, in Floyd County, Kentucky, acting by and through its City Council as its governing body, for value received, hereby promises to pay to the bearer, solely from the special fund hereinafter mentioned, the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) on the 1st day of November, 19... in like manner to pay interest on said sum, solely from said special fund, from the date hereof at the rate of ... percent ( ... %) per annum, payable semiannually on the 1st days of May and November in each year until paid, except as the provisions hereinafter set forth with respect to redemption may be and become applicable hereto such interest as may accrue and prior to maturity hereof to be paid only upon presentation and surrender of the annexed interest coupons as the same severally mature, both principal and interest being payable in lawful money of

the United States of America at the principal office of The First National Bank of Cincinnati, in the City of Cincinnati, Ohio.

This bond is one of an authorized series of bonds numbered consecutively from 1 to 623, inclusive, issued by said City pursuant to an Ordinance duly adopted and published by its City Council for the purpose of refunding at a lower interest cost certain similar bonds previously issued, as more fully identified in said Ordinance, under and in full compliance with the Constitution and Statutes of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, including among others, Sections 58.010 to 58.140, inclusive, of the Kentucky Revised Statutes.

Said City hereby reserves the right and option to call and redeem the bonds of said series numbered 185 to 623, inclusive, (all bonds maturing on and after November 1, 1974), as may from time to time be outstanding, prior to maturity, on any interest payment date on or after November 1, 1973, as a whole, or from time to time in part in the inverse order of their maturity (less than all of a single maturity to be selected by lot), and in the event any of said bonds are to be redeemed, it is agreed that there shall be paid to the holder upon surrender thereof, interest in addition to that then accrued and evidenced by interest coupons, in the sum of Thirty Dollars (\$30.00) per bond if such bonds are called for redemption prior to November 1, 1973; Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) per bond if such bonds are called for redemption on or after November 1, 1973 but prior to November 1, 1983; and Ten Dollars (\$10.00) per bond if such bonds are called for redemption on or after November 1, 1983, but prior to final maturity. Notice of such redemption, identifying the bonds to be redeemed, shall be given by publication at least one time not less than thirty (30) days prior to the redemption date in a newspaper of general circulation throughout Kentucky.

SECTION 7. The Mayor and the City Clerk are authorized to cause to be published an appropriate form of "Notice of Sale of Bonds," soliciting sealed, competitive bids for the purchase of the Refunding Bonds which are authorized by this Ordinance, the same to be received in the office of the City Clerk upon or until the occasion of a regular, adjourned, or special meeting of the City Council, as the Mayor may choose, the same to be then and there publicly opened, considered, and acted upon by the City Council. Said Notice may be in form as submitted and recommended by the Fiscal Agent, shall require a bid price not less than ninety-eight per cent (98%) of the face amount of the Refunding Bonds (with interest to delivery from the last interest payment date prior to delivery), shall require a good faith deposit with each bid equal to two per cent (2%) of the face amount of the bonds, and may place such limitations upon the interest coupon rates which may be proposed by purchase bidders as may, in the opinion of the Fiscal Agent, be best calculated to accomplish the maximum saving of interest cost as compared to the outstanding 1956 Bonds without undue variation in the aggregate amounts of principal and interest becoming due from year to year. The right to reject bids shall be expressly reserved.

Said sale notice shall be published according to the requirements of KRS Chapter 424, to-wit: one time, not less than seven (7) days nor more than twenty-one (21) days in advance of the date specified in the notice for the opening and consideration of purchase bids, in each of the following: (a) The Floyd County Times, the newspaper published in Prestonsburg, Kentucky, and having the largest circulation therein; (b) The Courier-Journal, Louisville, Kentucky, in order to provide statewide coverage; and (c) The Daily Bond Buyer, New York, New York, to provide national circulation among bond buyers.

SECTION 8. In the event the conditions set forth in the aforesaid fiscal agency proposal are met upon the occasion of the opening of purchase bids for the bonds authorized by this Ordinance, the City shall accept the best purchase bid received in compliance with the terms and conditions of the public offering, and shall enter into such contract as may then be tendered by the Fiscal Agent conforming to law and to the terms and conditions set forth in the fiscal agency proposal, whereby the City shall agree either (a) to purchase tendered United States Government securities for the account of the 1956 Sinking Fund immediately upon the receipt of bond proceeds, such United States Government securities thereupon immediately to be deposited to the credit of said 1956 Sinking Fund, or (b) to contract for one or more Certificates of Time Deposit of an incorporated state or national bank which is a member of Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, providing the same shall be continuously secured by a valid pledge of United States Government securities as provided in Section 8-A of the aforesaid 1956 Ordinance, the same to be held for the account of the aforesaid 1956 Sinking Fund. From the proceeds of the bonds herein authorized, there is hereby allocated a sum which, together with the sum at that time accumulated and available in the "reserve" in the 1956 Sinking Fund, in accordance with the 1956 Ordinance, will in the aggregate be sufficient to provide in the aggregate for all of the following:

(1) Interest becoming due on and prior to November 1, 1966, on all

The City further covenants and agrees that within sixty (60) days after the close of each of the fiscal years herein provided for, it will cause all of its financial records relating to the combined and consolidated water and sewer system to be audited by a certified public accountant not in the regular employ of the City; that it will cause a copy of the audit report to be placed on permanent file in the office of the City Clerk; that it will furnish a copy of said audit report to the Fiscal Agent, F. L. Dupree & Company, and to the original purchaser of bonds at each public sale thereof; and that if requested by or on behalf of any bondholder it will cause to be prepared a condensed balance sheet and a condensed operating statement therefrom, in reasonable detail, in reasonable number of multiple copies so that the same may be distributed to bondholders upon request; all costs thereof to be payable from the Operation and Maintenance Fund.

SECTION 12. That said City hereby covenants and agrees with the holder or holders of the bonds herein authorized and permitted to be issued, or any of them, that it will faithfully and punctually perform all duties with reference to said combined and consolidated water and sewer system required by the Constitution and laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, including the making and collecting of reasonable and sufficient rates for services rendered and facilities afforded, and will segregate the revenues and make the application thereof into the respective funds, as provided by the 1944 Ordinance and by this Ordinance; and the City hereby irrevocably covenants, binds and obligates itself not to sell, lease, mortgage, or in any manner dispose of said properties, including any and all extensions and additions that may be made thereto, until all the bonds herein authorized and permitted to be issued shall have been paid in full, both principal and interest, and the City further covenants and agrees with the holders of said bonds to maintain in good condition and continuously operate said water and sewer system as a combined and consolidated municipal public project, and to charge and collect such rates and charges for services rendered and facilities afforded thereby, so that the gross income and revenues will be sufficient at all times to make the prescribed payments into the several special funds as hereinbefore provided, as well as to pay the costs of operation and maintenance of the System.

SURPLUS REVENUES OF THE COMBINED AND CONSOLIDATED WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM

From and after the issuance of the Refunding Bonds, and compliance with the provisions of SECTION 3 of this Ordinance wherein provision is made for the payment and retirement of all of the 1956 Bonds, any balance still remaining in the 1956 Revenue Fund each month, after all payments and deposits prescribed by subdivisions A, B and C of this SECTION 10 of this Ordinance have been made, shall be deemed to be surplus to the requirements of the 1944 Bonds and the 1956 Bonds, and may be applied, or pledged to be applied, according to the provisions of the City's Loan Agreement with HHPA, wherein it is contemplated and provided that the City will shortly take action to combine the municipal natural gas distribution system with the aforesaid combined and consolidated water and sewer system in the establishment of a single combined and consolidated municipal water, sewer and natural gas system and issue its "Water, Sewer and Natural Gas System Revenue Bonds" which will be payable as to principal and interest from the revenues thereof, but in full recognition and acknowledgment of the vested security rights of the holders of the 1944 Bonds, the 1956 Bonds and the Refunding Bonds (it being understood and agreed that the Refunding Bonds, upon issuance thereof and upon compliance with the provisions of SECTION 3 of this Ordinance, will be substituted in place of the 1956 Bonds and in such manner as to reduce the aggregate amount of principal and interest which would otherwise be required in order to pay the 1956 Bonds and interest thereon to the final maturity date thereof.)

SECTION 13. That any holder of said bonds, or of any of the coupons, may either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus, or other proceedings, enforce and compel performance by said City and its officers and agents of all duties imposed or required by law or this Ordinance in connection with the operation of said System, including the making and collecting of sufficient rates and segregation of the income and revenues and the application thereof.

If there is any default in the payment of principal or of interest on any bond outstanding pursuant to the provisions of this Ordinance, any Court having jurisdiction of the action may appoint a receiver to administer the combined and consolidated System on behalf of said City, with power to charge and collect rates and charges for the services rendered thereby and to receive any other available revenue sufficient to provide for the payment of the 1944 Bonds and the bonds outstanding pursuant to this Ordinance, together with interest thereon, and for the payment of operating expenses, such receiver to apply the income and revenues in conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance and the applicable Statute laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

SECTION 14. The bonds authorized and permitted to be issued hereunder and from time to time outstanding shall not be entitled to priority one over the other in the application of the income and revenues regardless of the time or times of their issuance, it being the intention that the bonds be sold at different times and that there shall be no priority among the bonds authorized or permitted to be issued under the provisions of this Ordinance, regardless of the fact that they may actually be issued and delivered at different times; provided, however, that said City hereby reserves the right and privilege of issuing additional bonds, from time to time, payable from the income and revenues of said water and sewer system and ranking on a parity in all respects with the bonds herein specifically au-

such investments authorized by this paragraph as well as the income therefrom shall be carried to the credit of the 1956 Sinking Fund. Moneys held in the new Debt Service Reserve shall be applied to the payment of the principal of and interest on the Refunding Bonds authorized by this Ordinance whenever for any reason there would otherwise be default in the payment thereof; and investments held for the account of such Debt Service Reserve shall, to any extent necessary, be converted into cash for such purposes. The First National Bank of Cincinnati, Cincinnati, Ohio, is hereby authorized to convert such securities into cash whenever and as often as may be required for such purposes and need not seek specific action or additional authority from the City Council in order to do so. Whenever the balance in the new Debt Service Reserve shall for any reason be reduced below the level herein prescribed, payments into the 1956 Sinking Fund at the rate of \$3,500.00 per month shall be resumed and continued as long as may be necessary to restore the deficiency.

(8) The amounts required to be deposited and invested in the 1956 Sinking Fund for the account of the 1956 Bonds, as provided in SECTION 8 of this Ordinance, are hereby irrevocably pledged as aforesaid for the payment of the interest on, principal of, and redemption premium of the 1956 Bonds. All other moneys from time to time in said Sinking Fund including the new Debt Service Reserve therein are hereby pledged for the payment of the interest on, principal of, and redemption premium, if any, of the Refunding Bonds authorized by this Ordinance, and any additional parity bonds which may hereafter be issued in accordance with the conditions and restrictions hereinafter prescribed.

(9) The balance of the income and revenues of the combined and consolidated water and sewer system, when and so long as all of the foregoing provisions are being met, shall be available for the costs of operation and maintenance, for deposit in the Depreciation Fund, as hereinafter provided, and for the payment of other obligations issued or incurred by the City and which by their terms are made payable therefrom.

CITY OF PRESTONSBURG WATER AND SEWER DEPRECIATION FUND OF 1956

The "City of Prestonsburg Water and Sewer Depreciation Fund of 1956" (the 1956 Depreciation Fund) as created by the 1956 Ordinance, is expressly continued and shall be maintained as long as any bonds are outstanding pursuant to or as permitted by this Ordinance; and said 1956 Depreciation Fund shall continue to include an account, as to which separate records shall continue to be kept, designated as the Water Works Depreciation and Reserve Account (the 1944 Depreciation Fund) as provided in the 1944 Ordinance and in the 1956 Ordinance. So long as any of the 1944 Bonds remain outstanding and unpaid, the amount required by the 1944 Ordinance to be set aside from water revenues into said 1944 Depreciation Fund shall continue to be so set aside therein as a part of the 1956 Depreciation Fund, and the said account shall be secured and disbursed in the manner prescribed in the 1944 Ordinance. The amounts hereinafter required to be deposited into the 1956 Depreciation Fund shall be in addition to the amounts required to be paid into the 1944 Depreciation Fund.

From the balance of the annual income and revenues of the combined and consolidated water and sewer system remaining in the 1956 Revenue Fund after the required payments into the 1956 Sinking Fund have been made on the first day of each month, there shall be set aside and deposited monthly into the 1956 Depreciation Fund the sum of \$400.00 (in addition to the amount required to be deposited from water revenues into the 1944 Depreciation Fund, as aforesaid) until there shall have been accumulated in said 1956 Depreciation Fund, as represented by cash or by the market value of permissible investments, the sum of \$40,000.00; and whenever such sum shall have been accumulated, and so long as it is maintained, the monthly payments into said 1956 Depreciation Fund may be suspended or reduced; but such monthly payments shall be resumed whenever necessary in order to restore the balance to the sum of \$40,000.00 and shall be continued so long as the same may be required to maintain such balance.

The 1956 Depreciation Fund shall constitute a reserve for renewals, replacements, new construction and contingencies in the operation of said combined and consolidated water and sewer system and may be withdrawn and disbursed for any of such purposes; and any securities held for the account of said fund may be converted into cash upon order of the City's Utility Commission whenever and to such extent as may be necessary for any of such purposes; and provided also that withdrawals and disbursements shall be made from such 1956 Depreciation Fund if necessary in order to prevent default in the payment of interest on or principal of the 1944 Bonds or any bonds authorized or permitted to be issued under the provisions of this Ordinance.

As and when additional bonds ranking on a parity with the Refunding Bonds are issued, provision shall be made for additional payments into said 1956 Depreciation Fund for the purpose of increasing

under the conditions and restrictions hereinafter set forth. As provided in the 1956 Ordinance the amount so deposited monthly shall continue to be \$3,500.00 unless and until there shall be accumulated in the 1956 Sinking Fund, in addition to the sums deposited therein for the payment of the 1956 Bonds as provided in SECTION 8 of this Ordinance, a new Debt Service Reserve in the sum of \$40,000.00 which shall be held and may be applied or invested as hereinafter set forth for additional security of the Refunding Bonds authorized by this Ordinance; but so long as said Debt Service Reserve is maintained at the sum of \$40,000.00 as represented by cash or by the market value of permitted investments, the monthly sums may be reduced to such amount as, together with interest income actually received or to be received upon all investments held for the account of the 1956 Sinking Fund (including the United States Government securities or secured Certificates of Time Deposit held therein according to SECTION 8 of this Ordinance), are not less than one-sixth (1/6) of the amount of interest which will become due on the Refunding Bonds at the next interest payment date plus one-twelfth (1/12) of the amount of principal of the Refunding Bonds scheduled to mature on the next succeeding November 1; provided, however, that if the City shall issue bonds ranking on a parity with the Refunding Bonds in accordance with the conditions and restrictions hereinafter set forth in this Ordinance, such monthly deposits shall be increased so as to make similar provision for payment of the maturing principal thereof and interest thereon and to accumulate within a period of five (5) years an addition to the Debt Service Reserve in an amount equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements of such parity bonds.

(4) All moneys held in the 1956 Sinking Fund for the account of the new Debt Service Reserve herein created shall be held as a reserve for additional security of the Refunding Bonds (and parity bonds, if any), and unless all bonds payable from the 1956 Sinking Fund at the time outstanding are to be then retired, only such part of the moneys in the 1956 Sinking Fund (over and above the amounts held and invested therein for the account of the 1956 Bonds) shall be used to purchase or redeem bonds in advance of maturity as may be in excess of the prescribed Reserve and the interest and principal becoming due within the succeeding twelve (12) months on all bonds which by their terms are payable from said fund. Any such purchase of bonds prior to maturity shall be made at the lowest prices (not exceeding their current fair market value nor the terms for redemption thereof) following advertisement for tenders, but if insufficient acceptable tenders are received, the remaining excess may be applied upon order of the City Council to the calling and redemption of bonds as hereinbefore provided. All bonds so purchased or redeemed shall be cancelled. Provided, however, that no further payments need be made into the 1956 Sinking Fund after the retirement of all of the 1956 Bonds as herein provided, and after and so long as such amount of the Refunding Bonds have been retired that the amount then held in the 1956 Sinking Fund, including the new Debt Service Reserve, is equal to the entire amount required for retiring all bonds then outstanding and paying all interest that will accrue at the time of such retirement.

(5) If for any reason there should be a failure to pay into the 1956 Sinking Fund the full amounts hereinabove stipulated, then an amount equivalent to 110% of such deficiency shall be set apart and paid into the 1956 Sinking Fund from the 1956 Revenue Fund, and the same shall be in addition to payments otherwise herein required to be made until the amount of such deficiency shall have been restored.

(6) The monthly payments herein required to be made into the 1956 Sinking Fund shall be made in equal monthly installments on the first day of each month, except that when the first day of any month shall be a Sunday or a regular holiday then such payments shall be made on the next succeeding business day. The amount of the monthly payments in each fiscal year shall be computed as of the November 1 which is the first day of such fiscal year.

(7) All moneys held in the 1956 Sinking Fund, including the investments to be made in accordance with SECTION 8 of this Ordinance, shall be deposited in or with The First National Bank of Cincinnati, Cincinnati, Ohio, and the amounts required to be deposited monthly into said 1956 Sinking Fund shall be transmitted to said bank for deposit therein at the times herein required. To the extent that the amounts on deposit in said 1956 Sinking Fund shall exceed deposits of the City in said bank to exceed the amount insured by the FDIC, the same shall be continuously secured by a valid pledge of bonds or notes of the United States Government having an equivalent market value or shall be invested in such bonds or notes having a maturity date on or prior to the date when the sums invested will be needed for meeting interest and/or principal payments of the bonds herein authorized to mature or be called for redemption, and in no event to mature or be non-redeemable at the option of the holder more than five (5) years subsequent to the date of investment therein. All

## WATER POLLUTION AMONG CONGRESS TOPICS TALKED

Frankfort, Ky., October 25 (Spl.)— Nearly 500 people attended Kentucky's third annual Conservation Congress in Louisville, where a variety of experts devoted most of their discussions to the problems of water conservation and usage.

John Charles Daly, host of television's "What's My Line," in the main address at the recognition banquet, strongly opposed legislation before Congress to reorganize federal administration of water pollution.

Already passed by the Senate, the proposed legislation would transfer authority over comprehensive water pollution programs from the Public Health Service to a new assistant secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, Daly explained.

Daly said the move would lead to a serious drop in morale among technical personnel who identify themselves strongly with the Health Service.

He also touched on the larger theme of the conference, saying that the population and the need for pollution control, resource development and conservation are growing much faster than public awareness of the problems.

State Conservation Commissioner J. O. Matlick, in his opening address at the Congress said, "Proper development of our water resources is one of Kentucky's most pressing problems, and a great deal of effort is being put forth to solve it."

Matlick pointed out that divisions in his department have helped organize 22 small watershed projects and assisted in the initiation of Kentucky's new small lakes development program, which is building lakes "across the width and breadth of the state."

Matlick was re-elected chairman of the Natural Resources Development Commission, which sponsors the Congress, during the two-day meet. Jewell Graham, Lewisburg, president of the Kentucky Soil Conservation Districts, was elected vice chairman, and Mrs. John B. Roberts, Lexington, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Thirteen Kentuckians received conservation-recognition awards in acknowledgement of their outstanding leadership and distinguished service.

Jones, Lexington, state geologist emeritus with the Kentucky Geological Survey; Mrs. Mae Taubee Jarrell, Hazard, retired Perry county teacher; Henry C. Hagan, Morehead, head of Morehead State College's Department of Agriculture; Leland Hall, Morehead, retired farmer; Howard L. Van Arsdale, Louisville attorney, who helped organize the Junior Conservation Clubs; the Rev. Glenn "Tex" Evans, Frakes, superintendent of Henderson Settlement School; J. R. ## STATE PARKS, SHRINES TO SET NEW ATTENDANCE RECORDS

Frankfort, Ky., October 25 (Spl.)— Kentucky state parks and shrines seem sure to set another record in attendance this year, State Parks Commissioner Edward V. Fox has announced.

The total through August was 7,295,791, which is 1,489,666 more than the 5,806,125 for the same period last year, he said.

With only half of the parks and shrines totaled for September, the 1963 total has reached 8,050,979. The record-breaking 1962 total was 8,532,075. Last year's figure was 2,211,750 above the previous record

of 6,320,325 in 1961. In 1960, the aggregate was 5,939,350.

This year, as last year, July was the biggest month. Attendance in July totaled 2,143,168, as compared to 1,621,850 in the same month last year.

August, with 2,018,779, was the second-largest attendance month this year, and June, with 1,411,273, the third-largest.

The more than 152,000 persons visiting state parks and shrines on the Fourth of July this year established another record.

## Clinton Clay Cox, 47, Former Garrett Man, Dies In California

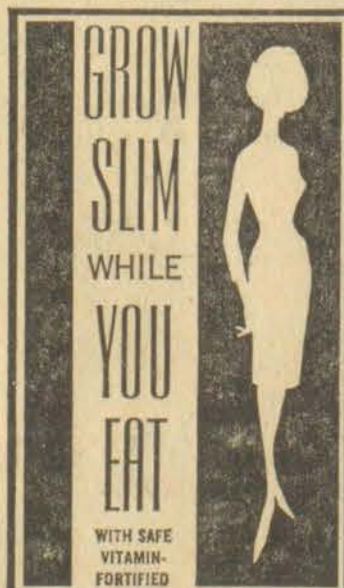

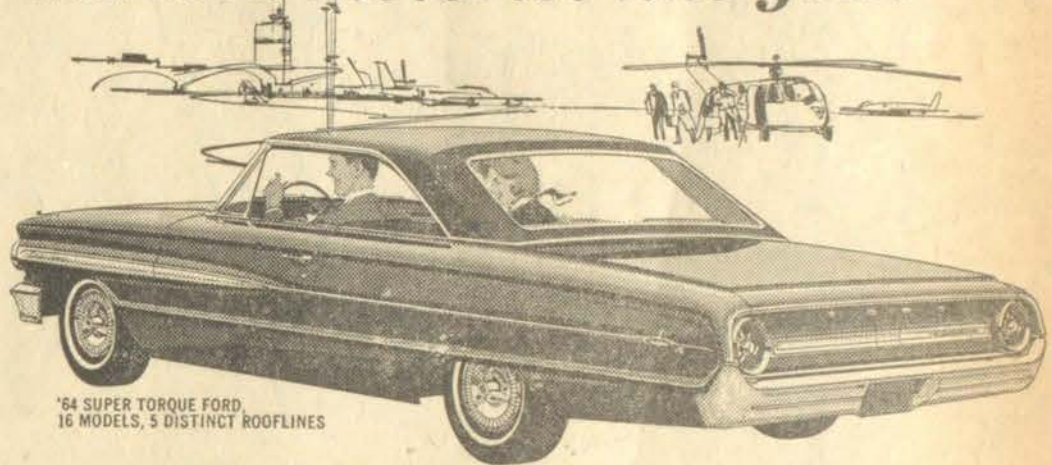

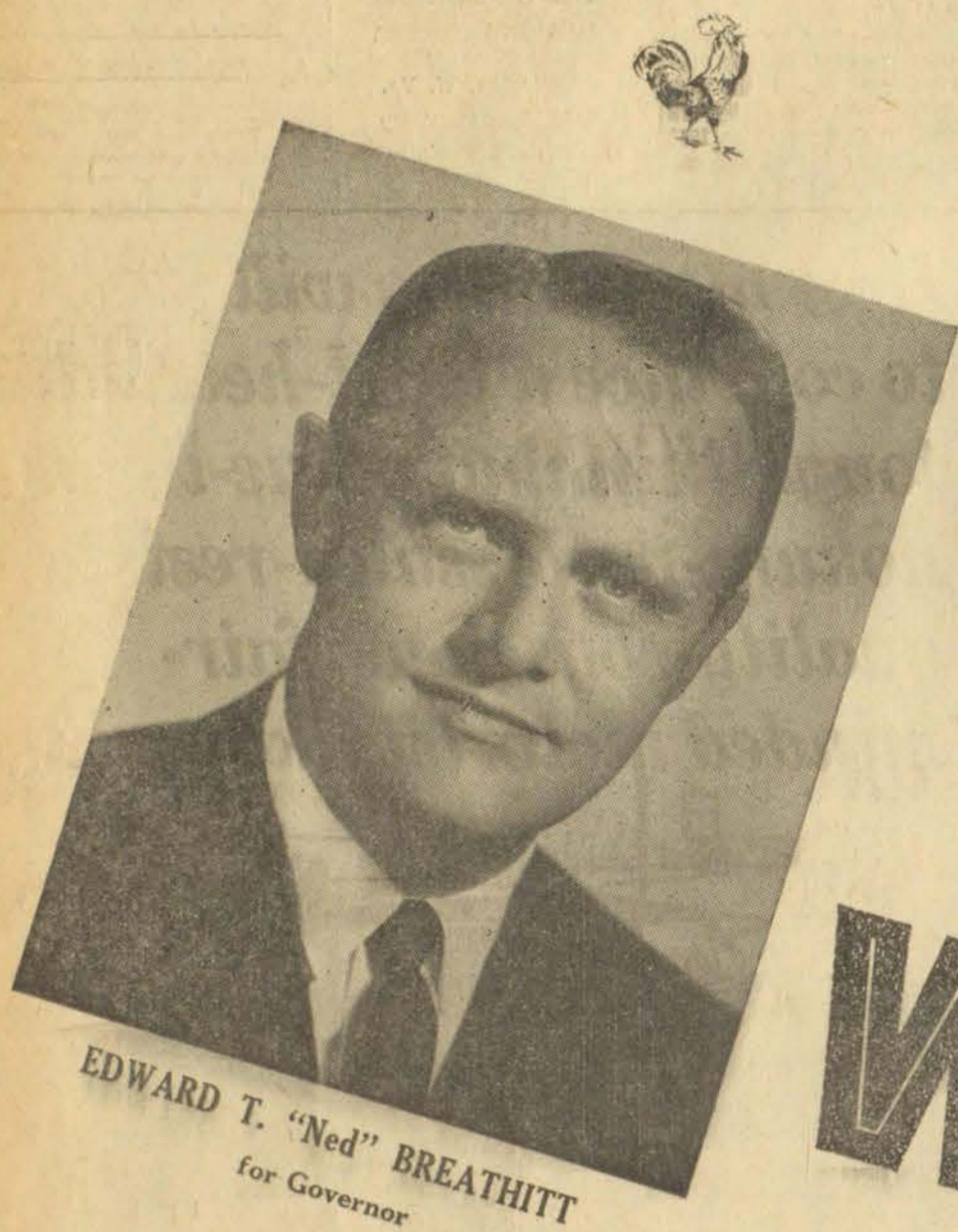

**FEDERAL, STATE FUNDS TO PAY FOR 7 LAKES**

Frankfort, Ky., Oct. 24 (Spl.) — Utilizing Accelerated Public Works money matched proportionately by funds from the Small Lakes Committee and other state agencies, the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources is engineering construction of seven lakes in various sections of Kentucky, encompassing 767 acres of new fishing waters at a cost of \$1,250,000. Minor Clark, commissioner of the Department, has announced.

Some of the lakes are in the building stages, one is almost completed and others have been approved by APW and state agencies and will be started soon, Clark explained.

Two of the lakes are located in Harlan county; one in Martin; another in Clay county, near Manchester; Madison county is to get one, and so is Anderson, while the seventh will be built in Pulaski county. In addition to these lakes, the Department has the approval for the use of APW funds in construction of a water supply public access area at Camp Wallace in Wayne county.

One of the largest lakes in the chain is under construction on Cranks Creek in Harlan county. This 260-acre lake is due to be completed in the spring of 1964 and the total cost will be \$500,000. This is built by APW funds in cooperation with the Small Lakes Committee under the direction of the Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Approval has been given for the construction of another 260-acre lake in Madison county but actual work has been held up pending acquisition of land. This lake will be constructed on Taylor Fork at a cost of \$260,000 using APW and Small Lakes Committee funds in cooperation with the Department of Fish and Wildlife.

In Anderson county work on a dam that will impound 167 acres of water is almost completed and the lake will be impounded this fall and winter. The lake will be on Beaver

**VENTERS GETS PRISON TERM**

**Pike Insurance Man Enters Plea of Guilty; 2 from Floyd Convicted**

Walter F. Venters, Pikeville insurance man, was sentenced to terms of a year and a day on each of five counts of mail fraud after his recent trial in U. S. district court at Pikeville, and the Cumberland Insurance Agency, Inc., of Pikeville, which he represented, was fined \$100 on the same charge.

Venters, president of the insurance agency, pleaded guilty to each count, as did the agency itself.

The indictment against Venters and the agency charged that the Cumberland Insurance Agency formerly was agent for the Stonewall Insurance Co., Mobile, Alabama, under authority granted by the Paul B. Bromley Co., Louisville. Because of financial difficulties encountered by the Pikeville insurance firm, however, its authority to act as agent for Stonewall was revoked in late 1958. Despite this, the indictment alleged, the Cumberland agency through its president, Venters, later mailed invoices on Stonewall Insurance Company policies to the Pike County Board of Education and to the Veterans Administration, Louisville. So it was, it was claimed, that Cumberland received premium payments on Stonewall policies to which it was not entitled.

**100 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK**

The Civil War in Kentucky  
By JOE JORDAN  
(Kentucky Civil War Commission)

One hundred years ago this week a Confederate cavalry battalion under command of Lt. Col. Clarence J. Prentice was defeated at Salyersville, Magoffin county, by the 14th and 39th Kentucky (Union) Infantry regiments, commanded, respectively, by Lt. Col. Orlando Brown, Jr., and Lt. Col. Stephen M. Ferguson. Fifty of the Rebel troopers were captured.

Clarence J. Prentice was a son of the editor of the Louisville Journal, George D. Prentice, a strong Union man. Both the editor's sons had joined the Confederate Army. Capt. Courtland Prentice, who had distinguished himself under Brig. Gen. J. H. Morgan, had been killed in a battle at Augusta, Kentucky, September 18, 1862.

By order of the military governor of Kentucky, Brig. Gen. Jeremiah T. Boyle, all corn which Kentucky distillers had purchased was seized and turned over to the Union Army Quartermaster. The distillers were warned not to buy any more corn.

In Louisville, Federal soldiers began picking up all "contrabands" and sending them to Lebanon to work on a road. Contrabands were fugitive slaves, or slaves unable to prove they were not fugitives, as by producing passes from their masters.

W. A. Gunn, of Lexington, engineer of a new military road being constructed by the Federal government, reported that he had been robbed of \$200 in cash and a watch worth about \$200 by guerrillas who raided Danville while he was at a hotel there. He said the outlaws first inquired about his politics; when he replied that he was a Union man, he was robbed. They then questioned a man from Harrodsburg. Having seen what happened to Gunn, he declared he was a Confederate. The guerrillas robbed him, too.

Nine mounted bushwhackers (another name for guerrillas) visited the farm of a man named Kirkpatrick in Lincoln county. Unable to find money they thought he had hidden, they compelled him to mount his own horse and ride away with them. When they had got about two miles from the farm, Kirkpatrick persuaded them to return to his house for supper, promising them whiskey as well as food. He sent a member of the household to sum-

mon help, and detained the bushwhackers at supper as long as he could. When they decided to leave, still insisting that Kirkpatrick go with them, three of the men left by the front door with him, the six others went out the back door.

Kirkpatrick picked up a heavy stick and knocked one of the three in the head. Taking his double-barreled gun, Kirkpatrick then shot both the others, one dying immediately and the other the next day. The six who had gone out the back way, hearing the firing, fled on foot.

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**BUTLER SAYS DROPOUTS CAN BEGIN OVER**

Frankfort, Ky., October 25 (Sp.)—Any Kentuckian who quit before high school graduation now can pick up where he or she left off.

Wendell P. Butler, state superintendent of public instruction, has pointed out the advantages of the state's adult education program.

"It not only provides a high school certificate for yesterday's dropouts," he said, "it also means employment for those unable to find jobs without one and promotion for those already employed."

"Our academic instruction is on an accelerated, non-credit basis in which each person can progress at his own rate, determined by his ability, formal schooling, time for study, and desire for learning," Butler added.

Persons who quit school can resume studies at whatever level they choose, C. F. Esham, director of the Division of Adult Education in the Department of Education, advised.

"This is an ungraded type of program for persons 18 years old or

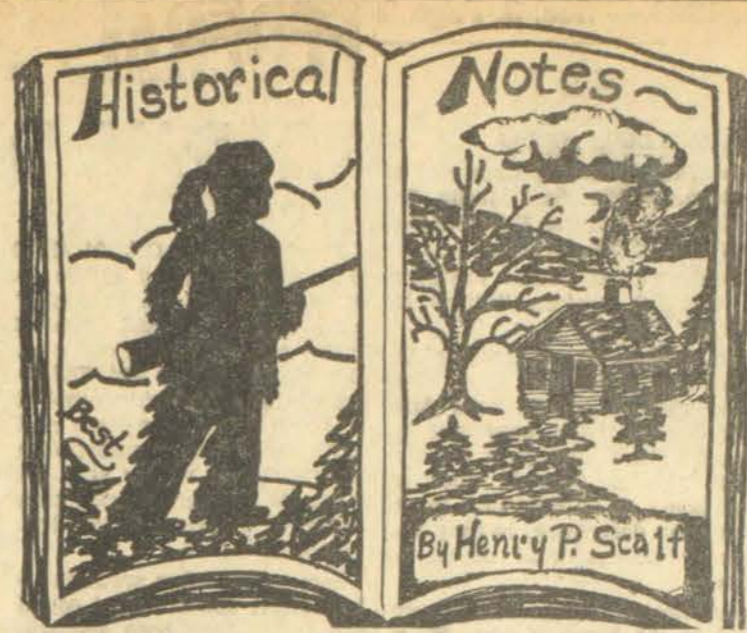
older with the rate of progress determining the student's class level," Esham continued. "No specific amount of hours are required, and the student can advance as fast as he is capable."

"For instance, a student can advance from the sixth grade to the ninth grade in the same semester. Our exceptional adults can complete requirements in one semester to qualify for the General Educational Development test."

This G.E.D. test, administered only at the University of Kentucky or at state colleges, qualifies adults for high school certificates.

The pilot program in adult education, helped by state funds, started two years ago. Classes are offered nights in public school facilities, making almost no additional equipment necessary, because the classrooms, libraries, shops and such already are in use.

Main cost is for instruction, as certified teachers are employed. Local superintendents supervise the



**GIBSON FAMILY**

We conclude the history of the Gibson family as submitted to us by Mrs. Mary P. Hanna, 210 S. High School Street, Indianapolis, Indiana. The original manuscript was prepared by Pierre Haynes, of New York and Texas. Mrs. Hanna excerpts the original for readers of this column.

"Great difficulty has been met in determining the names of the children of Archibald and Veshta Gibson. If he is the same as we find in Wilkes county census of 1790 there were undoubtedly daughters who married and stayed in North Carolina. There is also the great confusion caused by the use of family names in the various family branches. Besides those who might have stayed behind in North Carolina we have reason to believe that Archibald had Nicholas, Zachariah, John R., Ezekiel, Jesse, Absalom, Archie, James, William, Rachel and Elizabeth. Various members of the family commenced to arrive in Floyd and Perry counties, Kentucky, as early as 1816.

"Probably the first to arrive in Indiana was James who bought land near the present site of Jamestown, February 19, 1826. The village was probably named after him or James Matlock, a partner of John R. Gibson. The Gibson family is definitely connected with the village of Jamestown and local histories seem to assume that they were residents there. As a matter of fact they were mostly landholders in Hendricks county immediately south of Jamestown which is in Boone county. Most of the records of the family are at Danville, county seat of Hendricks county.

"Of the above sons of Archibald Gibson, Nicholas probably stayed behind in Floyd county, Kentucky, living near Prestonsburg (sic). Most of the Kentucky marriages of this family took place at Prestonsburg. Absalom and Archie went to Texas. Absalom probably going directly from Kentucky and Archie from Indiana. At least we know that Archie was known to grandchildren of Archibald in Indiana, while Absalom was not. Jesse lived in Indiana and probably went to Texas after 1850. Archie went in 1836 and was in the Texas army during the Mexican War. He was alive in 1875, aged 75 years. He had his cheekbone shot off in action. The rest of the family moved to Indiana beginning with James in 1826 and ending with Ezekiel in 1831. (Indiana Census of 1830 lists Ezekiel Gibson. This would indicate that he came between 1826 and 1830. Mr. Jesse Gibson married Molly Johnson, March 9, 1823. A later deed gives her name as Mary. They sold out their land in 1853 and there is no further record of them at Danville.

"Zachariah Gibson was known to have had a tanyard (the first) in Jamestown. Nothing else is known

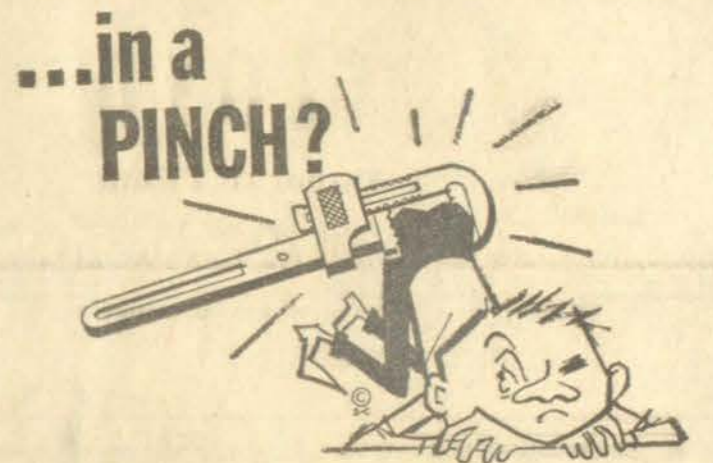

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### Food Stamp Permit Of Floyd Store Revoked

The food stamp program authorization number issued to Neval Jones' Grocery, of Lackey, Ky., was permanently revoked recently by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

According to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, Mrs. Neval Jones, owner of the store, had previously withdrawn from the food stamp program. She surrendered the store's authorization card, which identified it as one authorized to participate in the federal food stamp program. Agricultural Marketing Service officials stressed that the permanent revoking of the authorization number, KY-2-334, was on the basis of violations which otherwise would have warranted disqualification.

Mrs. Neval Jones is the legal owner of Neval Jones' Grocery, but it is operated as a joint venture with her husband, Agnol Jones, USDA said.

The action by the Agricultural Marketing Service is the third instance of a food retailer in Kentucky having his authorization number revoked permanently. It is the first instance in Knott county.

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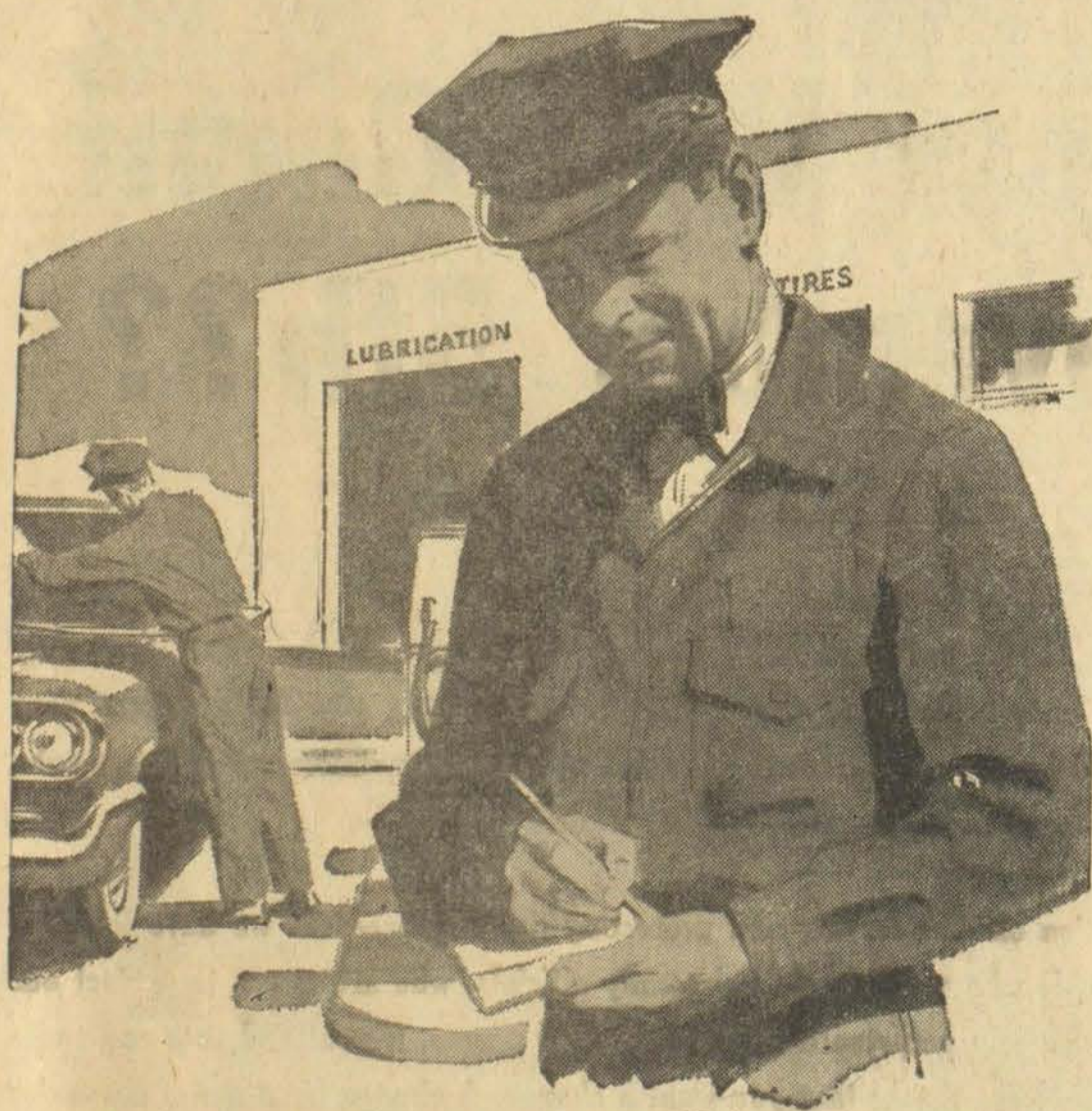

### Absentee Vote Law Upheld By Decision

Frankfort, Ky., Oct. 24—The Court of Appeals Thursday upheld the state's 1962 restrictive absentee-ballot law.

A brief order, signed by Chief Justice Milliken, reversed a ruling by Jefferson Circuit Judge Lawrence S. Grauman. The 1962 law limits absentee-voting to members of the armed services and Merchant Marine, federal employees, and religious or welfare workers connected with the armed services, along with their wives and dependents, and full-time college students.

an especially large chair built for her use. There was one child by this marriage, William B. Gibson, born 1831, died January 26, 1897 at Jamestown. He was a member of the 51st Indiana Volunteers and married Hester L. Tipton, and had John T. (d. inf.), Emma Maude, b. 1875, d. 1831, and Jonathan E., born February 11, 1862. Jonathan married Lula E. Coburn October 27, 1887, and lived in 1930 at Indianapolis. He had Vane G., Helen I., Chester L., William L., Dorothy M., and Katherine. Hester, wife of William B., died in 1875 and he remarried to Nora Murphy and had Will C. and Myrtle W.

"Because as he is mentioned as one of the founders of Jamestown, Indiana, John R. Gibson is probably the best known of Archibald's sons. One of the histories of Boone county tells of the marriage of John R. in Kentucky. It is said that his wife, Elizabeth Hooper, was emigrating across the mountains to Kentucky and met John Gibson on the way and was married. The marriage records of Floyd county, Kentucky, do not show the marriage of John Gibson and Elizabeth Hopper but there is a record of the marriage of John Gibson to Betsy Harper, June 2, 1818. She is said to have been sixteen years old when she came across so that we must assume that she had lived some time in Kentucky before her marriage. She was born June 9, 1800.

"The carelessness of pronunciation and the ignorance and illiteracy of these pioneers caused many mistakes and we feel safe in assuming that Betsy Harper who married John Gibson June 2, 1818, was Elizabeth Hopper. We know nothing of her father (possible Stephen 'Harper' of Floyd county, Kentucky.) Her mother Anna Hopper died at Jamestown March 23, 1838, aged 76 years. She is buried in the old cemetery back of the cannery. The Hoopers are said to have come from North Carolina.

"John R. Gibson was married twice. His first wife, Elizabeth, died at Jamestown, September 9, 1846, age 46 years, three months. John R. was born in 1796 and died January 13, 1872, age 76 years. The name of the second wife is unknown and this marriage is not known to have resulted in issue. The known children are the offspring of John R. Gibson and Elizabeth Hopper. Family records indicate that the children left home early because of the treatment received from the step-mother. The children were Francis Marion, Matthew, Tempa and George Washington.

"Ezekiel Gibson, son of Archibald Gibson, was probably born in North Carolina before 1800. He probably went with his parents to Kentucky. The marriage record shows his marriage to Jenny Johnson at Prestonsburg, Kentucky, May 30, 1819. She was afterwards known as Lucinda and Jane. There is no record of ownership of land in Kentucky. He bought land in Hendricks county, Indiana, August 17, 1831, and he was apparently the last of the sons of Archibald to come to Indiana.

"The movement of this family to Hendricks county and later to Clinton county, Indiana, is definitely connected with the Kirk family. Nathan Kirk was an early emigrant to Hendricks county where he was an associate judge in Clinton county.

"Kirk's Settlement of Clinton county undoubtedly had much to do with the going of Ezekiel. He sold his land in Hendricks county November 7, 1835, and bought land near Kirklins, November 13, 1835. The farm he purchased was S. E. QR. Sec. 10, Twp. 20 Range 1E. He paid \$250. This farm lies between Kirklins and Frankfort, a few miles from Kirklins where Sugar Creek crosses the highway. The location of the house is not known but is said to have been near the road that follows the creek. Ezekiel died in the latter part of January, 1837, and is said to have been buried on his own farm.

"The records of his estate show that guardians were appointed for minor children named William, Rachel, Sarah (Ellen) and Samuel Preston. A son, Allen, was known

to have been of age in 1843. The estate was settled in May, 1838, and a guardian appointed for the minor children. In 1846, Peter B. Kennedy was appointed as guardian in place of the first guardian who moved to Kentucky. The guardian was finally discharged June 12, 1851, by order of the court when all of the children were of age except Samuel and William who had been bound out to Nathan Kirk. We have only one birth date for this family. Samuel Preston Gibson was born August 31, 1831, probably at Jamestown, Indiana. With the exception of William the rest of the family was thought to have been born before that date, probably in Kentucky."

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### INDICTMENT ALTERED

Frankfort, Ky., Oct. 24—The Franklin County grand jury Thursday returned an amended indictment of knowingly receiving stolen property against Britton P. Franklin, former State Tax Commission attorney. The indictment Tuesday had merely charged receiving stolen property. The allegation involves possession of a stolen television set.

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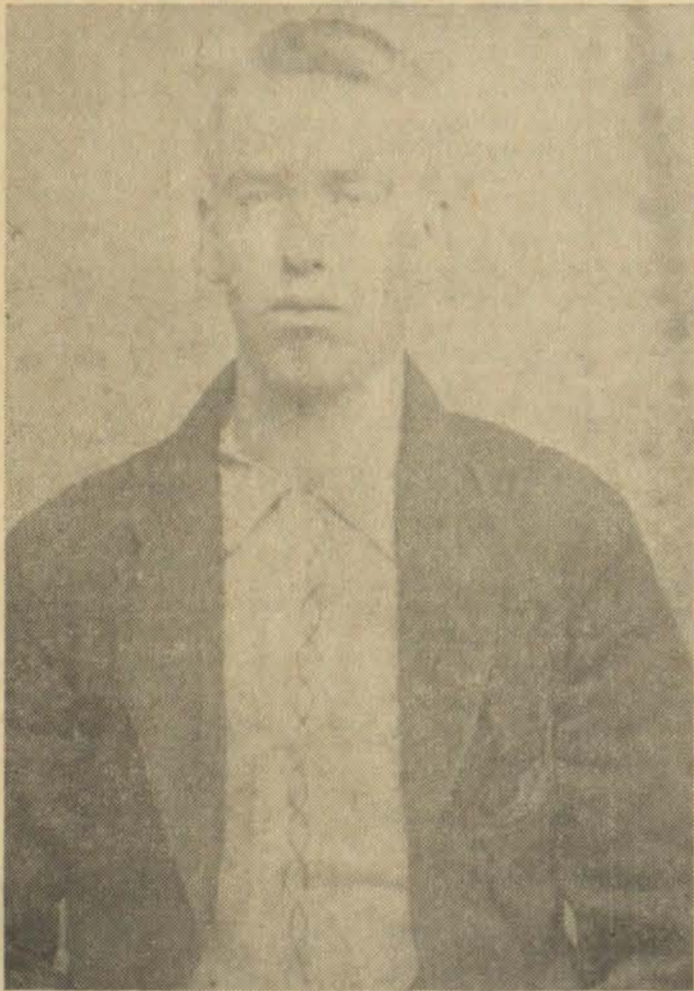

Ellison (Cotton Top) Mounts

The only man executed for murder in the famous Hatfield-McCoy feud was Ellison Mounts, nicknamed Cotton Top because his hair was snow white. He was hanged at Pikeville, Feb. 18, 1889, for participation in the New Year's, 1888, night attack on the home of Randolph McCoy, on Blackberry Creek, Pike county. Allfair McCoy and her brother, Calvin, were shot down as they fled the burning cabin and Sally McCoy, wife of the feud leader, Randolph McCoy, was critically injured but recovered. Mounts confessed to the crime before he was hanged.
