#### When Fun Isn't Innocent

Fred W. Luigart, of The Courier-Journal's East Kentucky Bureau at Hazard, last week wrote an interesting if sweeping indictment of Eastern Kentuckians in their "celebration" of Hallowe'en.

Apparently drawing on State Police records and the experiences of citizens, Luigart alleged that perhaps nowhere in the United States is Hallowe'en "celebrated" in a more vicious manner than in the coalfields of the area. He told of a woman, driving from Florida to Morehead, being terrorized as boulders and smaller rocks were rained down on her car from an overlooking embankment in Magoffin county; of a state trooper smashing his car against a boulder left in the highway; of logs and trees cluttering roads, of adults joining youngsters in hi-jinks that long ago ceased to be funny.

In Prestonsburg, although there was no great prop-erty damage, the night took on an ugly air as grown men, masked, reportedly roamed the streets. One woman reported two or more of these apparently were intoxicated, using disgraceful and frightening language.

All of which should convince peace officers and citizens alike that Hallowe'en, for all its traditions. is not a time when a moratorium is to be declared on law enforcement. We're all for the children having Hallowe'en fun, but when men don masks, even as the Ku Kluxers do, and under the cloak of anonymity turn what could be an evening of innocent fun into a hight of potential danger, or even horror, to others, the line should be drawn in unmistakable fashion.

The neighboring community of Paintsville is said to have adopted a commonsense policy this year. There no person above the age of 16 was permitted to wear a mask, and all, regardless of age, were forbidden the privilege of roaming the streets past 10 p.m.

"The death of Ellison Mounts today on the scaffold marks the first decisive efforts of the law to avenze one of the most horrible outrages that was ever perpetrated on a peaceful people. On New Years night of 1888, Rand'l McCoy, his grayhaired wife, Calvan and Miss Allifair, their children, and an orphan boy of ten years, were peacefully sleeping in their humble home on the west bank of Tug River in this county. Suddenly the stillness of the night was broken by the rapid discharge of firearms. The inmates of the cabin sprang from their beds to find the house surrounded by armed men. The fusilade continued. Father and son were making a gal lant effort in defense of the family when a new enemy appeared on the scene. Suddenly the darkness was dispersed around the besieged home. "The fiends had set fire to the building. The scene that follows beggars description. When morning dawned, the daughter lay dead near the dying embers of the house. A gaping hole in the young lady's bosom indicated the bullet's course. "The gray-haired mother lay a short distance away with her face horribly lacerated though not fatally injured. In the shadow of the shade (paper torn) . . . the edge of the clerring (sic) the son's body was found. A Winchester rifle ball had pierced his brain. The father and the orphan boy alone escaped injury

"For this heinous crime Mounts was arrested. He confessed his guilt. According to his statement those who participated and were present the night of the murders were: Jim Vance, Cap Hatfield, Bob Hatfield, Ellison Hatfield, French Ellis, Tom Mitchell and Tom Gillespie

"Ellison Mounts was the illegitimate son of old Deacon Hatfield He was 24 years old and could neither read or write when placed in prison but learned both arts while confined.'

Kentucky's "assigned risk" plan for automobile liability insurance. whereby all companies writing this coverage must insure a number of high-risk drivers in proportion to the amount of business they do. will be altered effective January 1. 1964, to eliminate these high-risk drivers from the over-all loss-ratio experience which ultimately determines the rates for average drivers. Insurance Commissioner J. Elliott Flanery said that the new arrangement would tend to lower rates for the average driver, although the effect will not be felt for some two years. Similar plans to separate the two types of experience in rate-making have been adopted in approximately 20 states, he said. The latest study of assigned-risk

drivers in Kentucky disclosed that these motorists cost \$129 in losses and other expenses for bodily injury and property damage for each \$100 taken in as premium. In the vocabulary of insurance actuaries, this means a loss ratio of 129 per cent, Flanery said.

Rates for these assigned risk drivers have also been standardized so that any of the approximately 250 companies which might be assigned the application will charge the same rate, he said. Drivers with the worst of the poor driving records will pay proportionately more, based on the number of points accumulated for accidents and traffic violations during the preceding three years.

Insurance agents who submit a driver's policy application to the Kentucky Automobile Assigned Risk Plan will be able to quote the premium cost to the customer immediately under the new arrangement. Since rates now vary from company to company, they presently can be quoted to the customer only after his application is assigned to a particular company.

Flanery pointed out even the assigned risk pool is not open to all drivers. Some with extremely bad driving records are disqualified, he said.

Some drivers, because of their age or other factors, may be considered poor risks even though their past driving records may be spotless. These drivers are insured under the assigned-risk plan at the same rates as those drivers insured by the companies voluntarily, Flanery said. Flanery urged all insurance agents to contact their companies for details of the new plan, before the effective date of January 1.
