

WARNING IS ISSUED IN GRAND JURY TALK

JUDGE SAYS NEW POLICY FORMULATED

Stumbo and Sturgill Pledge Cooperation On Confiscation Plan

Addressing the grand jury of the Floyd circuit court for the first time, Circuit Judge Hollie Conley served notice Monday morning on property owners whose tenants are bootlegging to get them out.

"One of the issues of the campaign was the liquor problem in this county," he said. "Many good people were anxious to know what my policy would be, if elected. If anybody is renting property which is used for bootlegging, I warn them to get them out. My policy will be this: I will direct the Commonwealth's and County Attorneys to confiscate and sell all property occupied by persons convicted of bootlegging."

"I will follow the judge's directions," commented Commonwealth's Attorney Harold Stumbo. County Attorney Barkley J. Sturgill later told Judge Conley he will be glad to work with Stumbo in complying with the directive.

Liquor law violation charges against 11 persons were dismissed this week by County Judge Henry Stumbo, so that the cases could be referred to the grand jury now in session. The action was taken after a recent liquor trial in quarterly court resulted in a "hung" jury despite the fact that the defendant did not testify in his own behalf after testimony had been introduced alleging his guilt. Defendants in these transferred cases are Thomas Laferty, Zella Mae Tackett, Mrs. Howard Stone, Harold Yates, Bobby Joseph, Junior (Red) Martin, Bennie Branchman, Raleigh Barnett, Alice Wright, Tommy Ratliff, Ernest Campbell.

Cases of two other defendants, Howard Stone and Jolie Maynard, had previously been transferred to circuit court because personal property was involved. The case of Junior Wells could not be transferred because it dated back more than 12 months, and the case has been redocketed for trial in quarterly court.

In his grand jury instructions Judge Conley told members of the grand jury, seven men and five women, that he considered them outstanding citizens. "We can make this a better county," (See Story No. 1, Page 6)

THIRTY YEARS AGO...

The Floyd circuit court has three new officials, all of whom are comparatively young, and each of whom has declared his intention of doing the best job of which he is capable.

We would encourage them to do just that—the very best job they are capable of doing. And it occurs to us, as we wish them well, that the most appropriate editorializing we could do would be to repeat a story which was told us by a friend, the other day.

It relates to the late O. C. Hall, who just 30 years ago this month became Commonwealth's Attorney here. O. C. Hall, who was by no means perfect, even as we all are, had two great attributes: He was afraid of nobody, in any situation, and he was honest.

Not long after he had taken the oath of office, a case arose in court which involved a man in whom a number of people were interested. So it was that four friends of the defendant who were closely related, by blood or friendship, or both, to Mr. Hall came here to plead for him.

They sat in a close group, the new prosecutor listening while his friends and relatives talked, asking him to dismiss the case. Suddenly those about him saw that tears were streaming down Mr. Hall's face. They naturally wondered why.

"I have to go into court tomorrow morning and resign my office," he told them.

FLOYD AID TOTAL TOLD

Stumbo Notes Amount Of Food Stamp Help; \$2,667,976 Expended

Floyd County Judge Henry Stumbo, in commenting on the food stamp program in this county, noted this week that 7,000 persons are receiving aid from the stamps. At one time, he said, 11,000 persons were eligible to participate.

Since the program was started here \$2,667,976 has been expended by the recipients for food. Of this amount, \$691,557, was contributed by the recipients.

Judge Stumbo, in explaining the three-fold purpose of the stamp program, said it helped needy families by giving them a more nourishing diet; it moved an agricultural abundance through small Floyd county retail and wholesale outlets; and helped the county economy by putting money into circulation.

"I sincerely hope that the food stamp will be continued in this county," Stumbo said, "until all of our unemployed find work. I also hope that we will finally have a work program for those able to work."

AREA FUNDS INTENDED FOR LONG-RANGE USE

County Judge Henry Stumbo said here this week that he has contacted every source known to him and that he has been unable to find any of the widely publicized "winter relief" scheduled for Eastern Kentucky's needy.

Though dubbed "winter relief," the funds made available by the federal government, with state participation, appear to be intended rather for long-range improvement of conditions. For instance:

Of the \$640,000 additional federal aid announced Monday by Governor Breathitt for this area, \$300,000 has been earmarked for the state's vocational-rehabilitation program to help the mentally retarded and handicapped; \$250,000 is for federal surplus property such as school buses, school furniture and laboratory equipment to be sent into the area, and the remaining \$90,000 is for additional maternal and child health services to be administered through the State Health Department.

Of the \$10 million authorized by President Johnson for the

CD SUPPLIES ARRIVE HERE

Courthouse Is Used As Temporary Storage; To Stock Other Centers

Civilian Defense supplies to stock Floyd county fallout shelters began arriving here Wednesday morning.

The first shipment consisted of 136 boxes of dried foods, medical and sanitation supplies to stock the Postoffice and Health Center buildings here. These supplies are temporarily being stored in the courthouse, Hern Burke, county Civilian Defense director, said.

Next week, supplies sufficient for 6,000 persons are expected for the stocking of Reed mines in the Drift vicinity.

Subsequent shipments will provide supplies for other centers approved as fallout shelters, the mines of Princess Coals at David, Inland Steel at Wheelwright and Elk Horn Coal Corporation at Wasland.

Death of Mrs. Tackett Under Investigation

Coroner Chester Hager, of Fayette county, issued a statement this week saying Miss Tackett died of an overdose of powerful sleeping tablets.

An indication that relatives of Miss Jo Ann Tackett, formerly of East McDowell, are continuing an investigation into circumstances surrounding her death is found in an advertisement appearing in The Lexington Herald, Monday morning.

The advertisement, headed "Urgent," reads: "Anyone knowing of the movements or whereabouts of Jo Ann Tackett, prior to December 26, please notify her mother, Call Dayton, Ohio, 233-2955."

Miss Tackett's body was found by Donald Lee Meade, formerly of Prestonsburg, in her Lexington apartment, the morning of December 26. An autopsy was performed, but relatives said findings were inconclusive.

BOARD RENEWS PACT WITH CLARK, RATLIFF

The Floyd County Board of Education voted unanimously Saturday to renew the contract of Superintendent Charles F. Clark for another four years, extending his term of office from the expiration of his present term on June 30 till July 1, 1968.

By the same unanimous action his contract as secretary of the Board was extended for the same duration.

Salaries to be paid Mr. Clark remain unchanged—\$9,200 a year as superintendent and \$2,400 as secretary. The motion to re-employ him was made and seconded by Board Members Ross Cooley and Bill Wells, respectively.

The same unanimity prevailed in renewing the contract for a four-year period of Wayne Ratliff as assistant superintendent. Mr. Ratliff's salary will be \$9,200 a year, as during his current term.

Commenting on the Board's action, Superintendent Clark said:

"Naturally, I am pleased and flattered by the Board's action, particularly since the Board proved that it is in complete harmony by voting unanimously on this matter. This spirit of cooperation has enabled the Floyd county school system to move forward rapidly in recent months. We still have much to do for our 12,000 children. While the Superintendent's responsibilities are sometimes almost overwhelming, I do accept the challenge. With a Board composed of members such as our present Board members, who are interested in Floyd county's children first, I look forward to four more years of laboring to make ours the finest schools in Eastern Kentucky. We ask the help and understanding of all Floyd countians in our move forward."

The Board approved the \$490,000 bond sale to finance the Wheelwright elementary school building and authorized its chairman and secretary to sign any documents relative to the sale. At the same time George Lee Shannon, architect, was authorized to advertise for contractors' bids on the construction of the Harold elementary school addition. Bids will be opened at a special Board meeting, Feb. 8. The \$80,000 approximate cost of the structure is being financed without the sale of bonds. The addition will replace the antiquated frame portion of the Harold building.

Superintendent Clark was authorized to advertise for sale the Sizemore school property, including the two buildings on the site. This authorization was made simultaneously with a decision to abandon the Sizemore school.

The Superintendent also was authorized to ask for bids on teacher wardrobes at the Middle Creek elementary school, which is nearing completion. Wardrobes were not included in the original construction contract. The school will open next fall and will eliminate all other schools on Middle Creek except that at David. There is a possibility, it was said, that two or three schools outside the Middle Creek watershed will be eliminated and their pupils transported to the new center.

Breathitt was told by President Johnson December 13 at a White House conference that the Appalachian program, started by President John F. Kennedy, would continue.

Breathitt plans to visit federal officials in Washington again January 17 to confer on the program.

GRAND JURY NAMES PRATT

In Murder Indictment; Eastern State Reports He Is Not Psychotic

One of the first seven indictments reported by the grand jury at the current circuit court session charged Grover Pratt, of Garrett, with wilful murder.

Pratt is accused of the slaying last October at Garrett of Phyllis Ann Sears, of Melvin. A few weeks after his arrest and imprisonment here, he was committed to Eastern State hospital, Lexington, for examination and possible treatment. He was returned to jail here Monday after the hospital had reported that "this patient has been observed and examined by members of our hospital staff and found not psychotic."

Commonwealth's Attorney Harold Stumbo explained, shortly after the seven true bills were reported Wednesday afternoon, that other indictments have been voted but have not been officially reported to the court. These will be reported shortly, he added.

One of the indictments named James Akers, a man of about 25, charging him with assault and battery of Larry Leslie, schoolboy son of Dr. and Mrs. Edward B. Leslie, of Prestonsburg. Akers was jailed Sunday, a day after he allegedly struck and kicked the youth on Arnold avenue here.

Other defendants named in indictments and charges against them follow:

Homer Hicks, breaking and entering the dwelling at Lackey of Gordon Collins; Garnie Watts, Carson Hurt, Carl Hurt and Elbert Fugate, breaking and entering the storehouse of Big Sandy Explosive Company; Otis Cisco, Jr., Ollie David Blackburn and Fred McCoy, breaking into the store of Earl Castle, Prestonsburg jeweler, and theft of tires from Bruce Walters Ford here; James Lovitt, grand larceny, stealing battery lights from the Turner Elkhorn Coal Company at Drift.

Funeral services were held today (Thursday) at the home, the Revs. L. P. Tussey and Wayne Blanton officiating. Burial was made in the Hoot Shepherd cemetery at Dwale under the direction of Carter & Callihan Funeral Home.

Pipe Cleaner Firm Sued For \$9,800 In Damages

Damages totaling \$9,800 are asked by Mrs. Ethel Salisbury Cross, of Prestonsburg, in a suit filed in circuit court Monday against the Pittsburg Pipe Cleaner Company. The suit is the aftermath of injuries suffered by Mrs. Cross last September in a fall on the sidewalk near the corner of Graham and South Lake Drive.

The suit alleges that the defendant's agents placed rods and other material used in cleaning and renovating city sewers on the sidewalk in such a negligent and careless manner as to make use of the sidewalk dangerous to pedestrians, and that they failed to erect a barrier or give any warning of the presence there of the obstructions. The accident occurred, it was pointed out, about 10 p.m.

Broken bones, bruises and lacerations resulted from the fall.

CEREMONY WITNESSED BY CROWD

Newly-Inducted Judge Picks Court Reporter, Master Commissioner

A crowded courtroom witnessed the induction to office Monday morning of the three circuit court officials elected at last November's general election.

The oath of office for Circuit Judge Hollie Conley was administered by his father, Willis Conley, of Garrett, who recently procured a notary public's commission for the specific purpose of officiating at his son's induction to office. Commonwealth's Attorney Harold J. Stumbo and Circuit Court Clerk Frank DeRossett were sworn in by County Judge Henry Stumbo in a joint ceremony.

Later, Circuit Judge Conley announced the appointment of Marshall Davidson as master commissioner and Mrs. Irene McIntosh as court reporter. He administered the oaths of office for both.

In the large courtroom crowd were many relatives and friends of the three officials.

Immediately following his induction, Circuit Judge Conley addressed the gathering, expressing his appreciation of the sportsmanship and work of his predecessor, Edward P. Hill, Jr., and acknowledging the seriousness of the duties of the office.

"This," he said, "is a vicarious and moving occasion because of the great responsibility which rests upon the shoulders of a judge. In the hands of our courts rest the lives, the property, the liberties of every citizen, high or low, rich or poor, black or white. NAB BROCK IN CHICAGO

Theft of Money Order Blanks At Minnie P. O. Charged To J. T. Brock

Federal authorities questioned a former Wheelwright man, James Taylor Brock, Jr., 24, Friday, in an effort to account for more than 100 of 400 postoffice money order blanks he is said to have stolen December 16 from the postoffice of Minnie, this county.

Brock is a veteran of the Navy and attended Wheelwright high school but withdrew and returned in 1953 to graduate on a G.E.D. test.

Brock, who said he formerly owned a bakery in Tulsa, was arrested Thursday of last week in a Chicago currency exchange after he tried to cash a money order.

Jacob Elkins, 57, owner of the exchange, called police after he verified that the serial number on the money order checked with a batch of forms stolen December 16 in a burglary of the postoffice at Minnie. The forms, if cashed at top \$100 value, would bring \$40,000.

Herschel Roberts, Chicago post-office inspector, said Brock admitted breaking into the Minnie postoffice and taking the forms, a check writer, validation stamp, and \$90 cash.

Roberts said 263 of the stolen blanks were found either in Brock's pockets, in a waste basket of the currency exchange where he was arrested, or in a suburban Schiller Park motel where he had been living since January 1 with his wife, Elizabeth, 22, and their 18-month-old son.

Roberts said Brock admitted that he cashed 15 or 20 money orders after forging them—some in Tulsa, and some in Kansas City, where he converted five for \$100 each at a Western Union office. He said he went then to St. Louis, and later flew to Chicago.

Brock was held on a preliminary charge of possessing stolen government property while further efforts were made to find out what happened to 100 other blanks.

For Added Beauty

As one drives the new highways in Eastern Kentucky and admires the beauty of areas which until a short time ago were inaccessible to the motorist, the thought arises that here indeed could be a mecca for all who love natural beauty.

The Mountain Parkway is a case in point. This has been hailed as "a geologist's dream and an engineer's nightmare" because of the diversity of rock formations and the difficult terrain penetrated by the highway. Blue Grass and Mountains, rolling lands and soaring mountains, pastoral beauty and rugged picturesqueness—the countryside intrigues the interest of the traveller as few areas can.

At this season of the year certain areas are particularly picturesque because of the wealth of evergreens on the nearby hillsides, creeping down to the very right-of-way of the road. Cuts and slopes have been seeded to grass, and most of the scars left by the builders will be hidden by a natural carpet of green.

One bit of work could make this Mountains-to-the-Bluegrass highway as inviting to tourists as Washington's cherry trees in bloom make the nation's capital. The planting of dogwoods and redbuds along the road, with care taken to see that the trees will not be subject to the mower's blade, would do the job.

These trees are native to the area and would not be difficult to grow. They also seed themselves and have a long life-span, and so the supply of trees would be permanent.

Can't you see the springtime picture—the white and pink of dogwoods and redbuds against a backdrop of spruce, cedar and pine and rugged outcroppings of rock?

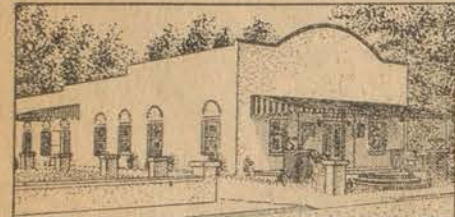

AREA FOOD PROGRAM IN SCHOOLS SLATED



Hot lunches for an additional 7,000 Eastern Kentucky school children is the goal in February of local, state and federal officials, according to an announcement by C. E. Bevins, director of the school lunch program in the Kentucky Department of Education.

Sixty-eight schools in eight counties of the region have been contacted with explanations and demonstrations of the projected program. These schools alone would serve hot lunches to 1,793 youngsters each school day. Return visits to the counties will be made in the next few days.

Floyd county has only six rural schools at present not participating in the program, according to Miss Blanche Dingus, director of the program for the Floyd County Board of Education. The county served as a pilot county in the program and began the present phase of its operation in January, 1962.

Special federal assistance for the program—in the form of food items and a maximum reimbursement of 15 cents for each lunch served—will come from federal sources. State agencies will administer the funds and will distribute food items from central stocks. Local communities are being asked to help secure stoves, refrigerators, hot plates and other necessary equipment. Parents and other volunteers will also prepare the lunches in many schools.

Other sources are also being tapped for necessary equipment. The State Department of Education's surplus property director, J. B. Williams, is locating stoves, refrigerators, storage cabinets, dinnerware and other items as well as trucks and jeeps for delivering the food. The Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation has contributed 13 two-burner hot plates and 39 galvanized cookers for demonstrations in 13 counties. These will be turned over to individual schools after demonstrations by the education department.

The federal reimbursement funds must be used for food purchases. These will be purchased in bulk by county boards of education and distributed as needed to the participating schools.

A demonstration meeting at Warfield high school in Martin county last week attracted 10 teachers, two of whom agreed to start the program immediately. Others will appeal to parents and their communities for help in securing equipment and volunteer help.

Earl R. Butler, head of the U.S.D.A.'s food distribution for school lunches, said that canned meats and other high protein foods—the most costly items on any menu—have already been shipped to Kentucky for use in the program. Floyd county hasn't yet received its quota but expects to soon.

Thomas A. Lewis, director of commodity distribution in the Kentucky agriculture department said that canned pork, chicken, chopped meat, butter, cheese and peanut butter are already on hand here.

At the Martin county meeting, Miss Georgia Arnett, who covers some 20 counties as State Department of Education school lunch supervisor, cooked and served a typical menu of pork and gravy, green beans, peach halves, bread, butter and milk.

Bevins said that about 75 per cent of the foods needed will be purchased from local food suppliers and jobbers. Purchases will include vegetables, fruit, bread and milk. These items, along with meat or other high protein food and butter, make up the "type A" menu under the U.S.D.A. classification, he said.

Accelerated efforts to extend school lunch participation are part of the winter relief efforts for Eastern Kentucky, launched during the administrations of former Gov. Bert T. Combs and the late President John F. Kennedy. Combs and Gov. Edward T. Breathitt conferred recently with President Lyndon B. Johnson in Washington. Johnson pledged his continued support of the emergency measures, adding, however, that they are no substitute

Baptists Schedule Evangelistic Meet

Middletown, Ky., Jan 8 (Spl.)—The 17th annual Kentucky Baptist evangelistic conference will open at the Walnut Street Baptist Church in Louisville, January 13. The three-day event, which begins with the evening session on January 13 and closes at noon on January 15, is expected to attract 2,000 pastors and other leaders from Baptist churches throughout Kentucky.

Robert G. Lee, pastor emeritus of the Bellevue Baptist Church in Memphis, Tennessee, will preach on "Jesus, the Master Evangelist" and "Prayers of Concern." During his 33-year ministry in Memphis, Dr. Lee saw the Bellevue Church grow from 1,400 to more than 9,000 members—the largest of any church east of the Mississippi River. He has written 34 books.

The purpose of the conference is to provide methods and inspiration for churches in winning and baptizing new converts. Last year Kentucky Baptist churches baptized 19,000 converts. The goal for 1964 is one baptism for each twenty church members.

NO POLIO CASES IN '63 IS RECORD, TEAGUE SAYS

"No polio in Kentucky this year!"

This happy record was announced on the last day of 1963 by Dr. Russell E. Teague, commissioner of the State Department of Health.

"This has never happened before, as far as we know," Dr. Teague added. "At least, it hasn't happened since 1916, when the state began keeping records of polio cases."

No Kentucky deaths have resulted from polio in the last two years, in comparison to the average of 26 fatalities per year from 1951-60, he reported. The record polio year in Kentucky was 1952, when 1,762 cases were reported, 924 of these paralytic. The death total that year was 129, also a record.

The last two years also have been marked by a tremendous drop in Kentucky cases. Only 23 were listed in 1961 and just 26 in 1962, compared to a 10-year average of 434 per year from 1951-60, Dr. Teague pointed out.

In September of this year, a suspected polio case was reported when an 11-year-old girl died at Symsonia in Westmoreland County. However, J. Clifford Todd, state epidemiologist, said that laboratory tests did not confirm the polio diagnosis.

Health officials attributed the decline of polio to the Salk and Sabin vaccines. The Sabin variety, an oral vaccine, is used mostly in the state now.

Mass immunization campaigns were carried out in all 120 counties of Kentucky in 1962-63.

HIGH RATINGS
The 15th region and Floyd county have four teams rated in the top 25 in Kentucky high school basketball in the latest ratings. Heading the pack is undefeated Wheelwright in 11th place, followed by Garrett in 15th place, Paintsville in 22nd and McDowell in 24th positions.

Outside of Jefferson county (Louisville), Floyd county has more cage teams in the top spots than any other county in the state. This is a fine tribute to county basketball. Tommy Boyd's Wayland Wasps missed the group by a mere four points.

Tuesday, January 21, undefeated Wheelwright is slated to meet the once-beaten Paintsville Tigers in what should be the 15th region's game of the year, since both are considered to be the leading choices for Garrett's regional crown.

Prestonsburg plays host to McDowell on the same night, and there is a strong possibility that the Paintsville-Wheelwright clash will be switched to Prestonsburg's spacious gym in order to accommodate the expected crowd.

Freddy Setser, Prestonsburg's hot-shooting junior forward, sports a 30-point per game average in the Black Cats' first seven games. He has been the Cats' most prolific scorer since the days of Lowell Hughes. He is second in the region to May-

town's talented Bob Tallent who sails along at a 40.4 per game mark, based on 364 points in nine games.

For the benefit of many phone callers who have been comparing Tallent's scoring with that of Wayland's all time great Kelly Coleman, we are listing Coleman's record-holding feats.

In 1952-'53, his freshman year, Kelly scored 336 points in 20 games for a 19.3 average; in 1953-'54, in 30 games as a sophomore, he tallied 784 points for a 26.1 per game average. In his junior season in 1954-'55, in 36 games, he amassed a total of 1,174 points for a 32.6 slate, and in his final year in 1955-'56 in 37 games he poured in 1,734 points for an uncanny 46.8 individual game mark.

Overall in his four-year career in 123 games, he scored 4,078 points for a 33.2 individual game slate. He was coached by former Eastern Kentucky State College All-K.I.A.C. forward "Copper John" Campbell, who now is in private business at Mousie, Knott county.

Scott county, one of the better teams in the 10th region, visits Floyd county for a two-game week-end session — Friday night at Betsy Layne and Saturday night at Maytown. The Scotties downed Maysville last Saturday by a 10-point margin.

Prestonsburg will attempt to raise its season mark to 6-3, Saturday night, when the Flat Gap Greyhounds move into the local gym.

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

**HIGHWAY SAFETY PROGRAM
UNDERTAKEN BY KENTUCKY**

Kentucky has undertaken a new highway safety program requiring drivers suspected of having physical or mental defects to take a medical examination.

Called the Driver Limitation Program, the new plan is a joint activity of the two State departments—health and public safety—and the Kentucky State Medical Association. It was initiated January 1.

According to State Public Safety Commissioner Glenn Lovern, medical tests, by a physician of the driver's choosing, will be required for the following:

A driver who has been involved in three traffic accidents within a two-year period.

A driver who tells an officer investigating an accident that he "blacked out" or "doesn't know what happened."

A driver who had an obvious defect when he applied for his license.

A driver whose ability to drive safely is challenged by another person in a sworn affidavit.

"Human error accounts for roughly 85 per cent of all traffic accidents," Lovern said. "Thus we feel it is imperative that this plan be administered. It has been set up by administrative regulation under provi-

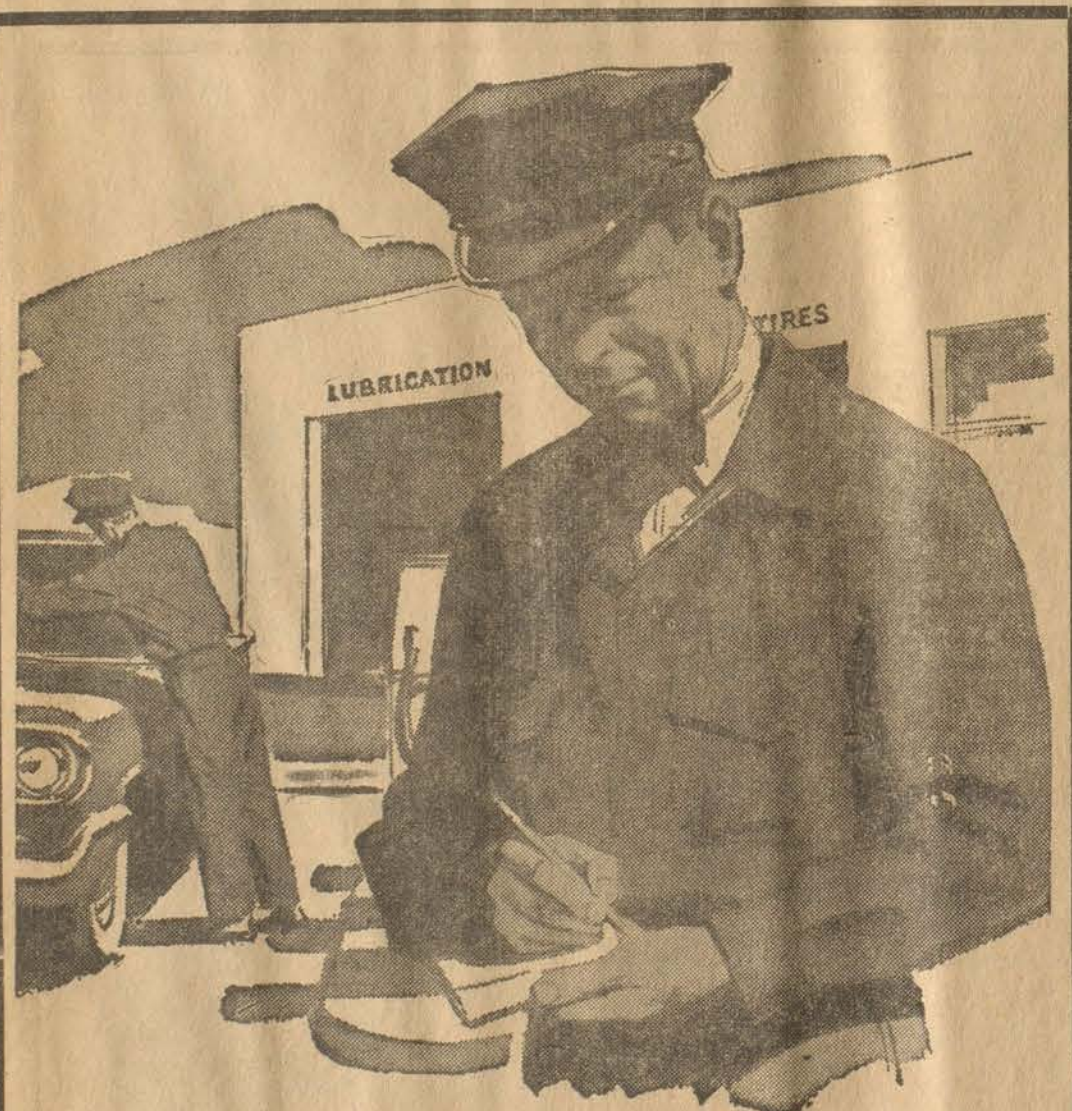

for long-range solutions to the area's economic ills. Health care, vocational training, and other programs are involved in the present emergency efforts and will be included in programs to be presented to President Johnson in February by the President's Appalachian Regional Commission.)

After visiting four of the Eastern counties last week, Butler commented that the present cooperative efforts are designed to establish now the lunch programs which would be set up eventually in larger, consolidated schools. In Magoffin county, for example, 12 schoolhouses will be replaced next year with a modern building having adequate teaching and feeding facilities. Floyd county in the past three years has abandoned 30 of the small school rooms in favor of consolidated schools and next fall will close 15 to 18 more. Betsy Layne high school has no lunch program due to the last flood but expects to start again in the near future.

Since 1961, some 70 schools in Floyd county have received the maximum reimbursement of 15 cents per lunch. These schools will now receive the canned meats, butter and other items from the Department of Agriculture. Four additional schools entered the lunch program this month.

Children whose families can afford to contribute to the program pay a small amount each day, usually about 10 cents. (In the regular program they will pay 25c and 30c.) In Floyd county, the percentage of children contributing to the program varies from about 60 per cent in the fall down to 35 per cent later in the school year.

For cooking, many of the schools will make do with hot plates since electric wiring is inadequate for electric stoves, if available at all. Gas is likewise seldom available.

Each school day at the Bucks Branch school in Floyd county, for example, Mrs. Doris Flanery uses a two-burner hotplate to prepare a hot lunch for her two children and their 13 classmates. According to their teacher, R. C. Barnett, Mrs. Flanery has appeared like clockwork each day for the past two years. If space is available next fall at the nearby Martin, Kentucky school, the youngsters will attend classes there.

The Bucks Branch school can be reached by car and food supplies are brought in each week or so, with milk and bread purchased daily. One Knox county school is not so fortunate. Here two of the older boys visit the country store half a mile away each day, load the milk, bread and other items on two mules and head up the creekbed with them.

With the additional 7,000 receiving a hot lunch this winter, Bevins said some 10,000 children would be involved in the special assistance program in Kentucky's eastern counties.

Appointment of Mrs. Harris S. Howard, 47 Arnold Avenue, Prestonsburg, as chairman for Floyd county and for the Prestonsburg area in the forthcoming 1964 Heart Fund drive has been announced by Jesse Stuart, of Greenup, noted poet and novelist, state campaign chairman. The drive begins February 1 and continues through the month.

Mr. Stuart also announced the appointment of Mrs. Georgia Cantrill, of Wheelwright, as chairman for that area, a position she has handled in five previous Heart campaigns, and of Mrs. Ora Howard, of David, as chairman for that area, her third year in that capacity.

The Woman's Clubs of Prestonsburg, Wheelwright and David are sponsoring the campaign in their respective areas. Mr. Stuart, himself a recovered heart attack victim, pointed out he has come to know first-hand of the "almost miraculous progress" science has made against heart and blood vessel diseases, and of how the Kentucky Heart Association "by its effective use of Heart Fund dollars in the state's communities, hospitals and medical research laboratories has vitally furthered this progress." He announced that the annual door-to-door Heart Sunday solicitation would be conducted this year on February 23.

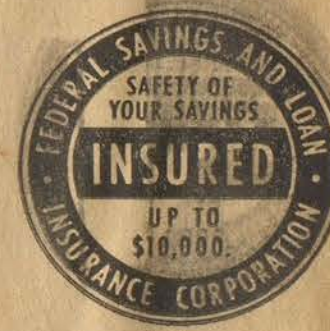

NAMES WARD MAN OF '63



The 1963 "Man of the Year" awards were presented Sunday night by Barry Bingham, president of WHAS, Courier-Journal and the Louisville Times, on a special 1963 news roundup program, "Flashbacks of '63."

Recipient of the award for the state of Kentucky was Highway Commissioner Henry Ward.

Two Louisville awards were made—the first, to Dr. William P. Vonderhaar for his Sabin Oral Sunday work and to two members of the University of Louisville's College Bowl team, Miss Evelyn Felner and Frank Krull, who represented the entire team. WHAS News named Marine Corps Commandant, General David M. Shoup, a native of Battle Ground, Indiana, as Indiana's Man of the Year.

The WHAS News "Man of the Year" awards commend individuals who are significant national or local news figures and in that role contribute to the well-being of their fellow citizens. One or more such awards may be made in Louisville, Indiana or Kentucky.

In making the award to the College Bowl Team, Bingham cited the Louisville scholars for capturing "the imagination of Louisvillians and the fancy of the nation as (they) piled up four victories on the television quiz show before tasting defeat." The team won a total of \$6,500 in scholarship funds which was later matched by a group of anonymous Louisville businessmen establishing a College Bowl Scholarship Fund of \$13,000. Bingham called attention to the "bounty of national publicity, placing the University and Louisville in the educational spotlight."

"Kentucky's realistic approach to road-building has come about because of the strong leadership of Henry Ward, and has been recognized nationally. His dedication to view road building as the Department's primary function, to the exclusion of politics, means mere miles of safer roadways for each dollar spent by the department. Ward has streamlined and modernized the Kentucky Department of Highways, eliminating wasteful duplication and fund-consuming politics," said Bingham.

The 1962 Award went to Governor Bert Combs and Mayor William O. Cowger and Jefferson County Judge Marlow Cook, jointly. There was no Indiana award made.

This is the 18th year the awards have been made by the Louisville station.

National Guard Plans Drive To Aid Region, Gen. Butler Announces

The Kentucky National Guard will participate in a clothing drive for Eastern Kentucky in February. It was announced recently by Brig.-Gen. William R. Buster, assistant adjutant-general. The drive is scheduled in line with Governor Edward T. Breathitt's effort to assist needy Eastern Kentuckians this winter.

The entire program, directed by John Whisman, administrator of the Governor's Area Development program, consists of two parts, a short range project to lessen the impact of winter on Eastern Kentuckians and a long range project which is directed toward the eventual cure of the economic ills of the Appalachian region.

As part of the short range program, the National Guard's clothing drive will be a joint effort with the Save the Children Federation. The assistance of this national organization will be utilized in the organization of a collection program and the distribution of clothes to needy families.

Clothing for both adults and children will be collected, General Buster said. The clothing drive will involve the collecting by Kentucky National Guardsmen of bags of used but serviceable clothing for distribution. The bags will be picked up at local National Guard armories or the Shewmaker Air Base in Louisville, and later massed in a central pick-up point for transportation to Save the Children Federation warehouse for sorting and distribution. The National Guard will also provide collection points to provide all state employees an opportunity to donate clothing.

The Federation has extended aid to Kentuckians on many occasions in the past few years, the most recent was during floods in March and April, 1963.

Although this will be the first year that Kentucky Guardsmen have participated in a clothing drive for the Save the Children Federation, this will be the Federation's 22nd annual collection. The Federation is a national organization headquartered in Norwalk, Connecticut.

Clothing collected will be distributed to needy children and their families, free, and for those reluctant to accept free clothing, a nominal fee will be accepted.

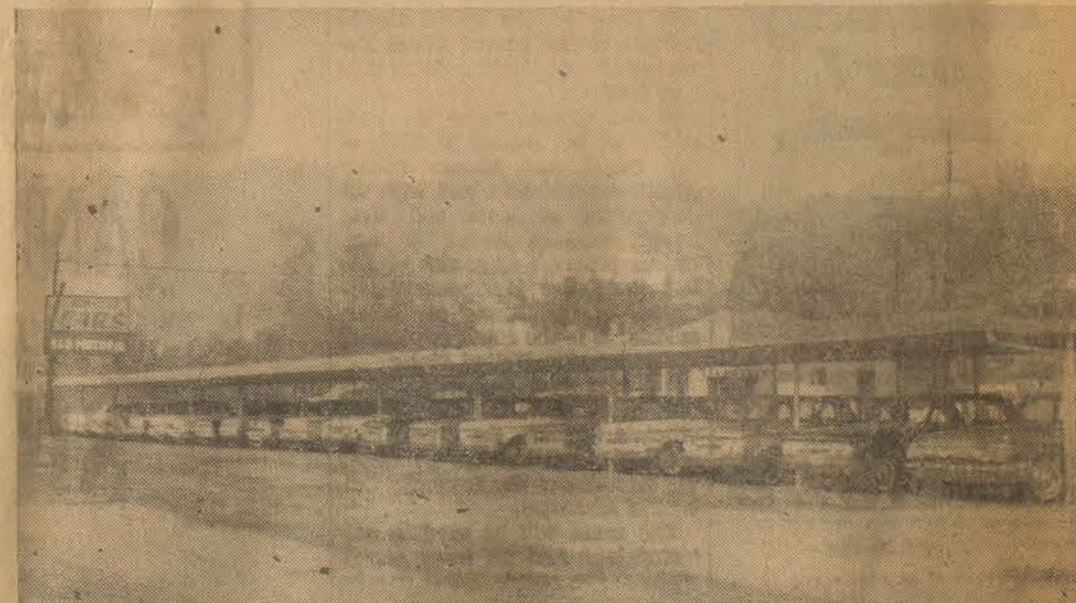

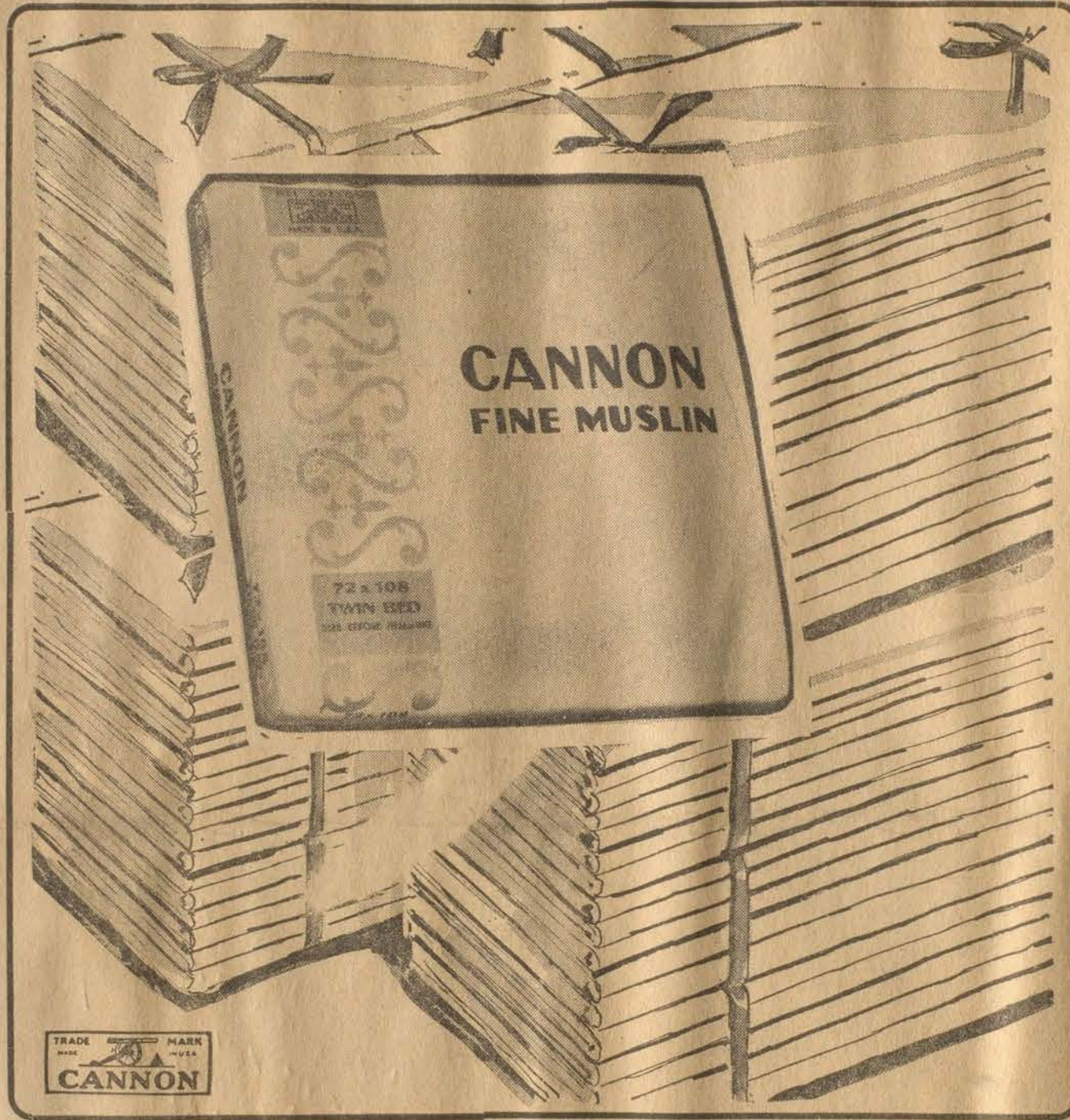

GRANT MADE FOR TB WORK

Martin County Receives Funds for Research; First of Kind In Nation

Martin county has been granted \$96,296 for research in tuberculosis eradication, it was announced Wednesday by Congressman Carl D. Perkins. The grant was made by the Public Health Service of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

Martin county, under the leadership of Dr. Russell L. Hall, of the Floyd and Martin county health departments, and with the cooperation of local and state health officials, began an ambitious program sometime ago to test the entire 11,000-person-population of the county for tuberculosis. It is the first program of its kind in the United States.

It was this projected project that decided the national health officials to make the grant, Hall said. The project will be under the direction of the Kentucky College of Medicine.

The grant will be used to pay technicians and an extra physician for the county if one can be procured, Hall added. The funds will also be used to underwrite a tuberculosis laboratory in Prestonsburg which will be housed in the basement of the present health department building.

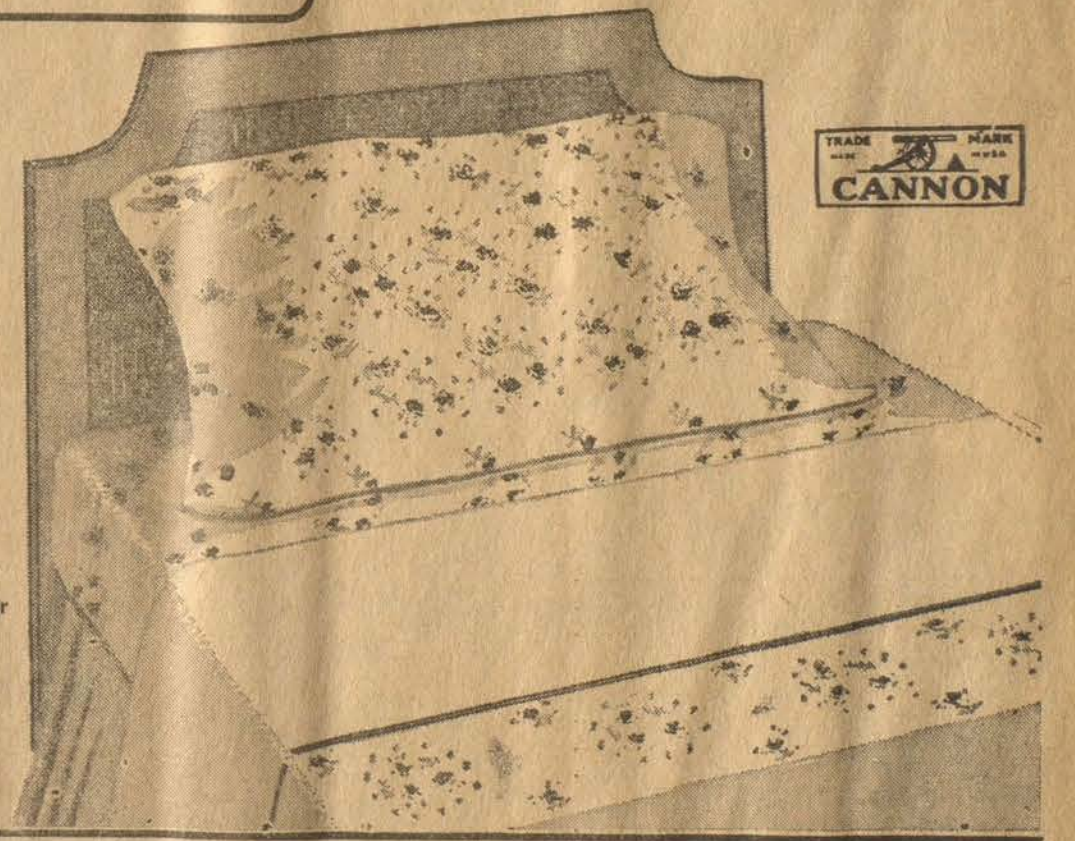
More than \$7,000 worth of equipment for the new laboratory has already been acquired without cost from the Kentucky Tuberculosis Commission, Hall noted.
