Fire Destroys Contents Of Central Ave. Home

Contents of the home of Mrs. Violet Friend on Central avenue were destroyed by fire or ruined by smoke and water at 2:30 a.m. Wednesday in a blaze which badly damaged the dwelling.

Cause of the fire was not definitely determined, but it was said that a gas line leak was detected after the fire was extinguished.

The fire was the first genuine alarm in a two-week period which saw the fire department answer two false reports that fire had broken out at Prestonsburg high school. The last such report, made by an unidentified man, was late Tuesday afternoon.

Fire Chief Henry Gray said that hereafter no alarm will be answered unless the person reporting the fire gives his or her name and telephone number.

The siren now being heard at noon daily is not to be taken as a fire alarm. The siren is required to be sounded as an equipment test to meet state actuarial requirements.

NURSE STUDY AID ASKED

ARA Hospital Officer Suggests Government Extend Student Help

An official of Appalachian Regional Hospitals, Inc., recommended to Congress last week that the federal government lend \$1,000 a year to students studying to be professional nurses.

Dr. O. J. Wilson, assistant executive director for development and education, testified in Washington April 10 before a House subcommittee on the nurse education bill, which proposes loans of \$1,000 for the first year and \$500 for each additional year of schooling.

A.R.H.I., a non-profit, non-sectarian corporation, operates community hospitals at McDowell, Harlan, Hazard, Middlesboro and Whitesburg. It also operates the Professional School of Nursing at Harlan.

"It must be recognized," the former president of Findlay (Ohio) college told the committee, "that, unlike college young men and women pursuing a four-year liberal arts program, professional nursing students are unable to hold part-time jobs to supplement their allowances from home. In many cases they have little or no financial assistance other than what they can borrow."

He recommended that the provision for forgiveness of student loans, now pegged in the bill at 80 per cent, be extended to 100 per cent.

Dr. Wilson suggested other changes in the nurses education bill, which attempts to carry out President Johnson's recommendations for federal aid to stimulate an increase of 130,000 in the number of professional nurses by 1970.

He proposed that the federal government give to professional nursing schools a grant of \$500 per student to help finance instruction. "The professional nursing schools of the nation," he commented, "have borne the staggering cost for nursing education alone for many decades."

The bill would provide construction grants to non-profit hospital schools of nursing if they put up \$1 in cash for every \$2 in grants. Dr. Wilson suggested that "provision be made in the bill for the appraisal of an existing structure for which expansion is contemplated and that the current appraised value be accepted in lieu of cash."

This Is Our Stand

The Floyd County Times salutes Circuit Judge Hollie Conley for the moral and political courage shown by his action last week in discharging the grand jury here when he became convinced that it had failed in the discharge of an important duty.

An authorized representative of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board was the only witness, true. But could there have been a better qualified witness? Besides, the grand jury needs only the testimony of one valid witness; it is not the duty of a grand jury to hear all the evidence, since it is not sitting in the trial of the case.

Some said the ABC agent himself violated the law when he took a drink of the whiskey which he says he purchased. Is it illegal to take a drink, or is it illegal to sell it? All legal technicalities aside, the grand jury could not expect an undercover agent to procure evidence of such an offense unless he appeared to be "one of the crowd."

Besides all this, the grand jury had the advice of the Commonwealth's Attorney and the County Attorney who should have been trusted in this particular situation. We do not suggest that a jury of any sort should be puppet-like, but men and women unskilled in the law must look to such officials for legal advice.

Aged Knott Resident Succumbs At Martin; Burial At Decoy, Ky.

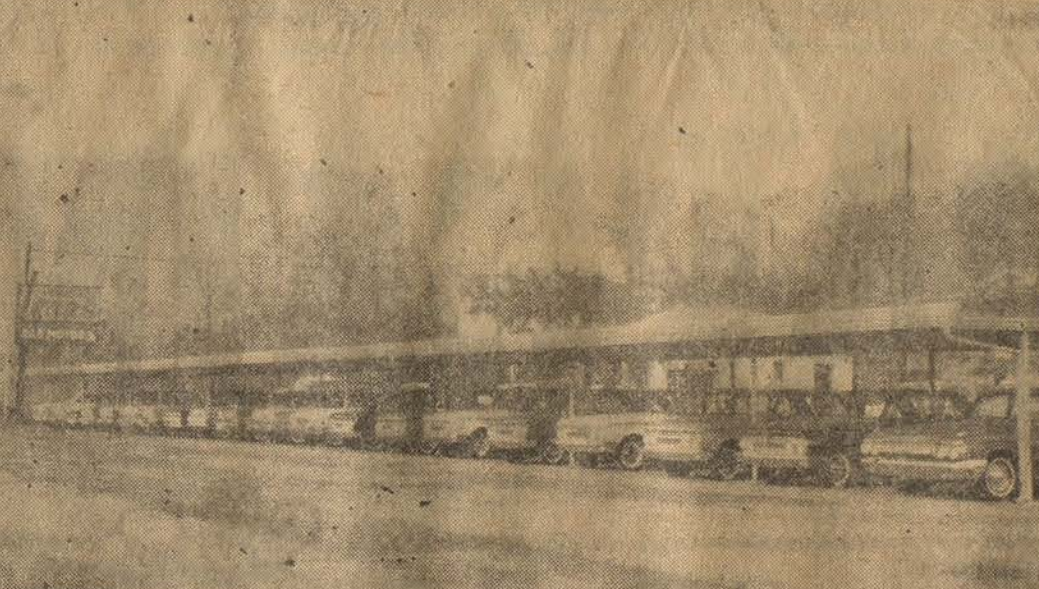
Ballard Howard, 93, Decoy, Knott county, died April 7 at the Beaver Valley hospital. He was the victim of a stroke. He was a retired farmer.

Engineers for the Johnson Coal Company, Pike county, are drawing up a disposal plan to submit to the Commission. The five coal companies now maintaining satisfactory disposal systems to keep coal dust, clay and other impurities from entering nearby streams are the Ashlo Coal Company, Perry county; the Harlan Fuel Company, Harlan county; the Mary Gail Coal Company, Clay county; the Shamrock Coal Company, Clay county; and Smith Coal Sales, Inc., Perry county.

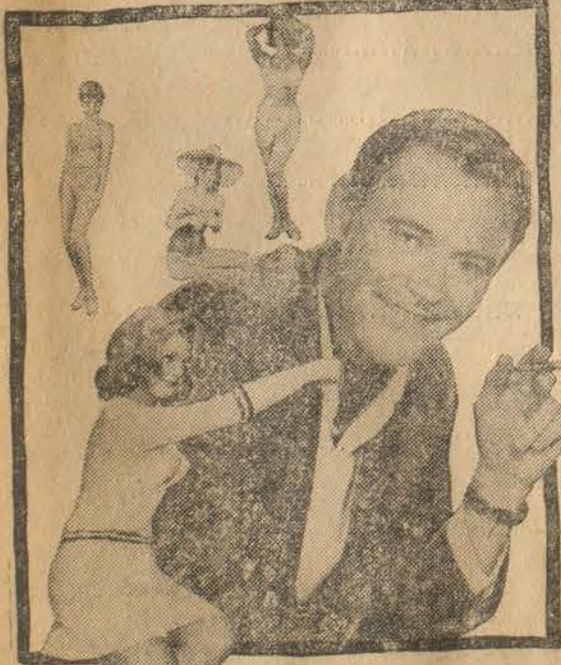

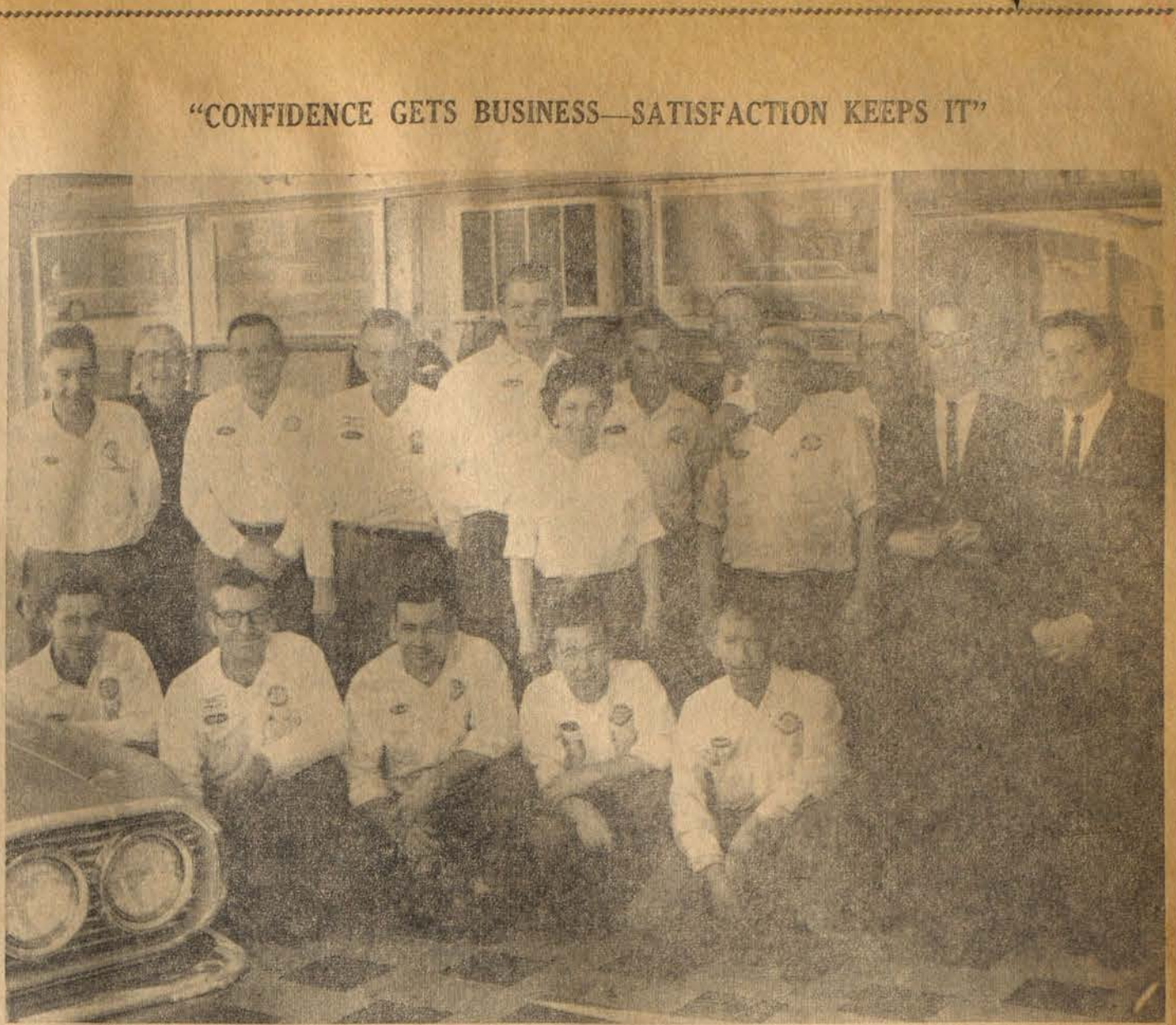

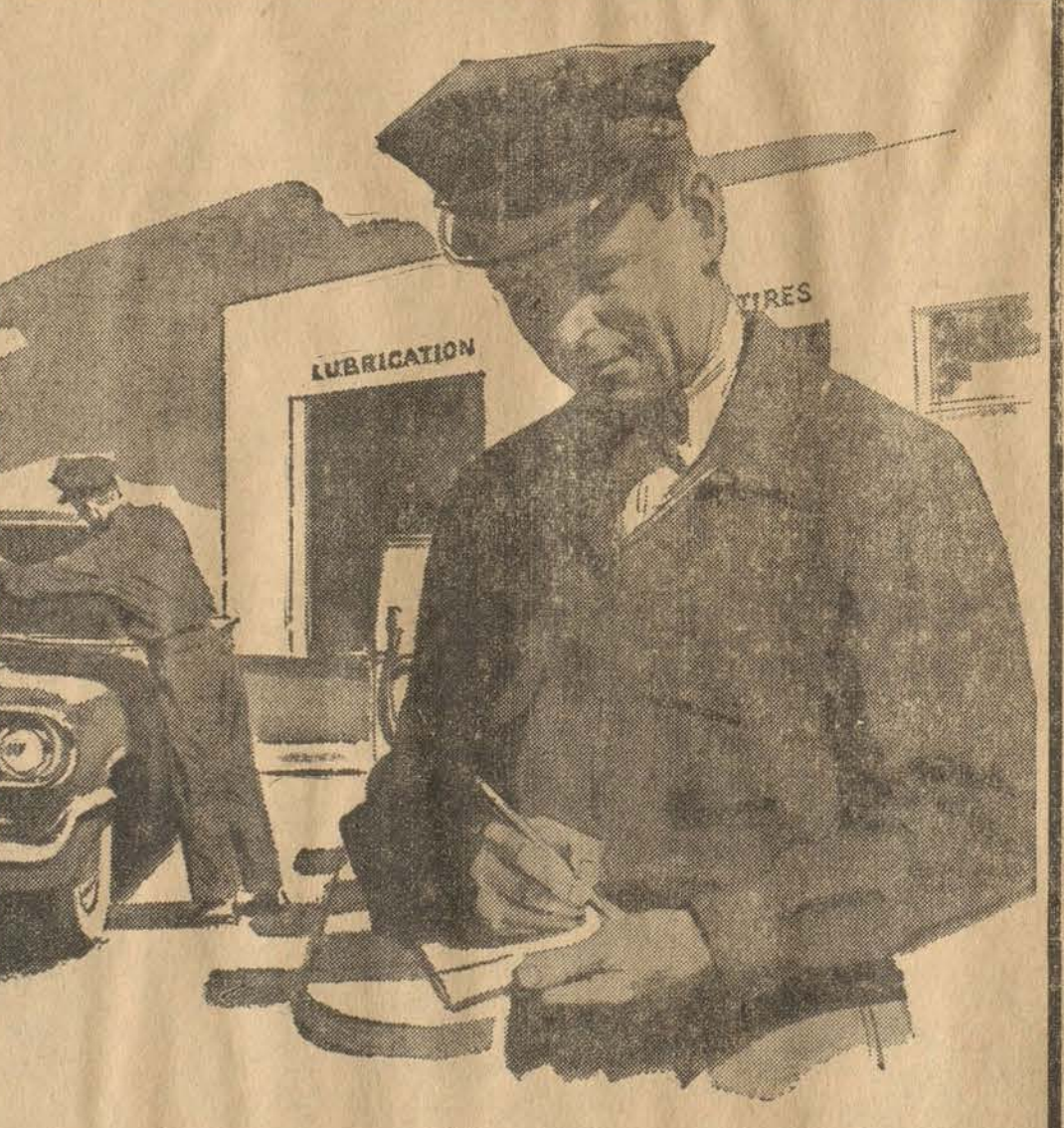

Richmond, Ky., April 9 (Spl.)—Three outstanding authors will be featured at the second Creative Writing Conference to be held at Eastern Kentucky State College July 22-28.

The one week conference, with members of a college creative writing group participating, along with others who enroll for one hour credit, is under the direction of Dr. Byno R. Rhodes, professor of English.

This workshop is one of twenty similar programs scheduled by Eastern throughout the eight-week summer session. Coordinator of the workshop program is Dr. John Rowlett, director of research.

Louis D. Rubin, Jr., professor of English and chairman of the English Department, Hollins College; Guy Owen, associate professor of English and director of the creative writing workshop at North Carolina State; and Walter Sullivan, professor of English at Vanderbilt University, will deliver lectures and discuss various aspects of writing.

The class may be taken either as a credit or non-credit course. Each participant will be asked to submit a manuscript of a short story, a play, or four short poems.

SPRING HOUSECLEANING SCHEDULED IN KENTUCKY

Frankfort, Ky., April 6 (Spl.)—Kentucky is set for its annual spring housecleaning with April 15 to May 15 proclaimed by Governor Edward T. Breathitt as Clean Up and Beautification Month.

The proclamation urges all citizens "to band together to remove accumulations of litter and trash and to help make Kentucky a cleaner, greener state—now and forever."

Officials of the award-winning Cleaner, Greener Land Program set up by the State Conservation Department in 1960 are primed for an intensive campaign during the month to help Kentuckians carry out the Governor's request.

Mrs. Connie Quinn, assistant director of the program, said the department is helping to promote clean-up programs in all 120 counties, working in cooperation with the Kentucky Federation of Homemakers—named co-ordinating group for the campaign.

Two kits of material are being sent by the Conservation department to each county. Included are pamphlets, leaflets, clean-up stickers, suggested news releases and a copy of the Governor's proclamation.

Working closely with the Department and the Homemakers group will be the local home demonstration agents of the University of Kentucky Home Economics Extension Program.

Other organizations and officials assisting in the program include: the Garden Club of Kentucky, Inc., Jaycees, Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs, Kentucky Congress of Parents and Teachers, Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation, county judges, mayors, district highway engineers, Department of Health area sanitarians and county health officers, and Department of Education district superintendents.

Mrs. Quinn said the motive force behind this intensive clean-up effort is summed up in the words of Governor Breathitt's proclamation: "Kentucky is endowed with all the scenic resources necessary to rank it the most beautiful of the 50 states . . . A more beautiful Kentucky enhances our attractions for new industry and more tourists and benefits every citizen financially and in enjoyment of clean, beautiful highways, cities, towns, parks and all places used by the public."

The participating organizations hope to form a permanent clean-up committee to put the program on a year-round basis. The committee would also work on the

special plans for Clean-Up Month.

Mrs. Quinn points to a week-long program scheduled for Fulton and Fulton county during Clean-Up and Beautification Month as one which other counties might use as a guide.

Local officials there have designated the week of April 18 to 24 as Clean-Up, Paint-Up, Fix-Up Week and each day is set aside for special activities. Included in the schedule are Landscaping and Planting Day, Church Cooperation Day, Parade Day, Inspection Day, Poster and Slogan Day, and County Cooperation and Garbage Pick-Up Day. Health and Sanitation Day at Fulton will include a tour of the area showing what clean-up work can do for health programs. Many state and federal officials will be present.

WARD NOTES CHALLENGE OF HIGHWAY POSITIONS

Frankfort, Ky., April 6—Highway Commissioner Henry Ward has bluntly challenged the young men of Kentucky to help build their state by enrolling in a technical training program that will lead to a full-time job with the Kentucky Department of Highways.

In order to train and develop engineering assistants, the Highway Department will sponsor an eight-week technician training program at the University of Kentucky from June 8 to July 31, 1964.

"Kentucky's expanded program of constructing interstate highways, parkways, primary routes and rural roads has created a heavy demand for young, highly trained technicians who can assist our engineering personnel," Ward said.

The Department will pay for instruction and classroom space for sixty-six students. The students will be required to pay room, food and supply costs, but they will be paid \$230.00 a month during the training period.

The trainees, four from each highway district and eighteen from the state at-large, must be at least eighteen years old by the end of the program and have a high school diploma with a strong mathematics background. In addition, the applicants must pass the state merit system examination for engineering helper and agree to work for the department for a year.

The training program will include 37 hours instruction a week of mathematics; algebra; trigonometry; plane and route surveying; surveying field practice; engineering drawing; highway materials laboratory practice and public relations.

Trainees that finish the program in the top fourth of the class and who are 1964 high school graduates will be considered for the Highway Department's University of Kentucky Engineering Scholarship Program for the 1964-65 academic year.

Further information about the program may be obtained from the training officer, Personnel Division, Kentucky Highway Department, Frankfort, Kentucky, or from the 12 Highway District Offices.

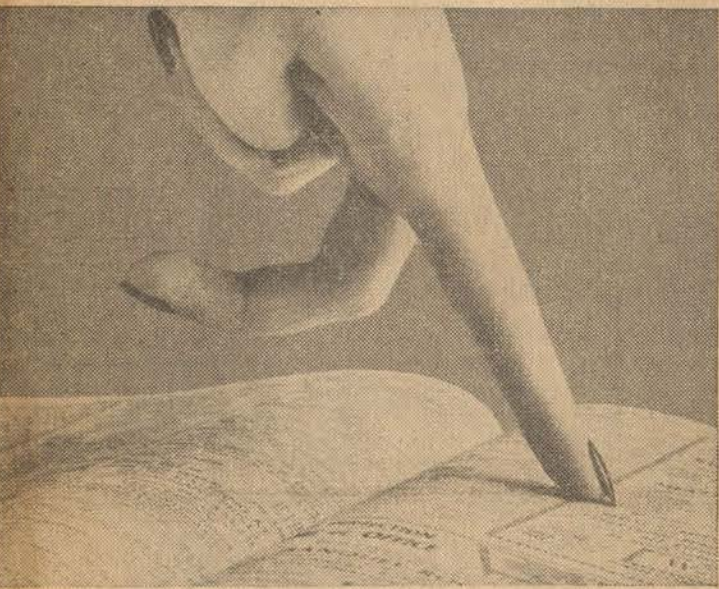

ONE THOUSAND NEW CASES OF TUBERCULOSIS FOUND

Approximately a thousand new cases of tuberculosis were discovered in Kentucky by the combined efforts of private physicians and six State Department of Health mobile x-ray units during 1962.

So said Dr. M. Stuart Lauder, director of the Tuberculosis Control program, last week.
 Dr. Lauder said 96,372 x-rays had been taken in 1962 by the Department's six units, operating in every county except Jefferson, which has its own mobile x-ray service operated by the local tuberculosis association.

The x-rays revealed 6,431 possible cases of tuberculosis and 282 cases of enlarged heart. The suspected cases were referred to private physicians for final diagnoses.
 Dr. Lauder said 1962 was the first year physicians were asked to report final diagnoses on suspected cases of tuberculosis to the Department.

Reports of 1,939 final diagnoses received by the Department indicated that the mobile units helped locate 311 new cases of the disease in 1962, including 69 active cases. Dr. Lauder said active cases "probably are contagious and in need of treatment."
 "Assuming that the same pro-

portion of new cases to suspected cases also applies to cases physicians did not report to the Department, we can conclude that x-rays taken by the six mobile units led to the discovery of some 1,000 new cases of tuberculosis in 1962," Dr. Lauder said.
 Of the estimated 1,000 new cases, 200 probably were in the active stage, 100 were questionably active or of undetermined activity, and 700 were inactive or non-contagious cases, Dr. Lauder said.

In addition, 60 cases of lung cancer were found, and 1,600 cases of other lung conditions.
 During 1962 the mobile x-ray units visited each county health department except Jefferson at frequent intervals and took x-rays of suspected tuberculosis cases or persons in contact with active cases of the disease, cases referred by private physicians, the chronically ill and aging, such occupational groups as educators and food service personnel, and volunteers.

Before 1962 the mobile units made a trip to each county once a year and x-rayed persons who volunteered for the test while the unit was parked near the center of town.
 Dr. Lauder said he expects mobile x-ray units to have located about the same number of cases during 1963. Results will be available sometime this summer, he said.

In Kentucky, 1,316 active cases of tuberculosis were reported from all sources in 1962. Dr. Lauder said at least as many more cases are still undiscovered in the state.

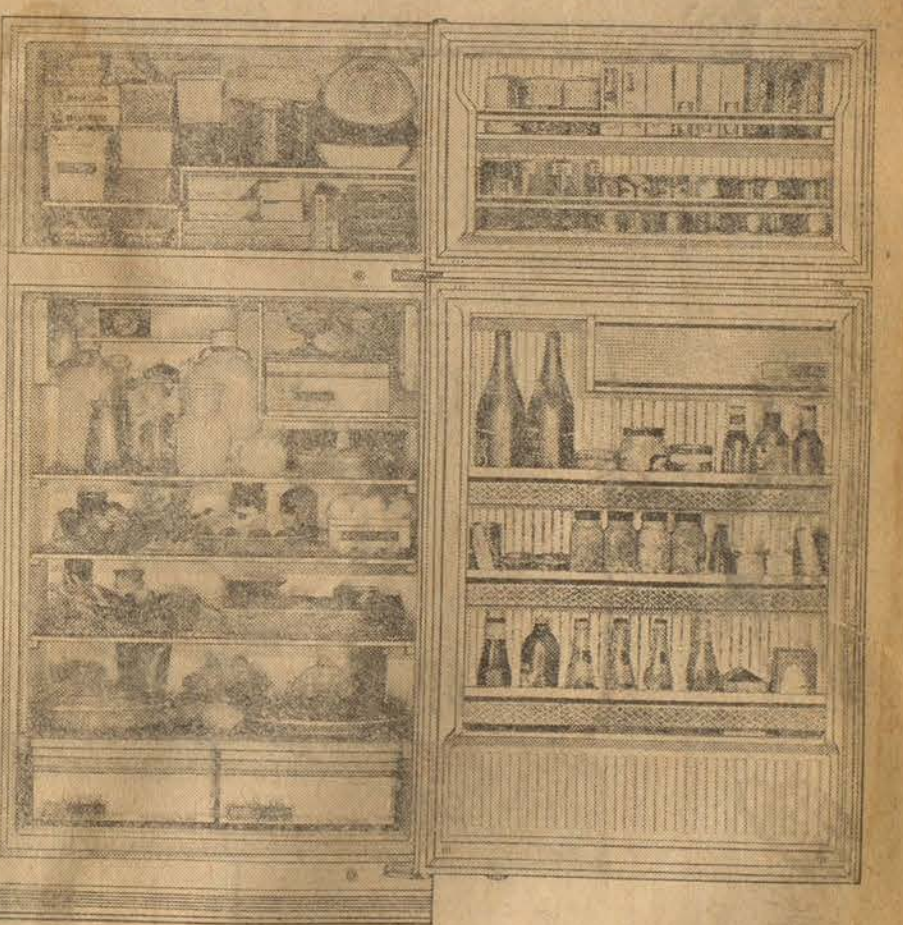

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New Mathematics Course for Elementary Teachers Scheduled for Testing

Frankfort, Ky., April 6 (Sp.)—Kentucky is one of only six states testing a new mathematics course designed for elementary teachers.

Dr. Harry M. Sparks, state superintendent of public instruction, said the course was developed by the School Mathematics Study Group, largest of the "new math projects" in the nation. Covering basic concepts in modern mathematics from kindergarten through the eighth grade, it is designed for elementary teachers who have had little or no college work in the subject.

The study group is supported by large grants from the National Science Foundation, based at Stanford University in Palo Alto, Calif.

Miss Louise Combs, director of the Kentucky Department of Education's Division of Teacher Education and Certification, said the course also is being tested in Washington, California, New Jersey, Virginia and Texas.

Dr. Sidney Simandle, assistant director of the division, is coordinator and consultant for the Kentucky project.

Except for two classes of students at Murray State College, the study group course in Kentucky is being taught to "on-the-job" teachers voluntarily upgrading themselves and keeping up with the new trends in mathematics," Miss Combs said.

The course is offered through extension classes or on campus at Eastern Kentucky State College, Richmond, and the University of Kentucky, Lexington, in addition to Murray, Morehead and Western Kentucky State colleges plan to enter the program this summer.

The Daviess county school system is conducting three classes in its own in-service course.

Those in the college classes also get credits, those in the Daviess courses enrolled only for their own improvement.

Registration in these special classes totals 275 statewide. Others are expected to register later for week-end, night, or the summer sessions, Miss Combs said.

A recent study by her division revealed that Kentucky elementary teachers—despite lack of a state requirement—"really are choosing mathematics at the high school and college levels to a surprising degree," Miss Combs added. This state requires that an elementary-education major's 45 hours of general education include 12 hours of mathematics and science. The phrasing makes it possible for graduates to leave out mathematics entirely.

Most colleges in Kentucky, however, within the last year have added a requirement on their own that such majors take three to six hours of mathematics in addition to an education course on "the teaching of arithmetic."

JOBLESS FATHERS ASSIGNED TO WORK

Frankfort, Ky., April 6—The State Economic Security Department reports that some 1,800 unemployed fathers are now assigned to local public works projects in nine counties of Eastern Kentucky under the recently launched \$1 million demonstration program of aid to unemployed parents of dependent children.

State Economic Security Commissioner Earle V. Powell, who made the announcement, said more than 50 community projects have been approved by the federal and state governments already. Powell said the work has been well-received in local communities and that the projects are directed toward improving the region.

Here are examples of projects already under way:

Repairs to the Pineville flood-wall, clearing of willow-choked river banks in Pikeville, a 270-man mobile fire fighting force working under the State Forestry Division, and many projects which are improving roads, local school systems and city parks.

Powell said the State Economic Security and Conservation departments are mapping a reforestation project to restore stripped land laid bare by worked-out Eastern Kentucky mines.

Also under consideration is a plan to employ and train about 200 of the unemployed fathers for county maintenance crews for the Kentucky Highway Department in that area, Powell said.

Spring Clean-Up Set By Betsy Layne FD, Chief George Notes

"Clean up for fire safety." This is, basically, the reason for the spring clean-up campaign which starts in Betsy Layne, Harold and Stanville, April 15, Fire Chief James George, of the Betsy Layne fire department, said Monday.

"Clean-up brings a lot of benefits to the community but one of the really major accomplishments is to get rid of the trash and rubbish which provides a breeding place for fire," George said.

Every 12 minutes one American home is destroyed or damaged by fire starting in rubbish, according to National Fire Protection Association statistics.

So the fire department goal for spring clean-up is to make every home in these communities safer from fire. This means concentrated attack on the spots in and around houses where fires start—accumulations in attics, basements and closets, any place where there is trash and rubbish.
