AKERS BID ON PROJECT IS LOWEST

Bond Sale To Finance Wheelwright Building; Early Start Is Seen

The Dana contracitng firm of low bidder Saturday by the Floyd County Board of Education on the 22-classroom elementary school planned to serve Wheelwright and vicinity.

The Akers bid, based on Alternate No. 1 which provides for heating by natural gas rather han by electricity, was \$538,000. Although the bid was approximately \$40,000 higher than anticipated, it was accepted by the board and approved by the State Department of Education.

One other bid was offered, and that by W. D. Johnson, Johnson's base bid was \$9,400 lower than Roy Salisbury, accused slayer of the \$552,900 asked by Akers, But on the alternate Johnson added and Thomas S. "Due to the newness and nature of limited access highways, which are fenced, the Highway Department had no guideline to follow in purchasing land," Carl H. Bradley, director of the rightof-way division, said. "In some cases, the Department paid too much for damages. This will no longer be true," Bradley added.

Studies have been made in Clark, Franklin, Montgomery, Simpson and Warren counties and other studies are under way. The Department is continuing its research so that all data may be used to substantiate testimony in court cases. Recently, this information was admitted by a Boyd county court during a trial concerning land acquisition for In-

"In acquiring right-of-way, the Department's only objective is to pay a fair share of the taxpayer's money to land owners so that we may continue building as economically as possible a modern network of roads throughout Kentucky," Ward said.

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




