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### Appalachia's Need Not Imaginary

Bank deposits are higher here, shiny automobiles are more plenteous and homes and their furnishings are more resplendent than ever before, those who scoff at the need for federal attention to the problems of Appalachia are wont to say. Therefore, they argue, the problems are imaginary, no real need exists, and Appalachia should be let

But they are dead wrong. Appalachia's needs are many and great. The bank deposits and cars and homes and other luxuries belong to the relative few; the region as a whole and the plight of the many must be considered. It must be remembered that Fort Knox does not make all Kentucky a repository for gold, and one Cadillac does not stand as a symbol of general prosperity, nor does the presence of one Ph.D., or dozens, mean that all the people are educated and prepared to meet the problems of this modern age.

Appalachia has deep and basic needs — needs which go deeper than those that are satisfied by bank accounts and cars and even new homes. Because of its terrain and isolation it has been walled in physically and, to a degree, intellectually. When homesteads existed as little worlds of their own, the owners concentrated on eking out a subsistence from the soil, and so the recognition of opportunity and the value of the natural resources escaped them. Besides, even if this recognition had been present, native capital was unavailable. And so the land was ripe for development of its resources -many call it exploitation-by outsiders.

A railroad sufficed for these who came into this part of Appalachia. The thinking of those who sought production and a market for timber and coal did not include highways and stream improvement. By and large, these did not enter into the thinking of those who were here when these others

And so the stream from areawide stagnation was a mere trickle. Progress moved in, but slowly, so slowly, while other areas of the land were moving ahead. Appalachia remained, in a sense, undiscov-

It has been so long unknown and neglected that its needs in a modern world have become so acute and vast that, unless the nation and this area are willing to wait another century or so, the only hope for it lies in a monumental undertaking through the use of federal funds here at home which must approach in magnitude those undertakings which are known as foreign aid, in places beyond these

Eastern Kentucky needs to be integrated with the remainder of America—by arteries of traffic. both by land and water, a task which defies mere local or state resources; by education, as a contribution to the future of the area as well as a contribution to the nation as a whole, in both the academic and vocational areas of training; in training people to work and by putting them to work at jobs other than digging coal; in restoring the beauty of the land that has been lost to ignorance and wanton assault, in conserving nature's gift and developing a region of rare beauty into a mecca for tourists and all who would escape the heat and grime and incessant rush of urban life.

Education and work will restore to the people some of the self-reliance they have lost through long, discouraging years. The work the federal government can do, and which only it has the resources in planning and execution to do, will not make of every dweller in the region a financier, or even one who is wholly independent financially, but it will afford the opportunity, train the people to take advantage of opportunity, by education inspire them to better things and wipe out that lethargy of mind, body and spirit which leaves men content to exist through public largesse in the form of foodstuffs, food-stamps and any dole of what-

ever description. The United States is paying heavily for its neglect of Appalachia. Month in and month out, the relief checks and the subsistence grants of food go out, and will continue to go out until basic needs are

met. It loses in tax revenues. But the federal government can make Appalachia an asset rather than a liability if it will invest heavily enough in the region and its people to make them productive rather than just recep-



More than a hundred years ago, David Cooley, father-in-law of Isaac Richmond, operated a General Store here in Prestonsburg. He was the great-great-grandfather of the present I. Richmond Store manager. In those early days of this, the oldest of Floyd county businesses, Mr. Cooley



Without quoting specifically, these two references ndicate that John Buchanan Floyd, born 1806 or 1807, gradtated in law in South Carolina and went to Arkansas to practice law and raise cotton. He lost all of his investments in Arkansas and returned to Abingdon, Virginia, in 1837, where he commenced the practice of law

"He had an indebtedness of \$30,000 which he paid off, so that by 1848 he had paid everything except \$1,200. He paid this last off within a year then slackened his strenous practice of law and was elected to the state legisla ture. Before this term expired he was elected Governor of Vir ginia in 1851. In 1855-1861 he was Secretary of War under President Buchanan and then entered the Confederate Army. It just does not seem possible that he had either the time or the finances to become involved in any substantial way, at least, in

the Warfield operation. "The local tradition has it that George Rogers Clark Floyd with John Warfield started operations in about 1850. This George Rogers Clark Floyd was a brother of John Buchanan Floyd, Governor Secretary of War, and CSA general. He was a son of Gov. Floyd who was elected in 1830. The Floyd genealogy states that George Rogers Clark Floyd married and reared a family in the mountain region of Virginia, now West Virginia. George Rogers Clark Floyd and John Buchanan Floyd had five brothers but little seems to be known about the



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
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
