**Utilities Announce Settlement of Suits; Price-Fixing Charged**

The six operating electric utility companies of the American Electric Power System this week announced out-of-court settlement of their 19 anti-trust damage suits against General Electric Company for a total of \$13,487,800. Kentucky Power Company's portion of this amount is \$34,900.

The settlements were announced by Donald C. Cook, president of American Electric Power Company and its subsidiaries, following their approvals by the boards of directors of the plaintiff operating companies.

The suits arose out of the 1960 charges of price-fixing conspiracies against a number of electric equipment manufacturers and were based on claims that the AEP System utilities had been overcharged for electrical equipment.

Meanwhile AEP System suits against other electrical equipment manufacturers remained pending in the U. S. district court, Southern district of New York.

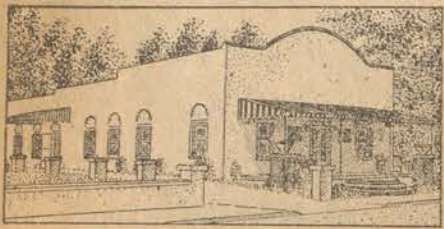

seized by inspiration, no less? He rushed to a telephone and panted, "Hold everything, honey! Don't pay that ransom—I've escaped. Be home in 20 minutes."

#### THE GOOD, OLD DAYS?

If you are inclined to say this section hasn't seen any improvements, we suggest you take a look at a road map of Kentucky which was issued July 1, 1929—35 years ago—by the State Highway Commission during the administration of Governor Sampson.

How much concrete or other hard-surfacing do you suppose had been applied to roads outside of county-seat town streets at that time? A bit from Jenkins to Pound Gap, across the mountain; a mile or so from Paintsville out toward Ky. 40, and U. S. 23 from Cannonsburg to Bolt's Fork. It was gravel from Paintsville to Prestonsburg; the road from Prestonsburg to Allen was a graded earth job, and the road from Allen to Maytown was under construction. From Maytown to Hindman in one direction and to Wayland in another it was marked on the map, "unimproved earth or poor surfacing." And a road up Left Beaver Creek hadn't even been mapped.

"This program is offered to any Floyd county child not physically able to attend a regular school. There is no cost to the parents as the program is paid for by the Floyd County Board of Education.  
"All medical forms should be filled out and returned to the superintendent's office by August 24, starting date of all Floyd county schools."

## REGIONAL ROAD NETWORK PROPOSED BY PRESIDENT

BY HENRY WARD

I have been cooperating closely with the President's Appalachian Commission and staff members in attempting to develop a regional highway system which will be financed by the legislation now pending before Congress for the creation of the Appalachian program. Under the bill before Congress, a system of 2,850 miles of development highways in the 11 states of the Appalachian Area would be authorized, to be improved at a total cost of \$840 million.

Of the total, 500 miles could be access roads to serve specific recreational, residential, commercial, industrial, school consolidation or other like facilities.

The bill provides that the federal cost participation of a project could be as high as 70%, but under no circumstances would be less than 50%. I believe that Kentucky could qualify on its projects for the full 70% federal cost participation. It is estimated that Kentucky might receive as much as twenty to twenty-five million dollars this present fiscal year if the bill is passed.

In order to plan for the future, I have budgeted seven million dollars of state funds for the present fiscal year to match the Appalachian money if it becomes available. This is 100% state money, which otherwise could be spent on state projects, but I felt that Kentucky could not afford to lose participation in this vitally important program, in the event it is passed by Congress. There is no money from the 1960 bond issue which could be utilized for this new Appalachian program, inasmuch as the use of remaining funds is limited to matching of the regular federal-aid program and the Interstate program. If the proposed bond issue is approved by the voters in November, 1965, it would provide funds for the matching of the Appalachian program for future years.

Attached is a map showing the proposed regional network system as developed by the President's Appalachian Commission. This network does not include all of the recommendations of the Kentucky Department of Highways, and I must be fair enough to acknowledge that it also does not include all of the recommendations of the other states. I

realize that some federal agency must take the lead in developing a regional system, inasmuch as it cannot be expected that the 11 states could get together and be in complete agreement when the interests of the individual state certainly would be involved.

You will notice that under this regional system in Kentucky, emphasis is to be placed on the complete modernization of US 23 all the way through from its entry into Kentucky across the Ohio River at Portsmouth until it exits in Virginia, US 119 all the way from its entry into Kentucky from West Virginia in Pike county through to US 25-E at Pineville, where it would connect with a proposal for making US 25-E a part of the development highway system from Pineville to Middlesboro, and on to a route in Tennessee.

The leg of the Mountain Parkway, which is now KY 15 from Campton to Whitesburg, would be an important part of the regional system financed under the new funds. This would make possible completion of this portion at a much earlier date than otherwise could be achieved under the regular financing schedule.

The state of Tennessee was extremely interested in a route running north of Chattanooga to the Kentucky line, and Kentucky has recommended that this regional route would best serve our traffic interests if it generally followed US 127 from the Tennessee line to the intersection of KY 90 north of Albany, thence east on KY 90 through Monticello to Burnside, north on US 127 to KY 80 west of Somerset, and then east on KY 80 to Interstate 75 near London.

This is not proposed as a substitute for regular federal-aid. Under the legislation pending, the state would have to continue to spend in the Appalachian area a percentage of regular federal-aid funds comparable to what has been spent the last three years. However, as a means of expediting building of the entire regional system proposed, it is planned to utilize projects that have already been developed, particularly in the areas where right-of-way has been acquired. This can mean much faster construction and improvement of the routes under consideration, and that other highways in the Appalachian area can receive attention that cannot be given to them now because of the shortage of funds.

Kentucky is ready to go. All we are waiting upon is passage of the legislation.

**Dutch Elm Disease Symptom Is Wilting**

Lexington, Ky.—Dutch elm disease, a fungus which grows in the water-conducting tissue of trees, is on the increase in this state.

To date, says R. A. Chapman, UK Ag Experiment Station plant pathologist, there is no known cure. Once a tree is infected, it generally dies within a few weeks. Rarely, a tree will survive one season's attack.

The disease is carried by elm-bark beetles, which overwinter in the elm bark. It carries spores of the fungus from a diseased tree to healthy specimens.

"At present there is nothing that can be done to save an infected tree. The fungus is inside the tree where it cannot be reached by chemicals from externally applied sprays. Researchers are now seeking materials that can be absorbed into and distributed systemically within elm trees without harming them. Some of this research is promising but at this time there is no readily available practical treatment that will cure diseased trees," Chapman says.

First symptom is wilting or flagging of leaves at the tips of a branch, frequently high in the crown. After extended infection, leaves turn dark brown and die. Outer bark of affected twigs, when pulled back, exposes dark brown wood underneath, sometimes streaked with dark brown tissue.

Diagnosis is important, as several other elm diseases have similar symptoms. Foot-long pieces of limbs a half to one inch in diameter should be sent to the department of plant pathology at Lexington. If the disease is identified positively, the tree should be cut and burned before fall.

Some lodge rooms are open for one-day stay at Pennyryle, Rough River, Pine Mountain, Kentucky Lake, Cumberland Falls, Natural Bridge, Carter Caves, and the central lodge at Kentucky Dam Village. Only in the new lodge at Buckhorn Lake in Perry county can a room be booked for a week, according to Bell.

Both cottages and lodge rooms at General Butler (near Carrollton), Jenny Wiley (near Prestonsburg), and Lake Cumberland (near Jamestown) are completely booked through August, Bell reported.

He said that the new Central Reservation Information Office here continues not only to be helpful in advance reservations; it also aids in balancing the distribution of vacationers in the state parks system. And cancellations sometimes make extra accommodations available.

**Indian Culture Exhibit Featured At Frankfort; Human Skulls Preserved**

Daniel Boone is a real Johnny-come-lately to Kentucky compared to the prehistoric Indians whose artifacts, tools, and weapons are now on display at the Kentucky Historical Society Museum in Frankfort.

Shell beads, stone maces, jars and spear points from Indian cultures dating as far back as 15,000 B.C. comprise the bulk of the 1,200-piece collection permanently loaned to the State Museum by the University of Kentucky and private collectors Charles Johnson, Frankfort, and Clemens Caldwell, Danville.

The artifacts, representing four distinct Kentucky Indian cultures spanning the period from the end of the Ice Age to the influence of Colonial traders, comprise one of the most extensive collections on free public display in the state, according to Society Director George M. Chinn.

These cultures are the Paleo-Indian, nomadic hunters of 15,000-6,000 B.C.; the Archaic or shell-mound Indians who lived off river mussels in Western Kentucky from 7,000 to 1,000 B.C.; the Woodland Culture of 1,000 B.C.-900 A.D. when pottery making first appears; and the Mississippian Culture, 1,000-1,600 A.D., the first cultivators of corn, beans and squash.

Included in the collection are such items as a 5,000-year-old tortoise shell gorget (neck charm) with a perfect cross carved on it, an atlatl hook used as a lever to throw a spear farther, and several perfectly preserved human skulls showing deformities caused by cradle board and skull binding.

Many of the artifacts were excavated at Indian Knoll in Ohio county and Fort Ancient in Mason county. McLean, Logan, Johnson, Butler, and Muhlenburg counties also contributed rich archeological finds. Most of the pieces in the University of Kentucky collection were gathered by the late Dr. W. S. Webb and Dr. Douglas Schwartz, both of the U. K. Department of Anthropology.

**Licenses Are Required For Gasoline Propelled Engine Vehicles, Said**

Anything that uses a gasoline engine to get you from here to there on a public thoroughfare must have a license plate, State Public Safety Commissioner Glenn Lovern has pointed out.

Also, Lovern added, the operator must be at least 16 years of age and possess a valid Kentucky operator's license. The applicant may take his driving test on a motor scooter, bike or cycle, he said, but if he does so driving privileges will be restricted to that vehicle.

Registration plates may be obtained from the county court clerk and are renewable annually. Go-karts are not required to be licensed, Lovern said, as long as they are not operated as a conveyance on public roads.

## GOOD ROADS ESSENTIAL PERKINS SAYS IN SPEECH

Good roads from "home to school, church, store, and commercial centers" were called essential to Eastern Kentucky development in a speech given Monday at Ashland by Representative Carl D. Perkins to an Opportunities Workshop Conference.

The Conference, jointly sponsored by the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare and the Commonwealth of Kentucky, extended through Tuesday, with various discussion groups covering educational, social and economic needs and problems of Kentucky. The theme for the conference is "Public Resources for Human Development."

Perkins said that lack of good roads was the greatest impediment to economic development. "Not only does the lack of good roads prevent our obtaining new industry but it also hinders our young people in their efforts to secure an education and makes more costly the delivery of the necessities of life, prevents the expansion of tourism and in general isolates Appalachia from the general prosperity being enjoyed in other areas of the nation," declared Perkins.

Perkins, who is one of the co-sponsors of the President's Economic Opportunity Act, discussed provisions of the bill which would greatly expand educational opportunities in Eastern Kentucky, and said that the legislation was only a portion of the total Administration's program to combat poverty. Perkins said that full implementation of the new Vocational Education Act passed by Congress last year along with the Economic Opportunity Act and the Appalachian Public Works Bill would completely alter the economic picture in Eastern Kentucky.

Passage of the Economic Opportunity Act by a slim margin by the U. S. House of Representatives was predicted by Perkins. The measure was passed by the Senate on July 23. Since differences in the language occur in the two bills, a conference between committees of the House and Senate will be required to reconcile the differences. The conference agreement must then be concurred in by both Houses. The Economic Opportunity leg-

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islation contains Perkins' proposals for the establishment of Youth Conservation Corps camps to provide healthful outdoor training for young men while doing deferred conservation work on the nation's forests and public lands.

In addition, the bill contains an extension of the Perkins Vocational Work Study Program to students attending college. It also embodies Perkins' legislation for local work training programs for young people.

Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act adopts Perkins' provisions to establish and finance state programs of Adult Basic Education.

Other features of the bill envision urban and rural community action programs to eliminate the causes of poverty in grants and loans to small farm operation in order to increase their income potential, loans to farm cooperatives, expands and liberalizes small business administration loan authority, broadens and extends jobless parent programs, provides training and educational programs for public assistance families.

### Heel Fly Treatment Urged by Extension; Ruelene Recommended

Lexington, Ky.—The heel fly, whose eggs laid on legs and bellies of cattle turn into the cattle grub, has finished egg-laying this season.

And treatment to control the grub can be started now, says R. L. Miller, U. K. Ag Extension Service entomologist.

Systemic insecticides are an excellent way to control the pest, he notes. Grubs develop in animals' bodies and emerge next spring from cattle backs. Systemics carried throughout the body of the animal kills the grubs before they have a chance to develop.

Treatment can be done from now until late October on native cattle. On cattle shipped in from the southwest, treatment date should be before September 1.

Materials recommended are Co-Ral, Ruelene or Trolene. The 25 percent strength wettable powder of Co-Ral is recommended as a spray, 12 pounds of actual material in 100 gallons of water. Wet animal's skin. This material also can be used as a backline, pour-on treatment, four pounds actual material in three gallons of water or light, white mineral oil. Pour one half pint on animal's back.

Ruelene is used in the 25 percent strength emulsifiable concentrate form, as a spray formed from two gallons of Ruelene to 100 gallons of water and apply two to four quarts per head. As a pour-on, it is one part Ruelene to two parts of water applied at 1/4 a cup per 100 lbs. body weight.

Trolene is a medicated or mineral feed additive. Label directions should be followed.

There are certain rules to be followed in use of any of these three materials. County agents can supply these, or furnish producers with a copy of Extension Service Misc. No. 290-A, entitled "1964 Insecticide Recommendations for Beef Animals."

100 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

The Civil War in Kentucky

By JOE JORDAN (Kentucky Civil War Commission)

One hundred years ago this week, sheriffs and other county officers were chosen in an election in which there was a great deal of interference by the Union Army in behalf of the "Unconditional Union" (Republican) candidates.

In an effort to insure the election of Mortimer M. Benton, the Unconditional Union nominee for Court of Appeals Justice in the Second Appellate District, the military governor, Maj. Gen. S. G. Burbridge, waited until three days before the election and then sent the following notice to the sheriff of each county in the district: "You will not allow the name of Alvin Duvall to appear upon the pollbooks as a candidate for office at the coming election." Duvall, the incumbent, was standing for re-election. His supporters on the morning of the election sent telegrams to all counties in the district, suggesting what would now be called a "write-in" vote for former Chief Justice George Robertson, of Lexington.

Robertson won the election by receiving 4,332 votes—442 more than Benton got. In three counties the Burbridge order was not received and Duvall's name was not removed; in those counties 2,936 votes were cast for Duvall, who meantime had fled the state to avoid being arrested. During this period Gen. Burbridge ordered the arrest of leading citizens in many counties.

Chief Justice Joshua F. Bullitt of the Court of Appeals was one of those whom Burbridge ordered arrested, but he escaped and went to Canada. The charge upon which the order of arrest was issued was that Bullitt was "disloyal." (After the war, an investigation by the legislature would result in a complete exoneration of Bullitt and a finding that he had been a victim of "military despotism.")

Absentee Voting Law Privileges Are Noted By Secretary of State

Many Kentuckians may not be aware that the bill enacted by the 1964 General Assembly broadening absentee voting privileges also broadened the field for absentee registration.

This is pointed out by Secretary of State Thelma Stovall who said she is notifying county clerks throughout the state that her office has available the forms for application for absentee registration.

This type of registration previously was limited to members of the United States military services on active duty.

The new law says that spouses and dependents residing with persons in active service may now register to vote by filling out a form.

Members of religious groups and welfare agencies, assisting members of the Armed Forces, and their spouses and dependents residing with them also may register.

The new provision includes federal civilian employees residing outside the continental United States and their spouses and dependents residing with them.

Mrs. Stovall said applications for absentee registration forms are made to the county clerk and must be returned to him.

While the persons specified by the law may register by mail, the law requires that they shall "re-register in person" upon their first return to the county of their residence when the registration books are open.

The law also says that the county clerk, upon receipt of a request for an absentee voter's ballot shall examine the books to see if the applicant is a registered voter.

If he finds the applicant is not registered and determines that the applicant is entitled to be registered, he shall register him as an absentee. Such registration may be made not later than 20 days before the coming November 3 election.

The 1964 General Assembly broadened the base of absentee voting by allowing persons to vote absentee if they are going to be away from their county on business on election day.

Absentee voting since 1962 had been restricted to persons in the Armed Services and students away from home.

The deadline for registration to vote in this year's election is September 5.
