Compliance Promised After Discrimination Complaints Lodged

Frankfort, Ky.of the tallest teams ever to play with the federal Civil Rights law has been promised in 13 charges of discrimination received and investigated by the Kentucky Commission on Hucame effective in July.

Galen Martin, Commission executive director, said the complaints were mostly directed toward restaurant operations. They are in contrast to thousands of restaurants, motels, hotels, movie houses, and places of entertainment in Kentucky which are comply ing with the law, he pointed

Three of the 15 complaints received were dismissed for lack of "probable cause," or probability of a justified complaint.

Two proprietors have signed written agreements stating their willingness to serve all patrons without discrimination and three other propri-etors are in the process of making such agreements with the Commission, Martin said.

In five other cases, proprietors have given assurances of their willingness to serve all patrons but the cases are being held open pending evidece that they are complying

To further explain the public accommodations title of the Civil Rights law, the Commission recently distributed 7,000 copies of "Memo to Managers," to all covered business-


