PIKE JURY IS ORDERED

In Roy Salisbury Case; False Claims Case Set For January Term Date

Circuit Judge Hollie Conley this week decided to call on Pike county for a jury to sit in the third attempt to effect the trial of Roy Salisbury, who is accused of the murders of three Floyd county residents.

He called on the Pike circuit court to draw the names of prospective jurors from the jury drum, and these will be summoned by Sheriff Henry Hale. Last week he was quoted as saying he proposed to call for 200 veniremen to appear here for examination on one day, 200 on the next and 200 more on the third.

The case of Woodrow Runyon, former Pike county school board employee, who is accused of making false claims, was transferred to the Floyd circuit court for trial at the November term but was continued till January. GOVERNOR SUGGESTS NEW FITNESS PLANS

Eleven Kentucky school districts have expressed an interest in a physical fitness pilot program for seventh- and eighth grade students, it is announced by Don Bale, assistant superintendent of public instruction. The program was suggested by Governor E. T. Breathitt.

Other districts are expected to volunteer soon, Bale said. Floyd county is exploring the possibility of entering the program but is hampered by budgetary considerations.

A program of 15 minutes of vigorous exercise would be started. The same students would be tested again next May and the results would be sent to the Education Department.

"We thus would be in a position to determine the effectiveness of the programs and how they compare in various schools or counties in Kentucky," the Governor said in a letter to Superintendent of Public Instruction Harry Sparks.

Bale said the program could be put into effect at very little cost to school districts. A

NEW MINE IS PLANNED IN PIKE-CO.

Operation To Employ Total of 300 Miners, Breathitt Announces

A new million-ton-a-year underground coal mine is to be opened shortly near Phelps, in Pike county.

Governor Edward T. Breathitt, chairman of Kentucky's Economic Development Commission, said Kentucky Carbon Corporation will employ about 175 men initially and some 300 eventually in the mine and adjacent coal-preparation plant.

"This new coal development is an economic boost for Pike county, for the coal industry in Kentucky, and for our state-development program," Breathitt said.

Kentucky now ranks second among the states in production of bituminous coal. Last year's 78,139,049 tons was fourth highest in the state's history.

The Governor said the mining company indicated its initial investment in the new operation—the Kencar Mine—will top \$3 million.

Breathitt said Norfolk & Western Railway Company's board of directors has approved spending \$3.8 million for a rail line to serve the new mining facility. The 8.5 mile line, between Preston and Coleman, is expected to be completed late next year, about the same time as the coal-preparation plant is finished.

Preliminary survey and right-of-way activities have been started in connection with the new rail line. The Norfolk & Western is the nation's largest originator of bituminous coal shipments. It hauled 64 million tons from more than 200 mines in 1963.

HEART TESTS SLATED HERE

Free Diagnostic Exams Scheduled for Indigent By Health Department

A two-day consultative heart clinic for medically indigent patients will be held at the Floyd County Health Department here Tuesday and Wednesday, December 15 and 16.

This clinic is being organized so that adult patients only will be admitted to the clinic on December 15, and children only will be seen on December 16.

Physicians from the departments of Medicine and Pediatrics at the University of Kentucky Medical School will conduct the clinics.

Co-sponsored by the Kentucky Heart Association and the state and county health departments, this clinic provides a diagnostic service for the patient along with recommendations for treatment and management of the case. It also provides an opportunity for the referring physician to consult with the clinician regarding his patient.

Necessary expenses of the clinic are being underwritten by the Kentucky Heart Association and the State Department of Health. Clinic personnel as well as space and (See Story No. 3, Page 6)

Motorist Stopped by Trooper Possessed Counterfeit Money; Secret Service Investigates

State Trooper Clyde Thomas, of Salyersville, in stopping a motorist last week whom he suspected of being drunk, found that he had his driver's license in good order but he had something else—a \$10 counterfeit bill.

Trooper Thomas, watching as John Perkins opened his bill fold, saw the corner of a torn bill that he recognized as counterfeit. A search of Perkins' pockets revealed he had 11 others of the same denomination.

Perkins told the trooper, it is said, that he received the money from a man with whom he had traded cars earlier in the day. Perkins, with Dorothy Napier, a passenger were arrested. Perkins was charged with driving while intoxicated. Miss Napier was charged with carrying a concealed deadly weapon.

According to County Judge Clyde Salyer, two Salyersville men, Dud Murphy and F. F. Patrick, were being held in jail on suspicion in connection with the money.

A Secret Service agent was in Salyersville last week, apparently investigating the case, but said he had no information that could be released for publication at this time.

ORDER CITES BACK WAGES

District Court Orders Distribution of Wages To Eleven Employees

Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz has obtained a court order in U. S. district court at Pikeville, permanently enjoining and restraining Cline Mitchell, a Floyd county sawmill operator, from violating the minimum wage and record-keeping provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

The order, approved by United States District Judge Bernard T. Moynahan, Jr., provides for payment by the defendant of \$1,658.92 in back wages to be distributed by the Department of Labor to 11 employees. In addition to banning further wage violations, the injunction obtained by the Department of Labor specifically orders the defendant hereafter to keep adequate and accurate records of hours worked and wages paid with respect to his employees.

The complaint filed in this case resulted from an investigation by personnel from the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage-Hour Division. According to the complaint filed by the Secretary of Labor, the defendant and his employees are subject to the Fair Labor Standards Act by reason of the fact that they are engaged in manufacturing lumber and mine timbers used in the production of coal for shipment in interstate commerce.

Coroner James J. Carter held that his death was self-inflicted. The body was discovered by his brother, Clyde Allen, Martin hardware dealer, who became concerned after Allen had failed to appear to go to a doctor, as planned, it was reported here.

Allen was a son of Mrs. Hattie Preston Allen Osborne, of Martin, and the late Irvin Allen, and was a stepson of the late A. B. Osborne. He was never married.

He taught in the Floyd school system for a number of years, a part of that time in Prestonsburg high school. Besides his mother, he is survived by two brothers, Major Ozni Allen, of the U. S. Army, and Clyde Allen, of Martin, and one half-brother, A. B. Osborne, Jr.

Accidental Gun Shot Discharged by Wallen Seriously Hurts Son

Harry Wesley Wallen, 19, was shot and seriously wounded, Thanksgiving Day, when a shotgun was accidentally discharged by his father, Oscar Wallen, of Prestonsburg, while they and three others were hunting near Pataskala, Ohio.

Full load of the shotgun struck young Wallen in his hip. His leg is paralyzed, and it will not be known for a week or more if the paralysis is permanent. It was said at a Delaware, Ohio hospital where he is being treated. The wounded man has resided at Pataskala for some time.

COURT HITS AUTO SEARCH

Search, Seizure Powers Restricted by Decision Of Top Kentucky Court

The arrest of a motorist does not give an officer power to search the vehicle without a warrant, the Court of Appeals said last week.

And in reaffirming protection against "indiscriminate" search and seizure, the high court went further.

It said that even if the driver does not own the car, he may validly challenge such a search. "In order to meet the modern conditions, the powers of various police forces to stop motorists on the highway have been extended," said Appellate Judge John Moreman.

"At the same time it may be necessary to restrict the powers of search and seizure without warrant which have heretofore existed."

At stake was an appeal by Cecil Lane, arrested in his wife's car by a State Police trooper in Boyd county on a traffic charge.

While detaining Lane, the court said, the trooper searched his car and found seven cases of whiskey in the trunk. Lane was indicted on a charge of transporting alcoholic beverages for the purpose of sale in dry territory.

Lane asked Boyd circuit court to suppress all evidence obtained from the auto search. The court overruled him and he was convicted.

The appellate court reversed the trial court. (See Story No. 2, Page 6)

\$100 FINE IS AWARDED

Intoxicants Claimed By Joseph; Branham Jury In Disagreement

A Floyd circuit court jury failed to agree Monday on the guilt or innocence of Bennie Branham, who was given trial on a charge of selling intoxicants.

Den Joseph was fined \$100 and given a 30-day suspended jail term in police court here last Friday when he claimed ownership of approximately \$800 worth of intoxicants found recently in an automobile on premises which his uncle, Dayton Joseph, had under lease here.

Dayton Joseph was arrested by raiding officers and booked on a possession count, but the charge against him was dismissed when Den Joseph claimed ownership and said that Dayton had no knowledge of the liquor cache.

ADAMS LOW ON BIDDING FOR 2 JOBS

Alternates Omissions Cut Figure To \$49,000 For City Renewal Job

The Adams Construction Company, after certain alternates were eliminated, was the lowest of three bidders on preparation of the two parking areas to result from Prestonsburg's Central Business District and Courthouse urban renewal projects.

Highest of the three on base bids, Adams' figure, with the alternates omitted, was \$49,000. The two areas will be black-topped instead of surfaced with concrete. Sodding, striping and storm drains were omitted.

The bids were submitted on the second advertising of the two projects. First bids were out of range of available funds.

And even now additional funds of approximately \$7,000 are needed from the Community Facilities Administration of the Housing & Home Finance Agency. (See Story No. 6, Page 6)

ROAD WORK BIDS ASKED

Road Department Plans Bituminous Surfacing Of 9-Mile Area Link

Bids for bituminous concrete surfacing on the Salyersville-Prestonsburg road in this county will be received by the Highway Department on December 18. Commissioner of Highways Henry Ward announced this week.

The project will begin at the Magoffin county line and extend to near the junction with Ky. 40 (the David road), a distance of 9.314 miles.

This highway improvement is being financed with federal and state road funds.

Actual surfacing of the road will not be begun by the successful bidder till next spring. Meanwhile, the road, a part of the Mountain Parkway, will be open to traffic through the winter months.

Grade and drain work on the road, all the way to the underpass at Royaltown, is almost complete.

GROUP EXPERIENCES SHELTER CONDITIONS

Getting a certificate in shelter management from the Civil Defense Administration here last month was more than a mere 30 hours of classwork for most of the students.

Twenty-eight of them spent 19 hours inside a fallout shelter erected in the Floyd County Emergency & Rescue Squad building, and under conditions as much like those following actual nuclear attack as possible. Those 19 hours covered situations, experiences and duties which might be expected to arise within the 14 days those taking refuge must spend in shelter before the deadly effects of radiation are dissipated.

Each shelter occupant was assigned to his or her special task—some to handling and preparing food, others to radio operation, to teaching the children in the shelter, to leading in religious instruction or worship, others to meeting sanitation problems and so on.

Most of the group entered the shelter at 7 p.m. Friday, November 13. Two other contingents arrived later, requiring those in charge of the food to refigure the number of calories per person to be allotted. Lights went out at 7 p.m., and none were permitted, except for flashlights, till daybreak of the following day. They maintained two-hour watches, worked with and for each other.

Youngest of the party was a five-year-old, and he and others of his age group were models of contentment. A few of the teenagers got restless as, living under simulated atomic war conditions, there was nothing to do but try to stay alive.

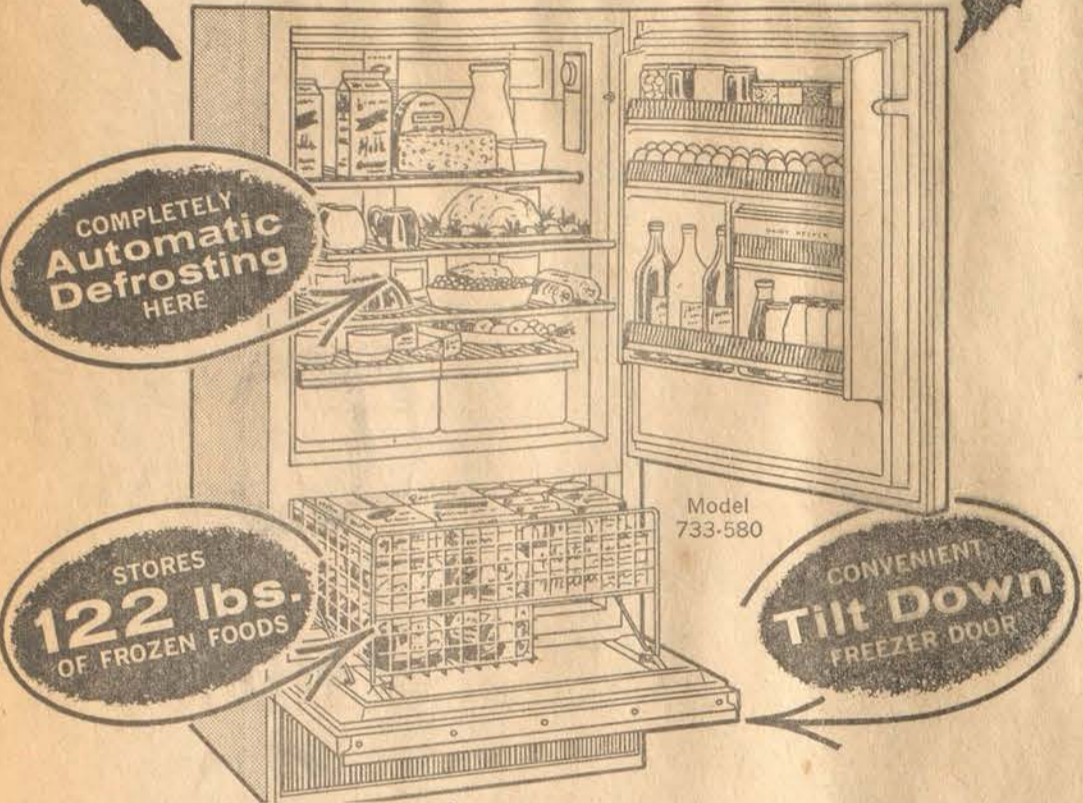

The Law Loses Its Teeth

Every bootlegger in the Commonwealth must have rejoiced upon learning last week that the Court of Appeals had come to the rescue.

This time, the high court made almost untouchable every transporter of intoxicating beverages in dry territory by ruling, in effect, that a motorist arrested on a traffic violation is safe from prosecution, even if his auto or truck is found filled with illegal liquor.

Now, a known bootlegger or transporter of intoxicating liquors into dry territory has his own "city of refuge" in his car, and the law is stopped at the gates.

The court opinion, of course, considers the principle of law that a citizen is to be protected against unlawful search and seizure. But the multitude of legal opinions have, over the years, tended to make existing law of no force and effect and to protect one type of citizen, the lawbreaker, to the detriment of others, those who respect and obey the law.

A known smuggler drives a Kentucky highway. Shall officers of the law be forbidden to search his car, and shall the smuggler be exempt from trial and conviction because the search was not done in such a way as literally to "track" the law, step by step, inch by inch?

It is true that this may be oversimplifying the matter. But in either case, that of whiskey or that of jewels, the law has been broken, and the law must not protect the criminal. Nobody has been killed—yet—in the case of the liquor-laden vehicle. But a killer rides it, as witness the carnage on American highways which is caused by drinking as well as drunken drivers, not to mention the crimes of every dismaying description which result from the use of intoxicating liquors.

The innocent have nothing to fear of the law. The guilty, day by day, have less and less to fear as the courts devote their time to dotting i's and crossing t's and overlooking the great, sweeping words of the legal document which looks to the public welfare.

REA BOARD CUTS RATES

Reduction Effective
December 21, Manager
Announces This Week

The board of directors of the Big Sandy Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation, Paintsville, has approved a 9.8 per cent reduction to become effective December 21. This rate reduction will be for all members except those on the commercial rate and others who come under the temporary power agreement.

Big Sandy RECC Manager Berlin Griffith pointed out that this rate reduction can result in important savings to consumers. For example, a customer using 500 kilowatt hours of power now pays \$13.01 under the present farm and home rate. Under the new rate structure, this consumer using the same amount of power would pay only \$11.46.

"We hope that this new rate schedule will enable our customers to use more electricity," Manager Griffith stated. "Big Sandy RECC is one of the many rural electric systems throughout the nation which are making every effort to bring their consumer-members an adequate supply of dependable power at the lowest cost possible in keeping with sound business practices. Rate reductions by 11 REA-financed rural electric systems during the fiscal year that ended June 30, 1964, will save rural consumers more than \$2.5 million annually on their electric bills."

Consumer-members will also notice a change in the meter reading supplies provided by the cooperative. New meter reading booklets will soon be mailed to each member. These booklets will be in the form of check books to enable the member to have a stub, or receipt, of the meter reading and payment he has made. These billing packets will be for a full 24-month billing period and will be computed up to a total of 2000 kilowatt hours. Complete instructions will be included in the billing packets.

"We hope that our customers will find this new billing booklet more convenient and that they will use it in accord with instructions," Griffith said. "However, if any member does not understand the booklet or the instructions for its use, we shall be happy to explain it for him if he will stop by the cooperative office. These booklets should be in the hands of the consumers before the January 20, 1965, reading date."

The new farm and home rates being instituted by the Cooperative are as follows:
First 15 KWH, or less, per month, \$1.50 per month; next 10 KWH per month, 7.5c per KWH; next 25 KWH per month, 6.5c per KWH; next 50 KWH per month, 5.5c per KWH; next 100 KWH per month, 4.5c per KWH; all over 200 KWH per month, 1.25c per KWH.

"It is our opinion that when a person is arrested for a traffic or other minor violation, the mere fact of the arrest does not give to the officer absolute right to search the vehicle or the premises indiscriminately," Moreman said.

It is impossible, he said, to lay down a rule that covers all possibilities. But, he said in essence, the court will condemn any action where a car is stopped on some pretext so police can circumvent the ban against unlawful search. Moreman said it also is time to reexamine the theory that only persons who own the property at issue are in a legal position to object to a search.

He went along with a federal decision that held anyone legitimately on the premises may make such a challenge.

If this story had been told earlier, Floyd county might have saved itself and the state considerable money by skipping Martin county when a jury to qualify as willing to inflict the death penalty was sought here recently. While the examination of prospective jurors was under way, a Martin countian told a bystander:

"They'll never get a jury from Martin county." Asked why, he told of a widespread superstition in that county that was born of a murder trial at Inez in the early 1940's. A man named Webb was accused of having beaten and shot to death a citizen whose body was later found; in fact, Webb is said to have confessed the murder. A jury of Martin countians agreed on death for him, and he went to the chair.

Then came a storm, and the homes or other buildings of some of the men on that jury were blown down. The unhappy incidents piled up on them. How long after the trial these happenings took place we do not know, but they served to establish a legend of destruction or worse that rivaled the fate of those who violated the late King Tut's privacy.

And so, the man opined, you're wasting your time trying to get a Martin county jury to give somebody, anybody, the death penalty.

Frankfort — Governor Edward T. Breathitt has announced plans for a new John F. Kennedy memorial center for examination and diagnosis of mentally retarded children.

Breathitt said detailed plans for the new facility will be released later.

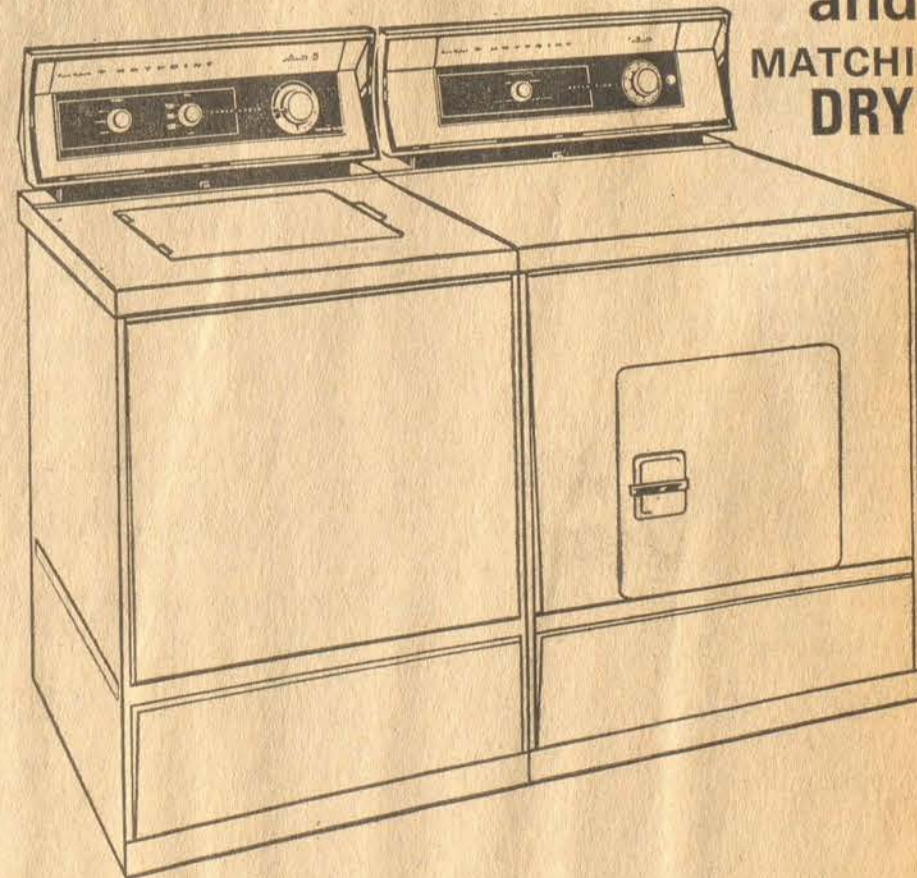

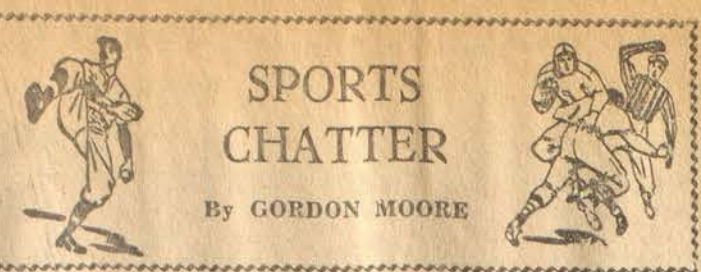

During October, 1964 Monroe became the first Kentucky county to be recertified as brucellosis modified-certified in the market cattle backtagging program.

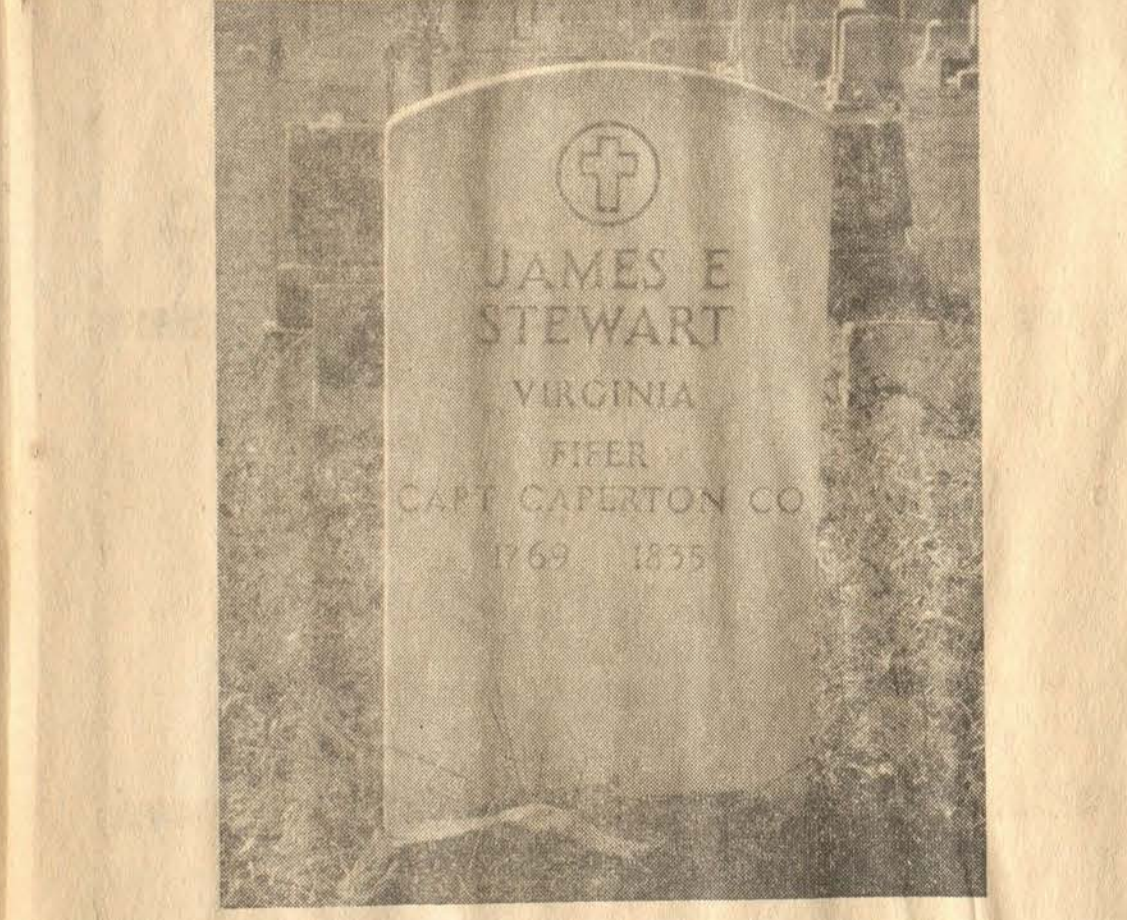

James E. Stewart (1769-1835), Borderland Soldier

James E. Stewart, Virginia Indian fighter and Big Sandy settler, was a member of Capt. Hugh Caperton's Company of Montgomery county, Virginia, pioneers organized to guard the frontier settlements on Greenbrier and Kanawha rivers against the Indians. The company was disbanded in 1793. Several of his comrades afterward pioneered Eastern Kentucky, including John Sellards, founder of the Sellards Settlement on Buffalo Creek in 1794. Sellards lies buried at Ivel, Floyd county, and Stewart, the name sometimes spelled Stuart, is buried in the old Buchanan Chapel cemetery in Lawrence county. Another member of the company was John Lewis, early Floyd county settler.

Daniel Boone was employed by Capt. Caperton to provide game for the company on an expedition to the Western Virginia river valleys, then in Virginia, now West Virginia. Boone disagreed with Caperton and left the company on Elk River.

NATURE TRAILS

By RUFUS M. REED

FOOD-PRODUCING PLANTS FOR WILDLIFE

We list herein most of the food-producing trees and plants found on our farms, which produce food for birds and wildlife. Some of these furnish our birds their main winter diet; all these plants should be protected on the farm and never destroyed unless necessary.

Pokeberries: these plants furnish food during late fall and winter for many kinds of birds; Blue cedar berries furnish food for cedar waxwings, doves, meadowlarks and others;

Pine cones furnish food in winter to chickadees, downy woodpeckers and other birds; I have watched chickadees pecking the seeds out of pine cones when the ground was covered with snow; wild cherries produce a bountiful crop of berries, which are devoured by many different birds; the devil's walking stick, or "prickly ash," bears a bountiful crop of berries eaten by many birds; this shrub produces large clusters of white flowers in late summer, and belongs to the same family as ginseng.

Elderberries are valuable shrubs and should be let grow along the borders of streams; they transform the country-side into a mass of white blooms in summer; the blooms produce an abundant crop of black berries that are eaten by catbirds, bluejays, sparrows and others. The berries are also used to make wine. The American holly is one of our most beautiful trees in winter, being covered with clusters of red berries; these are eagerly sought by cedar waxwings, cardinals, chickadees, titmice and other birds and often keep the birds fed until well after Christmas. Only the female holly trees bear berries. The holly should be protected wherever found. Unfortunately many persons slash off the limbs and mar the beauty of these trees, to get the twigs with red berries for Christmas decoration. The holly leaf is protected by sharp spines around its margin but this does not deter persons from cutting off the branches and sometimes ruining the tree.

The flowering dogwood is one of our most beautiful small trees; it is the only tree that is both state flower and state tree; Virginia is that state. It is also the state flower of North Carolina and state tree of Missouri. The dogwood produces a bounteous crop of scarlet berries that hang like clusters of rubies on the bare branches after the crimson leaves have fallen. These red berries furnish good eating for birds and squirrels. The dogwood should be protected wherever found; its bark is almost as good medicine as quinine and its graywinter buds look like small door knobs studding the bare boughs. Its bark is rough and scaly like an alligator's hide but its blossoms are glossy white like they were coated with starch. The Hawthorns are available small trees, as the pale red nutlets furnish food for birds and wildlife. They are often sought by children as a prize for nibbling. The Japanese barberry, both in its wild state and as a lawn shrub, has beautiful brilliant foliage in autumn; it also produces a bounteous crop of red berries that are relished by robins and other birds in winter.

HOLIDAY FOOD WARNING VOICED BY HEALTH OFFICER

The season of Thanksgiving, just past, and Christmas, only a few weeks ahead, is the most joyful and festive of the year, and at this time of year most homemakers are planning that extra special dinner with turkey and dressing. "In your hurry and excitement, don't forget to take the proper precautions in cooking and storing holiday foods and leftovers," warns Dr. R. L. Hall, Floyd county health officer.

During the holiday season, turkey is probably the most popular bird around, but he can also be dangerous if not handled correctly. Food poisoning, caused by improper cooking and handling of frozen turkey, occurs in large numbers every year during this season. The danger is especially high in school lunchrooms or other establishments where large quantities of food are prepared.

Extra care must be taken in the preparation, cooking, and storing of turkey because of its large size. If you buy your turkey early, be sure to freeze it immediately. If it is to be prepared within 48 hours after it was purchased, you may refrigerate it at 33 to 38 degrees. Ordinarily it takes much longer to defrost a turkey than any other kind of meat. The preferred method is

to thaw it in the refrigerator for two or three days until you are sure that it is completely defrosted. Another method that can be used is to cook the frozen turkey taken directly from the freezer, doubling the cooking time for a thawed turkey.

Before cooking, obtain a meat thermometer and insert it into the center of the stuffing or the thigh. Cook the turkey in a 300 to 325 degree oven the required length of time until the temperature of the stuffing reaches 165 degrees or the temperature in the center of the thigh reaches 190 degrees. Proper cooking times for turkey are: 3 to 3 1/2 hours for an 8 to 10 pound turkey; 3 1/2 to 4 hours for a 10 to 14 pound turkey; 4 to 4 1/2 hours for a 14 to 18 pound turkey; and 4 1/2 to 5 hours for an 18 to 20 pound turkey. If you are cooking the dressing and turkey together one day to be served on the following day, the dressing should be removed and refrigerated separately.

Since large amounts of food are usually prepared for holiday meals, leftovers must be taken care of. When refrigerating left-over turkey or other fowl, remove all dressing and wrap separately. Place the meat in shallow pans rather than in large bowls, in order that it can be chilled quickly and thoroughly. Refrigerate all left-overs immediately. Allowing food to stand several hours or overnight at room temperature is a common cause of food poisoning.

Dr. Hall suggests, "If you are not sure that a food is good, don't serve it." Everyone looks forward to that special dinner at Thanksgiving and Christmas. Be sure that the holiday meal you prepare and serve is both good and safe.

ORDINANCE NO. 20-64

An Ordinance Accepting Certain Territory Heretofore Annexed Into the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 15-64, was adopted by the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg at a regular meeting held August 22, 1964, annexing certain territory into the City near the northern corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 16-64, was adopted by the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, at a regular meeting held August 22, 1964, annexing certain territory into the City at the southern corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 18-64, was adopted by the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg, at a former meeting annexing certain territory into the City at the western corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg; and

WHEREAS, petitions for annexation were filed in the Floyd Circuit Court on September 29, 1964, and October 7, 1964; and

WHEREAS, on November 12, 1964, three separate judgments were entered by the Floyd Circuit Court annexing certain territory as a part of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, which judgments are recorded in Order Book 58, at Pages 47 and 48, Floyd Circuit Court records, which judgments have not to this date been appealed from and are hereby referred to for further description of said territory:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY,

SECTION I. That the following boundaries of land referred to above, be and the same are hereby accepted into the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky:

That certain territory and property belonging to the Porter Heirs, located adjacent to the Northern corporate limits of Prestonsburg, as now situated, comprising 20.50 acres adjacent to the Community College property, the Green Acres property, and intersected by the old Auxier Road, being more particularly described as follows:

BEGINNING at a stake on East right-of-way of Kentucky Highway 1428 and the Northeast corner of a lane to Porter cemetery; thence leaving the highway and following the lane S 75-20 E 358.00 feet to a metal post and gate to Porter cemetery; thence with the fence N 12-23 E 81.90 feet to a metal post; thence with the fence S 78-35 E 161.00 feet to a metal post on the edge of the old County Road; thence leaving the Porter cemetery and with the old County Road, N 06-00 E 72.00 feet to a stake; thence N 10-15 E 112.00 feet to a stake; thence N 23-25 E 107.00 feet to a stake; thence N 22-45 E 198.00 feet to a fence post on the right-of-way of old Auxier Road; thence crossing said road N 12-45 E 45.00 feet to fence post on the right-of-way of said road; thence with the right-of-way of said Road, N 29-30 E 160.00 feet to a stake being a corner to the Prestonsburg Community College; thence leaving old Auxier Road and with College property N 61-02 W 642.31 feet to a stake in the fence; thence along the fence and with the College property, N 43-56 E 505.50 feet to a large maple tree; thence along the College property N 48-12 W 1063.27 feet to the Big Sandy River; thence leaving the College property and following the river S 21-20 W 273.00 feet to a point under the bridge over the Big Sandy River (Kentucky Highway 1428); thence with the right-of-way of State Highway 1428 in a Southern direction 1850 feet to the point of beginning and containing 20.50 acres, more or less.

That certain territory and property belonging to the Lewis Mayo Heirs, located within the Southern City Limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, near the Prestonsburg Water Plant, and more particularly described as follows:

BEGINNING at an iron pin on the right-of-way of U. S. SIZEMORE FAMILY

A letter from James Sizemore, 219 Asco Street, Ridgecrest, California, is an interesting commentary on the Sizemore family.

He writes: "I am very sorry that I didn't get to Prestonsburg last summer but we did get to Manchester and Hyden and had to hurry on to Norfolk, Virginia. We met Matt Sizemore, of Manchester. He is a deputy sheriff there and our visit was really interesting. We went up the valley to Hyden. The valley sure is beautiful. We missed T. C. Sizemore, editor and owner of The Leslie County News. He was vacationing in one of the national parks. He plans to run for sheriff of Clay county again. Aunt Josie Sizemore died last year at 113 years of age. She lived right outside Manchester.

"A Mr. George Hoover, Mt. Olive, Kentucky, wrote me last June 7 and mentioned some of the Sizemores, among them Golden (Golden) Hawk Sizemore. He mentioned briefly Bill Hawk Sizemore and Black Jack Granville Sizemore, also Jeff Sizemore, and said they died near Prestonsburg. There is a Big Creek near Manchester, Clay county, where Aunt Josie lived and also the place where Golden Hawk lived.

"I have numerous names from the Department of Interior and there is a G. H. in Court of Claims index. I am going to write for a transcript of his claim. This was in 1906. Money was allocated for headrights for the Eastern Cherokee nation. According to the Department of Interior these claims, 2,000 of them representing 5,000 individuals, were rejected as non-conclusive in that they had inhabited a locale frequented more so by Catawbas and Virginia Indians than by Cherokees. The tradition, according to Special Commissioner Guion Miller's report, of Indian blood lines in the Sizemores was not denied, however, I plan to acquire the Miller report in its entirety.

"Most Sizemores claim English ancestry but I have recently received a post from Queen Elizabeth's Census Service and they have no Sizemores in all of Merrie England. The York Insignia Service has a list of over 100,000 surnames and Sizemores are not among them. The closest is Seymour or Semore but I doubt if this has any connection with us. The only similarity I have been able to find in Europe is the Sizmur in the Paris phone book. "There are lots of Sizemores

in Oklahoma City. We passed through there and called some of them and they seemed very nice. Some of them are doing right well for themselves. They have laid down their arms and one is a good lawyer in Norman, Oklahoma. We have two in the Pentagon and one is a scientist here at the Naval Ordnance Test Station at China Lake, California. "We are planning a sort of get-together for all the Sizemores who can make it. I would like very much to have the history of the Eastern Kentucky Sizemores that you have in your files to read to them at that time."

There was more to Mr. Sizemore's letter but the above excerpt constitutes the most interesting part. If anyone wants to correspond with our California correspondent they will find him an interesting acquaintance.

PREECE FAMILY

A letter from Harold Preece, 131 Prospect Place, Brooklyn, New York, renews the ties of the Preece-Priest family to Eastern Kentucky which had been broken since 1833. Mr. Preece is author of THE DALTON GANG and other Western books and innumerable Western historical features. One recent feature was in Real West magazine and was titled, MY GRANDFATHER, DICK PREECE. He was Harold Preece's grandfather and a noted Texas Ranger.

Mr. Preece writes: "My father, who informed me of kinsmen like the Strattons, Litchfields and Martins, always told me that our people came from Pike county, Kentucky, to Texas in 1838. Martin county, I understand, has been created since and that seems to be the concentration point of the family today. My grandfather, Richard Lincoln Preece, married Elizabeth Gideon, who was part Cherokee, in 1825. My work seems to have brought the two long-separated branches together and there have been a few personal visits of Kentucky kinsmen passing through Texas since. Several of us in Texas are working on family history.

"I'm sorry to hear of Cousin Emmons Preece's death. All our rapport between our two branches began after Cousin Emmons saw pieces that I did on my ranger kin for Texas Ranger Magazine. He recognized the connection and wrote me.

We are due for a friendly debate on the Preece-Priest matter. I think it has to do with whether we date the family history from England or Wales. The Texas branch now regards itself as Scotch-Irish, that rather indefinite term expressing the Southern hill country amalgam. "My great-uncle, Alexander Preece, probably named for Louisiana Stratton Preece's husband (Alexander Preece), disappeared in Mexico during the Mexican War, probably killed in action. Alexander B. Preece, a cousin, died in the Texas hills in a community called Round Mountain, some years back. We seem to maintain the old family names in both branches."

Mr. Preece mentions "that my ancestor, William Martin Preece, left North Carolina in a dugger," although he doesn't say why. He asks in his letter if old Joe Martin was his ancestor. Joe Martin, our Texas correspondent writes, was "sent out for reform by his rich Liverpool father only to come derved near tearing up the frontier. Near him on the Cumberland Trail a William Priest (Preece) established a trading post in 1773."
