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

Let's Let the Matter Rest

No damage has been done the McDowell Appalachian Regional hospital by the action instituted to require doctors there to register at the County Clerk's office here-if the matter is permitted to rest where it now is.

Resident physicians at this and other hospitals have been given the status of interns by a new State Board of Health regulation, thus exempting them from the registration law; the court action has ended in sensible agreement—there really remains little to row about.

Compliance with the law will harm no professional group, we think all are agreed. In the doctor-registration matter, we are not inclined to believe that there was an intention either to evade or violate the law on the one hand or to use the law for vindictive purposes on the other.

This county needs all its existing hospital facilities and all its doctors. Without those physicians and surgeons whose practice is largely limited to these hospitals, Floyd county would be deprived of most of its medical services. Few young doctors leaving college and interneship are returning to this county; hence, it follows that the county can ill afford to lose any of the qualified practitioners who are now rendering service to its people.

We have no interest in the professional relationships within the ranks of Floyd county's medical men except as those relations may be harmful to the public. For that reason, we suggest that every bonafide physician and surgeon be accorded a welcome by the people and others of their profession

Perhaps it would be well to let the matter rest on this note, which was sounded by Dr. Karl S. Klicka, president of Appalachian Regional Hos-

The Attorney General's Word On the Matter

May a magistrate impose a fine but not a jail sentence in cases of selling or possessing alcoholic beverages in dry territory? This is the answer to that question, as given last week by the Attorney General's office in response to an inquiry made by a Floyd county citizen:

"KRS 242.990 requires a fine, plus a jail sentence, for each violation of the local option law. However, the magistrate may impose the fine and probate the jail sentence, or vice versa. This would mean that the magistrate would have the power during the probationary period to reinstate the jail sentence if the defendant violates his proba-

have set an excellent example in handling these cases, and some of the lower courts make a bad situation worse by failing to follow suit. Jail terms are the rule in the quarterly and circuit courts, and those other courts which forget or otherwise dispense with that part of the penalty are as much in violation of the law as the bootlegger himself.

It is true that they may remit the jail sentence via probation, but is it ever really probation? Isn't it, instead, a weak-kneed attitude toward the law and those who wilfully break it?

The only known eyewitness to any of the violent action in the vicinity of the Hobson home, except the wounded Mrs. May and er husband, was Raymond Ratliff, who told officers he saw May knock his wife to the ground. He then heard shots, he said. woman, who was taken to he Pikeville Appalachian Regional hospital, suffered a blow on her forehead which caused pronounced swelling.

Fred Burke, assistant Pike county jailer, told the Floyd authorities that May on arriving at the jail and surrendering announced that he had killed two people at Harold.

They quoted Perry Justice, of Justice Funeral Home Pikeville, as saying that May telephoned him, saying he had killed three people, intended to kill himself and wanted Justice take care of the bodies.

The accused man told author ties that he went to the Hobson home "to straighten things out rong." He claimed the elderly Hobson, a cripple, struck him on the shoulder with his cane but was indefinite about anything that happened thereafter. Officers said examination of May's shoulders failed to reveal any

sign that he had suffered a blow.

May is a native of Pike county and has been employed by the Porter Electric Company at Alen. He had been in the Owensboro-Henderson area for the Al-len firm recently, and his wife said she and her children had been at her parents' home about

The May couple were involved in a divorce action filed here, several months ago, and more recently Mrs. May swore out a beace warrant for her husband. This latter dissension was later

resolved, however. The shooting scene is in the vicinity of the Harold postoffice. where Mrs. Hobson was post-mistress till last July. Her husband retired as janitor at the Harold school, the same month. Both were members of the Regular Baptist Church at Fords Branch, Pike county

Q. I have been disabled and unable to work for over 6 months, but my employer is continuing to pay my full salary for 1 year. Can I get dis-ability payments when I still get my full pay?

A. Yes. The fact that your employer continues to pay you has no bearing on your disability claim as long as you are not performing any work.

You often suggest our inquirers that they get in in this slat ouch with the social security office before retiring. I'm still not too clear on the advan-tages of doing this. Would you explain again, please?

A. The most important reason for calling early at the social security office is to obtain definite information. about what you can expect from so-cial security. This information will have a bearing on your planning—that is: when you may retire-at age 62, at 65 or tater; also, what steps you might take in advance to assure yourself of a more adequate income-such as the purchase of annuities or arranging for a part-time job, completion of time payments while still working, etc. Also, if you are able to retire, you may make application for social security benefits as much as 3 months ahead of time, so your checks will start prompt-

Q. From time to time, I hear that people have "lost" social security benefits. How does his happen?

A. The loss of social security benefits occurs because the person concerned is not aware of his or her rights under the law and does not get in touch with the social security office until after the loss has occurred. Social security benefits can be paid retroactively for as much as-but no more than-one year. Because of the technical workings of the retirement rule, it is often possible to pay a husband and wife some benefits for a year in spite of earnings as substantial as \$3400 or \$3500 in that year. If the worker waits too long, he may lose some of these payments. It is best to call at the social security office several months before you reach retirement age, even though you are working fulltime, and at any time between the ages of 62 and 65. You avoid "losing" some of your social security benefits.
