NEW ADULT PROGRAM IN EDUCATION BEGINS

625 ENROLL IN CLASSES IN FLOYD-CO.

James Salisbury Heads Program To Eliminate Illiteracy In County

Several hundred adults and 37 teachers in Floyd county are in school again. The adults are either learning to read and write for the first time or seeking to improve their grade education. Their teachers are studying guidance and complementary skills that will enable them more effectively to teach their adult students.

It is all part of an adult elementary education program that opened in the county April 5, according to James Salisbury, supervisor of the Floyd county school system who is in charge of the program. It is financed by 90 percent federal funds and 10 percent state money. The program in this county is one of two approved in the state and the first in Kentucky to be activated.

The teachers, all Floyd county instructors, are required to attend a special class organized by Morehead State College at Martin. They must meet in four sessions of five hours each to qualify as teachers of the adult students.

Stumbo elementary school at Grethel has 91 adult students, the largest class in the county. A total of 625 are enrolled in the 37 classes. Classes are composed of unemployed fathers and anyone else who wants to attend, Salisbury said. Free textbooks and materials are furnished.

County Superintendent Charles F. Clark, in commenting on the program, said:

"This program is probably one of the most significant steps in the history of general education in Floyd county. Most of the adult enrollees are learning at a startling rate, which is a source of great satisfaction to the teachers and Supervisor Salisbury as well as the board of education and myself. We are looking forward to the time when all citizens of this county are actively engaged in improving themselves through education."

False Advertising Alleged As \$2,500 Loss Reported Here

Ishmael Sturgill, of Ashland, was accused of false and deceptive advertising in a complaint filed with the grand jury last week by Commonwealth's Attorney Harold Stumbo.

The charge was based on an affidavit made April 9 by D. C. Stephens, Sr., of Prestonsburg, who alleged that:

On or about April 30, last year, Sturgill assured him, in their negotiations to procure natural gas to supply Jenkins, Neon, Whitesburg and other Letcher county communities, that he had influential connections with the United Fuel Gas Company and Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company and could get gas at wholesale from these firms.

Relying, he said, on such statements, which he termed false, Stephens said he was induced to pay Sturgill \$2,500.

ONLY 1 CITY SCRAP SEEN

Martin Council Race Seen for November; No Opposition Here

Election of city officials will be held in three municipalities of the county next November, but in only one will there be a scrap of it.

(Although city officials are not elected till November, the deadline for candidates for municipal office to file was last Saturday, when the lists closed for those entering the May primary.)

The November fight of it will be made at Martin where two tickets have filed for City Council. One is composed of Bill Wells, Steve Stout, Milton F. Lanley, Turner Lloyd McGary and D. M. Hutchinson. The other includes John H. Turnley, Haskell Frye, Sr., Earl Branham, Mrs. Dortha Allen, Mrs. Iola Crisp and Elliott B. Skeans.

Prestonsburg's mayor and its present eight councilmen are unopposed. All filed for re-election: Dr. George P. Archer for mayor; T. J. Fannin, Winston Ford, Jr., Dr. Edw. B. Leslie, E. B. May, Jr., Tom O. McGuire, Byron Nunnery, Dr. H. G. Salisbury, Jr., and Clifford E. Wright for City Council.

Told that lack of opposition must be considered a compliment to him and his administration, Mayor Archer said, "I don't know. Somebody said, 'If he's stupid enough to have the office, let him have it.'"

Wheelwright's five candidates for City Council likewise are unopposed. They are Landon Rowe, Jr., Joseph Peracino, Vern M. Bailey, Hobert Smith, Steve Benedict.

CLEAN-UP PROGRAM IN FLOYD BEGINS

The Floyd County Health department, various state and county officials and many civic organizations joined this week in urging citizens to cooperate in the clean-up campaign that opens today (Thursday).

The month of April has been designated as Clean-Up Month by Governor Edward T. Breathitt and Floyd County Judge Henry Stumbo.

All garbage, trash and other refuse will be picked up in county and state trucks and hauled away if it is placed by the roadside, it is announced. Pick-up days in all communities have been selected.

"Have garbage in cans or strong paper boxes and placed near the main highway so that trucks may be able to pick up and properly dispose of it," the health department urges. "All pick-ups will begin at 3:30 a.m."

JURY INDICTS MRS. LAYNE

In Slaying of Warrick; Also Lists 'Jap' Harris For Near-Fatal Beating

One of the indictments voted last week by the circuit court grand jury here accuses Virgie Short Layne, of Abbott Creek, of murder in the recent slaying near her home of her former husband, Zeen Warrick.

Trial date for the case has not been set. Bond of \$10,000 was set for Mrs. Layne.

Willie "Jap" Harris was named in an indictment charging him with striking and wounding with intent to kill, and provision was made for his trial under the Habitual Criminal Act. Harris, who is accused of the near-fatal beating on Middle Creek, near here, of Catherine Akers, has been held in jail here without bond since the date of the attack on the woman. Amount of the bond marked on Harris' indictment is \$5,000.

Mrs. Akers remains unconscious in a Lexington rest home. Also indicted in connection with the woman's beating was Maude Fitzpatrick, owner of the property at which the assault took place. She is charged with aiding, counseling, advising or encouraging Harris in the attack.

An involuntary manslaughter bill was voted against Robert Hall, alleging that he caused the death of D. J. Hall "by reckless and grossly careless operation of an automobile."

Henry M. Poston, of Minnie, was named on four breaking and entering counts; for entering the Willard Moore restaurant, the Verl Frazier restaurant, the Gulf Oil Service Station operated by Bobby Hall and Rex Gearheart's Texaco station. Bonds asked for his release total \$4,000.

Claude Greer, who was arrested by Prestonsburg police after he allegedly had threatened them with a gun, was named in two indictments—one alleging the armed robbery of Robert Nichols, the other for carrying a concealed deadly weapon.

An indictment alleging stream pollution lists the Left Beaver Coal Co., Inc. and the Ligon Preparation Co., Inc. as defendants. Another accuses Rush Fraley Shepherd and Colby James Marcum of knowingly receiving stolen property which was de-

WORK ON NEW CHURCH APPROVED

Says 2,587 New Voters Registered in County Since Last November

Floyd County Court Clerk C. Ollie Robinson said this week that 2,587 new voters are eligible to vote in the May 25 primary. The registration books opened five days after the November general election and closed on March 27. During that time 2,454 Democrats, 132 Republicans and one Independent registered. Meanwhile, 509 persons transferred from various precincts in the county to others.

BALL NAMED TO JOB HERE

Martin County Agent To Round Out Staff Of Extension Dept.

Eugene Ball, county agent in Martin county, was named Tuesday by the fiscal court, on recommendation of the College of Agriculture, University of Kentucky, to fill the vacancy created on the Floyd county agricultural extension staff by the resignation of Robert Jones, county agent.

The extension staff is no longer headed by a county agent, as heretofore. Instead, each of the three staff members is county agent, or specialist, assigned to a definite area of work and sharing responsibility for the extension effort.

Mr. Ball will be county agent in development work; Jack Friar, in youth work, and Mrs. Frances Pitts, in home economics.

The fiscal court had earlier recommended Friar to succeed Jones as county agent.

Ball, a native of Lawrence county, holds the B.S. and M.A. degrees from the University of Kentucky, and has been county agent in Martin county the last eight years. Before that, he was with the Pike county extension department three years. He will come here, about May 1.

Ball is married to the former Lois Cain, and they have two daughters.

CAN THIS BE FLOYD? ONLY 4 FOR JAILER!

This is news!—Floyd, a county which normally produces a "crop" of 20 or more Democratic candidates for the Jailer's office, this year has only four, and the time for others to file is past.

When Saturday's filing deadline was reached, there were five candidates for the office, but one, Michael D. Brown, of Garrett, withdrew Tuesday when advised that he was too young to qualify as a candidate.

A candidate for county office must have attained his 24th birthday. Brown, who was born April 19, 1943, lacks a few days of reaching the age of 22.

Told that he was ineligible, Brown at first balked, insisting he would make a race of it, but on advice of his attorney, Cassie J. Allen, later withdrew.

"I shall return," Brown said, giving full credit to the late General MacArthur for the originality of that statement.

The last day of filing produced no "surprise" candidates. In all, 100 Democrats and nine Republicans have filed for countywide and district offices. In only one

**STRING QUARTET SLATES
COLLEGE PRESENTATION**

The University of Kentucky Heritage String Quartet will present a concert at 8 p.m. tomorrow (Friday) in the Prestonsburg Community College auditorium. The event will be free and open to the public.

The Heritage Quartet is a resident string group, composed of permanent members of the UK music faculty. They are Abraham Mishkind and Elaine Pinkerton, violin; Kenneth Wright, viola, and Gordon Kinney, cello.

Mishkind is a graduate of the Juillard School of Music, New York, and received a master's degree from Columbia University. He also was an Albert Spaulding teaching fellow at Boston University.

He was first violinist with the Pittsburgh Symphony for six years and with the Detroit Symphony for four years. Mishkind has been director of strings at the University of Vermont summer music session for the past six years and has toured with several chamber music groups.

Elaine Pinkerton, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, studied violin with Richard Burgin and Raphael Bronstein, and was a member of the Detroit Symphony for four years before coming to UK. She has been a recitalist and soloist with orchestras in the eastern United States, and has presented many duo-violin concerts with her husband, Abraham Mishkind.

Wright received the master and Ph. D. degrees from Eastman School of Music. He has taught at Arizona State College, Mississippi State College for Women, and the University of California. His professional experience includes membership in the Kansas City Philharmonic, Rochester Philharmonic and the New Orleans Symphony. He has been at UK since 1949, and has written a number of compositions for strings and full orchestra.

Dr. Wright was selected the distinguished professor in the UK College of Arts and Sciences last year. Last semester while on leave from his teaching duties, he composed an opera, "Wing of Expectation," based on the life of Mary Todd Lincoln. This opera was performed at UK April 7-10 as one of the Centennial Fine Arts events of the current Centennial celebration.

County Attorney's Law Enforcement Manual

ARE YOU SATISFIED WITH LAW and ORDER IN FLOYD COUNTY?



A candidate for re-election for a public office will often say he is running on his record. This is easy because much of a county official's record is not well known, but part of the record is obvious. A part of the record, which we all know about, is that of law and order in Floyd county during the last three years. Search your own conscience, rely upon your own personal knowledge, ask those who know and answer these questions:

1. ARE YOU SATISFIED WITH THE INCREASED CRIME RATE IN FLOYD COUNTY?

COMMENT: A recent study of the F.B.I. based upon major crimes committed per 100,000 people shows Alabama to have a crime rate over twice that of the nation. Review in your mind the number of major crimes in Floyd county during the last year. It will show Floyd county's crime rate for 42,000 people to be more than double the national rate and even higher than the state of Alabama.

2. ARE YOU SATISFIED THAT ALL THE LAWS ARE BEING PROSECUTED TO CLEAN UP THE TRAFFIC IN ILLEGAL LIQUOR?

COMMENT: The County Attorney has available not only fines but jail sentences, may forfeit liquor bonds on convictions, may take action to sell property used in this illegal traffic, and may even enjoin the operation of places of business where such bootlegging activities are being carried on. Are all these remedies being used by our County Attorney?

3. ARE YOU SATISFIED WITH THE HANDLING OF JUVENILE DELINQUENCY PROBLEMS IN FLOYD COUNTY?

COMMENT: Other questions which arise are: Does the County Attorney have a policy of firmness and equality in these cases? A liberal policy of probation should be exercised, but should depend upon many factors, including age, seriousness of the crime and ability of parents to supervise. A follow-up program of supervision should be developed and recommended to the Court by the County Attorney.

It also advocated the use by future grand juries of the Habitual Criminal Act against persons who have been convicted on two or three prior felonies. The jury voted one such indictment during its session.

Expressing its pleasure with the appearance and the cleanliness of the courthouse, the jury recommended that a bulletin board be placed in the courthouse hallway for use in displaying public signs and notices. In the absence of such a board, such notices are being attached to the walls by the use of tape. The jury also suggested a directory be placed on the first floor of the courthouse, near the entrance, showing the location of all offices.

Recommendation also was made that the room adjacent to the grand jury room be converted into a waiting room for witnesses appearing before future grand juries.

The jury filed 36 indictments.

REHABILITATION IN STATE HAS HIGH NATIONAL RATE

Kentucky's rate of rehabilitation of physically and mentally-handicapped persons has advanced the Commonwealth from 50th place to 13th in the nation within the past 10 years.

Dr. Harry M. Sparks, state superintendent of public instruction, said the statistics released by the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Washington, D. C., point up "an-

other outstanding achievement of our Bureau of Rehabilitation Services."

The bureau is directed by Ben P. Coffman, assistant superintendent for rehabilitation. It does not consider a person fully rehabilitated until he is working on a job and self-supporting.

Coffman, who has been with the bureau nine years, said that "we like to think of the years from 1954 to 1964 as the 'Decade of Progress' in Kentucky rehabilitation work."

"In fiscal 1954," Coffman said, "our rate of rehabilitation was 15 persons per 100,000 population. With the increased funds made available for our work, we advanced to that 13th position in the last fiscal year with 96 rehabilitants per 100,000 population."

Kentucky ranked 21st in the 1963 fiscal year.

Kentucky also led the nation during the last fiscal year in the growth rate of rehabilitation of physically and mentally-handicapped persons. Federal statistics revealed Kentucky's growth rate is nine percent.

A record-breaking total of 2,975 handicapped Kentuckians were rehabilitated during the last fiscal year. This was 1,094 more than the previous high of 1,881 in 1962-63.

A total of 9,420 persons have been rehabilitated in Kentucky during the last five fiscal years, more than double the 4,131 of the previous five years.

Coffman said his bureau spent approximately \$1,876,457 providing services to 7,259 handicapped persons during the last fiscal year in all 120 counties in Kentucky. Persons were rehabilitated in every county, he noted.

State appropriations to the program totaled \$403,334 during the year.

To Talk Preservation Of Historic Buildings

A conference designed to cause Kentuckians to become more keenly aware of the importance of saving historic buildings—both public and private—will be held at the University of Kentucky, May 21-23.

The Conference on Restoration and Preservation, a "first" at UK, is expected to draw attendance from every county of the state. The meeting, sponsored by the UK School of Agriculture and UK's Kentucky Life Museum, Waveland, is open to all interested persons and state, county and civic officials, and members of clubs and organizations having or planning restoration projects are especially invited.

The conference will be centered particularly upon the preservation and restoration of Kentucky's ante bellum structures, mainly the Georgian Federal and Greek Revival homes and buildings.

Some of the nation's outstanding authorities on historic architecture, restoration and preservation will highlight the three-day program. The National Trust for Historic Preservation and The Smithsonian Institute will be represented.

The program is being worked out by Charles Graves, dean of the UK School of Architecture, Dr. James P. Noffsinger, UK associate professor of architecture, Dr. Hambleton Tapp, Waveland director, and a group of persons active in the restoration field, including Mrs. Lawrence C. Brewer and Laurie J. Blakely, both of Lexington, and John Seaton Huff and Frank G. Rankin, both of Louisville.

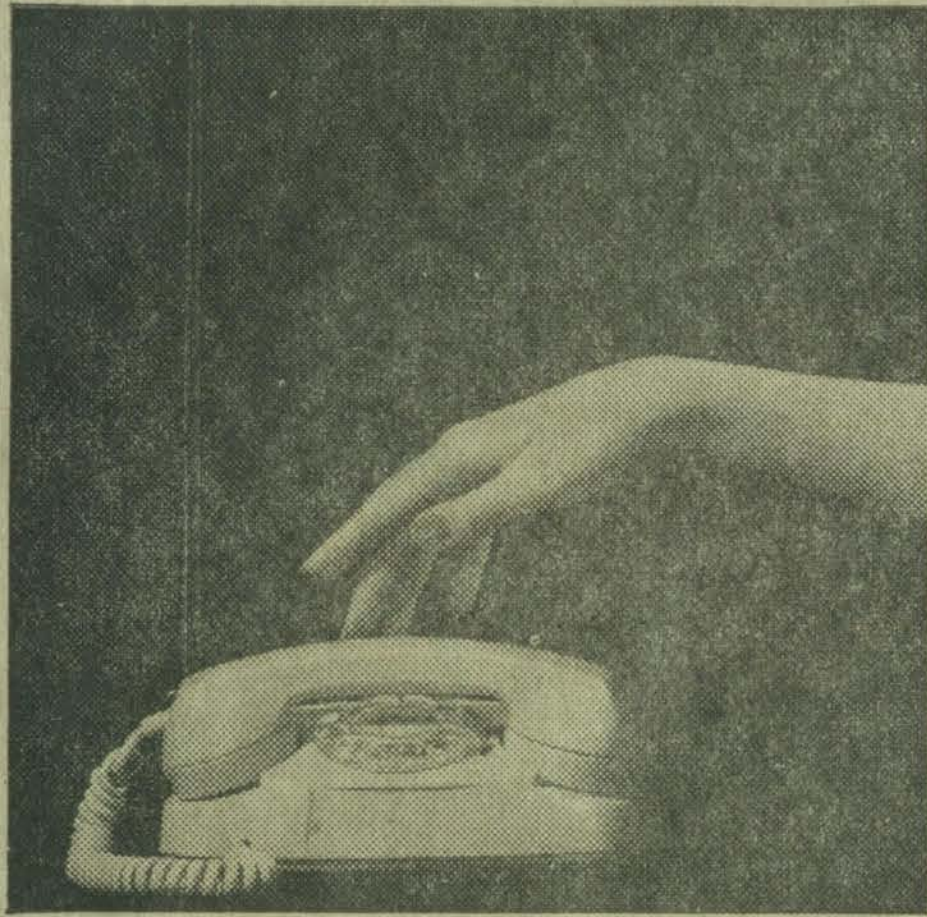

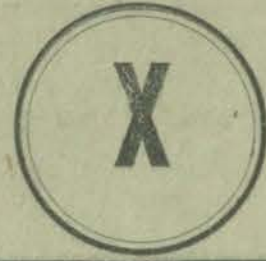

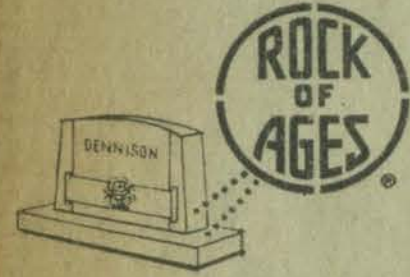

21,000 Rainbow Trout Distributed In State; Hauled from Virginia

Frankfort, Ky., April 8 (Sp.)—More than 21,000 rainbow trout, of catchable size, have been delivered to 12 streams and the tailwaters of three lakes this week. Minor Clark, commissioner, Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, announced today.

The trout, around eight inches in length, have been hauled from the federal hatchery at Paint Bank, Virginia, in four trucks and have been placed in Kentucky waters conducive to trout growth.

This is the first in a series of three such deliveries to be made to the favorable waters, with the second and third deliveries scheduled for June and July.

Deliveries were made to the tailwaters of Lake Cumberland, Buckhorn and Rough River Reservoirs and the following streams: Kinniconick in Lewis county; Swift Camp in Wolfe; Cloverlick and Kingdom Come in Harlan; Laurel Fork in Jackson; Crooked Creek in Rockcastle; Lynn Camp in Hart; Sinking Fork in Breckinridge; Casey Creek in Trigg; Sulphur Springs in Simpson; Trammel Creek in Allen, and Mill Creek in Powell.

JARMAN AND LOPEZ TALK FUTURE OF INSTITUTIONS

For several months discussions have been carried on between Dr. B. H. Jarman, president of Pikeville College, and Eugene Lopez, administrator of the Methodist hospital, as to the future of the two neighboring institutions.

Both institutions are situated on Peach Orchard Hill overlooking the city of Pikeville, both institutions are faced with the need of expanded facilities, neither can expand at its present site. Both institutions—one more than 75 years old, the other a youngster of 41 years—have dedicated their teaching and their services to Eastern Kentucky and to the region.

Pikeville College, with its increased student enrollment and the Methodist hospital, making long range plans for expansion, have been faced with finding a solution beneficial and acceptable to both institutions. For some time the possibility of Pikeville College acquiring the Methodist hospital property has been under consideration.

The Methodist hospital, with its increased patient load and increased demand on its facilities,

must re-locate. Pikeville College, with a 20% overall increase in enrollment last year and a 50% increase in boarding students and with acceptance for next year's freshman class 400% above the 1963 enrollment, must also plan for the future.

The Methodist hospital's projected expansion and re-location plan calls for a 200-bed hospital, a 50-bed nursing home, a 50-unit nurses' residence and a Medical Arts building within the complex.

As the hospital facilities are vacated the college will probably make use of the adjacent property for expanded classrooms, dormitories and badly needed parking area.

Pikeville College, a church related college established in 1889, has grown from a one-building, one-teacher preparatory school to a fully accredited four-year college with a faculty of seventy-five, a four million dollar plant that includes 19 buildings and a thousand-acre farm. The 1964-65 operating budget was \$750,000. The endowment funds are now over \$750,000. Pikeville College has had two successful development funds. The one completed in 1964 brought in pledges for approximately \$100,000. With no entrance restrictions as to race, color, sex or nationality, Pikeville College's current student body enrollment is nearly 800 and represents 19 states and four foreign countries.

The Methodist hospital, a voluntary non-profit community institution, opened its doors Christmas Day, 1924, with 50 beds. Two additions have been made in its 40-year history. The second, completed in 1952, brought bed capacity to the present total of 150, plus 24 bassinets. The active medical staff of the hospital is composed of 21 physicians and surgeons. These include specialists in radiology, pathology, surgery, urology, gynecology, ophthalmology and internal medicine. The hospital carries on two fully accredited teaching programs—the School for Licensed Practical Nurses through the Mayo State Vocational School, of Paintsville, and the School of Medical Technology with Pikeville College.

Wagner To Chair Chemistry Section

Dr. William Wagner, professor of chemistry at the University of Kentucky, will succeed Dr. Lyle Dawson on July 1 as chairman of the UK Department of Chemistry. Dr. Dawson, distinguished professor of physical chemistry, will return to full-time teaching and research at the institution.

FIRST FIVE LIST, PLAN

State Plans Program To Name Most Wanted Fugitive Criminals

Frankfort, Ky.—Kentucky, with its State Police inaugurating a "First Five Fugitive Program" (FFFP), is the first state in the nation to launch a plan similar to the 10 most-wanted criminals program made famous by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Col. James E. Bassett, State Police director, said the program will be started in Kentucky to combat a growing crime rate. He added that a list of the five most-wanted criminals in this state is expected to be released by late April.

A committee composed of representatives of the State Police, the Kentucky Sheriffs Association, and the Kentucky Peace Officers Association has been formed to select the fugitives from names sent in by officers throughout the Commonwealth.

"The success of the program," Bassett added, "will depend to a large degree upon the support and cooperation of news media in widely circulating the names and physical descriptions of the five most-wanted criminals."

According to the F.B.I., no other state has attempted a program of this magnitude.

Bassett reported that crime activity last year in Kentucky increased by an alarming rate.

The FFFP list will be changed only when one of the fugitives is caught. At the start, only fugitives believed to be in Kentucky will be placed on the list, but a fugitive will remain on the list if he is believed to have left the state.

Forms already have been sent to all police departments and sheriffs in Kentucky. Officers and prosecuting attorneys will suggest fugitives who should be on the list and forward the form back to the committee.

Both Ashland Police Chief Lewis Mutters, president of the Kentucky Police Officers Association, and McCracken county sheriff D. Y. Perdue, president of the Kentucky Sheriffs Association, praised the program and pledged the full support of their organizations.

 The Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs will hold its annual convention in Louisville, May 26-28, with activities geared to Kentucky Homecoming Year. The Kentucky Restaurant Association's Annual Convention, April 20-22, will be opened officially by Mrs. Edward T. Breathitt and dedicated to promoting Kentucky Homecoming in restaurants all over the Commonwealth. Miss Cattie Lou Miller, commissioner of the State Department of Public Information, will address the convention April 21, and Governor Breathitt will appear on April 22 to give Kentucky Homecoming a final boost.

Honorary Degrees To Be Given by UK
 The trustees of the University of Kentucky have selected six men to be awarded honorary degrees at May commencement exercises. They are Gov. Edward T. 36 Beef Bulls Average \$416.11 at Princeton

The University of Kentucky Ag Experiment Station animal science department's recent performance-test beef bull sale had an average of \$416.11, recap of sale figures shows.

The sale was at the Princeton Experiment Substation in Caldwell County. Some 36 bulls were offered and brought a total of \$14,980 for the lot, says Dr. Roy Gray, animal husbandman.

Highest selling bull sold for \$1,000. This bull, a polled Hereford, was the highest indexing bull in the sale. The second highest bull was an Angus that sold for \$900. It was second high indexer. (Indexing is scoring a bull on weight for day of age, conformation and other factors, Gray explained.)

There were 11 Angus bulls sold, which averaged \$471.31; 11 polled Herefords averaging \$464.09, 13 Herefords averaging \$341.15, and one Short-horn, for \$250. Each bull had been performance-tested at the Princeton station.

"The sale points out that all 36 bulls sold remained in Kentucky," Gray said, "and that the animals averaged \$416 a head for performance-tested animals. Other bull sales in Kentucky the last year and year and a half show the effect of a depressed cattle market. The willingness of Kentucky beef producers to pay for performance-tested bulls indicates future planning and the realization that this performance information on beef cattle is important to Kentucky beef producers."

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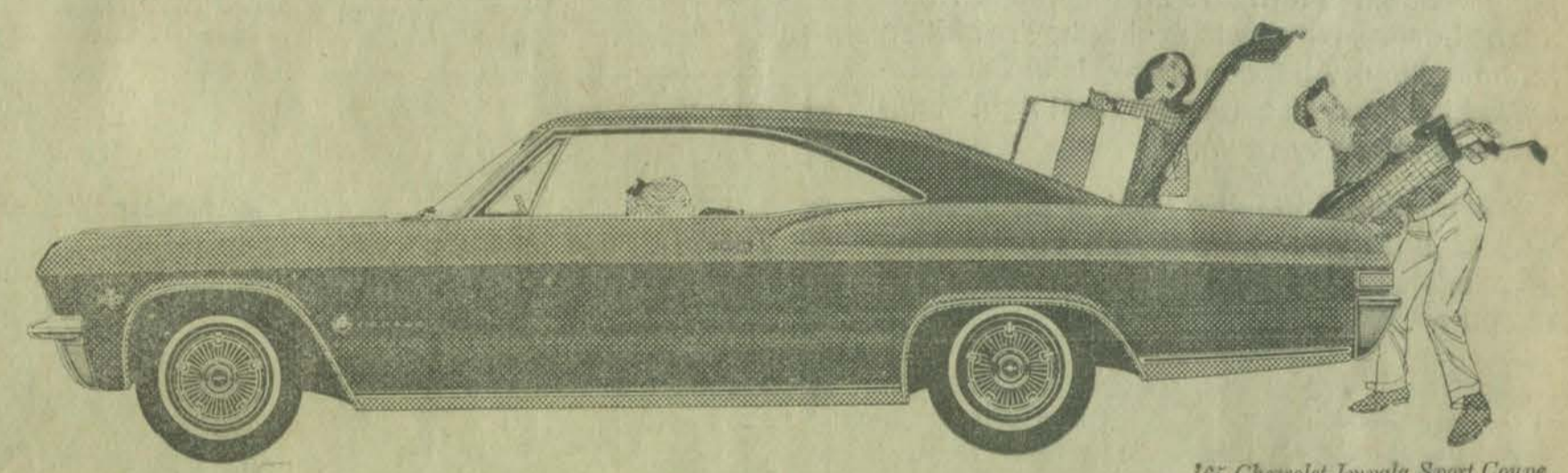
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FEWER FOREST FIRES SEEN IN KY. FOR '65

Frankfort—State Natural Resources Commissioner J. O. Matlick has reported that 1965 may be Kentucky's best year so far in forest fire control. The record of the first three months of the year, Matlick said, shows a decrease of 152 in the number of fires and a 42.4 per cent reduction in acreage destroyed by fire.

"Last year, by the end of March, 690 fires had burned 12,865 acres," Matlick said. "That was a good record, but now we have surpassed it with only 338 fires and 7,294 acres burned during the same period of time."

Matlick pointed out that the official Spring fire season began March 1 and lasts through May 15.

The state's organized fire-protection system covers 101 of the 120 counties and a total of 10.6 million acres of woodlands. The 19 less-wooded counties, not included in the organized system, are protected under a 1,670-man "citizen firefighter" volunteer program, conducted by the Natural Resources division of forestry.

As the system's "backbone," the division currently maintains 50 major pieces of forestry equipment, 154 manned fire-watch towers, 10 fire-weather stations, four airplanes, and nearly 60 miles of access roads or fire trails. Firefighters include about 1,100 warden crews and a force of 8,800 men across the state.

"If we are to maintain and, we hope, even better the record," forestry director Gene Butcher said, "we will need the cooperation and help of every citizen. For the most part, we have gotten it."

"In particular, that means strict observance of the fire laws and reporting of any violations that anyone might come across."

The basic laws, he noted, are that:

* During the spring fire season (March 1-May 15, the only time when fires—for debris burning or other lawful purposes—may be set in the vicinity of woodlands is between 4:30 p.m. and midnight, according to Central Standard or "sun" time.

* At all times, persons starting fires must observe all responsible precautions, including a distance of at least 150 feet in all directions from any woodland or brushland. No fire should be started during prevailing high winds.

* Although tobacco farmers and certain others may burn off land, such as plant beds, at any time during the day, they must also comply with the "reasonable precautions" rule and must keep watch over any fires started.

* Wood mills and processing plants of any kind which are

not entirely closed by fire-proofing or shielding must observe reasonable precautions, start no fire within a distance of 150 feet from woodlands or 100 feet from any sawdust or "slab" (wood reject) piles.

* No lighted match, cigarette or other flaming or glowing substance is to be thrown from a moving vehicle or left within the limits of a road right-of-way.

* No backfire may be started without the direct supervision and authorization of the forestry division, on private or public property.

* Fires to capture or destroy wildlife are forbidden.

* "Unlawful and improperly supervised fires." Butcher emphasized, "needlessly cost human lives as well as property loss. It is important to obey these laws."

The Conference program opened Sunday, April 11, with a 4-H Congressional Banquet highlighting the day's program.

Kentucky Congressman attending the Banquet included Senator John Sherman Cooper and Representatives Frank A. Stubblefield, District 1; William H. Natcher, District 2; Tim Lee Carter, District 5; John C. Watts, District 6; and Carl D. Perkins, District 7.
